



Music in the Key of New

by Peter Rutenberg

For the first time, Walt Disney Concert Hall resounds with the Los Angeles Master Chorale under the direction of Grant Gershon. In this once-in-a-lifetime concert, we hear some of the oldest and newest music written for that most expressive of instruments — the human voice. Tonight's repertoire has been selected both for its inherent musical value and to highlight the hall's exceptional acoustics as well as the sense of high celebration unique to this occasion.

Veni creator spiritus Come, creative spirit

It is fitting and most symbolic that the first music sung by the Master Chorale in Walt Disney Concert Hall should be this timeless hymn invoking the creative spirit to "fill our hearts" and "enflame our senses." The history of Roman Catholic plainchant is long and varied with origins in ancient Jewish tradition. It is now known that the Frankish clerics exerted a considerable influence over its development in the ninth century and that the majority of what is referred to as Gregorian Chant was solidified not during Pope Gregory's lifetime but in the 11th–13th centuries. Veni creator spiritus dates from the 10th century and serves liturgically as a hymn at Pentecost. Its popularity is attested throughout the Middle Ages and Renaissance, with Gustav Mahler eventually appropriating its text for his Eighth Symphony.

Singet dem Herrn ein neues Lied Sing to the Lord a new song

Johann Sebastian Bach's motets are unique among the master's output. They are not as grand in scope as the *Mass in B Minor, the Magnificat*, or the *Passions*; neither are they reliant on vocal and instrumental soloists like the cantatas. Rather they feature the chorus in a virtuosic role. While the motets were suitable for church use, it is probable that they were composed for other kinds of celebrations (official birthdays and affairs of state) or for funerals. The boundless joy evident in the antiphonal fanfares that open *Singet dem Herrn ein neues Lied* for double chorus distinguish its purpose as one of great festivity. Beginning with the

words "The children of Zion," Bach seizes his first opportunity to write a fugue. The Choir I sopranos lead off, followed by altos, then tenors. The basses of both choirs intone the fourth statement of the "subject" in unison, succeeded by the Choir II tenors, altos, and finally sopranos, making for an extended arc. The second section gives different thematic material to each group: Choir II sings the tender chorale and Choir I comments on and embellishes each phrase in response. The mood of joy returns in the third section, continuing into the fugal fourth section. Here the choirs merge to sing "Everything that hath breath, praise the Lord" — the very motto engraved on the composer's organ cabinet in Leipzig.

Two world premieres

Composer/Conductor/Performer Bobby McFerrin is well known to a wide range of audiences as the singer's singer. The son of opera singers, Mr. McFerrin first came to public attention in 1981 following his appearance at the Kool Jazz Festival in New York. He went on to work with a veritable "Who's Who" of jazz performers and won the Grammy Award® for best male jazz vocalist in 1986. Early experiences in a broad range of vocal and instrumental techniques gave way in the 1990s to engagements as a composer for and conductor of orchestras, opera companies, and his own virtuoso ensemble *Voicestra*.

His composing partner, Roger Treece, has spent several years developing a new voice in choral music, combining his own compositional expertise with McFerrin's vocal innovations. This collaboration has resulted in a body of work that will soon be released as a Bobby McFerrin Choral Album. In 2003, McFerrin and Treece collaborated on a commission for Chicago's Ravinia Festival: *He Ran for the Train* was premiered by the Chicago Symphony and Chicago Children's Choir and acclaimed by the Chicago press. Influenced by jazz and gospel as a child, Mr. Treece studied composition at the University of Northern Colorado, and later with Lyle Mays of the Pat Metheny Group, among others. In addition to his symphonic works, he has written for film, television, radio, and

commercials. His work as a composer, arranger and producer has earned him two Grammy nominations, 14 Downbeat awards.

Brief Eternity (2003) is the first of two works written by McFerrin and Treece especially for this program and is scored for six-part chorus, two flutes and harp, to an original text by Don Rosler. The use of oxymorons such as "timeless time," "brief eternity," and "small infinity" establish the text's allegorical themes of "mystery in the human experience" from origin to destiny, and of "longing for the unknowable or unattainable," or, as Mr. Treece calls it, "a glimpse of heaven." He goes on to explain that, "The melodic themes were conceived first. Then the piece, with its romantic character, was fleshed out later."


By contrast, *Messages* (2003), scored for chorus, low strings, percussion and soprano saxophone, grew from a single ostinato pattern of eighth notes. A first theme was developed from this pattern, then two more contrasting themes were added to yield an ABAC form. This pattern comprises the first and last thirds of the work, with the final C-section extended by a free-form coda. The central section explores the medium of improvisation against a backdrop of fixed score, as the saxophone paraphrases the soprano chorus in dialogue. The ostinato figure inspired the text as well: its pattern reminded Mr. Rosler of Morse Code which in turn suggested the use of more than a dozen languages to deliver various "messages" emblemized by the entreaty, "Heed the voices of time."


Harmonium

Massachusetts-born, Harvard-educated, and California-based, composer John Adams is surely one of the most powerful and eloquent figures in contemporary music today. Several of his works have entered the repertoire and are widely performed around the world, among them, Shaker Loops, Harmonielehre, The Chairman Dances, and the 1981 Harmonium. Drawing on current events rather than history, Mr. Adams created a cultural revolution of his own with his two operas, Nixon in China (1987) and The Death of Klinghoffer (1991) — both controversial and provocative, both a creative expansion of the operatic medium. San Francisco has served as Mr. Adams' base since he joined the faculty of that city's Conservatory in the late 1970s, and later as composer-in-residence with San Francisco Symphony into the mid-1980s.

Mr. Adams together with Steve Reich and Philip Glass are the 'triad' of American Minimalism, yet the word hardly does justice to Adams' musical language: Maximalism is more in tune with his style. Harmonium's expansive three movements were born ironically in the cramped quarters of the composer's Haight-Ashbury apartment. To understand the work's breadth and energy, Adams offers this description: "In Shaker Loops, I utilized the repetitive techniques that Terry Riley first proposed in his In C. Rather than set up small engines of motivic materials and let them run free. I used the fabric of continually repeating cells to forge large architectonic shapes — creating a web of activity that was more detailed, more varied, light and dark, serene and turbulent. Ultimately I settled on three poems of transcendental vision. 'Negative Love' by John Donne examines the qualities of various forms of love, ascending like Plato's Symposium from the carnal to the divine. Musically, this meant a formal shape first, a single, pulsing note that, by process of accretion, becomes a tone cluster, then a chord, and eventually a huge, rippling current that takes on energy and mass until it crests in a cataract of sound. To date, I still consider 'Negative Love' one of the most satisfying architectural experiments in all my work. The two Dickinson poems show the polar opposites of her poetic voice. 'Because I Could Not Stop for Death' is the intimate, hushed Dickinson, whose beyond-the-grave monologue is a sequence of images from a short life seen through the lens of a slow-motion camera. Following the slow movement, the music enters a transition, gradually assuming weight, force and speed, until it is hurled headlong into the vibrant clangor of 'Wild Nights.' Here is the other side of Emily Dickinson, saturated with an intoxicated, ecstatic, pressing urge to dissolve herself in some private and unknowable union of Eros and Death."

Peter Rutenberg is producer of the Master Chorale's latest album, Glass · Salonen, as well as of Argento · Duruflé and the Grammy-nominated Lauridsen Lux Aeterna. He produced The First Art national radio series for nine years and is founding music director and conductor of Los Angeles Chamber Singers & Cappella, now in its fourteenth season. This is Mr. Rutenberg's sixth season as the Chorale's Program Annotator.

[meet the artists]



Grant Gershon (Music Director) has garnered tremendous critical acclaim during his two seasons at the helm of the renowned chorus. *The Los Angeles Times* proclaims, "Gershon is a direct, unfussy conductor, who values clarity, clean execution and immediate statements." He has

also been hailed for creating "a dark, rich sound awash with resonant sparkling amplitude" and his programming has been applauded for being "as warmly spiritual as it is ambitious."

Since joining the Chorale, Gershon has expanded the choir's repertoire considerably by conducting a number of world premieres, including Donald Crockett's *Broken Charms*, Tania León's *Rezos (Prayers)*, and Sharon Farber's "*Mother's Lament*," as well as the U.S. premiere of Esa-Pekka Salonen's first choral work, *Two Songs to Poems of Ann Jäderlund*.

Gershon has guest conducted the St. Paul Chamber Orchestra, Houston Grand Opera, Juilliard Opera Theatre, and the Finnish chamber orchestra *Avanti!*, among others, and has conducted performances at the Edinburgh, Vienna and Helsinki, Ravinia and Aspen Music Festivals, the Roma-Europa Festival and the Festival Otonno in Madrid.

Gershon is also in demand as a pianist for such leading singers as Kiri Te Kanawa, Peter Schreier, Rodney Gilfry and Audra McDonald. In October 2002, he and pianist Gloria Cheng made a special appearance at Royce Hall, under the auspices of the Los Angeles Philharmonic, reprising their acclaimed performance of John Adams' *Hallelujah Junction*, written for them.

In addition to recording with the Los Angeles Master Chorale, Gershon has made a number of other recordings, and served as chorus master on two Grammy Award-nominated recordings, *Sweeney Todd* (New York Philharmonic Special Editions) and Ligeti's *Grand Macabre* (Sony Classical).

Prior to joining the Chorale, Gershon served as assistant conductor of the Los Angeles Philharmonic from 1994–97. Gershon also served as Assistant Conductor/Principal Pianist with the Los Angeles Opera, where he participated in over forty productions and garnered a reputation as one of the country's exceptional vocal coaches.



Bobby McFerrin (co-composer of *Brief Eternity* and *Messages*) is one of the natural wonders of the music world. A ten-time Grammy Award winner, he is one of the world's best-known vocal innovators and improvisers, a world-renowned classical

conductor, the creator of one of the most popular songs of the late 20th century and a passionate spokesman for music education. His recordings have sold over 20 million copies, and his collaborations with Yo-Yo Ma, Chick Corea, the Vienna Philharmonic and Herbie Hancock have established him as an ambassador of both the classical and jazz worlds.

With a four-octave range and a vast array of vocal techniques, McFerrin is no mere singer; he is music's last true Renaissance man, a vocal explorer who has combined jazz, folk and a multitude of world music influences — choral, a cappella, and classical music — with his own ingredients.

In 1977, McFerrin decided to come out from behind the piano to test his skill as a vocalist, and in 1978, he started singing with the group Astral Project in New Orleans and then toured with legendary jazz vocal pioneer Jon Hendricks. Inspired by the completely improvised solo concerts of pianist Keith Jarrett, McFerrin and Linda Goldstein, his jazz vocalist producer, conspired to develop his innovative career as a solo vocalist. Bill Cosby arranged for his 1980 performance at the Playboy Jazz Festival, and a year later McFerrin made a triumphant appearance at the Kool Jazz Festival in New York.

In recent years, he has combined his love of improvisation with his conducting skills, extending his vocal journeys to larger groups of singers — whether trained or not. McFerrin's solo concerts have always included audience participation; McFerrin sees them not as sing-alongs but as a genuine collaborative process of making music in the moment. He's also developed that idea in more sophisticated settings with his longtime vocal ensemble Voicestra in the albums *Medicine Music* and *Circlesongs*, and in a project of choral works in collaboration with composer Roger Treece.

He maintains a dual career as a conductor and a solo performer, and continues to bring music to children, whether in his own improvised concerts or in special orchestral programs. In spite of all this activity, however, his greatest ambition is to spend as much time as possible at home with his wife of 25 years, Debbie, and their three children.



Don Rosler (lyricist for *Brief Eternity* and *Messages*) is a lyricist, musician, and producer, but at heart — a poet. Inspired by the music during an early stage of its composition, Don sought to imbue it with language that would express its essence.

The words, syllables, and sounds (from many languages) flow with and among the contours of the melodies, float down

through the harmonies, and fuse with the bedrock rhythms that characterize the transcendent nature of the music.

Prior to this collaboration, Don co-wrote and co-produced the John Margolis CD *Christine's Refrigerator*, due for release in 2004. One of the songs from this project, *Tanta Belleza* (So Much Beauty) is prominently featured in the upcoming HBO film *The Kidnapping of Ingrid Betancourt*. Two of his songs have enjoyed widespread commercial success on the soundtrack CDs for *Patria Minha* and *Quatro y Quatro* (both on the Global/Som Livre label).



Roger Treece (co-composer of *Brief Eternity* and *Messages*) has spent the past several years writing and producing a Bobby McFerrin Choral Album, which will be released in 2004. Treece and McFerrin's writing and vocal collabora-

tions, combining the world-renowned innovations of McFerrin with Treece's melodic and compositional expertise, are yielding genuine innovation in choral music, beautifully recorded and performed on the upcoming album with some of the finest vocalists from the world of classical, jazz, Broadway and pop.

In spring of 2003, McFerrin and Treece collaborated on another commission, this time for Chicago's Ravinia Festival, which yielded a new work entitled He Ran for the Train. The world premiere, by the Chicago Symphony and the Chicago Children's Choir, garnered laudatory reviews in the Chicago press. Roger Treece's work as a composer, arranger and producer has earned him two Grammy Nominations, 14 Downbeat awards and a first place at the Hollywood Film Festival. In addition to his symphonic works, he has collaborated with such notable jazz artists as The Manhattan Transfer, The New York Voices, Mark Murphy, Janis Siegel, and Toninho Horta. Roger's work also encompasses music for advertising, film, worldwide radio and television for Disney, PBS, Microsoft, The United Way, and McDonald's. Mr. Treece has taught college level jazz pedagogy and directed vocal jazz ensembles. His groups were the first ever to sweep all three vocal jazz categories in the DownBeat Student Recording Awards. He travels as a member of Bobby McFerrin's Voicestra and as a clinician, teaching and conducting his current workshop project, "Singing Rhythmically" in North America and Europe, including annual stints at the Rhythmic Conservatory in Copenhagen and Arhus, Denmark.



Alex Acuña (percussion) was born and raised in Lima, Peru. A self-educated musician, he was inspired by his father and brothers (all of whom were musicians) by the age of four. By the time Alex turned ten, he was already playing in

local bands. As a teenager, he was one of Peru's most accom-

plished session drummers, performing on many recording projects for artists as well as film and television productions

Alex has played with such musical greats as Elvis Presley and Diana Ross and became both a drummer and percussionist for one of the most innovative jazz groups of our time — Weather Report — recording *Black Market* and the famous *Heavy Weather* album.

Since his move to Los Angeles in 1978, Alex has earned the position of a valued session drummer and percussionist for recordings, television and motion pictures. His countless album credits and live performances are comprised of such diverse artist as Uz, Paul McCartney, Joni Mitchell, Al Jarreau, Ella Fitzgerald, Roberta Flack, Andre Crouch, Tracy Chapman, Sheryl Crow, Whitney Houston, Chic Corea, Antonio Carlos Jobim, Carlos Santana, The Gipsy Kings, Julio Iglesias, Herbie Hancock, Placido Domingo, Wayne Shorter and Joe Zawinul to name a few. Additionally, Alex has recorded film scores under the direction of Dave Grusin, Michele Legrand, Bill Conti, Marvin Hamlish, Mark Isham, Hans Zimmer, John Williams, and many more.

Alex's South American and Caribbean roots and understanding of contemporary and classical music make him a complete and skilled master musician. In 2000, Alex Acuña y Su Acuarela De Tambores received a Grammy® Award nomination for Best Traditional Tropical Latin Album for "Rhythms for a New Millennium."



Justo Almario (soprano saxophone) is a musical bridge-builder. As a musician, composer and arranger, Justo has combined elements of his native South American rhythms with American Jazz to create an artistry distinctively his own.

Justo went on to travel the globe with Mongo's group. While living in New York, he also worked with jazz giant Charles Mingus. After moving to Los Angeles, Justo joined the now legendary jazz-rock group Koinonia. He also began to work with other great artists, recording and performing with the likes of Linda Rondstadt, Roy Ayers, George Duke, Dave Grusin, Tito Puente, Machito, Master P, Queen Latifah, Cedar Walton, Terrance Blanchard, Joe Lovano, George Wein and Bebe Winans. He has contributed to numerous film and television soundtracks including *Dirty Dancing, Trading Places, Mambo Kings* and *The Birdcage*.

Recognized as Colombia's most outstanding jazz musician of his generation, Justo has established himself as an artist of major importance. Few musicians have integrated the musical traditions of the Americas so successfully. Justo lists John Coltrane, Cannonball Adderly, Antonio Carlos Jobim, Bach, Bartok and Debussy among his primary musical influences.

meet the artists [



One of America's most admired and frequently performed composers,

John Adams (composer of *Harmonium*)
was born in Worcester, Massachusetts, in
1947. After graduating from Harvard
University in 1971, he moved to California,

where he taught and conducted at the San Francisco
Conservatory of Music for ten years. His innovative concerts led to his appointment firstly as contemporary music adviser to the San Francisco Symphony and then as the orchestra's composer-in-residence between 1979 and 1985, the period in which his reputation became established with the success of such works as Harmonium and Harmonielehre.


In 1985 Adams began a collaboration with the poet Alice Goodman and stage director Peter Sellars that resulted in two operas, *Nixon in China* and *The Death of Klinghoffer*, worldwide performances of which made them among the most performed operas in recent history. A third stage work, *I Was Looking At The Ceiling And Then I Saw The Sky*, a "song play"with libretto by the poet June Jordan, was also staged in more than fifty performances in both the US and Europe. His most recent stage project, *El Niño*, a further collaboration with Peter Sellars, premiered in Paris in December 2000 and further performances took place in San Francisco in 2001, and in Los Angeles and Brooklyn in 2003, featuring the Master Chorale.

Adams' works have received numerous awards, among them the 1994 Royal Philharmonic Society Award for his *Chamber Symphony*, and the 1995 Grawemeyer Award for his *Violin Concerto*. In 2002 Adams compose On the *Transmigation of Souls* for the New York Philharmonic, a work written in commemoration of the first anniversary of the World Trade Center attacks. This work received the 2003 Pulitzer Prize for Music.

Adams most recent work is *My Father Knew Charles Ives*, a musical self-portrait of the composer's childhood in Concord, New Hampshire, where he played in marching bands with his father and first heard live jazz in the summer dance hall owned by his grandfather. Michael Tilson Thomas and the San Francisco Symphony premiered the work in April 2003.

Los Angeles Master Chorale celebrates its 40th Anniversary with this inaugural season at Walt Disney Concert Hall.

Recognized as one of Los Angeles' cultural treasures, the Chorale has received accolades for its innovative programming and its commitment to commissioning new works. Last June, the Master Chorale received the prestigious

ASCAP/Chorus America Award for Adventurous Programming.

The Los Angeles Times has stated that the Chorale "has become the most exciting chorus in the country under Grant Gershon," and also described the Chorale's performances as "masterly," "ethereal" and "alluring." Billboard says the Chorale's "singing and direction are first-rate."

Its groundbreaking 2003–04 season features the largest number of concerts in the history of the chorus. Program highlights include two world premieres by Bobby McFerrin, Duke Ellington's Sacred Concert, and Beethoven's *Missa solemnis*. The Chorale also collaborates with the Los Angeles Chamber Orchestra in a Bach-Fest conducted by Helmuth Rilling.

The Chorale has released three CDs under the baton of Music Director Emeritus Paul Salamunovich, including the Grammy-nominated Lauridsen-Lux Aeterna, Christmas, and a recording of Dominic Argento's Te Deum and Maurice Duruflé's Messe "Cum Jubilo." The Chorale's first CD with Music Director Grant Gershon was released in September 2002 and features Esa-Pekka Salonen's first choral work, Two Songs to Poems of Ann Jäderlund, and Philip Glass' Itaipu. In addition, the Los Angeles Master Chorale is featured under Paul Salamunovich's leadership on the soundtracks of numerous major motion pictures, including A.I. Artificial Intelligence, My Best Friend's Wedding, Bram Stoker's Dracula, Sum of all Fears and Waterworld.

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
