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FOREWORD


This catalogue offers a snapshot of what the small press publisher John Nicholson called a "strange, invisible world" in 1988. As the so-called Information Age of the 1990s sped towards the long-fantasised ideal of 24/7 internet connectivity, small press activity — curiously — remained, for the most part, strange and invisible despite its obvious exuberance. This is borne out by the absence of ephemera from this period within library databases. This was by no means for want of action and enthusiasm...

The 1990s explosion of small press and autonomous publishing was marked by exhibitions such as the V&A National Art Library's showcase of *Smile* magazines in March 1992 (an anonymous open-identity magazine producible by anybody), Printed Matter's New York exhibition of photocopier artists' books a month later, and the October 1994 Counter Intelligence underground publishing exhibition (at the then-squatted 121 Centre in Brixton). Small press fairs flourished over the course of the 1980s and 90s, and most importantly, new specialised distributors functioned as icebreakers at the cultural forefront, facilitating movement and ingress of exciting new underground media across a generally frozen expanse.

A portion of one such pioneering London distributor's archive forms the core of this current catalogue, focussing on the period between 1985 and 2000 (notwithstanding a few American psychedelic printed anomalies from the late 1960s — see #67 and #111). Being at the eye of the small press hurricane, this distributor moved within a world of radical zines, underground comics, mail art, experimental poetry, eccentric tracts, newsletters, bulletins, catalogues, fringe Situationism, 'pataphysical assaults, unsolicited manuscripts, techno proselytisings, postmodern logorrhea, uncategorisable free/priceless ephemera, etc., covering all forms of counterculture, and described its enduring invisibility as something of an enigma — the materials mostly being published "immediately before the internet, which then did not make it to the internet for reasons I cannot fathom." The diligence and genius of this London small press champion means that much material has been saved from vanishing entirely. It is hoped that this catalogue — presenting over two-hundred rare, authentic, original publications — can be of value itself as an aid for this growing area of study.


Before the internet subsumed autonomous media, there was much truth in the strapline of the American small press directory Factsheet Five which declared "every crank in the world would love to send you strange and wonderful rantings. (...) Discover a universe of articulate nonconformists". The present collection bears witness to this. The "strange, invisible world" of late 20th century small press is invisible often due to its very "strangeness", but it is also worthwhile to note some other contributing factors: the Victorian-era dynamic of the rare book trade lurks conspicuously (possibly extending to the custom of print runs strategically languishing under beds?) — a sensibility nodded at within items #27 and #93 here, and felt more luxuriously in the activities of rarity publishers such as Aporia Press. Many artists and authors were also furtive about their experiments (as seen in letters and statements accompanying some items here), testing the waters with very limited editions. Some, meanwhile, set out to wilfully subvert bibliographical endeavours (as with the aforementioned Smile, described as "a librarian's nightmare", or the spurious issue numbering of Dr. Spin's Lies [item #55]). Disorientatingly, formats could radically change from issue to issue (compare the two Nozone items #106 and #107). Elsewhere, flirtations with controversy could condemn a publication. Others might neglect the legal deposit rigmarole (i.e. abstaining from sending copies to national libraries), possibly to avoid any threat of alerting the Inland Revenue to their publishing activities in the improbable event of profitability. In many cases, ephemera was simply given away freely, which tends to amplify ephemerality; eminent book-scout Martin Stone once remarked that if you charge a healthy sum for a book, you can guarantee it will be preserved by its purchaser and will live on into the foreseeable future. Ephemera can thereby be converted into permanenta. By this logic, regarding free distribution, it might be feared a significant proportion of printed social history is lost to oblivion.

It may be the case that major library databases do not record the bulk of this ephemera, but there do exist many "off-grid" libraries, notably Railton Road's 121 Centre in Brixton and 56a Infoshop in Southwark. These important radical social centres hold large archives. Such centres, together with other archivist-curators (independent or otherwise), and booksellers from around the world, hold the keys to measuring the depth of the small press iceberg. An opportune contribution to a depth survey follows herein, with the added bonus of everything being for sale at Marcus Campbell Art Books, 43 Holland Street, London.









An anti-censorship, paranoia-analysing zine — formerly a mail-order catalog, but magazineified in this inaugural issue of its second volume — containing a mix of

"Christian conspiracy and hidden history with anarcho-anti-imperialist 'green' politics". Interviews with cult eccentric musician Tiny Tim, radionics expert and UFOlogist Trevor James Constable, creator of the Schwa conceptual art project Bill Barker, and Debbie Goad of the controversial *Answer Me!* magazine. Articles on the feasibility of Free Energy and its coverage in the press, H.P. Lovecraft, revelatory dreams, fair use and copyright (focussing on Negativland's U2 lawsuit — a flyer for the group's book *Fair Use* is loosely inserted), paradoxical addiction to "twelve-step" addiction recovery programs, the mysterious science of psionics, and reviews, book lists, etc.

explore various social and cultural environments with an aim of understanding how they are used as part of the social factory of capitalism, and to document the activities of those operating at its extremities or against the general current".

James, Peter Straub, and Phil Rickman] it contains three of my own short ghost stories, a seven part comic strip story also entitled Darkly Sinister, a creepy crossword and a three-page article referring to factual phenomena." Every page has a small entity in the corner. Eerie juvenilia. Very rare and unrecorded.



Paperback, 8pp. Very rare itinerary for this ambitious 1994 festival of anarchism in London, listing workshops, performances, debates, music, films, stalls, protest, street actions, lectures, zine conferences and an exhibition organised by 121 Railton Road of autonomous self-published matter "creating strange new categories of their own". Includes sections on feminism, animal rights, computers (includes quotes from the Fast Breeder BBS), and even "orgy rooms" organised by Thee Temple ov Psychick Youth (TOPY) who are also listed as overseeing paganism and occult actions. The Edgar Broughton Band and The Fugs are listed as participating in the famous "Out Demons Out!" ritual to levitate the House of Commons — the famous Levitation of Parliament stunt. Very rare. An early issue of Le Dernier Cri collective's in-house zine, consisting of impressive silkscreen printed bizarre madcap artworks. The group was founded in 1993. This issue cites Frédéric Poincelet, Henriette Valium [aka Patrick Henley], Nuvish, Pierre la Police, Y5P5, X90, El cHico Solo, Graham Harwood, Pigassou, Kerosen, Colas Meulen, Frederic Levy-Hadida, Stéphane Blanquet et Olive, Gary Panter, Didier Poiraud, Philippe Huger, Raymond Reynaud, Blexbolex [aka Bernard Granger], among many others. Small amounts of text in French and English. Mail artist Mark Pawson had described the group thus: "Ignored by the French art establishment and treated like genuine outsider artists, Le Dernier Cri have been forced to build up their own network of misfit artists by seeking out and publishing comic art delinquents from around the world." A spectacular mix of visionary, abstract, psychedelic, comic strip, and outsider art. Very good condition. £225

Fox and Sister Judith Savard, "[drawing] on many sources and uses many believing people to illustrate the impossible: the meaning of love". Sister Savard was head of Marymount Collage art department, and Fox was director of community-orientated group Full Circle Associates, credited as being instrumental in ending the 1967 East Harlem riots. Both worked with Spanishspeaking residents of New York and were involved in mural-painting and the city's late-1960s "Summer in the City" anti-poverty programme which aimed to "clean and cheer up slum streets". An extremely rare colour artistic production combining late sixties psychedelia with non-secular (and understated) religiosity. It consists of 16 loose-leaf circular glossy sheets printed recto and verso housed in original printed envelope, resembling an LP record. Artworks are pop-art style photographs of New York residents with inspirational quotes from figures ranging from E.E. Cummings to Camus. The project was an outgrowth of the "Summer in the City" programme which commenced with A Journal of City People Who Unbelievably Believe in the City and the Fullness of Life to be Found There. According to the preface, Full Circle was the last publication in the series.
