Come out to Memphis on Main, Friday June 1st for our final 1st Friday event. Tee Dee Young, who has been called "Kentucky's Best Kept Secret," will be rocking the house at 10:00pm. The Gavin Stolte Project will open for Tee Dee at Memphis on Main at 8:00.

Tee Dee Young born in Lexington, Kentucky, and got his start playing the guitar at the age of thirteen mentored by the late Mr. Harrison Coleman. He learned to sing from his father, gospel singer Leonard Young, and was influenced by his brother George Young, who encouraged him to never change his style. Tee Dee has performed at blues clubs such as The Cotton Club, Albert King's, B.B. King's and Kingston Mines. He has opened for Johnny Rawls, Guitar Shorty, Big Bill Morgan, Albert King and Lil "Howling" Wolf among others.

Tee Dee was voted 2011 Beale Street Blues King by the Beale Street Merchants Association in Memphis, Tenn. He has four albums. The most recent, Dream the Blues, was released in January 2011.

## Candy Foster Lifetime Achievement Celebration By Sandy Hannum

Sunday night May 20 was filled with fond memories, lots of laughs, and fabulous music as the community celebrated the lifetime achievements of Candy Foster – not that he is anywhere near done yet!! As his daughter pointed out, everyone just wanted to share their love now at the peak of his career, rather than later when he is gone. It is so much more fun this way.

The evening consisted of a lively progression of stunning musical performances by the Shades of Blue, DaJaVu, and several guest singers. DaJaVu, the three lovely young women who sing and dance with the Shades of Blue, also have lots of personality. They did a great job of keeping the show moving along, and keeping it visually interesting with several beautiful costume changes. DaJaVu jumpstarted the evening with "Proud Mary."

Candy received several awards for different aspects of his life – Family Man, Humanitarian, Community Leader, Entertainer, and Lifetime Achievement. Mayors Prussing and Gerard presented him with the keys to the cities of Urbana and Champaign. Interspersed among the short award presentations were individual songs by well-known guest artists who had ties to Candy Foster. Sharika Elison sung a jazzy rendition of "God Bless the Child." Kathy Harden belted out a fabulous "Down Home Blues." She mentioned that she had been one Candy Foster's Buttercups, the group that preceded DaJaVu.

Andy Duncanson sang a rich and gritty "Stormy Monday." He also took the time to thank Candy for his mentorship. Dawna Nelson sang a great version of "Little by Little." There was also an interesting performance by members of the lota Phi Theta fraternity, to which Candy Foster belongs. The young men did a routine that involved intricate hand and body slapping percussion and (continued on next page) movement, along with shouts, similar to a haka. I don't know how else to describe it. It was exciting and fun to watch.

Best of all, Rich Cibelli got up and talked about Prairie Crossroads Blues Society and the work we are doing. He presented Candy with a plaque, making him an honorary member for life. Candy then said a few words about how important it is to keep Blues alive and that he is glad that our organization is doing this good work. Yes!!

## Local Bands Take the Stage at Champaign Blues, Brews & BBQs By Lorri Coey

What a great festival we have to look forward to right in our own town at the end of the month. While it's very exciting to get a chance to see national acts like The Royal Southern Brotherhood, Lil' Ed and Nick Moss, it's equally exciting to see some of our local bands get a chance to showcase their talent before a large crowd. This year that opportunity belongs to four PCBS member bands.

On Friday Alex Jenkins and the Bombers will be opening the festival on the Central Illinois Bank Stage from 5:00-6:30 pm. This will be a great way to kick off the weekend. Alex Jenkins and the Bombers' influences include jazz, rockabilly, R&B, Motown and Stax. And they've got a great mix of "been there done that" with Alex Jenkins, who grew up in the area of Chicago's Maxwell Street, and Tim Jenkins, an early fan of Motown, mixed with the college-age energy and enthusiasm of Codie Snyder, saxophonist and music education major and Mike Crisp, bassist and alumni of Illinois State University jazz combo.

On Saturday you'll find The Diva & The Dude taking the stage from 1:45-3:00 pm. The Diva, aka Kathy Harden, will win your heart with her great smile, huge voice and high kicks if the mood strikes. She describes herself as a small town girl who sings from her heart. That she does. Her partner on stage, The Dude, Andy Baylor, is a guitarist extraordinaire and a bit of wild card. "Unpredictable and exciting, every performance is an event," says their Facebook page and that is true.

Following The Diva & The Dude, you'll have one of the Champaign-Urbana's best known and loved blues performers: Candy Foster. He plays from 3:30-4:45. Candy Foster was recently honored for his 50 years of work in the community and he's a special performer as well. Candy is well-known as one of the hardest working blues singers in the area. Candy has appeared with blues performers such as Etta James, Junior Wells and Stevie Wonder, just to name a few.

Rounding out our local blues bands performing at the festival is Hurricane Ruth. This powerful blues band was the PCBS entry in the 2012 IBC Challenge in Memphis. The band consists of Hurricane Ruth LaMaster, Gary Davis, Jim Engel and David Lumsden. You'll hear them playing some of their originals from their recent The Power of the Blues... # Hurricane Ruth is headed back to Champaign-Urbana By Lorri Coey

Hurricane Ruth, Prairie Crossroads Blues Society's entrant into the International Blues Challenge, will be back at Memphis on Main Saturday, June 9.

This band has traveled a long road since they won last year's local competition. They immediately got busy writing songs, rehearsing and released a CD, The Power of the Blues...Feels Like a Hurricane, before they headed to Memphis last January. In Memphis they were chosen to compete for The King of Beale Street and they've been invited back to play there later this year.

The band hasn't been taking it easy since then. They've been writing even more new songs and playing venues throughout central and southern Illinois. They've got several blues festivals on their schedule for this summer.

This is a hard working, power blues band playing original music and having fun. Make it out to Memphis on Main to see how far they've come and get a little taste of where they might be going from here. I've heard a change of scenery helps to clear one's mind and enhances creativity. Taking that suggestion to heart, my wife Sherry and I packed the car and headed out on a musical voyage.

Our first stop was Memphis, Tennessee and The 2012 Beale Street Music Festival. This three day event kicks off the annual Memphis In May month-long celebration, including the World Championship BBQ Cooking Contest.

Some 410 miles of interstate later we arrived at our hotel in plenty of time to catch one of the first acts. We grabbed a quick bite and headed to see The North Mississippi All-Stars at one of several outdoor stages. Brothers Cody and Luther Dickinson and band put on a nice show featuring many fan favorites. Nevertheless, what impresses me most about these musicians is their ability to create such wonderful sounds with an assortment of instruments. This night Cody played an amplified washboard.

However, the highlight of my Friday night at the fest was none other than Johnny Winter, who for the first time that I can recall began his show standing up and playing. It was an amazing sight to see.

I must also mention the weather down in Memphis. Although it was close to 100 degrees on both Saturday and Sunday, it never rained the whole time the festival was going on. A little history lesson is needed here. You see Sherry and I made our first trip down to the music event way back in 1999 and have made it every year since except the last two. Each year we attended, (continued on next page) the sky above would open and pour down rain on the festival site. This would sometimes occur for hours at a time. That is why some regulars call the event "Memphis in Mud."

On Saturday we caught a variety of performers including Kenny Wayne Shepherd, Larry McCray, local legends The Bo Keys and even Gary Clark Jr. On Sunday we witnessed the always impressive Herbie Hancock as well as 2012 BMA Winner Charlie Musselwhite. We ended the night and our trip to the festival with The Robert Randolph Band.

But our musical journey would not end yet. We still had much to do and see including making a stop in Springfield, Illinois and a place we had always wanted to visit called The Alamo.

Studebaker John and The Hawks happen to be the artist appearing on this Monday night. The Chicago area blues musician put on a great show with an array of master slide guitar work combined with an awesome display of harp playing as well. He can do it all!

If you get the chance go out and catch one of his shows. I guarantee you won't be disappointed by this incredible showman and his band of seasoned musicians.

No matter what your opinion of Bonamassa, one has to admit that this 35-year-old guitar player can hold his own with anybody. He proved it to me and many others during his two and a half hour sold out show.

Meanwhile back home for a change of clothes and a few days rest, we next headed out toward the Windy City area for "A Symposium on Race, Gender & the Blues." Hosted by Dominican University, this event featured several discussions and presentations and included many of the top Chicago Blues musicians and singers. In particular many of the participants during the event's opening session including Sugar Blues, Billy Branch, Matthew Skoller, Deitra Farr, Sharon Lewis and even Lincoln "Chicago Beau' Beachamp stated that black blues musicians are and have been treated differently than white musicians and singers for far too long. They all agree it has to end.

Among the many reasons given for this feeling include the difference in pay, promotion and festival bookings as well as the continuing decline in the number of attendees at blues shows.

Another issue that also stood out to me occurred when Sharon Lewis who was speaking as part of the Chicago's Blues Divas session mentioned that she gets treated better in Europe then in places she performs in Chicago. Others in her panel including Nellie Travis and Deitra Farr agreed and went as far to say that foreign visitors to Chicago Blues clubs now make up most of the fan base. If nothing else, what I took away from my visit to the event is the recurring theme that the state of blues music and the industry as a whole is in the need of some real attention and review.

Several times during the event I had to remind myself to keep an open mind to what was being voiced and that it wasn't being directed towards me or what we are trying to accomplish with our own blues society. However, I have to admit it did open my eyes and I can say with no doubt that there remain some underlying issues when it comes to race in this country with no easy answers in sight.

That being said, the highlight of my visit to this year's symposium was watching and then meeting Marie Dixon, President of Blues Heaven Foundation, being awarded the 2012 Blues and the Sprit Award. She is truly one of the nicest persons you will ever meet.

It was this night I was given the opportunity to represent our organization and present a PCBS Honorary Membership to Gerald "Candy" Foster. The entertainer and friend to many was being honored for his 50 plus years in the music business.

What a terrific night filled with the celebration of music and praise for a man who has given so much of himself back to our community. Even with the threat of rain lingering, Foellinger Auditorium on the University of Illinois campus was filled with many who wanted to be part of this special moment.

I really enjoyed Sandra Hannum's article about the event and especially these comments "Overall it was one of those feel-good events that makes you glad to live in this community and to be part of the PCBS". I could not agree more.


To end this part of our musical journey Sherry and I had (continued in next column)

> Paul Rishell "Talking Guitar" Mojo Rodeo Records Reviewed by Rich Cibelli



If you're into Pre-War Blues, then take a listen to Talking Guitar, the new release by Paul Rishell with special guest Annie Raines. Released on Mojo Rodeo Records, "Talking Guitar," is a journey back in time to the sounds of a lone singer and the likes of an acoustic or resonator guitar.

This 13 song CD starts off with Rishell doing a version of "Fannin' Street, "penned by Lead Belly and follows up with "Special Rider Blues," by Skip James. Both feature outstanding vocals and brilliant finger picking technique.

The previously mentioned Rishell is a master guitarist who has dedicated many years of studying both the music and the lives of those who created the genre of "Acoustic, Pre-War Blues." (continued on next page) Born in Brooklyn, New York in 1950, Rishell gravitated toward music in his early teens. It was also during this time that he was incredibly moved by the sounds of a man named Son House. From that point on Rishell decided he was going to learn all he could about the music of House and those like him.

Rishell eventually decide it was time to make a move to the Cambridge, Massachusetts area to start performing at clubs and make a name for himself. He also found time to befriend the up and coming blues performers of the time. Along the way and to his credit Rishell performed with the likes of Howlin' Wolf, Johnny Shines, John Lee Hooker and many more.

Rishell has recorded several albums over his storied career and it was during work on an album called "Swear To Tell The Truth," that he met the harmonica virtuoso Annie Raines. The two have been music partners ever since.

I had the privilege of seeing Rishell and Raines perform at the 2011 Mississippi Valley Blues Festival. They are truly amazing to watch as they work their magic sound. The pair has opened for performers of all genres including Dr. John, Ray Charles, Little Feat, Leon Russell and even Asleep At the Wheel.

On "Taking Guitar," Raines contributes on three of the CD's tracks including the Tommy Johnson classic "Big Road Blues," "I'm Gonna Jump and Shout," which was written by Rishell and on the project's final piece, "Michigan Water Blues," created by Jelly Roll Morton.

As far as this release is concerned, I enjoyed each and every song and I think you will as well. Paul Rishell's latest and all acoustic project is both a reflection and deep devotion to the music he loves and to those he has dedicated his life's work to. I hope you'll find time to take a listen.
