

A SUS STAFFING STUDY

Dear Editor,

The coverage of Dr. Circo's study on police staffing and response times sets off several alarm bells ["New Study's Staffing Model Calls for 108 New Officers," News, Jan. 21]. First, the study has been published without being subject to a peer review process in which experts thoroughly analyze the strengths and weaknesses of its arguments.

Second, Dr. Circo's study was commissioned by a police advocacy group with a history of arguing for more police. Studies commissioned by biased advocacy groups have a sordid history in American politics. They were a key component of the deny-and-delay strategy used by the tobacco and oil & gas industries to defend themselves from the burgeoning public realization of their harms. These industries wanted the public to accept a certain favorable conclusion (smoking doesn't cause cancer; anthropogenic climate change isn't a threat largely caused by fossil fuels), so they commissioned studies performed by academics to provide a sheen of legitimacy.

Third, by relying on machine learning models, Dr. Circo is using a statistical argument methodology that's easily abused. Recent history provides evidence of this. In the election lawsuit presented to the Supreme Court in December 2020, Ken Paxton et al. included a statistical analysis performed by an economics Ph.D. to support their claims of voter fraud.

Fortunately, this particular analysis was refutable by anyone with cursory knowledge of statistics, and Paxton's suit was quickly dismissed. Dr. Circo's study is much more sophisticated than those bumbling efforts, which isn't necessarily a point in its favor. Machine learning models are notoriously opaque, even to the experts who create them. Additionally, as critics in your article point out, they often rely on numerous questionable assumptions. It can be very easy for researchers to (intentionally or accidentally) build their preferred conclusion into these assumptions.

We should be very cautious about how we use this study to inform policy.

POOR CLEAT APPROACH TO DEFEAT


Dear Editor,

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ANTISEMITISM GROWS IN TROUBLING TIMES BUT WE ARE ALL PART OF THE SAME BIBLICAL TREE

Several months ago, a woman I never met named Renate reached out to me and members of my family. Renate lives in Germany and is writing a book about children who fled Nazi oppression. Amazingly, my father and his two siblings were the subjects of one of her stories. Renate had all kinds of information about my family that had never been known before. She had medical records of my grandmother, detailing the state of her mind when her husband was taken from her and her children were placed in an orphanage. Renate had a copy of a pamphlet that listed which businesses to boycott in Frankfurt because they were owned by Jews, including my grandfather's cobbler shop. As the situation in Germany deteriorated, my grandparents somehow were able to send their children to the United States. My father was forever indebted to the kindness and compassion shown by the Americans

who quite literally saved him, his brother, and his sister from certain doom. He became a proud patriotic veteran and civil servant.

Nearly a hundred years later, the trends that led to my father's escape from Germany are being echoed today in our beloved America. Populist nationalism, economic inequality, a fractured parliament influenced by extremes on both the left and right are all the ingredients that led to our family's misfortune in the 1930s. Authors in the last few years have shown how this perilous concoction of populism, extremism, and economic disparity have led to a line of authoritarians that link Mussolini of Italy to Venezuela's Chavez to Erdogan of Turkey and Orban of Hungary. When researching these autocrats, what's remarkable is many of them were elected in fledgling democracies, quite often as a minority political party that eventually consumed and suppressed any opposition. In fact, even the Nazis were elected to power, first with 18% of the vote in 1930 and then 37% in 1932, eventually consolidating all power a few months later when the fear of a potential communist takeover forced President Hindenburg to make Hitler chancellor.

With all the challenges of our current day, the toxic environment that infects school board meetings, airline travel, and even sporting events, what's concerning to me is the rise in antisemitism that mimics what my father experienced as a boy and how our current environment has roots in the past. On Halloween, my own congregation here in Austin, Congregation Beth Israel, suffered an attempted arson attack by an 18-year-old extremist. Numerous antisemitic events have occurred in Austin in the last few months, echoing what we had thought we had left behind 80 years ago. And just this month, there was a hostage situation at another Congregation Beth Israel, in Colleyville, Texas, that thankfully ended with no harm to the captives.

How did we get to this eerily similar point? Economic disillusionment? Social

media? Erosion of our educational system? Pandemic exhaustion? Or simply history repeating itself? It is hard to know the answer to pinpoint a resolution. Simply putting down our phones and talking to our neighbors is a start, especially to those from different back-

cially to those from different backgrounds, faiths, experiences, or political views. Challenging our elected leaders and potential candidates for public office to represent the best of us, and not our left or right extremes, is another opportunity to tamp down the discord and hostility.

Finally, lost in the news about the Colleyville event is that it occurred the same week Jews celebrated the holiday of Tu B'Shevat, the celebration of trees. Trees give us sustenance, clean air, and shelter. And in a metaphorical sense, the major Western religions all come from the same tree of Abraham. In fact, in his writings, George Washington would often reference "sitting under the vine and fig tree" to foster freedom and prosperity. Let's nurture that biblical tree for all its unique features and for all the different types of fruits it bears rather than try to prune any of its branches. All faiths nurturing each other can build a wonderful grove that enriches us all.

LET'S DOUBLE ACC'S NURSING PROGRAM

It's time for the community to focus and support ACC to double its Registered Nursing program. We faced a chronic and dangerous nursing shortage before the pandemic. Now it is code-red critical as nurses burn out, retire early, or travel to other cities to earn \$2,000-\$3,000 per week. Local employers desperately posted over 3,000 listings in November.

And that was before the current surge.

ACC has one of the best RN programs in Texas. It scores fifth among 67 Texas associate degree programs ranked by percent of graduates passing RN licensure. Inspired by rewards both financial and spiritual, nearly 8,000 students were enrolled this fall in the health sciences area of study.

Nearly 500 had completed their prerequisites and applied for the fall RN program. Yet, ACC admitted only 168. Doubling the ACC nursing program might not accommodate everyone, but it would be a start.

Our crisis has been building for a long time. There's a serious mismatch between the number of

local nursing graduates and our population. Our region ranks near the bottom according to the Texas Center for Nursing Workforce Studies – 23rd of 25 in Texas. We rank 49th of 53 in grads per 100,000 population among cities over 1,000,000 in the U.S. according to the Council on Adult Experiential Learning.

This vacuum invites the private, forprofit, and very expensive schools. Aspen University School of Nursing signed an eight-year lease in Round Rock in 2020. Galen College of Nursing just opened a campus in Austin. They will not be cheap. For example, the federal College Navigator website lists the tuition and fees at Galen's longtime San Antonio campus as \$30,190 for its 18-month associate RN program and \$65,380 for its bachelor's RN 36-month program. In contrast, tuition and fees for ACC's core, 24-month associate RN program are \$9,405 for in-district students and \$21,465 for out-of-district students.

Doubling ACC's nursing program would attack another chronic crisis – equity. Our nursing workforce does not look like us. Our region and state will soon be majority of color, but our region's nursing workforce is only 28% of color. ACC's student body is majority of color. Doubling ACC's program would create a healthier balance in our community.


Of course this has a cost and can't happen all at once. Temple College, our neighboring community college to the north, just completed a five-year plan to double its program. A key to expanding ACC would be a new, third Health Sciences Center to complement ACC's Round Rock and

East Austin centers. A Hays Campus facility, at the top of ACC's Academic Master Plan facilities wish list, would be a natural.

In the meantime, ACC could continue to grow incrementally, as it has intermittently over the years. Kudos to ACC's dedicated faculty and administration for nudging up the spring enrollment to 176!

We urge this doubling in the spirit of the farmer who wanted to plant a new and special apple tree. When her foreman heard this, he protested, "But Madame, it will take 100 years to grow." Her reply: "Well then, we have no time to waste!"

AND ON TO THE NEXT ELECTION CYCLE The last day to register to vote in the March 1 primaries is this Monday, January 31. Not sure if you're already registered? Check votetravis.com. TEXAS FRENCH BREAD near West Campus caught fire this week. Nobody was injured, but the building was declared a **total loss**. The building was the last location of the bakery first opened by **Judy Willcott** in 1981.

DEL VALLE INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT has increased its minimum **substitute teacher pay** to \$130 per day for the remainder of the 2021-22 school year. Additional pay incentives are in place for substitute teachers with a bachelor's degree or teacher certification, and for long-term positions.

WHEN IN STAGE 5 The Austin independent School District announced that during the spring semester – while Austin is in Stage 5 of the local COVID-19 Risk-Based Guidelines – student absences related to pandemic concerns will be excused.

MURDERVILLE, TEXAS – the second season of The Intercept's investigative podcast *Murderville* – launches on February 1. The show is hosted by award-winning reporters Liliana Segura and Jordan Smith, the latter of whom covered criminal justice for *The Austin Chronicle* as a staff reporter for over 15 years.

HOMETOWN HEALTH Ascension Seton plans to build a new women's health tower on its Ascension Seton Medical Center Austin campus for \$320 million. Totaling 282,000 square feet, the tower will feature 28 inpatient beds for clinical services, capacity for approximately 7,500 deliveries, and a dedicated OB-GYN emergency department, among other services. The tower is expected to open in fall 2024.

KICKED TO THE CURB Beginning February 21, Austin Resource Recovery will suspend large brush and bulk collection for residential curbside customers until further notice. "These suspensions are attributable to staffing shortages related to COVID-19 and difficulty filling open vacancies," said ARR in a press release. For those seeking alternatives during the suspension of curbside collections for brush and bulk items, ARR is asking customers to drop off large brush at the Hornsby Bend Biosolids Management Plant (2210 FM 973).

Making Good Trouble on I-35

America's infrastructure systems are broken, but TxDOT has gone the extra mile

Two of my big wins as a campaign operative – the 2006 Central Library bond and the 2012 Central Health/UT Dell Medical School tax rate election – were collabs with my old pal, mentor, and hero Lynda Rife, a true genius of civic engagement. It was at

that very same Central Library on Tuesday that Rife, having taken on the toughest gig in town – allowing the Texas Dept. of Transportation to show that it did, in fact, hear what we had to say about its plans for I-35 through the heart of Austin – demonstrated a central element of

that genius: telling people what they didn't want to hear and making it OK. At TxDOT's latest Capital Express Central listening session – in person, for several



dozen of us mobility die-hards, and online for hundreds more – Rife was directing her empathy at Heyden Black Walker, who with her father Sinclair Black has championed the Reconnect Austin vision for I-35. To most people paying attention, that

st people paying attention, that long-running effort is synonymous with "cut and cap" – burying I-35 through the city center and building over it. The ultimate motivation for Reconnect, though, is for that "over it" (or alongside it) to be developable land that grows the tax base and

helps pay for the urban design intervention of going below grade; otherwise, it's just an amenity. TxDOT has decided that it does not want to go there, hence Rife's breaking the bad news to Walker. But it's totally game for the cutting and capping part, which is a somewhat mind-blowing amount of progress since we last got up in the state's grill about I-35 in August.

SAY HELLO TO "MOD-ALT-3"

One of our main complaints back then was that the two remaining alternatives being studied as TxDOT prepares the federally required environmental impact statement for CapExCentral, the 8-mile stretch from U.S. 290 East (Koenig Lane) to U.S. 290 West (Ben White Boulevard), were barely distinguishable from one another. The former Alternative 1, which has been dragged behind TxDOT's barn, was the one where the whole deal got tunneled, including the new "managed" lanes, to deliver on the "no CONTINUED ON P.10



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

wider and no higher" promise made by both the city and the Texas Transportation Commission. We were not shy at the time about castigating TxDOT for deciding doing I-35 properly was just too hard, and that a mildly retooled roadway that took out "only" 150 properties (including the *Chronicle* offices) would be a good enough way to dispose of a multibillion-dollar investment in one of the nation's most-used roadways through the center of the nation's fastest-growing metro area.

I don't know this for certain, but I suspect that in her own genius way, Lynda Rife convinced TxDOT that we were not overreacting and that they needed to show some more effort. So they did. Perhaps their professional pride was at stake; certainly, younger generations of engineers, even at TxDOT, all see how much opportunity cost the agency was incurring by trying to keep its Austin-skeptic bosses happy. What is now "Modified Alternative 3" is functionally not that different from the Alternative 1 schematic. It's all at or below grade from 51st Street to the river and again to Ben White, eliminating silly over-under grade separations near Hancock Center, Holly Street, and Woodland Avenue. The frontage roads from 38th Street to the river would instead be a boulevard running along one side - which delivers about two-thirds of the urban design benefits of both the Reconnect and Rethink I-35 visions to unbuilding the highway. The Downtown portion of this could be capped with 20 acres or more of public space: four times the size of Dallas' Klyde Warren Park, and maybe six times what TxDOT had called its "cap and stitch" provisions in previous iterations.

Most importantly, the cut-and-cap-andstitch component, which TxDOT had tried as hard as any state agency can to make not its problem or mandate – that was all going to be "local enhancements," for which the

city of Austin has no money to spare – is now acknowledged as a central part of the package, some of which will be paid for by TxDOT, and for which the state will partner with the city to go find a bag of cash with Austin's name on it in Mayor Moneybags Pete Buttigieg's vault.

NO PONIES, JUST TRADE-OFFS

The CapEx Central remains imperfect, but the means to fix those problems lie well above the pay grade even of TxDOT District Engineer Tucker Ferguson. It remains true that the federal environmental review process should be the place where honest discussion of trade-offs can take place. Does

the enhanced mobility, if any, that the project will provide to Central Texas outweigh the harm being done by I-35 as it exists now, dividing and depressing Austinites by color and class and harming their health and safety in the bargain? Do the benefits of the Mod-Alt-3 cutting and capping ameliorate those harms? Considering how hard it was for Congress to pass even its bipartisan infrastructure framework, rewriting the National Environmental Policy Act is a generational project, but it's probably as important a project as President Biden can get done and done well.

Rethink35, as of press time, was not ready to make nice – they protested outside the Central Library but did not attend the meeting – but some other stakeholders are having the same reactions I did. "The entire Austin community should be proud of the high quality, detailed input submitted," Heyden Black Walker wrote in a Wednesday press release. "This historic level of community engagement illustrates the generational importance of this project to people affected daily by I-35. The Modified Alternative 3, shared today by TxDOT, reflects progress towards our common goals."

Learn more about TxDOT's new plans at my35capex.com. There's no deadline for feedback; the agency expects to be ready to finalize the EIS in about 12 months.

In the last column, I previewed a couple of meetings that were upcoming this week, so I'll follow with a brief recap this time around. First came Tuesday's update on the **Capital Express Central** plan to rebuild I-35 through Central Austin and actually, my pagemate Mike Clark-Madison has that covered in some detail on the facing page. I'll note only that while the **TxDOT** presentation was pretty upbeat about all the improvements they've made in the new plan in response to public input – some of them quite

striking – the critics' reviews were out the next morning, and they were, shall we say, mixed.

Reconnect Austin will continue to work with all stakeholders to design a project which will further contribute to those shared goals. We encourage everyone to review these new plans for I-35 Central and provide feedback to TxDOT as soon as possible. Additional input on today's significant modifications will help further refine this project." So, will all the slamming and sharing in the world affect any further course change on this enormous dreadnought that's heading down the interstate toward us? Chito Sails to Council

With just over

Vela wins D4 special election in a landslide

José "Chito" Vela sailed to victory Tuesday night, Jan. 25, pulling in almost 60% of the total vote and avoiding a run-off in the City Council District 4 special election to replace **Greg Casar** as he campaigns for Congress. When Vela is sworn in Feb. 4, he will become the second-ever representative for the majority-Latinx district in Northeast Austin, from

Windsor Park to North Lamar. In total, 3,608 people cast a ballot in the first-ever special election since the 10-1 district council took office in 2015. according to unofficial final results from the Travis County Clerk's Office, which equates to just over 10% of the registered voters in D4. Vela got 2,137 of those votes, and none of the six other candidates in the race even came close to touching that figure; Monica Guzmán, who finished second, pulled in 495 votes, or about 14% of the total.

That's despite some heavy

spending in what most predicted, and what turned out, to be a low-turnout election. Voices for District 4, the political action committee formed to support Jade Lovera and oppose Vela, invested nearly \$40,000 in the race, according to two campaign finance reports filed by the PAC on Jan. 17 and Jan. 24. The Lovera campaign itself had spent just shy of \$4,600 in the race according to a Jan. 18 report, with nearly \$3,700 left in cash to burn through. We won't know how much, in sum, was spent on her candidacy until

final reports post in the next few weeks but what we do know is that, whatever was spent, it earned her a whopping 402 votes.

Guzmán's contributors (including Vela's soon-to-be Council colleagues Leslie Pool and Ann Kitchen) saw a similar return on their investment; her Jan. 18 campaign finance filing shows about \$8,600 in contri-

butions, nearly \$2,400 of which the campaign had spent, while maintaining close to \$14,000 in cash to spend through the remainder of the race. A PAC

the former Statesman property, aka the Batcave. And that's just what we can think up off the top of our heads!

In a conversation Wednesday, Vela told us he has a range of smaller concerns from constituents he wants to deal with once he's sworn in - camps of unhoused people that have grown, areas where drugs are dealt, and traffic safety. "Neighbors want a humane and compassionate response to these issues, but they want a response," Vela said. He also wants to explore development options at the North Lamar Transit **Center**, the northern terminus of the **Project Connect Orange Line.**

"I'd love to put some housing there now that we're developing plans for the Orange Line," Vela said. "It's a key spot and we could potentially put some city-owned public housing near the center, maybe with retail and other community assets."

City Council Preview: Survivors' Lawsuit Settled

City Council meets for the first time in 2022 today, Jan. 27, to take up an 89-item agenda. Most of the business deals with renewing or beginning routine contracts, but there are a few notable items dealing with local law enforcement on the agenda.

First, Council is set to approve a settlement in the class action filed in 2018 by eight **survivors of sexual assault** against the city and the **Austin Police Department**, Travis County and the **District Attorney's Office**, and other defendants. The lawsuit highlights what the plaintiffs argue are systemic flaws that created a justice system that routinely failed survivors and allowed sexual assault offenders to "walk freely to rape again," according to the initial complaint filed nearly four years ago.

Individual defendants include former police Chiefs **Art Acevedo** and **Brian Manley**, former D.A.s **Rosemary Lehmberg** and **Margaret Moore**, and Travis County Sheriff **Sally Hernandez**, the only one who remains in office; Moore's successor, **José Garza**, has supported the plaintiffs. The original federal class action was dismissed by U.S. District Judge **Lee Yeakel** but was reinstated by the **5th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals**.

Terms of the settlement are unclear at this stage, although they will be paid through the city's **Liability Reserve Fund**, funded annually to help settle claims against city departments. In June, the **Travis County Commissioners Court** voted unanimously to settle, paying a total of \$580,000 in attorneys fees, damages to the plaintiffs, and a \$250,000

commitment to fund programs to enhance the prosecution of sexual assault.

Meanwhile, a proposal that would create a **City Marshal** Office to provide security at the **Municipal Court** has been postponed once again – this time to Feb. 17. Following pushback from justice advocates, Council postponed a vote in November to allow for the City Manager's Office and Municipal Court to engage with community stakeholders on what security should look like and if a new law enforcement agency was needed. Currently, APD provides security at the court alongside a privately contracted security firm. At the time, the Municipal Court judges and clerk said that they preferred to maintain the status quo but that this was the best option available.

It appears not much engagement has happened yet. A number of justice groups – including the **Texas Fair Defense Project, Austin Justice Coalition**, and the **Texas Harm Reduction Alliance** – co-signed a Jan. 19 letter to Council demanding further postponement. The letter praises efforts at increasing law enforcement accountability through the **Office of Police Oversight**, but the authors write that creating a new agency where "specific training, trainers, and accountability measures are undefined" could undermine those efforts.

At its Jan. 24 meeting, the Councilappointed **Public Safety Commission** voted unanimously, with Commissioner Rebecca Bernhardt absent, to recommend Council reject the the Marshal Office and continue securing the Municipal Court with APD officers. – Austin Sanders

Abbott gets close to saying the V-word

Gov. **Greg Abbott**'s speech last week in Lewisville to tout a **parental bill of rights** was expected to be a full-throated endorsement of **vouchers**, until it wasn't.

Observers can't be blamed for suspecting Abbott would put a push behind a key redmeat issue like **school choice**, be it vouchers

or private school tax credits. Primary challengers **Don Huffines** and **Allen West** have come at Abbott hard from the right. Huffines, in particular, has taken swipes at Abbott, sending out slick emails with subject lines such as, "Abbott thinks you're stupid," and, "**Beto** can turn Texas blue (but I won't let it happen)."

Then there was the speech by **Texas Public Policy Foundation** CEO **Greg Sindelar** introducing Abbott at the TPPF Policy Orientation last Wednesday. "By passing a parental bill of rights we ensure that every child, every child has access to a quality education of their choosing," Sindelar said. "And every

parent feels empowered to act in the best interests of their child. And we know if we do this that we can forge an education system that's built on transparency, quality, respect, and choice."

We already know TPPF is a vocal proponent of school choice. We also know Abbott and Lt. Gov. **Dan Patrick** personally support choice legislation. "As Republicans or conservatives, we believe that your education should not be tied to your ZIP code. We believe in school choice," Patrick told TPPF on Friday. "The left believes the government owns your children, and they will tell them what to learn, and that the parents have no

voice. That's the left view – anti-charter and anti-choice."

As for Abbott, the governor has said in past sessions he would sign any school choice bill that came to his desk. But when it came down to Abbott's actual speech on a parents' bill of rights last Thursday in Lewisville, Abbott did not lead with a school choice message.

"I attended public schools, including one in Dallas County, when I was growing up," Abbott told the crowd at the **Founders Classical Academy**, a public charter in Lewisville. "As governor, I've devoted more funding toward public education than any governor in the history of our state. But

all that being said, we need to understand that at the end of the day, no government program can replace the role that parents play in the education of their children."

Then Abbott outlined what he *did* want in his parents' bill of rights: Give parents access to school curricula online. Provide parents with a venue for protesting curricu-



lum or books. Require school districts to provide parents with information about charter and magnet school options for their children. And, in an effort to protect student privacy, stop the selling of student data to outside vendors; outgoing Senate Finance Chair **Jane Nelson**, R-Flower Mound, carried such a bill during the last session that did not make it to Abbott's desk.

"Parents are losing a voice when it comes to their child's education and health care matters," Abbott told the audience in Lewisville. "Many parents are growing increasingly powerless about what to do to be able to regain that control. That [is why] I am running for reelection, to create a parents' bill of rights, to restore parents as the primary decision-makers of their child's education and health care issues."

The **Texas Education Code** already has a chapter on parental rights, added by then-

Rep. **Scott Hochberg**, D-Houston, way back in 1995. What Abbott is proposing sounds suspiciously like the **Florida Parents' Bill of Rights** adopted last year. The health care exemptions under the Florida legislation allow parents to opt out of vaccines on the basis of religious objections; it also allows parents to excuse their children from performing biological dissections in class.

Abbott also wants his Texas Parents' Bill of Rights to include penalties for educators who show **obscene content** to students. Obscene content, as defined by the conservative movement, has included LBGTQIA-affirming books that included cartoon pictures of oral sex. "Texas will ensure that any educational personnel who is convicted of providing minors with obscene content will lose their educational credentials and state licensing, forfeit their retirement benefits, and be placed on a do-not-hire list," Abbott said.

AISD WEIGHS SCHEDULE CHANGE TO FIX BUDGET WOES

With budget talks on the horizon, **Austin ISD** teachers are sweating the latest unwelcome change in two years of seemingly nonstop changes: a proposed **schedule adjustment** that would cut planning time for teachers in half. The change, currently being discussed between AISD's central office and leadership at the campus level, has been posited as a last-ditch solution to fix the district's growing **budget deficit**, currently sitting at **\$62.2 million**.

"We're working with every individual principal to see how we can get to what we need from campus staffing in a way that doesn't create the largest negative impacts to the system," said Superintendent Dr. **Stephanie Elizalde** at an **AISD Board of Trustees** information session on Jan. 13. She said the decision would be discussed at length in budget talks beginning in February and that there are still other options on the table. She said leadership knows the change isn't ideal. "There are pros and cons, mostly cons, to the **seven-of-elght** in terms of its impact on campuses," Elizalde said, referring to the controversial plan to have secondary school teachers in class for seven of the eight class periods in a day. However, she added, "There are only cons to not creating a balanced budget."

Education Austin President **Ken Zarifis** told the *Chronicle* that the seven-of-eight schedule is not a new proposal. In the time since he became a teacher in the early 2000s, he said he's heard the idea floated four or five times, always in a time of dire financial need. "In a budget crisis, they're looking for big dollars real quick," he said. Because the district has found other solutions in the past, and because it's among the largest landowners in the city, he believes there are other solutions to closing the funding gap.

In a Jan. 18 EA press conference, teachers, students, and others voiced their concerns about the proposed schedule, which would eliminate one of two planning periods currently afforded at the secondary level and replace it with another period of instruction. "It'll add almost 20% to the workload," Zarifis said, explaining that the two planning periods are necessary for already overworked teachers to prepare for classes in their other six periods. Although a modest salary increase has also been proposed, "it's beyond the compensation, it's really about the quality of instruction for students."

The phrase "last straw" has been thrown around liberally by teachers in the last year, but Zarifis said he thinks the switch to a seven-of-eight schedule might be enough to force an even bigger wave of resignations than that seen in the fall semester. According to data posted by Trustee Arati Singh on Facebook, between July 2021 and January 2022, AISD lost more than 30% more staff than it did in the same period the previous year, at the height of the COVID-19 pandemic's deadly second wave.

The resignations and retirements aren't evenly spread across AISD either. According to Singh's post, 32% of current teacher vacancies are in special education, and 71% of the elementary teacher vacancies are in **Title I** schools, where at least 40% of enrolled students are from low-income families. "It's really accurate to state that we're going to see a massive exodus if the district continues down this path," Zarifis said. – Morgan O'Hanlon

TPPF Refuses to Leave the Warblers Alone

New lawsuit again aims to remove endangered status

On Jan. 12, the conservative think tank **Texas Public Policy Foundation** filed a lawsuit on behalf of the **Texas General Land Office** against the **U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service** "for continuing to disregard the private property rights of Texans" by keeping the **golden-cheeked warbler** on the **endangered species list**. The warbler resides only in the Central Texas region, from around San Antonio to Ft. Worth, and was listed in 1990 due to the threat of development depleting the Ashe juniper and oak trees where the birds build their nests.

All petitions to list or delist a species have to go through a 90-day review process, in which the FWS determines if the petition has enough merit to move on to the more substantial 12-month status review. The agency rejected TPPF's first petition to delist the warbler seven years ago, in 2015, at the 90-day point, after which TPPF sued in federal court on the grounds that FWS used outside information to review its claim. During the 90-day review, the agency is only supposed to look at the petition itself. In 2020, the 5th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals sided with TPPF and directed FWS to redo its review, which led to the same result after 90 days, and now a revival of TPPF's legal action.

Ryan Shannon, an attorney who works on Endangered Species Act issues with the **Center for Biological Diversity**, explains that the service had just conducted a status review of the species and decided it should remain endangered when it rejected TPPF's 2015 petition (which cited research that claims the warbler's range and habitat is five times larger than was thought). The 90-day review is "not intended to be a super high hurdle," Shannon clarifies. "It's a tough thing for the service to defend a rejection [of a 90-day petition] in court because the standard of review is so permissive. They've often lost when they've had to defend it before."

As for the scientific evidence TPPF presented, Shannon says the warbler's survival hinges not on population numbers or habitat acreage, which may well have increased, but rather on "the threats that rendered it endangered in the first place. One way to think about it is like, what if we had a captive breeding program? If we had 100,000 golden-cheeked warblers on hand and could release them tomorrow, the number in the wild would be pretty high. But if there's no Ashe juniper for them to nest in, then having a high population number at a certain point in time might not actually be indicative of their longevity prospects."

It's also a question of habitat quality, explains **Nicole Netherton**, executive director of **Travis Audubon**: Warblers "are very territorial; they will fight and not be able to successfully breed if they're too crowded. You have to have a lot of space." Netherton says the birds also won't get too close to the edge of their available habitat, or the **wildland-urban interface**, requiring large uninterrupted spaces like those protected in the **Balcones Canyonlands preserve** for the species to thrive.

If TPPF wins this case, the warbler won't be delisted immediately – the service will just have to do another 90-day review and potentially move on to the 12-month survey. Even then, Shannon says it's unlikely the warbler would be delisted, but rather downlisted to "threatened" to allow property owners and developers more flexibility in

its habitat, but also continue to provide some protections under the Endangered Species Act. Until the judge decides, TPPF remains highly confident: "Our original petition provides more than enough evidence to show the warbler may not be endangered – which is all we need to demonstrate," reads the press release.

The Gloves Come Off in Travis County Precinct 4

The primary contest for **Travis County Commissioner Pct. 4** heated up last week as **Del Valle ISD** Trustee **Susanna Ledesma-Woody** brought attention to incumbent **Margaret Gómez**'s largest donor: billionaire **Joe Liemandt**, who gave Gómez \$25,000, **Save Austin Now** \$75,000, and **Donald Trump** \$250,000. Travis County Judge **Andy Brown** also took \$100,000 from Liemandt in December.

"I'm running to fight for the people of Southeast Travis County, not the GOP donor class," said Ledesma-Woody. "I challenge Commissioner Gómez to return every dollar she has taken from Trump mega-donors and Save Austin Now supporters." In a tweet, Gómez seemed to suggest that the end justifies the means: "My opponent is once again attacking ... my working with one of our county's biggest financial supporters for housing individuals experiencing homelessness. I authored a \$110 million investment in housing ... I remain committed to my values." Ledesma-Woody's press release came the same day Gómez had reported a cash advantage of \$59,225 "despite [Ledesma-Woody] ... asking for money in 41 separate Facebook posts."

In a separate release Jan. 18, Gómez pointed to Ledesma-Woody's "successful effort to block hazard pay for Del Valle ISD essential school employees," quoting a fellow trustee as well as **Carol Guthrle**, business manager of **AFSCME Local 1624** – Gómez is endorsed by that union, **LIUNA Local 1095**, and the **Austin Firefighters Association**. Ledesma-Woody responded by calling attention on Facebook to Gómez's 2019 push to increase commissioners' salaries: "While I serve as a DVISD Trustee, I am serving as a volunteer, meanwhile ... Margaret voted to raise her own salary by \$43,000 over two years even though her fellow commissioners raised the point that many county workers

still don't make a living wage." – Lina Fisher







Austin Opera Probes the Power and Perils of Connection With *The (R)evolution of Steve Jobs*

The local company launches a new collaborative production for the nation **BY RICHARD WHITTAKER**

"We choose pieces that we think will make sense for Austin." So says Austin Opera general director and CEO Annie Burridge, and that's why the company is mounting a new production of *The* (R)*evolution of Steve Jobs*, a timely work for a city that she described as being "at the intersection of innovation and barbecue."

Directed by Tomer Zvulun and conducted by Timothy Myers, this new production brings John Moore back to the titular role (which he previously performed in Seattle) as the Apple grower observes his life, career, and often flawed relationship with his former romantic partner, Chrisann Brennan (Madison Leonard), his wife, Laurene Powell Jobs (Sarah Larsen), his friend and technological peer, Steve Wozniak (Bille Bruley), and his spiritual mentor, Zen Buddhist priest Kobun Chino Otogawa (Wei Wu). Burridge called it "a very honest portrayal. ... It shows the ugly, it shows the love and the stability

that Laurene bought to his life, it shows some of the good parts of his relationship to Chrisann, but also some of the brutal parts where he denied paternity to [their daughter] Lisa."

Unlike the tech industry where products are often rushed to market, staging an opera is a complicated process that can take

half a decade. The original 2017 production of *Steve Jobs* was a Grammy-winning smash for commissioning company Santa Fe Opera, but Burridge was planning an Austin staging even before those accolades and successes. Her planning started in 2016, just as she joined Austin Opera from Opera Philadelphia, and she'd even discussed making the original version a co-production with Santa Fe. Unfortunately, she said, "when it got down to brass tacks, it would have cost two to three times as much as a standard production, [and] I didn't think in my first few weeks on the job I should commit to that."

It was the combination of composer Mason Bates and librettist Mark Campbell that initially intrigued her, and being in the audience on opening night in Santa Fe only reinforced her interest, especially because of how well Bates' music melded with the subject material. "What he's known for is the incorporation of electronic sounds into really exciting and accessible classical music. ... He's also been a house DJ, so there's a driving, rhythmic impulse to his music that aligns so perfectly to what you'd imagine the soundtrack to innovation might be." Equally, she found Campbell's libretto surprising. "I didn't expect a portrait of a man who was so mercurial and volatile to be so touching." Austin Opera's great success in 2019 with Zvulun's staging of Campbell's Pulitzer Prize-winning Silent Night further rein-

forced the idea that this was the right work for this audience and the right director for this piece, and so dates were set for 2021 – which, of course, never happened, thanks to COVID-19.

While Austin Opera moved into the virtual space early, as well as holding drivein performances with Blue Starlite Mini Urban Drive-In, the decision was made to push back this production until they were able to mount in-person performances again. The company returned late last year with Tosca and The Marriage of Figaro, and

even with the Omicron surge the decision was made to keep the scheduled dates for *Steve Jobs*, rather than risk losing it completely. "You get to a point where you can't postpone. These artists are booked for the next few years, so you can't reassemble the team. You've just got to go and throw all the safety precautions you can around it."

This wasn't just about putting on a show in Austin. While the idea of a co-production with Santa Fe fell through, Burridge was still committed to creating something within the broader national opera community,

"a physical production that we can put on stage that can be accessed by other companies." Most especially, the production would be geared for those on the same tier as Austin, "the under \$10 million companies." Talks began with Atlanta Opera, then Kansas City joined, and over the pandemic the ranks of the consortium swelled. "We now have Utah and Calgary

also, so we're all sharing the costs."

Suitably for the opera's subject matter, the ongoing tech diaspora from the coasts to Austin has put an additional pressure on the company to excel beyond what would be expected from a smaller company in a smaller city. With those newly minted Austinites, she said, "if they like opera, they've seen opera in New York or L.A. or San Francisco, so we have to put something on stage that would pass muster in those major markets. The way we can do that as a \$4-5 million organization is to partner with other opera companies." However, this isn't just about financing, Burridge clarified. Dozens of planned productions nationally have been abandoned because of the pandemic, so "it's a testament to the shared belief in this piece and this production that it stayed on everyone's schedule."

The result is a production, with scenic and costume design by Jacob A. Climer and projection design by S. Katy Tucker, that leans into the high-tech aspects of the story. Burridge explained, "The stage is covered in screens and computer monitors, and it does rely on the highest available projection quality technology in theatre." Fitting the original collaborative remit it's intended to be flexible, with a modular set that can be restructured to fit the performance space. "If you're a symphony hall, for example, you can perform it with the orchestra behind the set," Burridge said, and that's important as Bates trails only John Adams as the modern American composer most likely to be performed by American symphony orchestras.

For Burridge, it's the emotional center of the opera that audiences will associate with, and that's a core component of Jobs' technological ambitions that he did not always replicate in his personal life. "It asks us some questions about what matters. What are the wonderful things about how seamlessly we are all connected now, and what are some of the traps and dangers."

Ao5 Heads North

The city's largest art gallery leaves South Austin for the Arboretum, bringing its signature informality with it

You won't ever find Todd Gresley wearing a stiff, tailored suit to work. "I tell people every day, 'I don't look professional, but I am.'" Gresley took over as gallery director of Ao5 Gallery in 2014, and he strives to make buying pieces of contemporary art an unapologetically accessible and fun experience. By relocating Ao5 from its former location on South Lamar to the Arboretum, Gresley hopes Ao5 will reach a much wider audience in Austin and beyond.

Around 6pm on a dreary Saturday evening, Gresley was installing artworks at Ao5's new space between Pottery Barn and Orvis, playing Kate Bush loudly through the gallery's overhead speakers. This is its third location, the name being a contraction of its original explanatory title of Art on Fifth. The director noted that hearing music in the gallery is not a rare occurrence. "We have loud music playing so that people can talk and enjoy their time." Gresley's vision contradicts a view of art galleries as cold, stark, and quiet spaces that can feel hostile to many. Cracking open a beer, he explained, "Art feels elite, and we try to cater to everybody. ... There's a stigma within art [spaces] that you have to dress a certain way and act a certain way and collect your art and go home. But I make sure everyone dresses casually at work. We want everyone to feel comfortable here."

As the largest gallery in Austin (now even larger than it was before), Ao5 presents original artworks that range in medium and monetary value. Its multicolored walls feature \$75 gig posters in close proximity to paintings by the likes of Salvador Dalí and Dr. Seuss that sell in the multithousands. Because Ao5 displays works with such diversity in prices, Gresley feels that it is important to "let the art sell itself" and not have commissioned salespeople "following you around trying to get you to buy things." He described this practice as a way of protecting Ao5's guarantee that all potential buyers receive the same care and treatment, regardless of their budget. "Fifty dollars might be a lot of money for somebody, and we want them to feel like they're going home with something awesome. And it is awesome, or I wouldn't have it in here!"

Ao5 Gallery embraces a curatorial approach that allows for a plurality of visual styles that emphasize the originality of each featured artist. Its director has very few limitations in regards to what the gallery can show, except that it must be suitable to be displayed in someone's home and "awesome." Gresley, who turns 48 this year, recalled, "I started professionally doing this when I was 24. So literally for half of my life, I've been acquiring and meeting artists from around the world. We have [artists] from every continent except Antarctica here, and we have tons of Austin artists." He gets to know many of the artists personally and makes a point not to exhibit any artists who are "jerks" because he believes that "their good energy goes into the work and that energy goes home with the people that purchase it."

In the Arboretum space, Ao5 Gallery can now show much more artwork and significantly expand its museum-quality framing services by their certified, in-house framer. Until their official opening party this spring, Ao5 invites anyone to peruse the works on display in their new location, even as they continue to finish installing. The folks at Ao5 feel optimistic about the possibilities for their new home between MoPac and U.S. 183. Gresley happily remembers seeing the gallery for the first time. "The second I walked in the door, I went, 'This could be Ao5's future.'"



Fairfield Lake State Park is for sale. Actually, the entire 2,400acre former power plant reservoir with 21 miles of undeveloped shoreline outside of **Fairfield** and about 75 miles east of **Waco** is on the market. It's the largest privately owned lake in the state and it can be yours for \$110.55 million.

The 1,460-acre state park encompasses the southern shoreline where three creeks empty into the lake. An old-growth forest of hard-wood and evergreen trees covers the rolling hills. The thick woods create a windbreak in the winter and a shady canopy in the summer.

A favorite fishing hole year-round, the park is also a popular campground. All 135 campsites have paved parking spots, picnic tables, and fire pits. Each of the three lakeside campgrounds has showers and restrooms.

Most of the nearly 10 miles of trails are open to hiking and biking, and an equestrian trail follows the eastern perimeter of the park.

One of the most scenic areas of the park is the day-use area that includes a swimming beach and fishing pier. This is a good spot to see the park's resident **otters** or **bald eagles** visiting in the winter.

As many as 25 bald eagles have been seen at the lake in past years. The lake was built in 1969 for the coal-fired **Big Brown Power Plant**, which was retired in 2018.



The state park opened in 1976. **Texas Parks & Wildlife Department** leases the property in 10-year increments. The current

lease expires in December 2022, and the park's future is uncertain. Lake Fairfield State Park is 13 minutes north of Fairfield. No fishing license is required to fish within the park. Reservations can be obtained at tpwd.texas.gov/state-parks/fairfield-lake.

Sizing Up Austin FC's Roster After Offseason Makeover

Retooled and refreshed after a brief but busy offseason, Austin FC is carrying plenty of confidence into a crucial second season in Major League Soccer.

"We have more quality, more experience, certainly more depth, and in an instant you can see the competition out on the field is much, much different than last year," head coach Josh Wolff said Tuesday in his first remarks to the media in nearly three months. It was a significant three months for a club that desperately needed a talent overhaul after ending its maiden campaign 12th out of 13 in the Western Conference.

Three free agent signings, one big money transfer, a fortunate SuperDraft, and a departing Designated Player have given Austin FC's roster the makeover that could – if Wolff can make all the pieces fit – spark the Verde toward competing for a playoff spot in 2022. Such is the bare minimum for a club with Austin FC's ambition and support.

With no more major moves expected before the start of the MLS season, it's time to take stock of how Austin FC shapes up for year two, position by position.

GOALKEEPER Brad Stuver, Andrew Tarbell, Will Pulisic, Damian Las

The only part of the pitch Austin FC left largely untouched during the offseason is at goalkeeper, for good reason. Stuver established himself as a top-end starting net minder in MLS in 2021, leading the league in saves and keeping ATXFC alive in several matches that could have easily turned into blowouts. Even more than his shot-stopping ability, Stuver's comfort with the ball at his feet makes him an indispensable part of Josh Wolff's structure. Tarbell and Pulisic provide capable depth, while 19-year-old Las, signed on Tuesday, is likely destined for a loan spell.

DEFENSE

Nowhere on the pitch did Austin FC more clearly need reinforcing this offseason than at center back, after the pairing of Romãna and Cascante looked overmatched following (now-retired) Matt Besler's season-ending concussion last season. The club got the help it needed, first in the MLS SuperDraft when Keller, the NCAA's top center back. fell to them at pick No. 5. Then, Austin FC signed out of the French second division the experienced 29-year-old Gabrielsen, who the club thinks can be a top-level center back in MLS. Buyer beware, though. CB's with more impressive résumés have come to MLS and been slow to adjust to the league's physicality. Lucky for Austin, though, physicality is Gabrielsen's M.O.

It's as-you-were on the flanks with Kolmanič locked into the left back spot and Lima/Jimenez likely rotating at right back. As it stands, rookie Asensio will have to provide valuable reserve minutes if any injuries befall the other three. New striker Maxi Urruti brings 62 career MLS goals and an MLS Cup championship ring to Austin FC

Having the mercurial Driussi for a full season is a huge boost to Austin FC's attack. However, it's the defensive midfield spot that's gotten the biggest lift this offseason. The club shelled out over \$1 million to Colombian champions Deportivo Cali for Valencia, an expert ball-winner and defensive sweeper. His presence should allow Alex Ring – who signed a contract extension making him a Designated Player earlier this month - to get forward more often in attack, where he had success at times when allowed to do so in 2021. Pereira, fresh off a strong rookie season, represents an excellent fourth option capable of filling in anywhere in the midfield.


One key name from the inaugural roster has been removed from Austin FC's midfield picture. Tomás Pochettino, the club's secondever DP, returned to his native Argentina to join Buenos Aires club River Plate on Ioan, with an option to become a permanent transfer at the end of the season. The move seems to have been a positive for all sides; Pochettino, who did not fit cleanly into Wolff's structure, will have opportunities to thrive with River Plate. Meanwhile, the money Austin FC saves on his wages likely allowed them to complete the deal for Valencia.

For a span of two months last season between Hoesen's season-ending hip injury and Djitté's arrival, Austin FC had exactly zero healthy strikers to anchor the attack up top. Now, with Hoesen returning to fitness and ATX securing the free agent signing of MLS veteran goalscorer Urruti, Wolff is spoiled for choice at center forward.

"To have three strikers is a far cry from what we had last year. I'm delighted by the options and the amount of competition throughout the field is critical," Wolff said, adding that he hopes the trio makes his job of distributing playing time "tough every week," due to all three excelling in training.

Free agent signing Finlay brings veteran experience and leadership to a deep group of wingers, where Domínguez and Fagundez return as lock-'em-in starters.

From Afghanistan to Animation

Elegant and touching Rotoscoped documentary *Flee* puts a refugee on the therapist's couch **BY JOSH KUPECKI**

Amin is restless. An impending marriage and the purchase of a new house could make anyone a bit tense, but there are stronger, deeper currents unmooring him. There's a past he has withheld from his fiancé, a history that he hasn't stopped to examine himself. But with the help of his high school friend, filmmaker Jonas Poher Rasmussen, he relates his extraordinary story, one grimly familiar yet markedly singular, to the camera. To his partner. To his friend. To himself. Amin is restless.

Growing up in Afghanistan in the Eighties, young Amin's life is marked by a number of dots connected here. His father is taken in for "questioning" by the communist government that had toppled the country's monarchy in 1979, and never heard from again. Raised by his mother and older brothers and sisters, Amin discovers, with the aid of Jean-Claude Van Damme, that he is gay. When Afghan authorities attempt to round up Amin's brother for

and unsuccessful escape attempts, including a particularly harrowing journey in a stripped-out hull of a boat on the Baltic Sea. When, finally, he is able to step off a plane in Denmark, his family has been scattered across Europe, he is a teenager and a refugee. His closest family, one brother and two sisters, are thankfully close by in Sweden.

Director Rasmussen uses evocative

Rotoscoped animation to tell Amin's story, which imbues *Flee* with a layer of intimacy, further captured in Rasmussen's and Amin's introspected conversations about the film itself. In living a life of constantly moving forward, unable to stop for fear of persecution or death, Amin now is given the time to reflect and recognize the motives, the shame, the guilt, the responsibility, and ultimately arrive at fragile acceptance. *Flee*'s story, Amin's story, provides for us a valuable mirror with which to understand ourselves, and our desire for meaning in an incredibly harsh universe. In sharing his story with the world, Amin and Rasmussen have given us a truly generous gift. NEW REVIEWS CHARLIXCX: ALONE TOGETHER

It's been almost a year since Charli XCX's succinct COVID-laced documentary *Alone Together* made waves at South by Southwest's first virtual festival. The indie-pop star's tight 67-minute film focuses on the creation of her collaborative hyperpop album, *how i'm feeling now*, which had a unique fan-involved construction and rollout. During the process of making the album, Charli hosted Zoom parties that brought her unique fan base together in a time when people were feeling their most vulnerably lonely to discuss the album-making process, and at the insistence of directors Bradley Bell and Pablo Jones-Soler, she documented it.

Charli XCX is a woman who never stops: a mastermind behind a waterfall of pop hits that flushed out the sound of dance clubs in the 2010s. (What millennial hasn't bopped to "I Love It" by Icona Pop or shouted along to "Fancy" by Iggy Azalea in the flashing neon lights of a rundown nightclub?) But for the first time in nearly a decade, the pandemic forced the beloved musician and songwriter to slow down, something she wasn't used to. What makes Charli XCX such a great indie-pop idol is the absolute pleasure she gets connecting with her fans, the self-proclaimed "Angels," and her willingness to create a deeper relationship with them, to reward the ones who offer her so much.

The shutdown of concert venues at the beginning of the pandemic felt like the end of the world. It's a space where likeminded people can get together, listen to their favorite song, sing along with strangers who were moved by the same lyrics - the loss of this space was heavy for some. For Charli's Angels, it also meant losing a community of LGBTQIA friends and allies that made the world feel a little less shitty from time to time. Alone Together is just as much about the fans' grieving over lost social connection as it is Charli's, but from this devastation a new project bloomed, where Charli could truly bond with her fans, and bring them together to formulate bonds at a time when loneliness permeated everyone's day-to-day.

Alone Together offers up a more vulnerable Charli to her Angels. She shares her insecurities, like how she doesn't find herself attractive, and that she wishes she could sing better, all of which flared up frequently and aggressively during quarantine. Mental health checks with her fans became important and encouraged them to do the same. Through the creation of music, Charli brought light to the darkness of monotony, isolation, and fashioned a safe space bursting with love and creativity. The documentary's sugar rush display of healthy fandom is a rarity, giving the film legs outside its pandemic novelty.

There's a rumbling, inconsolable guilt at the heart of *Clean*, the latest from fascinatingly flexible writer/director Paul Solet. He could have stayed on the horror track after his South by Southwest 2009 cult favorite *Grace*, and surprisingly kept those sensibilities in place for true-crime documentary *Tread*. For bloody and cold revenge drama *Clean*, he reunites with Adrien Brody, star of his 2017 heist flick *Bullet Head*, in a somewhat by-the-numbers story of a broken man trying to do one good thing in the only way he knows – the violence he's tried to put behind him.

Brody plays the titular Clean, a sanitation worker with a grimy history that he's trying to throw away but that sticks with him. The star also co-wrote the script with Solet, produced, and wrote his first score since his arty home renovation documentary *Stone Barn Castle*. Clean's a very traditional hero with a dark past, revealed through flashbacks and nightmare sequences that explain why he's become a proxy father at arm's length of his young neighbor, Diandra (DuPont), and why her grandmother, Ethel (Tony nominee Wilson), is begrudgingly OK with it because she knows his hidden horrors.

The inevitable violent collision comes from another father figure: Glenn Fleshler as local crime boss Michael, a Kingpin-esque figure of extreme physical brutality in his criminal enterprises and equal emotional cruelty to his son, Mikey (Richie Merritt). He runs the streets that Clean, well, cleans, and the inevitable intersection of their paths – gory as it is – is set in motion by those children and the lessons they learned.

Clean sits readily in the tradition of *John Wick* and *Nobody*, of the everyman with a brutal résumé: But he's also more of a bottom-feeder than either of those middle-class murderers, his weapons of choice pulled out of a toolbox or bought without serial numbers from a pawn store (run with suitably dour aplomb by RZA). Yet, unlike either of those sibling movies, *Clean* takes its time to get to the explosion of violence. Much of the opening hour is Clean trying, clumsily, to rehabilitate the collapsing slum (a collapse for which he is clearly partially responsible) that he infests. His is the tragedy of a man painting empty houses to make it look like the past is still alive. It's that tragic progression, plus Solet's grasp of sickening and unflinching violence, that raises *Clean* above the mire of mediocrity.

Well, MovieMaker Magazine just confirmed what everyone knows already: Austin is one of the best big cities in North America to live and work as a moviemaker, and the top city for filmmakers in Texas.

One of the few cities to make the prestigious list every year since the magazine launched it in the early 2000s, Austin came in at No. 8 on the list. MovieMaker cited Austin's "collaborative community of professional filmmakers" and large number of equipment rental and post-production facilities as reasons for its high ranking, as well as its 36 film festivals meaning that "opportunities for inspiration, networking, and showcasing vour work are abundant."

6) Vancouver Even in the pandemic. Austin proved its allure and capacity for making TV and movies. Kelley (Ally McBeal, Boston Legal, Goliath). 1) Albuquerque

Brian Gannon, director of the Austin Film Commission, described making the list as "an honor. ... We have such a talented crew base here in Austin as well as the cast, local vendors, production companies, and facilities that make Austin the place for commercial, film, and television production. Thanks to

the reputation cultivated by the hard-working Austin professionals over the past 45 years, productions that film here always know they will come in on time, on budget, and looking great."

The slightly bad news is that Austin slipped down the rankings, from No. 3 in 2021 to No. 8 in 2022. However, it's the only city in Texas to make the Top 10, beating Dallas at No. 15, San Antonio (24), and Ft. Worth (25), and showing the city's powerhouse position as a home for big-budget and indie production.

THE KING'S DAUGHTER

D: Sean McNamara; with Kaya Scodelario, Pierce Brosnan, William Hurt, Benjamin Walker, Fan Bingbing, Pablo Schreiber, Crystal Clarke, Ben Lloyd-Hughes. (PG, 90 min.)

My favorite period of an actor's career is the narrow window where they're big enough to headline major movies but still have a few small projects kicking around on Hollywood shelves. Kaya Scodelario may be inching toward stardom thanks to her work in franchises like The Maze Runner. Still, it was another 2014 feature - The King's Daughter, based on Vonda N. McIntrye's award-winning novel The Moon and the Sun - that once seemed destined to put her on the map.

Eight years later, the film has finally found its way to the screen. Scodelario plays Marie-Josèphe, the newly appointed court composer (and unknowing daughter) of King Louis XIV (Brosnan). When Marie-Josèphe discovers that the king has captured a mythical mermaid, she quickly befriends both the creature and its gruff caretaker (Walker). But when the true machinations of the king are revealed, Marie-Josèphe and her new friends must hatch a plot to save the mermaid before it is too late and maybe redeem her father in the process.

Thanks to principal photography at the Palace of Versailles, The King's Daughter offers a surprisingly convincing spin on the French court. Everything in the movie is just a little better than the tumultuous production would lead you to believe, from the chemistry between Scodelario and Walker (the two actors would marry in 2015) to the cast's performances. It certainly doesn't hurt that Brosnan understands the assignment: his roval lothario contributes to some of the film's best running gags (including his regular confessions to the court priest). In addition, his chemistry with co-star William Hurt adds a much-needed piece of ennui to the proceedings.

Perhaps the biggest star of the film is costume designer Lizzy Gardiner. An Oscar winner in 1995 for her work in The Adventures of Priscilla, Queen of the Desert, here she finds a balance between leather and period design that makes the entire film pop. With good costumes and good scenery, half the battle for The King's Daughter is already won.

While director Sean McNamara cannot match the kinetic storytelling of Matthew Vaughn, there is more than a dash of Stardust in the final product. Rather than undermine the film, the tension between contributors allows the film to operate more as an Eighties-esque fantasy feature, where bawdy humor and childish moralizing sit hand in hand. Paradoxically, these imbalances make the whole affair feel more genuine than most of the sanitized studio content we've come to expect.

So while The King's Daughter may be little more than a blip in the career arcs of its talent, one can understand why executives were unwilling to punt on the film altogether. With a few standout performances and production design that imbues it with a good amount of period shine, it may yet find a receptive audience. The world needs more adult-ish fantasy anyway. *** - Matthew Monagle

✿ LAST AND FIRST MEN

D: Jóhann Jóhannsson; narrated by Tilda Swinton. (NR, 72 min.)

Facing extinction 2 billion years in the future, humankind has contacted us through the eons, seeking our help. A temporal lifeline to aid them in their (our?) last-ditch effort to thwart elimination from the cosmos. Beginning life as a 1930 sci-fi novel by influential author and philosopher William Olaf Stapledon, *Last and First Men* has followed time's more traditional arrow to arrive today as a film from the late composer Jóhann Jóhannsson. Less a straight adaptation, Jóhannsson's film is instead a contemplative film essay, a brooding and stark sensory experience.

"Listen patiently," declares a voice. It's the familiar, distinct elocution of Tilda Swinton, who guides us through the history of humanity's evolution of conquering the stars. A history of fits and starts, it takes a few hundred thousand years before society rises out of petty conflicts and inconsequential stasis to find itself in a transcendent state of collective unity and pursuits of technological and spiritual altruism. As Swinton conveys their (our?) story, and forlorn strings and stark percussions toll an uncanny dirge, Jóhannsson and cinematographer Sturla Brandth Grøvlen present us with alien monuments and structures amid a landscape reclaimed by nature. Boundless and bare, as Shelley would say. The structures are in fact

Spomeniks, the tens of thousands of World War II memorials that fill the hillsides and fields of the former Yugoslavia, their futurist architectural style dotting horizons like abstract enigmas.

How appropriate for Jóhannsson to pair these Spomeniks – once a testimony to bravery and victory over fascism, now decaying and forgotten across a country haunted by millions of ghosts – with Stapledon's history of the annihilation of our future selves. *Last and Future Men* is a haunting film of melancholic beauty, but hidden within are stubbornly persistent elements of hope. Just listen patiently.

POLY STYRENE: I AM A CLICHÉ D: Celeste Bell, Paul Sng. (NR. 96 min.)

"My mother was a punk rock icon," Celeste Bell intones offscreen as her mum watches herself on a wall of televisions in the first few seconds of her unique and affecting new documentary, *Poly Styrene: I Am a Cliché.*

That mother? Poly Styrene, crucial Seventies Britpunk X-Ray Spex's leader. They splashed neon day-glo colors atop punk's black palette, rejecting its nihilism for a vicious satire of consumerism. They grafted bleating saxophone atop the usual Sex Pistols-inspired power chords. Classics like "Oh Bondage, Up Yours!" were punk Roxy Music, minus Brian Eno's arty distance and Bryan Ferry's arch lounge-lizard persona. Styrene shattered both her mixed race origins and the beauty process, flaunting her dental braces and hiding her voluptuousness in shapeless fashions of her own creation, 40 years before Billie Eilish.

"All these people I'd never met, people who came to say goodbye to Poly Styrene, this famous person," Bell scoffs seconds later, recounting her mother's 2011 funeral. (She died of metastatic breast cancer that April 25, age 53.) "Someone so far removed from the mother I knew." *I Am a Cliché* is Bell discovering the person who was both her mum, Marianne Elliott, and Poly Styrene, punk icon.

She examines this complex woman through vintage footage, onscreen excavations of the extensive archive she unwittingly inherited, and travels to Styrene's life's locations. What you won't see is a single talking head, except Styrene in ancient TV interviews. Bell appears wordlessly onscreen, her disembodied voice narrating. The drama's players - such as Bell's father Adrian, X-Ray Spex bassist Paul Dean, and Styrene's sister Margaret Emmons - similarly speak off-camera. So do such punk luminaries as filmmaker Don Letts, journalists Vivien Goldman and John Robb, and musicians Thurston Moore (Sonic Youth) and Kathleen Hanna (Bikini Kill, Le Tigre). Styrene herself speaks through Preacher/Loving actress Ruth Negga's in-character readings from her diaries. What emerges? The music biz machinery ground down this visionary artist, leaving a mentally ill core seeking redemption via Hare Krishna. Bell extricated herself at a young age to live with her grandmother, as Styrene often neglected her child while attempting to center herself. They later reconciled, working together on Styrene's final solo record. Poly Styrene: I Am a Cliché is the daughter cinematically coming to terms with their complicated relationship and with a figure who changed our culture. ***1

Rollin' on a Dream

CRANKY GRANNY'S

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A cinnamon roll is a deceptively simple treat. It's an enriched bread rolled up with cinnamon sugar, baked, and topped with a cream cheese, confectioner's glaze, or buttercream icing. But that simple pastry is the result of a process that takes hours and hours, sometimes multiple days. While the

ingredients remain the same, the results can vary widely based on external factors the baker can't control.

The process of making cinnamon rolls is not unlike building a small business. It's a process with discrete phases: the idea, gathering

and measuring ingredients, assembling said ingredients, waiting, rolling, cutting, waiting some more. *Then* you execute. And even at the end of the line, you still may not be successful. But maybe you will be.

Such is the case with Cranky Granny's, a gourmet cinnamon roll shop located in the Domain. Conceived, owned, and operated by 23-year-old Sianni Dean, the business has undergone a variety of phases on its way to being fully realized.

WARM MILK, SUGAR, AND YEAST

The first step in making cinnamon rolls is to proof the yeast. To warm (but not too hot) milk, you add a few teaspoons of yeast and a fat pinch of sugar to feed it. Then you let it sit for several minutes to see whether the yeast starts to bubble and foam. That's how you know you've got good yeast. Dean came up with the idea for Cranky Granny's when she was 15 and in an entrepreneurship club at school in Willingboro, N.J., but didn't launch the business until she was 18. She spent the three intervening years between concept and execution doing market research. Proofing the yeast, so to speak.

"Every year there was a competition in which you could win \$100,000 to go toward your first business plus help from [the club sponsor's] marketing firm," says Dean. "I never won. And my last year I felt like I should have won.

"He told me, 'I don't think you're ready to be a boss.' When he told me that it set something off in me. It went from 'now I have to prove you wrong,' to just proving myself right."

FIRST RISE

After you mix your dough, you must let it rest in a warm environment so that it doubles in size. Dean launched Cranky Granny's, named in tribute to her grandmother, from her apartment, where she operated for a couple of years, crowdfunding among her personal and professional networks, including the Harrison family, who owns the Rita's Water Ice franchise where Dean worked as a young adult. These donors are called "Founders," and their names and photos are framed on the wall at Cranky Granny's storefront.

In 2020, the opportunity arose for Dean to relocate her sweet roll operation to Austin. She was not without her doubts. "I was so against coming to Texas. Only because I hate the hot weather," she laughs. "But I could either keep selling the sweet rolls and food platters out of my apartment back home in New Jersey or take a leap of faith."

In November of 2020, Dean and her girlfriend moved to Austin and Cranky Granny's set up shop in the back of Midtown Live, a sports bar and cafe in the St. Johns neighborhood. While the product was well received by the clientele, Dean had her sights on a brick-and-mortar storefront, one with greater visibility and higher foot traffic. When a lease became available at the Domain in early 2021, Dean leaped at the opportunity, opening her doors in May 2021. She was 22.

"I like being here at the Domain. At Midtown, it was kind of hard to find us," Dean explains. "We had a banner outside, but some people couldn't see it so they

wouldn't even know we're inside. Here you have a lot more parking."

And potential customers with significant disposable income. "We aren't the most expensive cinnamon roll, but we are premium."

THE PUNCH DOWN

After the first rise, you must (gently) punch down your dough to release the gases that accumulated in the fermentation process. This helps keep the gluten from stretching out too much, resulting in dense, tough rolls. The point is to maintain the structural integrity of the dough so that it remains tender and appealing.

Cranky Granny's scratch-made rolls are. roughly, the size of a sixth-grader's face, and they'll set you back about seven bucks, depending on what you order. There's the classic sweet roll, with a thick confectioner's glaze. That's entry-level stuff. When you're ready to get serious, there's the cookies and cream, with a generous rubble of chocolate-crème cookies on top. Or the peach cobbler, with a heaping scoop of the classic dessert on top. Banana pudding is laden with crushed vanilla wafers and loaded with banana slices. It's breakfast, with a side of dessert. And there's the option to add ice cream. There are also vegan sweet rolls in several flavors, plus milkshakes and smoothies.

Far from the trendy, upscale Rock Rose arm of the Domain, Cranky Granny's is in the relatively quiet southern wing by Dillard's, an escape room, Maggiano's Little Italy, and Bath & Body Works. One might wonder whether the shop is a good fit for

the area, but Dean states that the shop is busier at the Domain than inside Midtown Live. The shop has a staggering 4.9-star rating on Google reviews, with patrons exclaiming, "Cranky Granny's has made me fat!" and, "It smells like heaven [...] like my grandmother's house when she was baking." The structure is being built; another

transition is on the horizon.

FINAL PROOF

The last step before putting cinnamon rolls in the oven is a final resting time, when your cinnamon-andsugared buns rise to double their size. If they rise nicely, odds are good that you're going to have a successful final product.

Cranky Granny's lease at the Domain ends in April, and Dean is on the hunt for a new location, one with even greater visibility and a drive-through. To that end, she is once again crowdfunding, seeking more Founders, virtually through GoFundMe, and in the shop in the form of the \$100 Golden Child sweet roll topped with salted chocolate caramel glaze, 24-carat gold flakes, and gold-dusted chocolate truffles.

Dean's vision for Cranky Granny's includes franchising across the country, as well as establishing a legacy for her family.

"I want Cranky Granny's to be something that is not only for me and my siblings and my parents but for my nieces and nephews and my kids and grandkids and so on," she says.

Ultimately, the proof will be in the process.

MORE CINNAMON ROLLS TO SEEK OUT

Here's a roundup of the five best cinnamon rolls in Austin. It was tough work, but someone had to do it. - Melanie Haupt

Dō Artisan Bakery

If your Nana's cinnamon rolls were the Platonic ideal of cinnamon rolls, look no further than the Tiny Bread Shed at Camp East. Pastry chef Camila Velez's rolls are large, gooey, and not too sweet, with a cinnamon-sugar-laced spiral of tender bread robed in the perfect amount of icing. 12/10 would eat again and again. 2903 E. 12th, dobakery.com.

Épicerie

Taller than it is wide, the Rosedale French-Tex cafe's roll is statuesque, but hides hunks of pecans in her middle because we've all got secrets. She's got a soft center and nice flavor, and has the added benefit of not being an afternoon-obliterating gut bomb. The cylindrical shape adds an advantage when warming up the roll, as the icing melts down into the soft center. 2307 Hancock Dr., epicerieaustin.com.

Teal House

This SoCo bakery's signature baked good is soft and buttery, with a winning balance of sweetness and cinnamon flavor. The icing is more like a glaze, but it's generous and, when warmed, dramatically ups the gooeyness quotient. It's a little petite for the \$4 price tag, but, you know, sometimes that maxim about quality over quantity is true. 2304 S. Congress, tealhouse.co.

Tiny's Milk & Cookies

The walk-up bakery window at Tiny Boxwoods in Bryker Woods has a large, tender pastry for those who prefer a sweeter roll. Warm it up when you get home to soften up the icing a bit; when it melts into the center of the roll, you'll approach nirvana. *1515 W. 35th, Bldg. C, tinysmilkandcookies.com.*

Austin-Adjacent Honorable Mentions:

Sweet Lemon Kitchen (sweetlemonkitchen. com) in Georgetown has buttery, gooey cinnamon rolls the size of your face. If you want to absolutely obliterate your day and have a good excuse to spend it on your couch, follow your bliss and eat the whole thing. If you need to function, pair half of one with a scrambled egg and go about your business.

Skull & Cakebones (skullandcakebones.com) in Dripping Springs has a hubcap-sized sourdough cinnamon roll that is also fluffy enough to use as a pillow. Plus, these folks know that a lot of cinnamon + (vegan) butter + salt is the secret to the perfect cinnamon roll.

Food News Buffet

Here's some of what's happening in Austin's culinary scene, as wrangled from numerous PR releases, words on the digital street, and even the occasional (verified) IRL eavesdroppings.

You want the bad news first, citizen? OK, how about learning that Murph Willcott's longtime Texas French Bread eatery at 2900 Rio Grande has burned down? The Austin Fire Department responded to the fire just before 11pm on Monday night, according to various reports, and it took about three hours to fully douse the flames. No one was injured in the blaze, but the whole structure collapsed and, yeah, we can't conjecture what the next move might be for the iconic Austin business that started back in 1981. But we'll keep you updated as best we can...

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
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Mathematical Contractions of Austin's Musical Identity

THE CONTEMPORARY AUSTIN UNVEILS NEW DANIEL JOHNSTON TRIBUTE MURAL

Last Saturday, driving into Downtown, I passed nuns and figures in old-timey robes holding cloth banners. I saw little boys in suits carrying a statue of the Virgin Mary on their shoulders, marching like a pint-sized funeral procession to the annual anti-abortion rally occurring on the state Capitol grounds.

A few blocks south, a group gathered outside the Contemporary Austin to celebrate another world of moral iconography. A new mural honoring the late Austin artist Daniel Johnston adorns the side of the museum, featuring sky-high editions of his signature ducks and friendly demons, like the multiheaded beast referencing the Book of Revelation. His famed Jeremiah the Innocent dons a Nirvana tee, Johnston's thank-you nod to fan Kurt Cobain.

Joined by District 9 Council Member Kathie Tovo, Mayor Steve Adler proclaimed Johnston's birthday, Jan. 22. Hi How Are You Day. Amid the consistent clatter of Downtown construction, he referenced the mural as a bastion of local identity "in this city that is just changing so much."

"You see that strength in everything that's happening around us, with all the cranes," said Adler. "But, [Johnston] recognized the frailty that is also part of that. It's the soft doubt that we all have ... To take these symbols, and to put [them] in such a visible place in this city, is so incredibly important."

Inside, the first-ever exhibition of the artist's work, "Daniel Johnston: I Live My Broken Dreams," runs through March 20. Alongside video and Johnston's worn, white piano, the largely printer-paper-sized works emphasize the mural's impactful scale. Speaking to the crowd, Dick Johnston remembered when fans rallied in 2003 to save his brother's iconic mural on Guadalupe.

"It has been Dan's experience, and it continues to be mine, that all the things that he wanted to do but didn't have the tools to do – people always appeared, magically, and helped him do it," he said. "My take is, you

know, he's gone, but he meant for it to go on. The continued story, he would call it."

Vans and local skate shop No-Comply provided funding for the mural, painted by Austin's Show Goat Mural Works. Donning colorful Half-Cab sneakers with Johnston's characters, owner Elias Bingham previewed No-Comply's third Johnston shoe collaboration, due for mid-March. The first collection, in 2019, commissioned exclusive doodles and lettering from Johnston still in use for the upcoming line.

"For the last one, we had a line for six hours at the store, and the rest sold online in less than a minute," remembered Bingham. "There's a lot of excitement, globally. We had people reaching out from all over the world. Being able to support the Hi How Are You Project with proceeds and keep that story around it – of the art and the mental health awareness and the music – all resonates with what we do with skateboarding."

His skate-and-coffee shop closed for an hour to bring a troupe of board-toting employees to the mural opening, located at West Seventh and Congress.

"We want people to know this is here and see it," said Bingham. "Hopefully, it'll resonate enough that the community says, 'We don't want it to come down.' That's my goal. If it's seen as an Austin staple, I think it's possible for it to stay."

BOB DYLAN PAINTS THE HOLE IN THE WALL, WITH A TWIST

When Bob Dylan plays UT's Bass Concert Hall on March 16, as announced Monday, we have a guess as to one local establishment the famed songwriter may visit.

In London, Halcyon Gallery currently displays a new painting of Hole in the Wall

created by the artist. The piece, titled "Hole in the Wall" and dated 2020, features a glowy after-dark view of the Guadalupe club, for an unlisted price. Dylan, also known for longtime work across formats as a visual artist, has never played the 48-year-old venue.

(Halcyon Gallery did not respond to the *Chronicle*'s request to publish the painting, which can be seen on their website.)

Adding intrigue, the landmark Sixties songsmith took some artistic liberties in his depiction. While HITW features a prominent mural of a young Dylan on its south wall, the artist swapped his own image for a blackand-white Elvis in his painting. Renowned local muralist Federico Archuleta, originator of the real-life Dylan mural, was charmed to learn of the Easter egg.

"It's kind of odd, right?" he remarked. "T'm actually flattered, because I think he did it as an inside joke. He probably picked to paint [HITW] because he was on there to begin with. He was probably like, 'I want to change that detail around because I don't want to, like, kiss my own ass.' Maybe he put Elvis as somebody that inspired him."

The mural is now Archuleta's remaining Dylan depiction on the Drag, as his stencils of various musicians outside the former Tower Records location were covered up last year for renovation of a new CVS store. At the behest of longtime HITW booker Paul Minor, Archuleta originally created the mural in 2005 for a Dylan tribute night. The muralist continued to show his fandom in updates to his "Subterranean Homesick Blues"-inspired work.

"It's an image of him dropping the cue cards, referencing the music video. It originally said Dylan Hoot Night and who was going to perform. After that I reset and put, 'How does it feel?" Also, I put, 'I'll be your

baby tonight,' for Valentine's Day. After that, we stayed with, 'Don't need a weather*man*.' for over a decade now.

"I kind of feel like I should change it now to Elvis standing on his toes, from Jailhouse Rock," added Archuleta.

MOBLEY ARCHIVES BLACK CULTURAL LEADERS WITH "AUSTIN STORYBOX"

Mobley, local multiformat artist and musician extraordinaire, had a bit of a chip on his shoulder about the frequent exclusion of audio from public art. So, upon learning of the city-sponsored TEMPO program supporting short-term installations across Austin Public Library branches, Mobley envisioned "Austin Storybox." On display outside the Carver Library on the side of the building facing Rosewood Avenue, the four-sided structure features portraits of elder Black Austin artists.

Snippets of in-depth interviews with the creatives, conducted by Mobley, swirl around the structure from a solar-powered playback system.

"It was really genuinely a pleasure, in every way imaginable, to pick these people's brains and give them an opportunity to tell their stories," said Mobley. "Our current culture in the United States is probably pretty unique across human history in the degree to which a lot of people just don't really experience multigenerational interactions on a regular basis. A lot of knowledge is getting lost, and a lot of younger and older people are really isolated from each other."

Mobley collaborated with local visual artists Dawn Okoro and Adrian Armstrong on the selection of three longtime Austin-based cultural leaders. The portraits colorfully depict musician/East Austin arts advocate Harold McMillan, multidisciplinary artist/ activist Carla Nickerson, and veteran singer/ bassist Andrew Venson, also known as the father of Jackie Venson.

Mobley said an audio selection from McMillan, who founded the nonprofit DiverseArts and oversees East 11th venue Kenny Dorham's Backyard, captured the goal of the project.

"In terms of a visible African American presence in this community, [this] is the last stand, the final frontier," said McMillan, currently nominated for the Austin Music Awards Hall of Fame. "So, that is about investment in reestablishment, preservation. Starting now, [this is about doing] work that ends up being institutionalized to the extent that going forward, in 100 years, you'll be able to come to this community and know where you are."

While putting the installation together, many subjects dropped out due to complications related to COVID-19. Armstrong, who painted the portrait of McMillan, decided to represent them with the sign of an absent performer, an empty stool. (Find all TEMPO pieces on display, across 10 library branches, through October.)

"We decided to do a more symbolic piece, with the stool, to represent the Black people being pushed out of Austin," said Armstrong, known musically as Njune. "We're also representing the Black people who have been taken through COVID."

ARMADILLO WORLD HEADOUARTERS SIGN SELLS FOR 52K AT SOTHEBY'S

An artifact from one of Austin's most historic music venues, the Armadillo World Headquarters, sold Tuesday for \$52,920.

The 16-foot-long wooden sign, reading "Armadillo World Headquarters Concert Hall and Beer Garden," once hung over the patio entrance to the famed Seventies venue. Sotheby's, the planet's oldest and most prestigious art auction house, auctioned the sign starting at \$35,000. Ahead of the sale, multiple people formerly involved with the Armadillo questioned the piece's origins.

That was later disputed, though, by the auction house and evewitnesses to the original sale.

Armadillo founder Eddie Wilson and Leea Mechling, a core staffer at the Armadillo who is now the executive director of local culture nonprofit AusPop, both told the Chronicle the sign was stolen after the venue closed in 1980. The sign was created by 'Dillo staffer Don Cowley, based on Camel cigarettes-inspired lettering by famed poster artist Jim Franklin.

Derek Parsons, vice president and senior press officer at Sotheby's Americas, adamantly denied accusations that the sign was stolen, writing: "Sotheby's takes seriously any claims about auctioning stolen objects. For all consignments, Sotheby's proactively conducts rigorous due diligence and research to establish provenance and an object's history. In looking into the Armadillo sign, it was established that the sign was sold at auction in 1981, and there were no concerns about the chain of ownership. There is no evidence to support the claim of theft."

Sotheby's auctioned the sign for Michele Krier of San Antonio, who said her exhusband Don White bought it in 1981. White's sister, Susan, confirmed that account to the Chronicle – as did artist Debracarol Hearne who says she took White to the 'Dillo that day.

"I was there when he wrote the check. I don't remember what he paid for it, but I remember it was a lot of money," Hearne recalled of White's purchase. "He said, 'I can't believe I'm doing this!' And my background is art history. I'm an artist, so I told him, 'Look, this is the only one - this is the only sign like this. It's a one of [a] kind sign and it's worth having it.' We had to rent a U-Haul and it was a big event to get it loaded up and people helped us. He'd checked out with his little auctioneers ticket and everything. Nobody stole that."

NAKIA DOMINATES **IN BEAR** MUSICAL

"This is the second time I've found you in a semi-naked, compromising position with an overly



aggressive man," a diaper-loving adult baby, Simon, scolds Anthony. The protagonist's stuck in a virtual reality simulation, leaping between fraught relationships - a maddening trip for the lovable bear, but there's fun songs along the way.

A special musical episode of the queer fat-positive web series Skeleton Key, Dueling Pianos follows Anthony and husband Hunter as they try to reconnect in the cyber mesh. As if Anthony's situation weren't perilous enough, Hunter's confined in an asylum run by a horny cannibalistic doctor. Clever, memorable songs include an informative "The ABC's of Kink" and the devilish "Hate Sex," sung by Nakia Reynoso.

The Austin vocalist plays Sebastian Jupiter, a mid-meltdown former superstar who gets what he wants at any cost. It's shocking to see the sweethearted local intimidate as a hostile, domineering sugar daddy, but his dramatic singing - especially on the reflective "Man With the Midas Touch" - leaves an equally strong impression.

Nakia calls the 15-song musical, crafted with Joshua R. Pangborn (Anthony), "by far the queerest and most sexual piece of art I have ever been a part of or created." Three collections, helmed by Matt Parmenter, can be streamed: a cast recording, a sing-along soundtrack, and Nakia's vocal version. Meanwhile, Dueling Pianos premieres Friday for SideKick Patreon subscribers before hitting YouTube Sunday. - Kevin Curtin

SUN JUNE EXPANDS SOMEWHERE

Eleven months after the album's celebrated reception, wistful Austin pop troupe Sun June rolls out an expanded edition of sophomore effort Somewhere. Lovely accompaniments offered live in the past year, including on tour with Shakey Graves - the three new songs' warm, reliable instrumentation beckon singer Laura Colwell's weightless ruminations on love and memory. A new room in the familiar Somewhere house, "Reminded" threads tranguil, questioning scenes with a shaky, devotional edge. "How could I resist you?" asks the lead. "How could I not try?/ Did I make it hurt?/ Did I make it hard?" There's also new "Easy" and acoustic track "Tom Petty." - Rachel Rascoe

ALEX COKE & CARL MICHEL MANIFEST THE EMISSARY

A change of environment always engenders fresh ideas: Veteran Austin jazz musicians Alex Coke and Carl Michel developed new LP The Emissary whilst performing on their driveways during lockdown. The reedist and guitarist channel oxygen and the spirit of Alice Coltrane into a half-dozen free-flowing spiritual jazz tunes. Manipulating saxophones, flutes, guitar, bass. vibraphone, harp, and Bob Hoffnar's atmospheric pedal steel, Coke and Michel sample catalogs of Leadbelly, Paul Motian, German abbess Hildegard von Bingen, and their own inventory to paint the tracks in grass green, sunset orange, and sky blue - bypassing pandemic limitations and reaching for the ethereal. - Michael Toland

NORMAN BASE AND THE BLACK EXPERIENCE

In a short-form video posted to his Twitter timeline, ATX rapper Norman BA\$E personally analyzes the Black experience in two minutes, focusing on hot-seat topics such as police brutality and Black beauty. Partnering with Black Pumas keyboardist JaRon Marshall, the lyricist floats over an elegant and light, soulful tune with haunting phrases accompanying cruel visuals. "An eye for an eye, why my brothers die? A couple tears going down a Black mother's eyes." The story concludes with a 1960s Black woman defending natural hair and the importance of self-love and acceptance. - Morgan-Taylor Thomas

GOOD LOOKS ARE FULLY "ALMOST AUTOMATIC"

Good Looks' debut single entices the warm fuzzies of frolicking hand in hand with a lover under the brushstroke hues of a sienna sunset. In a glimpse of their upcoming Keeled Scales album, Bummer Year, the folk-rock quartet boasts a sound straight Hill Country. Americana roots flow palpable through breezy riff reverb straight from the coffee-and-whiskey breath of self-described "blue-collar political indie-rockers." Along with a video abounding with ATV donut-spins and cows. Good Looks' soft-alt sensibility reminds us that while this is Austin, we all still breathe Texas air. Mars Salazar

8½ SOUVENIRS AT THE MOVIES

Before disbanding in the new century, 81/2 Souvenirs became a local cornerstone of a swing and lounge revival for their Nineties triptych Happy Feet, Souvonica, and Twisted Desire. With production assistance of Texas guru Charlie Sexton. At the Movies marks their first release in over 20 years as it retains the French cinematic spirit of smoke plumes shrouding European cafes and speakeasies. Reunited with original singer Kathy (Kiser) Benayoun, guitarist Oliver Giraud and company unravel a multilingual coalescence from dramatic accordion flourishes in "Off White," sultry hip sway in "Cafune," or circus show gypsy jazz in "Where Do They Go." – Alejandra Ramirez

SILVANA ESTRADA The Parish, Thursday 3

Silvana Estrada is the 24-yearold folk singer-songwriter from Veracruz being called the "millennial Chavela Vargas." She can build her own stringed instruments by hand and has - at least as a kid - but she was also raised by luthiers and surrounded by music, eventually studying jazz at a Mexican conservatory and making a beautiful album with Charlie Hunter. Her debut solo full-length, Marchita, draws from Veracruz's native style jarocho, a delicate, chiming music largely drawing percussion from the feet of dancers, but this is no dance



LP. Marchita also pulls from biting rancheras for an intensely intimate story of post-breakup disillusionment played on a Venezuelan cuatro. Full of melismatic singing, Silvana work is all poignance, vulnerability, and drama, like a late-night fiesta that yeers into drunken, tearful karaoke. "This whole thing of singing songs and drinking and crying at some point - even if we are partying, we get to do that and it's not like a heavy thing to do," Silvana tells the Chronicle. "I have this deep connection with 'bad emotions' and 'bad feelings,' and in Mexico, I feel like we have a deep connection with sadness and loss ... but then we have this amazing cultural thing of finding beauty in everything ... I have a lot of that in what I do. And even Marchita is a celebration of a breakup." Christina Garcia

ROCHELLE & THE SIDEWINDERS Skylark Lounge, Friday 28

Genuine Eastside juke joint the Skylark Lounge reopened in a burst of communal goodwill and soul last November, shuttered some 20 months due to the pandemic. "[We're] connected to what live music is locally and what it means to that neighborhood," pledged owner and ATX native Johnny LaTouf. Extending a legacy of Black R&B at the sugar shack, he stages gutbucket blues rockers Rochelle & the Sidewinders, led by vocal blowtorch Rochelle Creone and Zeppelin-esque ax master Tom Coplen. "Every snare crack, riff bend, sax flare, and vocal wring snaps, crackles, and rocks," wrote the Chronicle of 2020 breakout Something Good. Club, meet a club wielder. - Raoul Hernandez

LOTERIA RECORD RELEASE Feels So Good Records, Saturday 29

With sliding Telecaster twang on top of a nostalgic garage rock sound, Loteria plays like a honky-tonk's rock & roll house band. Including members of the Motel Ball Band. Berkshire Hounds, Bad Lovers, and country act JD Clark's Stuck in the Mud Band, the Austin fourpiece rings in the release of Texas Toast, their first LP since 2014's Party Favors, with a party at Feels So Good Records (211 E. Alpine). Dark country act Rattlesnake Milk and ex-Strange Boys songwriter Rvan Sambol open up along with newer outfit the Honky Tonk Time Machine. Admission is free, which feels so good. - Robert Penson

14TH ANNUAL CHILI COLD BLOOD CHILI COOK-OFF Sagebrush, Saturday 29, noon-6:30pm

Chinese Year of the Tiger, 2022 notches a decade since guitar hero Nick Curran drove down to the proverbial crossroads at the crushing age of 35. Benefiting homegrown lifesavers Health Alliance for Austin Musicians in his memory, 20 contestants fire up bellies 'n' beer prompts in the outback of Sagebrush for Chili Cold Blood's labor of roots possession and blues. Mayeux & Broussard's red beans & rice injection, tall Texicana tales of rock adventures, rides shotgun, while lysergic je'Texas spikes their acidic blues, and newcomers Little Bear stack onto the all-day soundtrack of four-alarm Austin grit for a cause legit. - Raoul Hernandez
