



MUDDLED ABOUT MAPS

Dear Editor,

I am writing about the map included in your story about the additional cost of regulations on multifamily (MF) housing versus single family (SF) ["It's Expensive to Build in Austin, and Regulations Are Adding Cost," News, Aug. 4].

The map's caption states that the color codes show the additional cost for MF.

It is patently ridiculous that the range in the highest class can be from \$1,795,000 to \$2,377,000 for each construction. It implies that for a hypothetical eight units, each unit would be near \$200 to 300k cheaper if it was regulated as in the lowest class on the map (\$14,270).

You need to clarify how these numbers were reached, including what the imputed rate of interest ("time is money") and permit fees were.

These cost estimates of the overall potential regulatory costs a multi-family development could incur in each ZIP code come directly from a city of Austin report. The researchers used an aggregate of all possible sites within each ZIP code and used a variable cost methodology to apply estimates of potential regulatory costs. THE WEEK'S BIGGEST NEWS IN BRIEF

CEDAR PARK FIRE Central Texas was ablaze this week. A brush fire in Cedar Park Tuesday destroyed an apartment building, damaged three others, and caused the evacuation of hundreds of homes and businesses, KUT reported.

ONE WAY OUT

South of Austin, Kyle is struggling to handle the Oak Grove Fire, per KUT. Mayor Travis Mitchell says evacuees and fire crews in rural areas sometimes find there is only one way in and out. Some residents had to drive toward the fire to avoid being trapped by it.

A/C FOR FIREFIGHTERS Meanwhile, the city is working to repair air conditioning in Austin Fire Department fire trucks after a memo from Council Member Mackenzie Kelly described risks of damaged A/C to firefighters and emergency responses, the Austin Monitor reported.

HEY, I DON'T KNOW ABOUT YOU, BUT I'M FIGHTING 52 LAWSUITS Thirteen formerly incarcerated people and the families of nine people who died in the Harris County Jail filed suit this week, joining at least 51 other lawsuits lodged against the jail, The Texas Tribune reported. They are represented by Texas attorney Paul Grinke and Ben Crump, who represents families of George Floyd and Breonna Taylor.

ETJ MAYDAY Since 1963, Texas cities have had limited authority over buffer zones around them called extraterritorial jurisdictions, or ETJs, where cities regulate impervious cover, noise, lighting, and more. A new state law will allow ETJ residents to leave that authority through a petition or election, Community Impact reported. We don't yet know the impact.

Cruel and Usual

This article is part of a three-part series on the mounting heat crisis in Texas prisons. Expect Part 2 in next week's issue.

Texas prisons are cooking people alive. Are we okay with that? **BY BRANT BINGAMON**

Alexis Woods is facing the same crisis as other prisoners across Texas in this summer's historic heat. With temperatures soaring to 120 and even 130 degrees in her cell at the Dr. Lane Murray Unit outside Waco, Woods' cot is too hot to sleep on. So the 26-year-old is sleeping on the floor.

“She will take a shower, then lay on the floor, go under her bed, pull the covers down, and put her fan right there,” Alexis' mother, Samantha, told the *Chronicle*. “So it's like a little box that is bearable. But as it's gotten hotter and hotter, now the floor is hot, and the walls are hot. So she's just like, ‘Mom, I don't know what to do.’”

We heard from over a dozen family members of incarcerated people in researching this article, as well as several former and current prisoners. They say this improvisation — drenching yourself and lying down on bare concrete to sleep — is a near-universal practice in cells without air conditioning. These cells, metal and concrete boxes that retain and amplify the heat of the day, are found in two-thirds of Texas prisons. They house approximately 95,000 people. Roughly 4 out of 10 are serving time for nonviolent offenses, according to stats from the Texas Department of Criminal Justice.

“And in an hour, when that water is completely evaporated, they're waking up and pouring more water onto the floor,” said Marci Simmons, a former inmate at Lane Murray who now runs the advocacy group Lioness Justice Impacted Women's Alliance. “And some people don't have access to the shower. They have to use the sink in their cell. The water that comes out of the sink, it's warm, it's warm enough to melt instant coffee. But the water in the toilet, if you flush it several times, it gets cool. And you have people who scrub their toilet out and put toilet water on the floor, trying to get some relief.”

“HE SAVED MY LIFE”

THE MUSIC SCENE, TIMES SEVEN For advocates of local live music, **new definitions** for music venues and art spaces in the land use code are cause for cautious excitement, the Austin Monitor reported. If **Council** approves the language next month, the number of properties eligible to hold a **music venue** will increase almost sevenfold – but advocates warn that an initial surge in venues will likely be followed by closures, depending on the state of the market.

FOR THE NEWS JUNKIES WHO LOVE A GOOD TIMELINE This week, The Texas Tribune continued its coverage of A.G. **Ken Paxton's** impact in office ahead of the impeachment trial, creating a timeline that tracks the A.G. Office's dramatic transformation from a quiet state agency focused mainly on child support and bureaucracy to a powerhouse of conservative ideology and a producer of **conservative federal judges**.

WILCO GETS SUED The *Statesman* has been following the fraught relationship between former **Williamson County** health director **Derrick Neal** and **WilCo Judge Bill Gravell** since 2021, and this week Neal filed a federal lawsuit accusing Gravell of racial discrimination that led to Neal's resignation. Neal alleges Gravell made threatening and inappropriate comments after Neal complained that Gravell had racially targeted him in criticism of vaccine distribution.

87 AND STILL SLAYING The *State Theatre*, 87-year-old sibling to the **Paramount Theatre**, will be renovated. The changes include a rooftop lounge and update to the iconic neon sign. The Historic Landmark Commission was hesitant about the sign, but they have limited sway since the *State Theatre* isn't a registered landmark.

Simmons told us that during her years at Lane Murray the summer routine was regularly punctuated by the arrival of ambulances, putting the prison on lockdown. She said she witnessed vomiting, seizures, and loss of consciousness each year – symptoms of heat cramps and heat stroke. Left untreated, heat stroke can progress to heat exhaustion, with the heartbeat elevating to dangerous levels as the body works frantically to cool itself. Death often comes from cardiac arrest.

TDCJ denies that there is widespread heat stroke or heat exhaustion in the prisons. A TDCJ spokesperson told the *Chronicle* that in the last year, 25 employees and only 9 inmates needed medical care beyond first aid for heat-related illness. But given that prisoners outnumber corrections officers roughly 7 to 1, we would expect to see at least 175 inmates with heat-related illness requiring medical care – and that estimate is probably too low, because it assumes that the rate of heat-related illness is the same for staff who go home at the end of their shift and prisoners who are in hot cells around the clock. (The TDCJ employs roughly 17,000 COs and houses 116,000 prisoners, per a spokesperson and TDCJ's 2022 statistical report.)

Samantha Woods says Alexis has repeatedly called her in tears this summer, describing fellow inmates collapsing and having seizures. “They’re dropping like flies,” Woods said. “And my daughter tells me,

‘Mom, there are people in here that are too old. There are people that are mentally ill, that should be in another unit. There’s people that have major medical issues, they’re in wheelchairs, they’re on walkers.’ And with TDCJ, the narrative is so twisted. They say they have special units for the elderly. Well, I see them every single time I visit my daughter.”

Joseph Martire has spent this summer at the **Estelle Unit** north of Huntsville, where five inmates have died since June. He said that Estelle, like Lane Murray, has many infirm inmates. “Of course there is fear,” Martire told us. “You got a lot of people on this unit that have medical problems. The heat’s a very big risk for them, exacerbating their health problems. They could get heat stroke or a heart attack, heat exhaustion. And you’ve got regular people that are susceptible too.”

Martire himself has had difficulties. He says this summer has been the hottest in his 18 years behind bars. That includes last year, when he had a serious episode of heat stroke. “For 2½ hours his cellie and other people on the run were hollering, lighting fires, trying to get an officer to come down,” Martire’s wife, Kat Komisky, said. “When medical got to him, they said it was just in time.

He had been unconscious and convulsing. Since then he’s had more sensitivity to the heat. He’s had multiple episodes with loss of consciousness, numbness and tingling throughout his body, seeing black spots in his vision.”

“THAT’S A BALD-FACED LIE”

“Every summer the deaths and suicides increase – it’s like clockwork,” said Dr. **Amite Dominick**, the founder of **Texas Prisons Community Advocates**, which tracks inmate deaths. With this summer being so hot, Dominick has been deluged with pleas from inmates and their families. “Right now, the family members are terrified,” she said. “They’re panicking, honestly. It’s well beyond, ‘They’re in prison and it’s hot.’ It’s, ‘Oh my God, they haven’t called me – are they alive or dead?’”

According to the Texas Attorney General’s **Custodial Death Report**, over 100 people have died in Texas prisons since the middle of June, when the heat began in earnest. A pair of recent studies by Texas A&M and Brown University estimate that as many as 12% of these deaths could be heat-related. But that’s not something you will hear from TDCJ. According to the agency, there hasn’t been a heat-related death in any Texas prison since 2011.

“When TDCJ insists that they haven’t had a death from heat-related causes in 12 years, that’s a bald-faced lie,” said **Tona Southards Naranjo**, mother of Jon Anthony Southards, who died at the Estelle Unit on June 28. Naranjo said she viewed her son’s body after his death and he had a heat rash “from the top of his head to the backs of his knees.”

Naranjo told me that she spoke to her son three times the day he died. “He was complaining that it was so hot. ‘Turn your fan on, baby,’ I said. He said, ‘I can’t, Mama, it makes it hard for me to breathe.’ I said, ‘What about a cold shower?’ He laughed at me and said, ‘Mama, I haven’t had a shower in four days.’ My son was in solitary confinement. So he was dependent on the guards for respite.

“I believed with all my heart that he would be safe

in TDCJ. I believed with all my heart that going to prison would save his life, that he was safer there than he was on the streets at the time. But what happened was a judge sentenced my son to 20 years, but the TDCJ sentenced him to death.”

The *Chronicle* will report on TDCJ’s response to the heat crisis in next week’s issue. ■

Hays Co. Sets Amerson Trial Date

Cyrus Gray's murder case was dropped; why not his?

Three weeks ago, the Hays County District Attorney's Office dismissed capital murder charges against **Cyrus Gray**, one of two men who spent years in jail awaiting trials over the 2015 murder of Texas State student Justin Gage.

When the D.A. announced the decision, Gray's supporters believed that the capital murder charges against **Devonte Amerson** – the man prosecutors accused of committing the murder alongside Gray – would also be dropped. That has not happened. A murder trial for Amerson has now been set for Oct. 16. This has observers wondering: If the evidence against Gray wasn't good enough to put him on trial, does the state have better evidence against Amerson?

"The allegation has always been that Devonte and Cyrus committed this crime together," said **Amy Kamp**, founder of Hays County Jail Advocates (and a former *Chronicle* news editor). "So why is it that they're willing to let Cyrus walk free and they're proceeding with a trial against Devonte? If they think they're guilty they should try both of them. And if they think that they're not guilty they need to stop wasting taxpayer money – and years of Devonte's life – and drop it."

By "years of Devonte's life," Kamp is referring to the five years and counting that Amerson has spent in the Hays County Jail waiting for his day in court. He's been incarcerated since March 3, 2018. According to his mother, **Chelesta**, Amerson was

offered a 15-year sentence in June to testify against Gray but turned the offer down flat. Amerson, in a recently rejected motion to the court, claims that prosecutors responded by asking how many years he would accept to testify against Gray, and that he again rebuffed them. The charges against Gray were dropped weeks later.

The evidence presented at Gray's original 2022 trial, which ended in a mistrial, was scant. It consisted mainly of cellphone records putting Gray and Amerson within 10 miles of Gage's killing and the testimony of a friend of Gray's, who said he was told about a robbery gone wrong. What prosecutors didn't have was evidence putting the gun that killed Gage in either man's hand (and the gun itself has never been found). A San Marcos detective admitted that law enforcement did not know who had pulled the trigger.

And there was no DNA, fingerprint, or eyewitness evidence demonstrating that the pair were ever in the apartment where the murder took place.

So, has the D.A.'s Office gathered better evidence for Amerson's trial? "State bar rules against extrajudicial comments will not allow us to answer your question or make any comment at this time," Hays County Assistant District Attorney **Gregg Cox** told the *Chronicle*. Amerson's attorney, Paul Evans, was similarly circumspect, saying he looks forward to trying the case, but in court, not in the press.

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
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Something's Gotta Budge

Final budget talks weigh police, rent help, guaranteed income for Austinites in poverty **BY AUSTIN SANDERS**

City Council holds its final budget work session Thursday, Aug. 10, as they prepare to amend the city's spending plan for **fiscal year 2023-24** and adopt it during a series of meetings scheduled for next Wednesday through Friday, Aug. 16-18. Tuesday, Aug. 8, Council held its penultimate budget work session, with Council members asking questions about spending on permanent supportive housing, public health programs, and improving maintenance of the city's park system.

The overall budget proposed by Interim City Manager **Jesús Garza** comes in at \$5.5 billion, but most of that is made up by enterprise departments – those that generate their own revenues through fees – including **Austin Water and Energy**, the airport, and resource recovery. All of the political action, including the focus of advocacy groups and policymakers, is on the much smaller **\$1.3 billion General Fund** that pays for city services such as public safety, libraries, and parks.

Meanwhile, Council members have been posting a steady stream of budget-related questions into a central repository online for staff to answer. The responses provide additional context on line items included in the manager's proposed budget, which will help direct the shape of amendments CMs propose during budget adoption next week. So let's take a look at some of the most interesting issues they're weighing.

PUBLIC SAFETY ...

It's well-known now by even casual City Hall observers that the **Austin Police Department** sucks up more money from the GF than any single department in city government (proposed at **\$476.5 million** in the manager's FY 24 budget). But what may be surprising is that **\$39 million** of APD's budget, or about 8%, is dedicated to positions the department has been unable to fill. As of July, APD has a total of 440 vacant positions, which includes roles such as victim services counselors and 911 call takers; but 313 of those vacancies are for officer positions, which amounts to about \$30 million in funding.

It is highly unlikely that APD will fill even half of those vacant officer positions in the next fiscal year (the **Austin Police Academy** graduated just 33 cadets from the most recent class in May). As long as the positions are allocated to APD and remain unfilled, they can only be spent on police overtime – which the department certainly has been doing. In the current budget year, APD has already spent \$32 million on overtime for sworn personnel, and they're expected to end the fiscal year having spent \$39.8 million on overtime.

By comparison, the **911 call center** – which has been plagued by staffing issues resulting in long hold times for emergency calls – has 48 vacancies valued at **\$2.7**

million. Garza's proposed budget also includes \$211,375 of new funding to continue the **First Responder stipend** of \$150 per month for 911 employees with an active license from the **Texas Commission on Law Enforcement**, which is designed to increase recruitment and retention at the call center. The Collaborative Care Communication Center (C4), which operates under **Austin-Travis County Emergency Medical Services**, is a well-regarded system within the 911 call center that helps divert people who are in need of nonemergency health care or other services away from hospitals so that EMS field medics can focus on responding to true emergencies. In response to a question from CM **Mackenzie Kelly**, staff estimates that it would cost \$1.1 million in ongoing costs to increase C4's operating hours from 12 to 24 hours a day.

... AND MORE

Some CMs have also begun laying out the budget priorities they will attempt to secure via amendments to the manager's proposed spending plan. CM **Chito Vela** confirmed with staff that the manager's budget includes just \$250,000 in emergency rental assistance, and intends to offer an amendment boosting that to \$7.8 million – which is about what was available to renters last year. Vela also intends to increase the city's "shade fund" from \$200,000 to \$2 million; the funds would be used to increase shading in city parks.

CM **Vanessa Fuentes** said she will bring a \$1.3 million amendment to continue a partnership with nonprofit **UpTogether**, with which the city contracted in August 2022 to pilot a "guaranteed income" program. For one year, 135 households of varying sizes received \$1,000 per month, no strings attached, to spend as needed. If passed, the new funding would extend the program for another year.

Council will hold one more meeting today, Aug. 10, before adopting the budget. The focus of the final meeting will be on budget amendments proposed by Council members. ■

ZILKER REVAMP PLAN DEAD IN THE WATER(SHED)

After a rapid series of events over the weekend, the controversial and years-in-the-making **Zilker Master Plan** "will not be on the August 31st City Council agenda, and there is no plan to bring it before the Austin Mayor and Council in the future," according to Mayor **Kirk's Watson Wire** Monday afternoon. The announcement marks the apparent conclusion of a bitter fight over the plan, during which opponents waged a sometimes misleading campaign to convince the public that the plan would lead to the privatization of Zilker, while not doing as much as it could to preserve it as Austin's most beloved and prestigious green space.


The plan sparked debate over several important issues, but misinformed arguments spread more widely than informed ones this spring. Concerns that ACL's parent company **C3 Presents** would receive revenues from paid parking and that the nonprofit model would allow Zilker to get disproportionate amounts of money to the

detriment of other parks were unfounded, per our reporting. Another argument, that building a new amphitheatre with greater capacity would harm the environment, ignored that the plan moved the existing amphitheatre out of the Barton Creek watershed and would have restored at least 2 acres to woodland. But the presumptive nonprofit partner, Zilker 351, did include an organization that receives a majority of its funding from C3, and community concerns about biasing development to benefit C3 have persisted. In April, the Environmental Commission voted to recommend removing the nonprofit element of the plan, but the whole megillah was due to come to Council at that Aug. 31 meeting.

Last week, documentary filmmaker **Steve Mims** premiered his 17-minute exposé, "Zilker, Inc: The Plan to Monetize a Natural Treasure," produced in conjunction with some of the ZMP's fiercest

critics, including Save Our Springs' **Bill Bunch** and **Rewilding Zilker Park's Robin Rather** (both of whom also serve in leadership positions on the Zilker Neighborhood Association). On Friday Mims sent out a press release announcing that the film was on YouTube. The next day it was removed, due to a copyright claim by **Design Workshop**, the consultants hired by the city to produce the ZMP. By Sunday it was back up, with two images removed (Mims claims he's in the right, but won't bother fighting it), and scathing press releases from both Mims and Bunch. And on Monday, in quick succession, Council Members **Ryan Alter**, **Zo Qadri**, and Mayor Pro Tem **Paige Ellis** sent out a joint press release saying they wouldn't support the plan, and Watson sent out his final dictum, indicating that planning will resume and will include some elements of the plan that have general consensus (likely not the amphitheatre or parking garages). He concluded, "This plan wasn't the right course and it's time for it to be ended. I'm grateful the Interim City Manager has stopped this process." Bonus Ballot!

Are Austin's low-turnout initiative elections worth it?

"Petition Initiative" elections in Austin have become increasingly common as a way for political organizations to push for policy change that may not have been viable through the usual legislative process. Organizations can spend around \$150,000, collect at least 20,000 signatures from Austin voters, and voilà, we have an election.

But these elections cost taxpayers real money, too – data provided to City Council in response to a budget question shows that since 2018, the city has spent more than \$4 million processing the petitions in support of initiative measures and administering the elections to decide them.

In a budget question document, Council Member **Mackenzie Kelly** asked staff for a tally of the costs associated with regular and petition initiative elections over the past five years. The *Chronicle* analyzed the data provided by staff and found that elections in which only local initiatives were on the ballot – i.e., not those in which an initiative was added to the ballot of an already scheduled election, such as the 2018 City Council election – cost a total of \$4.3 million. That includes the costs incurred by the city to process petitions submitted in support of a ballot measure, which ranged from about \$30,000 in 2018 to more than \$83,000 in 2023. That covers the time City Clerk's Office staff spends reviewing petition signatures to make sure they belong to qualifying voters (for petitions with large numbers of signatures, the city pays a statistician, who then uses a statistical sampling method to verify signatures).

Most of the time this process is straightforward, but the police union-backed **Austin Police Oversight Act** of 2023 (with the same name as the act backed by justice advocates) cost \$83,250 to process. That was due partly to hundreds of

people asking the clerk to remove their names after the petition campaign was found to be deceptive and misleading, and because the petition was submitted in December when clerk staff were on vacation. Sometimes, the city has to pay to process petitions that don't even make the ballot. In 2021, when **Save Austin Now's** first attempt at forcing an election to reinstate restrictions on public camping failed, the city still had to pay \$59,219 to process it.

Administering the elections is much more expensive; it requires payments to Travis and Williamson counties who actually run the elections, newspaper ads providing notice, and translation services for ballot language. The city spent more than \$382,000 to hold an election in November 2021 in which only one item was on the ballot: Save Austin Now's police staffing plan, which voters rejected overwhelmingly.

Supporters often frame the petition initiative process as a vital tool of democracy. But these elections are often decided by a much smaller slice of the electorate than elections that include even local political offices. In 2018, Austin hit about 60% voter turnout; the following year, when Austinites were asked to vote on the expansion of the **Neal Kocurek Memorial Austin Convention Center** and the city's hotel tax rate, only about 14% of Austin voters turned out.

But change could be coming to Austin's petition initiative process. A **Charter Review Commission** initiated by Council in March and tasked with considering potential changes to the City Charter – including to the number of signatures required to get a petition initiative on the ballot – has finally seated enough members to begin meeting. The seven volunteers currently serving on the committee are in the process of scheduling their first meeting now. – *Austin Sanders*

Why it matters that Travis County District Attorney José Garza is seeking reelection **BY AUSTIN SANDERS**

Flanked by a cast of prominent progressive justice and labor activists, as well as a number of liberal elected officials, prosecutor **José Garza** announced Tuesday morning that he would seek a second term as **Travis County District Attorney**, the top criminal prosecutor in the county.

From inside the headquarters of the **Texas AFL-CIO**, Garza described local efforts to revolutionize the justice system in Travis County as a “conversation” on reforming criminal justice and public safety. That conversation, Garza continued, “has become polarized, lines have been drawn ... and facts have been distorted.” Garza is at the center of that polarization, having led many of the county’s criminal justice reform efforts since his landslide run-off victory over establishment Democrat and incumbent D.A. **Margaret Moore** in the 2020 primary.

Fox News and high-profile Republicans have positioned Garza as a poster boy for the “soft on crime” prosecutors they almost always refer to as “Soros-backed” – an antisemitic dog whistle that connects progressive prosecutors to liberal billionaire and Holocaust survivor **George Soros**, whose foundation funds progressive causes throughout the nation.

In reality, one of Garza’s aims – and one of the aims of the progressive prosecutor movement more broadly – is to counteract the mass incarceration that exploded in America following the enactment of tough-on-crime policies throughout the Eighties and Nineties. But Garza, like other leaders in the progressive prosecutor movement, insists that decarceration efforts have not meant he is soft on violent crime. At the press conference, he shared a range of statistics on prosecutorial successes within his office: increases in the conviction rate for violent offenses, including family violence assault, and improvements to the way the D.A.’s Office responds to victims of sexual assault – which address failures in Moore’s administration that dogged the final years of her tenure and played a prominent role in her defeat.

The double symbolism of Garza hosting his reelection announcement at the Texas AFL-CIO headquarters soon became apparent. First, of course, it emphasized his roots as a labor leader; before winning election to the D.A.’s Office, Garza served as executive director of **Workers Defense Project**, Texas’ preeminent immigrant and low-wage worker advocacy organization. But also, the proximity of the announcement



site to the **Texas Capitol** – whose Republican lawmakers represent the greatest threat to Garza’s progressive transformation of the D.A.’s Office – could not be escaped.

“Earlier this year, statewide leadership gathered across the street,” Garza said, gesturing toward the pink dome, located about a block away, “and we became one of their favorite political targets. They like to target our community and office, because it’s so much easier to play politics with our public safety than it is to find real solutions.” Texas Republicans landed a blow on their new favorite leftist enemy (now that Greg Casar is busy in Washington, D.C.) by

passing into law House Bill 17, known as the “**rogue prosecutors bill**” because it was designed to disempower Texas D.A.s, who have historically enjoyed broad discretion to prosecute or drop cases as they see fit. The full effect of the law is still unknown, but its existence will loom as a specter over the rest of Garza’s term and his next one, should he win reelection.

Garza has continued to irritate right-wingers by making good on his campaign promise to prioritize community-based solutions to violence prevention rather than rely solely on punishment via the court system. That has included partnering with the

Understaffed EMS, Underserved Patients

Austin ambulances were out of service 35 times last month

Negotiations continue to drag on between the city of Austin and the union representing **Austin-Travis County Emergency Medical Services** employees, with union officials rejecting the city’s latest pay package last week.

The city offered a four-year deal with pay-scale adjustments designed to deal with pay compression issues created when the city and union signed a one-year contract extension last year that increased base pay for entry-level medics. Year 2 of the new offer would provide 4% pay increases across the board, with 3% raises coming in years 3 and 4, at a total cost of \$30 million over the life of the contract.

But that offer won’t cut it, says **Austin EMS Association** President **Selena Xie**. She hopes to win a contract that would increase the minimum wage for entry-level medics by 9% – from \$22 per hour to \$24 per hour. The city and union are closer on what a fair wage increase looks like in years 2-4; however, the AEMSA offer, which totals \$36

million over four years, asks for other compensation benefits like stipends for community health paramedics, who have to undergo additional training for which they currently are not compensated.

The lack of competitive pay has directly contributed to the vacancy rate at EMS, Xie says, which has not changed much in the year since the one-year contract extension was signed. Those vacancies mean that it is sometimes difficult to fully staff ATCEMS’s ambulance fleet. When an ambulance can’t be staffed with a paramedic and a basic-level emergency medical technician, as is required by department policy, the ambulance is taken out of service.

Over the past nine months, an average of two ambulances per day have been taken out of service, according to data analyzed by the *Chronicle*. The data shows that from Nov. 1, 2022, to July 23, 2023, ambulances had been taken offline for part or all of a 24-hour period **631 times** – and that’s not including the other types of vehicles ATCEMS uses to

Austin Police Department, whose leaders have a fraught relationship with Garza, on gun violence prevention programs.

To the ire of his critics, he has also made good on a campaign commitment to bring before a grand jury every law enforcement officer accused of causing death or serious bodily injury while on duty – a commitment that has resulted in more than two dozen Austin police officers falling under criminal indictments for on-duty use of force, including some being charged with murder, a level of accountability that was unimaginable before Garza's election.

Garza's commitment to law enforcement accountability (what his opponents – including attorneys defending office clients – characterize as “political prosecutions”) has been the driving force behind opposition to his administration. That opposition is almost certain to manifest in the form of a candidate challenging Garza from the right in the 2024 Democratic primary – with support from the groups, such as the Austin Police Association, that have opposed Garza since he was just a candidate. Some well-known names from Travis County's courthouse establishment have been floated as potential challengers, but thus far, no one has stepped forward.


Despite that opposition, Garza told the array of TV cameras assembled before him, he would continue the fight to transform Travis County's justice system. “Sometimes it feels impossible to make progress,” he said. “But I have seen the power that regular people have to change their community. I have seen the power of the people behind me and that the change we seek is happening all around us. But only if we are willing to fight for it.” ■

provide emergency care. The peak hit in December, with ambulances out of service 104 times. Over the summer, the rate has improved – just 48 instances in June and 35 as of July 23 – which an ATCEMS spokesperson says could be linked to the 15 new cadets who have been cleared for independent field duty, along with 20 paramedics who recently finished training at the department's in-house training program.

Taking an ambulance out of service is a last resort for ATCEMS leadership and it is always tied to vacancies in the daily schedule that can arise from sick or vacation leave,

training, injuries, and other regular absences. An ATCEMS spokesperson says when an ambulance is taken offline, others cover the impacted service area, with the dispatch center directing where units should be moved to ensure gaps in coverage are minimized.

ATCEMS officials contend that the staffing struggles they're facing are not unique – EMS systems across the country are having difficulty hiring and retaining staff. Part of the problem, the spokesperson said, is that entry-level EMS employees sometimes see their EMT certification as a “stepping stone” to other careers such as firefighting or nursing. Other employers within the health care system have begun heavily recruiting paramedics since the onset of the pandemic, and their offers can be hard to resist. Hospitals and health care clinics often offer better pay and much more comfortable working conditions – the workday is spent inside an air-conditioned commercial building walking from room to room rather than running from call to call in cramped ambulances, exposed to whatever weather conditions may be present that day. But ATCEMS recently began hiring directly into the department's paramedic position – a higher rank with better pay – which the department thinks will help recruitment in the long run.

The vacancy rate at ATCEMS barely moved between June 2022 and 2023, but the July year-over-year number shows improvement (24.5% vacancies last year and 16.5% this year). But

Xie is concerned about how long that improvement will hold without a long-term contract that meets the wage demands AEMSA feels their members deserve. “Yes, we're able to fill our EMT basic ranks, which is helping our vacancy rate,” Xie told

us, “but we are still woefully short on our paramedics. And the only way we can improve our paramedic ranks is by offering wages that will allow us to stay competitive with hospitals and clinics.” – Austin Sanders

WE MUSK ASK...

How much of the Colorado River should we leave up to Tesla's discretion? **BY LINA FISHER**

Three years ago, Travis County cut a deal with Tesla, giving it a 2,000-acre site on the banks of the Colorado River in Southeastern Travis County – and a 70% rebate on its property taxes. The mammoth \$1.1 billion Gigafactory that ensued now produces a quarter million Model Ys annually, and Elon Musk has promised to build a publicly accessible “ecological paradise” around the factory. But Musk has, in some ways, already proven untrustworthy. As part of the deal, Tesla was to create at least 5,000 new full-time jobs by 2024 – at least half going to Travis County residents. But immediately,

there were concerns from the Workers Defense Project about the lack of third-party monitoring in the deal – and sure enough, accusations of wage theft and unsafe conditions at the factory followed last December.

As to whether Musk is creating “paradise” along the Colorado, the little publicly available information doesn’t bode well. Travis County commissioners who struck the deal with Tesla aren’t sure exactly how much water the factory is using or will use, despite repeated requests for information. And an international parallel raises concern. In March 2022, Tesla opened

another Gigafactory in the coal mining state of Brandenburg, Germany, called Giga Berlin, which would produce half a million vehicles annually. Immediately, there were concerns from environmental advocates that the drought-stricken area’s groundwater supply wouldn’t be enough for both the cars and the people living there. In a research note upon the factory’s opening, Deutsche Bank auto sector analysts wrote that “the company may completely exhaust the water reserve in the region with the first stage of the plant build out, and will need additional extraction permits in order to expand its

capacity any further in the future.” Musk literally laughed off the notion of Tesla having an effect on the water supply, but experts’ estimates that the factory would almost double the amount of water consumed in the area, plus subsequent legal challenges, caused a delay in the plant’s opening.

German and Texan politicians alike have supported Musk’s operations moving in, as they’re big job creators. But at the break-neck speed he builds, will there be any water left for the rest of us? And are his contributions to the electric vehicle industry enough to offset his local ecological footprint?

SUCKING UP THE RIVER

Coming out of one of the hottest and driest months on record, the Central Texas water supply is severely stressed. In a late July press release, the Lower Colorado River Authority reported that combined storage in two of the Highland Lakes – Buchanan and Travis, which provide water to more than 1.4 million “Texans, businesses, industries, and the environment” as LCRA puts it – is now at 49% capacity, and is projected to fall below 45% capacity by this weekend. When that happens, LCRA will move to Stage 2 of its drought contingency plan and implement mandatory measures to significantly reduce water usage. LCRA has already cut off water to the Gulf Coast and agricultural customers in Colorado, Wharton, and Matagorda counties for the first time since the 2012-15 drought. For the first time in its 36-year history, the Barton Springs/Edwards Aquifer Conservation District announced last week that it’s on track to enter Stage 4 Exceptional Drought status. Water levels in the nearby Trinity Aquifer are continually dropping – Jacob’s Well has reported zero flow since late June, while the Blanco River in Wimberley is on the same dismal track, reporting record low flows.

Meanwhile, Tesla has a contract through September 2024 with LCRA to draw up to 10 acre-feet of river water a year for irrigation purposes, but the rest of its water comes from our city’s utility, Austin Water. So how much of Austinites’ drinking water is being sucked up by Musk’s projects? Hard to know exactly. Tesla did not respond to the *Chronicle*’s request for comment. In FY 2022, Tesla used 127.7 million gallons, per data from Austin Water – but the Gigafactory opened in April 2022 and only operated for five months of the fiscal year, all while production was ramping up, so we can expect significantly higher usage in future years.

County Commissioner Brigid Shea says she’s asked Tesla “from the very beginning how much total water they will be using.” Last July she got an estimate of 600 million gallons a year, “which is pretty astonishing. And I told them I was concerned about that

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
quantity of water." Still, Shea is impressed by the factory's plan for using reclaimed water, though in its latest 2022 impact report, they seem to have more plans than documented action. The report states that Giga Texas plans to capture at least a quarter of its roof runoff to use for cooling manufacturing equipment. They say that "in an average rainfall year" – this year we're significantly below the historic average – "such systems should save an estimated 7.5 million gallons of potable city water." They say they'll start using reclaimed water this year, which they estimate could serve cooling needs for a production level of 250,000 vehicles per year and save "just under 150 million gallons of potable city water annually." But any data on what their water usage, reclaimed or otherwise, has been so far is nowhere to be found, though the plant started producing cars in 2021.

TUNNELIN' AND DUMPIN'

Further down the Colorado River in Bastrop, another of Musk's companies is positioning itself to dump close to 150,000 gallons of wastewater into the river. The Boring Co. came under fire in March for petitioning the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality to dump that much as a temporary measure, the company says, until a new Bastrop wastewater treatment plant is built in 2025. TCEQ has already cited the Boring Co. over several violations, including poor erosion controls, while Bastrop County has issued them a violation for an unpermitted wastewater holding tank/septic system.

"Essentially, they just build what they want without checking regulations and local requirements first," says Chap Ambrose, a software developer who lives right across FM 1209 from the Boring Co. site. He's become the local mouthpiece for all things Boring-related, and details his frustrating experiences communicating with the company on his website (keepbastropboring.com) and on YouTube, writing, "They also seem to be actively hiding the truth ... I was asked to sign a non-disclosure agreement when I requested site drawings, but I later learned those drawings were public record!" Ambrose says the company doesn't seem to prioritize their surrounding environment unless

pressed: “Only when they’re getting violations and legal threats do they seem to follow the state [rules].” A *Washington Post* article from May of this year quotes a Bastrop county employee complaining in an email that they have been “regularly hounded by [the Boring Co.’s] staff and consultants to expedite and approve permit applications that are incomplete and not in compliance.”

Aside from pollution concerns about surface water, environmental advocates here – as in Brandenburg – are also concerned about groundwater: “Every family home in the area is on well water, all the neighbors drink this water, and several rely on it as part of their small businesses,” says Ambrose. Steve Box, director of nonprofit Environmental Stewardship, has been tracking Boring Co. plans that show them tunneling 1,500 feet from the lower Colorado River, where the shallow Colorado alluvial aquifer sits. The company will be boring through sand and gravel that drains into the river. Box is also concerned about Boring Co.’s request of TCEQ to allow them to spray treated wastewater on the property – the aquifer is “at most” 10-15 feet below the spray field, he says. “So, in this case, everything that

would go into the spray field and leaches into their alluvial aquifer ultimately has a route into the river.”

In public comments on the permits to TCEQ, Box contends that parts of the Colorado River near the Boring Co. site with the highest aquatic and recreational use standards in the state are already not meeting standards, “yet [TCEQ] is permitting wastewater and stormwater as if the river is meeting the standards.” He writes that “evidence shows ... impairment of fish and macrobenthic communities ... yet these concerns have not been adequately investigated.” Box says TCEQ should designate the segment “impaired” and that if the Boring Co. wants to spray wastewater in the area, it should work with the local groundwater conservation district to monitor the river’s water quality.

“I’m not anti-growth, I’m not anti-Elon,” insists Ambrose. “But I am concerned about the water and about the people working here and living around it. There’s the assumption that a high-tech business is going to do everything right. And I think that assumption goes away the closer you get and the more experience you have living next to it. You start to see that their marketing is really good.”

TROUBLE IN ECOLOGICAL PARADISE

Around the current Gigafactory and still-under-construction Boring Co., Musk’s properties are always expanding. There are plans for 110 homes for workers on FM 1209 – nicknamed Project Awesome – with a liquor license for a bistro already obtained. This growth has sparked environmental advocates’ concerns that Tesla will set precedent for further development to encroach upon the fragile ecosystems on the river’s edge. One organization has been successful in opening lines of communication with Tesla – TOCA, or Tesla Outreach Community Alliance, a coalition of community groups including the NAACP, Hornsby Bend Alliance, Del Valle Community Coalition, and PODER. They’ve had regular meetings with Tesla since June of last year, when they sent a letter to Musk requesting dialogue with the local community. In it, they set a few environmental expectations: for Tesla to improve protection of water quality, ensure air quality is not degraded; develop an ecological conservation and restoration plan for Tesla’s riverfront property, including plans for a community park; and enhance measures to mitigate flood risk for downstream communities. So far, they haven’t seen much

tangible progress on any of these goals – despite Musk’s “paradise” goals.

Last summer, Tesla held a summit of sorts with local elected leaders and the community, where they unveiled exciting plans for riparian restoration along the banks of the Colorado – but the consensus is there hasn’t been much movement since. Christopher Brown, a lawyer, science fiction author, and part of the Colorado River Conservancy (a subsidiary of PODER), says the initial presentations were “promising.” Tesla reps told TOCA they were working with Siglo Group, ecological consultants that Brown calls “reputable and trustworthy, and in tune with how you properly restore areas around here. But [Tesla staff] rebuffed any efforts to get them to put any of that in writing.” Brown says that since then, Tesla has communicated that the stretch of land between the factory and the river that they’re restoring isn’t publicly accessible. “Whatever public pronouncements their CEO might have made of their intentions, those are not contractual obligations.” Siglo Group did not respond to the *Chronicle*.

Brown was originally excited about the prospect, even penning an op-ed in the local publication *Urbanitus* explaining “how Tesla’s Gigafactory can save Austin’s urban river.” He advocated for Musk to set a “powerful precedent for other new developments

along the urban and exurban Colorado” in terms of water quality protections, as the current water quality protections for the river diminish as it flows east of 183 at Longhorn Dam. There are still some guardrails – city watershed protection standards apply because the factory falls in Austin’s extraterritorial jurisdiction, or ETJ (an area outside city limits that the city and the county share regulatory control over), and the 100-year floodplain (the land predicted to flood during a once-in-100-years storm). Those regulations require a buffer zone of at least 200 feet between the riverbank and any development.

Last year, Council passed a resolution requesting increased river protections downstream of Longhorn Dam, in light of increasing development in the area. Watershed Protection staff recommended doubling the buffer zone to 400 feet, but Council called for more staff analysis and stakeholder input – the new deadline for staff to bring forward updated regulations to Council is May 30, 2024.

As these protections are left pending, Brown says what’s at stake is special: “In a world where all these great cities of the world are spending tens of millions of dollars to take their urban rivers and try to bring them back to something like their natural condition ... Here, we already have it. We just have to not screw it up.”

As Box puts it, “We don’t want him to mess up our ecological paradise, and then have to fix it in order to have his ecological paradise.”

MR. WORLDWIDE

Though Musk’s effect on Central Texas water and ecology is not yet clear, he’s certainly made massive contributions to the success of an increasingly urgent energy transition worldwide. “Anytime you have new industry, or new demands on water coming to Texas, it’s certainly concerning,” concedes Luke Metzger with Environment Texas. “But agriculture is still the main use of water in Texas, followed by municipal and residential uses, and then industrial is a smaller portion of that. It’s important to remember that broader context.” And while Musk’s aspirations may lead him to suck up our water, he’s also leading the charge on solar power in various ways.

After a summer during which solar carried the grid, producing more than a third of our state’s power during some record demand days, Austin Energy is trying to increase its local solar capacity. Batteries – both commercial and residential – will play an integral role in making that power last when the sun doesn’t shine. Tesla has been a leader in terms of home battery storage, Metzger points out, and “really innovative” in terms of helping their solar customers sell power stored in Tesla batteries to ERCOT during peak demand, so their customers can provide a public service and make some money doing it. A new pilot program at the Public Utility Commission lets companies aggregate individual customers’ power to meet an energy savings goal set by the PUC. “Tesla, by virtue of having the most supply out there, is well-positioned to meet a lot of that,” says Metzger.

Perhaps the most impactful contribution to reducing greenhouse gas emissions lies in the Gigafactory itself and the Model Ys it produces. “Transportation is the largest source of greenhouse gas emissions in the United States, and he’s done more than anyone to popularize electric vehicles, get them on the road, and make them more affordable to consumers,” says Metzger. According to the impact report, by 2030, Tesla aims to produce 20 million electric vehicles per year, compared to a half million in 2020. They’re also manufacturing 1,500 gigawatt-hours’ worth of energy storage in batteries per year, compared to 3 GWh in 2020. However, as the company ramps up production, it’ll need more water and produce more carbon – its total emissions, including from its supply chain, grew 4% last year alone. And Tesla ranks worse than most other automakers at self-reporting those emissions.

Still, local advocates haven’t given up on Musk yet and are calling on him to do the right thing when it comes to water management and transparency. “We recognize that there are going to be some impacts, and those are a trade-off we have to make, because electrifying transportation is just so critical,” says Metzger. “Whatever you think of what he says on Twitter – which you might rightly hate – his contributions to clean energy should and do stand on their own.” ■

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
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

What the Screen Actors and Writers Strikes Mean for Austin

Hopes of a bumper year fade as unions fight for a fairer future for members

If there's been a single defining image of the ongoing strikes hitting the TV and film industries, it's been banners held by picketing actors and writers in New York and Los Angeles. But as a major and growing production hub, Austin is feeling the effects of this fight for sustainable wages in film and TV.

The Screen Actors Guild-American Federation of Television and Radio Artists (SAG-AFTRA), the union that represents screen actors, began their industrywide strike on July 14, joining the Writers Guild of America (WGA) walkout that started on May 2. "It's impacted everything," said Austin Film Commission Executive Director Brian Gannon, but it's had a particular impact in Austin. TV production in shows like the CW's *Walker* was slowing for the summer hiatus, and commercial shoots were scaling back due to the intense heat making outdoor filming untenable, but the expectation was that the industry would come back faster than ever due to a record increase in funding for the Texas Moving Image Industry Incentive Program (TMIIP). "It was celebration, then this put pause on everything immediately," Gannon said. "A lot of people were on unemployment and were getting ready to get back to work. So it's a blow, but a lot of them are union members and want something that's going to last for decades." However, the strikes aren't just affecting actors and writers, but everyone involved with a production, "from [production assistants] to producers to lumber yards to hotels to grips, everyone who has a contact with the industry is affected."

The roots of the strikes lie in the last rounds of contract negotiations between the guilds and the Alliance of Motion Picture and Television Producers (AMPTP), an industry alliance consisting of major motion picture studios like Paramount, Sony, Universal, Walt Disney, and Warner Bros.; TV networks including ABC, CBS, Fox, and NBC; and streaming services such as Netflix, Apple TV+, and Amazon. The agreements set baseline pay and working conditions: However,

the current contracts did not cover residuals for the then-nascent world of streaming rights, and actors have seen their wages decimated over the last decade. What the AMPTP brought to the table when contracts came up for renewal this year did almost nothing to redress the situation.

However, that's only the beginning of the problems, as actor rates have been obliterated by industry changes and inflation. On top of that, concerns have been raised about studio proposals to use the likenesses of actors in perpetuity – raising the nightmare scenario of performers being replaced by digital extras with their faces.

AI is a similar concern in the writers strike, with the very real concern of writers being replaced by prompt-generated scripts, but again that's just the beginning. The position of writers has been dramatically degraded since their last major contract negotiations in 2007, with traditional writers rooms reduced to minirooms, where writers are expected to produce scripts and rewrites with little or no pay, all with no commitment that the show will be produced.

Union leaders fear that the current situation and the AMPTP proposals will make careers in the arts untenable – a future that some executives may relish. As WGA West negotiator Julie Plec put it bluntly during this year's ATX TV Festival, "There's a room full of folks who want to see union labor go away."

However, the strike does not mean the entire film and TV industry has completely halted. There are commercial shoots that are still ongoing, but those are all non-union "and that's a very small part of the industry," Gannon said.

Yet not all films are AMPTP productions, so SAG-AFTRA is providing interim agreements to eligible independent productions. They

can then proceed with production, as long as they abide by the terms set out in the union's negotiating position. Aaron B. Koontz of Austin-based Paper Street Pictures, explained, "That's why they're calling it an interim agreement, not a waiver." He is working on one of the over 100 productions now approved and is waiting to be assigned a SAG rep for applications for two more. However, his biggest project – upcoming supernatural horror *Shelby Oaks* – is in limbo. It's in the final stages of post-production, including the all-important automated

dialogue replacement, when actors re-record their lines. "We need the actors in, but we are not a priority project because we are not in production," Koontz said. He understood prioritizing the paperwork for eligible

films that were either in production or just about to start, "but we're trying to finish this film in the next month."

Even completed films are being hit by the strike. Just as film festivals were getting back to normal post-pandemic, now they face a fall with no actors or writers in attendance. For example, former Austinite Glen Powell is headlining Richard Linklater's upcoming *Hit Man*, which will premiere at the Venice Film Festival. As the film was independently produced and financed, producers are currently seeking an interim agreement that will allow some cast members to attend the premiere.

Director Morissa Maltz gained SAG approval for her cast and crew to promote

her film, the Austin Film Society-backed *The Unknown Country*, as well as to start production on a new project using the same cast. The process was also relatively simple for her because productions don't come much more independent. She said, "They asked, 'What's the production company? Let me look it up.' Well, the production company is Morissa Maltz LLC – it's just me. So then they really tried to fast-track it, because a single-person LLC is nothing to do with the AMPTP"

However, promotion can only happen for films opening, and the release calendar could get sparse if studios start holding titles back. Speaking confidentially, one PR rep said that because they represent films rather than individual actors, they had not seen any real impact yet. However, if the strike continues and studios begin to delay release dates, that could change quickly.

So what happens if the guilds and the AMPTP reach a deal tomorrow? Speaking anonymously, one producer said that films should be able to spin back up pretty quickly. However, episodic shows are a different matter. Due to the structure of TMIIP, the state is more attractive to TV than films: Most are currently on hiatus anyway, and because they tend to think in years rather than weeks or months, they will keep their leases on soundstages. But since writers will not be working on struck projects over the hiatus, it will take them longer to bank enough scripts to get back on track.

"It's going to be very busy when everything's resolved," Gannon said, noting that every production will be scrambling to get back into production. "They're like airplanes circling an airport, waiting for the storm to pass." ■

“VISION BOARD”

“We don’t typically see an artist’s vision board, only the by-product of blood, sweat and tears,” say the exhibition notes. 

WHEN ASKED about the origin point for August event **ATX Trans Pride** – happening this Saturday, **Aug. 12, 7pm to 2am, at Cheer Up Charlies**, with more info avails on fb.com/atxtranspride – organizer and **DJ Boyfriend ATX**, aka **Ezra Edwards**, points to a frequent queer motivator: **pettiness**.

The first ATX Trans Pride bloomed in 2019, following years of Edwards not being booked for **Austin Pride** despite being a longstanding Bat City trans DJ icon. Making a bit of counterprogramming to the yearly Fiesta Gardens event and parade was, to Edwards, reflective of his time as an Austinite observing the event year after year. “Because I grew up here, I attended the Pride parade when I was out of high school,” he says. “For me witnessing, almost like, I don’t want to have to say how many years but enough years of Austin Pride, it’s like **I’ve changed and it hasn’t**.” Seeing both changes in himself and Austin’s growing queer community motivated Edwards to create an event for an unserved need: a Pride completely for and by transgender people.

“I hadn’t seen anything like it happen before,” he recalls. “[I wanted] to do something more Texas and trans.” Centering trans Texan artists was an admirable goal, but Edwards needed help filling out the lineup. That’s when he linked up with **p1nkstar**, whose expertise in the world of trans artistry helped pick a showcase of transgender talent and whose sparkling personality made for a perf host alongside **Turito**, née Yung Kwane.

So 2019 put ATX Trans Pride on the calendar, and in 2020, COVID caution necessitated a virtual edition – **Texas Pride Online**, livestreamed and inclusive of the whole Lone Star State. After a 2021 pause on the event, p1nkstar says she picked up the phone in 2022. “I texted or called Ezra and was like, ‘Um, can I get involved with this?’” With p1nkstar now on board as the official co-organizer, that year boasted the biggest Trans Pride for Austin yet. “Last year there were way more actual trans people in attendance,” Edward says, comparing 2019’s crowd to that of 2022. “Even looking back at the photos, I’m just remembering like, there

are trans people everywhere here now. It was really cool. **We called a meeting and everyone showed up.**”

Plans for this year’s Trans Pride hope to encourage an even bigger trans congruence. Offerings like **a vendor market**, a podcast taping by **ASHwell**, a **trans comic showcase** curated by **Max Morrison**, drag hosted by **Alexander the Great**, and **musical artists** like headliner **Ah-Mer-Ah-Su** turn the night-owl outing into a day-to-night extravaganza. Both organizers pulled inspiration from outlier queer events like **Queerbomb**, **Dyke March**, and San Francisco’s own Trans Pride. Yet, “the things that I think about when I think of ATX Trans Pride, I don’t know that they’re necessarily like clear inspirations,” p1nkstar adds, “but it’s just a community-centric event that

is about celebrating the people that attend, the people that are onstage, and **celebrating the trans community and the trans people that are there.**”

With the 2023 legislative session in Texas delivering heavy blows on the trans community, both Edwards and p1nkstar want ATX Trans Pride to remain a stalwart symbol of strength. “I definitely had some moments like, should we do this this year?” Edwards admits. “[But] it’s almost like the backlash is helpful in terms of bringing transness to the forefront. These trans people do exist, especially in the South. By staying visible, we’re doing ourselves a service as opposed to folding and not doing the event.”

For p1nkstar, Austin Pride season holds a great deal of emotional weight. With no comparable celebrations in her hometown in Mexico, p1nkstar didn’t experience Pride until moving to Austin. “I never really had queer, gay, trans, or any community growing up,” she says. “The Austin Pride season is a testament to how my life has changed over the years.” ATX Trans Pride is her way of preserving that sense of community among other trans folks who need it now more than ever. “I always tell people Austin saved me,” p1nkstar says. “And that’s why I’m so grateful. I always wanted to continue doing work for the city. **Because I found my people here.**” ■

AN AEROBIC WORKOUT FOR THE CAST, A DELIGHTFULLY MINDLESS EXPERIENCE FOR THE AUDIENCE **BY BOB ABELMAN**

The first taste of the winking and nodding to be found throughout Patrick Barlow's hilarious, parodic stage adaptation of the classic 1935 Alfred Hitchcock spy film *The 39 Steps* (based in turn on the genre-defining 1915 novel by John Buchan) comes in the very first scene. A dashing, bored, and period-perfect Brit named Richard Hannay seeks "something mindless and trivial, something utterly pointless" to amuse himself. So he goes to the theatre.

Once there, the intricate and implausible plot unfolds. Hannay inadvertently gets mixed up with double agents, accidentally uncovers a German plot to steal vital British military secrets, gets framed for murdering a young woman, and, of course, takes it on the lam from London to the remote Scottish Highlands by foot, car, and the *Flying Scotsman* train.

Audiences also seeking something mindless will find it in Georgetown Palace Theatre's thoroughly entertaining production of this 2008 Tony Award-winning play. *The 39 Steps* is a romp from beginning to end, playing for laughs all that is film noir in Hitchcock's movie, including its low-budget aesthetics, gentlemanly hero and mysterious femme fatale, dark and misty ambience, unforeseen double crosses, and abrupt twists and turns. Cinematic clichés, cloak-and-dagger genre conventions, and Hitchcockian quirks are all fodder for this play.

Some knowledge of Hitchcock's signature style is a plus, but *The 39 Steps* is great fun even without this insight, for its antics are clever in their own right and are performed with balls-to-the-wall energy by Eric Reed as our square-jawed and thin-mustached hero, Morgan Urbanovsky as all of

the female protagonists, and Bradley Billeaudeau and Hayden Smith as, well, everyone else.

As Hannay, Reed captures every aspect of the archetypal good guy sucked into a foul situation. His clipped diction, perpetually cocked eyebrow, and cavalier approach to danger are spot-on. Urbanovsky's portrayal of dialectically opposed and dialogically diverse women – from a Mata Hari to an innocent love interest to a Scottish farm girl – are delivered with wonderful, overly dramatic flair. And doing the heavy lifting in this production, often quite literally, are Billeaudeau and Smith, who

serve as human sight gags and set-change laborers. These actors have been given a herculean task and much of their success is getting the audience to appreciate their efforts. Which they do.

Speed is also essential when staging this play. Lines must come with rapid delivery. Costumes

(designed by Emily Taylor) must zip on and off. Props and set-pieces (courtesy of Abigail Rubin and Chase Staggs, respectively) must rush in and out. And the timing of lighting and sound cues (designed by Becca Kehl and Aaren Horak, respectively) is crucial in the making of good parody. Director Keyshaan Castle's greatest achievement is maintaining that breathless pace and essential timing.

Not everything works in this production (much of the shadow puppetry falls flat) and a few higher-risk comedic opportunities found in the Broadway production and elsewhere (such as the pantomime antics performed on top of a moving train) are not to be found here. Still, there is plenty of creativity and loads of laughs to warrant a trip up north to see this show.



DAY TRIPS BY GERALD E. MCLEOD

Santa Anna's leg resides in the **Illinois State Military Museum** in **Springfield, Ill.** The rest of the general was interred in **Mexico City**.

There are at least three of Santa Anna's prosthetic legs: the one in the military museum, a peg leg in the **Governor Oglesby Museum** in **Decatur, Ill.**, and one in the **Museo Nacional de Historia** in Mexico City.

The artificial leg in Springfield is the fanciest. Made of cork, wood, and leather, it has a black boot. Santa Anna had small feet.

Two years after Antonio López de Santa Anna (1794-1876) lost Texas at the **Battle of San Jacinto** in 1836, he was wounded in battle with the French and had his left leg amputated. The severed limb was buried with full military honors.

During the **Mexican-American War**, in 1847, Santa Anna's fortifications were overrun at the **Battle of Cerro Gordo**. After the clash, **Lt. W. A. Tinney** of the 4th Illinois Volunteer Infantry Regiment wrote home: "Stormed their fort and put the enemy to flight ... we captured Mexican General Santa Anna's carriage, also his wooden leg, which I have in my possession." The prosthesis became a spoil of war.

For years Texans have tried to persuade the **Illinois National Guard** to donate the leg to the **San Jacinto Museum**, but it steadfastly refuses.

The thing is, many northerners don't know Santa Anna's significance. When asked if he came to see Santa Anna's artificial leg, a local visitor to the museum replied, "I didn't know **Carlos Santana** only has one leg." They don't teach Texas history north of the Red River. Who knew?

The Illinois State Military Museum in Springfield, Ill., is 2 miles north of the state Capitol and near the **Lincoln Tomb**. Santa Anna's leg can be seen for free at the fortresslike museum *Tue.-Sat., 1-4:30pm.*

Rodolfo Borrell Delivers Sobering Assessment

Ten months ago, Austin FC's stock was soaring. The **Verde and Black** had come within one game of the **MLS Cup Final**, only falling on the road to eventual league champs **LAFC**, the only team to finish above them in the Western Conference. Despite that loss, ATXFC entered the offseason with loads of momentum and excitement, looking like the fastest-rising club in Major League Soccer.

It was fool's gold.

At least, that's how **Rodolfo Borrell**, the club's new sporting director, sees it.

"In my opinion, guys, the team overachieved last year," Borrell asserted bluntly in a press conference last week following the surprise trade of fan favorite winger **Diego Fagúndez** to the **LA Galaxy**. "[They] played well, had some key results in some moments where the good luck also sometimes goes your way ... And sometimes because of the – my opinion – overachieving last season, we were setting ourselves into a position where, I'm not saying we cannot achieve, we will fight to achieve ... but you have to understand that it takes time."

For starters, kudos to "Rodo" for the honesty. It takes guts to tell a fan base that their team is not as good as they thought, even if a sizable portion of supporters had already clued into that fact through the first half of the 2023 season. And his point is well taken. Austin FC set an MLS record last year with four comeback wins from two goals behind, and **Sebastián Driussi's** 25-goal, seven-assist campaign papered over whatever cracks had started to form in the Verde Wall.

Then again, even in what has clearly been a season of regression for the club, Austin FC still finds itself solidly entrenched in the Western Conference playoff picture in fifth place, just 5 points out of second. Barring a collapse in the final third of the season, El Tree will once again have a chance to make a run through the playoffs and compete for MLS Cup. However, by offloading Fagúndez to free up salary cap space, Borrell and the Austin FC brass have made the conscious decision to sacrifice the club's chances this season in favor of a longer-term vision.

In other words, trust the process. And it likely won't be a short one.

"We will improve the team toward the transfer window, but there are two windows

every year. So the idea is to make an improvement in that window and then a little one in the next one, and a little one in the next one ... Unfortunately, it may mean players in and out, in and out," Borrell explained.

The roster remodel that Borrell likely has in mind won't be easy. Of the club's roughly \$19 million wage bill, nearly a third of it is tied up in players that currently look like bad investments: **Emiliano Rigoni**, **Rodney Redes**, **Alex Ring**, **Johan Romaña**, and **Moussa Djitte**. Other clubs aren't peppering Austin FC's inbox with offers for those players the way the Galaxy pressed for Fagúndez. It may necessitate waiting for some or all of those players' contracts to expire before Borrell can really dig his claws in and overhaul the club.

But there's danger in that, too. First and foremost, it risks wasting multiple years of Driussi's prime (or worse, giving him added reason to pursue a return to Europe or Argentina). Second, there's no guarantee that a rebuild – at least in its first iteration – leads Austin to a better spot than it's in now. And finally, it risks straining the endurance of a fan base that has remained fiercely loyal since the club's 2021 genesis, but has yet to really have its patience tested.

The way things are headed, that's about to change. ■

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And Then There Were Three

Often-explicit drama *Passages* probes the turmoil of a lopsided love triangle **BY KIMBERLEY JONES**

A man returns home to his husband after spending the night out. “I had sex with a woman,” he tells his husband. “Can I tell you about it?” The two sentences are a marvel of economy, a subtle reveal of the rules – spoken or otherwise – of their relationship. But there’s mystery tendered here, too:

Is the husband really okay with this???

Love is strange. It’s right there in the title of Ira Sachs’ 2014 film about two men whose long and loving partnership is strained after they marry in their 60s, and it’s been a recurring topic of interest in Sachs’ filmography: with the roundelay of adulterers in 2007’s *Married Life*; in the semi-autobiographical 2012 addiction drama *Keep the Lights On*, where the heart keeps a man rooted in place, even when the head is screaming to get out; in the fraternal love between two boys in 2016’s *Little Men*, whose friendship is ruined by the adults in their lives.

In *Passages*, Sachs’ enthralling eighth feature, he and his regular co-screenwriter Mauricio Zacharias return to the more experimental bent of *Keep the Lights On*, echoing that film’s elliptical nature and naturalistic presentation of sex, its dizzyingly destructive relationships and Euro-arthouse affect. Impetuous, needy Tomas (Rogowski) is a film director married to the more steady Martin (Whishaw, best known as Bond’s Q). They live in Paris. While celebrating the wrap of his latest film, Tomas meets Agathe (*Blue Is the Warmest Color*’s Exarchopoulos), a schoolteacher, in a bar. When Martin goes home early, Tomas stays to dance with Agathe and eventually goes to her place. The morning after, he makes his confession to Martin, beginning a torturous pattern of bouncing back and forth between his husband and his new lover.

Sachs and his performers are alert to the delicate and wordless ways bodies move toward and away from each other, in overture to sex and sometimes in rejection of it. A

not-negligible amount of the film’s running time is spent in beds. Presumably because of that sexual content, the MPA issued the film an NC-17 rating, which Sachs and distributor Mubi rejected, saying the board’s decision seemed “anti-gay, anti-progress, anti-sex” and opting to release the film unrated instead. The scenes of straight sex are not at all explicit; the scenes of lovemaking between Tomas and Martin are revelatory – unadorned, honest-feeling depictions of an intimate and fraught partnership.

Of course, it’s not just sex that happens in bed. In one scene, as Tomas and Martin fight, Sachs films the conversation from behind Tomas, the back of his head obscuring the whole of his husband’s body. Later, a similar framing is applied to Tomas in bed with Agathe, who disappears from view. The metaphor is easy: His presence is so big, he blots out everyone else.

Whether Rogowski is convincing as a man of such magnetism to bring two otherwise sensible people to their knees is, I suspect, a matter of taste. I’ve adored the German actor in films like *Transit* and *In the Aisles*, where he’s shown an underdog’s vulnerability. Here, he is the alpha – an agent of chaos, a petulant child. I understand why Sachs and Zacharias centered him, but I wanted so much to burrow more deeply into the inner lives of Martin and Agathe, the more interesting characters, and the more textured performances.

Films about time travel tend to revolve around the ethics of causality. How will this thing that’s been altered in the past affect the future? Will it be worth it? Will there be unexpected consequences? Because no one tells a time-travel story where nothing gets changed – that’s just a flashback. Time travel is the plot device that offers a remedy for regret: the do-over. But tread carefully; one too many do-overs can send everything out of control, as evidenced in Jared Moshé’s *Aporia*.

Sophie (Greer) is a nurse living in Los Angeles with her 11-year-old daughter, Riley (Herman). Both of them are grieving the recent death of their husband/father, Mal (Gathegi), who was struck down by drunk driver Darby (O’Byrne). Mal was the glue that held the family together, it seems, and his absence has them potentially drifting irrevocably apart. Enter Jabir (Maadi), Mal’s physicist friend, who confides to Sophie that he and her late husband were building a time machine in Jabir’s spare bedroom. Just a couple of science-minded dudes throwing back a few cold ones and tinkering around with space and time. And while they were unsuccessful in building that time machine, Jabir explains that what they *did* build is a kind of particle accelerator that can send abstract particles back in time to create a burst of energy. They built a time gun. A gun that can fire a bullet into the past, as long as you know the exact coordinates – which, thanks to Instagram, is entirely feasible. It takes Sophie about 30 seconds of movie time to give the go-ahead to knock off Darby, and voilà, Mal is back. He never left, and the weird but small changes to Sophie’s life – her shifts at the clinic are different now – mean nothing because now the nuclear family is restored.

As Jabir continues to work on extending the length of time the gun can reach back to (and execute a predestined mass shooter in his downtime), Sophie becomes preoccupied with Darby’s widow, Kara (Cox), and his daughter, Aggie (Cienfuegos), who haven’t been doing too well since Darby mysteriously died of a brain aneurysm on a camping retreat. Sophie’s guilt drives her to put another photon into the chamber and fire it back to the past to help them out. Course corrected, case closed. But no, these things are never so simple. No time crime goes unpunished.

Writer/director Moshé (South by Southwest 2017 selection *The Ballad of Lefty Brown*) grounds the tension of the various ethical dilemmas in *Aporia* by focusing more on his characters than on the gimmick of his delightfully low-tech time murder machine. As Sophie and Mal confront increasingly complicated conundrums, the sci-fi drama maintains an insightful and compassionate perspective that finds a lot more

interesting things to say about cause and effect than, say, wondering if someone should point a time gun at Hitler. It's a film that considers that life may be less about what you have or can get, and more about what you are willing to give up.

With its offbeat-dramedy-meets-sci-fi concept, *Jules* feels pulled right out of the world of indie cinema from 10 years ago. It's in communion with the likes of *Safety Not Guaranteed* or *Seeking A Friend for the End of the World*: movies that revel in a superficial attempt at charm that's undermined by a shallow understanding of their own characters, instead choosing to live and die by a determined sense of quirk wrapped up within their supposedly refreshing sense of genre-bending. If that sounds harsh, it's because this type of movie always comes off as grating and bland to my eyes and ears.

To be fair to *Jules*, it does carry itself with a bit more of a low-key, approachable earnestness, but it's still difficult to take much away from this over-the-hill E.T. story. Ben Kingsley plays Milton Robinson, a doddering senior whose daughter, Denise (Winters), worries he is starting to suffer from memory loss and senile confusion. Her fears are not allayed by the fact that Milton begins mentioning an alien that landed in his backyard. The alien is very real and is the titular Jules. Played by Jade Quon in a mute performance, the creature's silence ultimately acts as encouragement for the people that encounter it to open up more than they normally would.

Milton befriends Jules first, buying him apples to eat and letting him remain in his home, but it's not long before fellow older locals Sandy (Harris) and Joyce (Curtin) find what Milton has been hiding in his house. The three become

co-conspirators in harboring an extraterrestrial fugitive that's being hunted by the government in an underlying subplot that's less than half-baked. Though it has pit stops in some more familiar, provoking science-fiction concepts and imagery, including an offscreen head explosion, the film's tone is generally defined by a placid sense of nicety, as the sheer extraordinary nature of Jules' appearance ends up forcing these characters to reckon with their late stages of life.

This is a fine concept in theory, and it's nice to see a coming-of-age movie targeted at an older audience. Yet the latest film from Marc Turtletaub (who, coincidentally, produced *Safety Not Guaranteed*) fails to mine a true sense of meaning out of its events. There's a lack of synthesis between the script's earthly drama



OVERCOMING REJECTION IN *MATCH ME IF YOU CAN*

Director Marian Yeager on how the Austin-made rom-com escaped the “no” pile **BY RICHARD WHITTAKER**

Ever felt like the entire world looked at you and decided to swipe left? Betsy Morris wrote *e-LOVE*, a script based on the experiences of a friend who suffered the ultimate indignity of being rejected by a dating app – not by other users, but the app itself. Morris submitted it to the Austin Film Festival’s 2008 screenplay competition, and it ended up in the “no” pile. That’s where, in the style of every great literary rom-com, another reader turned it over, read it, and shuffled it into the “yes” pile, and it ended up winning the festival’s award for Best Comedy Screenplay.

That reader was producer Monica Lund, who stayed in contact with Morris and eventually heard that the script was available for option. That’s when she contacted her creative partner, Marian Yeager. “I was in West Texas looking after my mom,” Yeager recalled, “and Monica was like, ‘We need to make Betsy’s script.’” In November 2021, they started filming *e-LOVE* around Austin, directed by Yeager. Now called *Match Me if You Can*, it arrives on Amazon and iTunes this week.

Over the 15 years, the script has undergone several rewrites, most especially to reflect the changing nature of online dating. But the core narrative “didn’t need a lot of updating,” Yeager noted. “It’s a universal story. ... Girl wants to find somebody who will understand and love her for who she is, but the world’s telling her that you have to be this, this, or this for that to happen.”

Match Me if You Can follows the romantic misadventures of Kip Parsons (Georgina Reilly), *Pontypool*, *Murdoch*

Mysteries), a programmer who not only faces the day-to-day struggles of being a woman in tech but also gets that vicious rejection letter from dating site iPromise. The problem for iPromise founder Riley Detamore (Wilson Bethel, possibly best known as Bullseye in Marvel’s *Daredevil*) is that he has no idea how that message could have been sent.

In the tradition of *10 Things I Hate About You* and *The Shop Around the Corner*, *Match Me if You Can* sees them change from enemies to lovers. Since the immediate sympathies of the audience lie with Kip, the challenge was to make sure that viewers don’t turn on Riley. Yeager said, “Betsy and me and Monica and Georgina really worked on creating some scenes for him so that we could show a more sympathetic side to him.” However, that meant giving some of Riley’s worst actions and traits to his overprotective mother (Jennifer Griffin). “She realized when she was on set. ‘Am I the villain?’ I’m like, ‘Yeah, you are, just a little bit.’”

Aside from the universal aspects of the romance, as a former IT professional herself Morris wanted to represent that hard reality of being a woman in the notoriously sexist world of tech. Yeager said, “At the Dallas Film Festival, we had somebody who is in STEM, she waited until everybody had talked to me and she came over and was like, ‘I just want to tell you – I feel seen, I feel heard, and that was me.’ I’m so glad that it felt like it was speaking to her.”

and gestures toward intergalactic escapades; ostensibly, this is a film about rediscovering one’s humanity by way of otherworldly emotional connection, but the relationship between the central trio and Jules himself never feels particularly resonant.

At the very least it’s a decent performance showcase for its cast, though the feeble, doting elderly man direction that Kingsley is given begins to encroach on being too cutesy for its own good. As does the trajectory of the narrative, which prioritizes fleeting whimsy over satisfying emotional closure. Maybe this will speak to the demographic represented within more successfully but, despite an air of amiability that makes this hard to be too upset with, it’s also too frivolous to take seriously.

MEG 2: THE TRENCH

It’s time for an unchanging and arcane creature of violence to emerge from the depths and unleash slightly bloody violence on the modern world. Yes, Jason Statham is back in *Meg 2: The Trench*, a befuddling sequel to 2018’s *The Meg*. Sharksplotation is in – or seemingly, has never gone away, as argued in the recently released documentary of the same name. In that potted history of humanity’s cinematic conquest of the cartilaginous fish once known as sea dogs, sharks are presented as a black-eyed void into which people can pour their fear of the sea and what might hide there.

In *Meg 2: The Trench*, they’re basically just convenient sight gags, swimming around at high speed until called upon to mindlessly chew on pontoon boats, bridges, subs, tourists, mercenaries, scientists, and evil industrialists. The only difference between the sharks of *Meg 2* and those of any other Z-grade *Jaws* knockoff is that they’re the giant, ancient megalodon: Extinct in the real world for 3.6 million years, in the *Meg* movie world they’ve been lurking at the bottom of the ocean under a layer of icy water that keeps them and other nasty creatures of their prehistoric ilk away from the surface and modernity.

That barrier being readily breached in the first film, the sequel requires a more spectacular disaster as rapacious illegal miners blow up the bottom of the ocean for utterly opaque reasons. Well, it’s just so that Green James Bond (as his friends call him) Jonas Taylor (Statham at his most disengaged) can be trapped on an abandoned underwater mining base along with his adopted daughter, Meiying (Cai), and her uncle, Jiuming (Chinese action star Wu). Conveniently, Meiying’s mother, Suyin (played in the first film by Li Bingbing) has died offscreen,



and that’s just one of a series of fortunate events – fortunate, that is, to move the script to the next place that screenwriters Jon Hoeber, Erich Hoeber, and Dean Georgaris want to force it. The megs (for there are three of them) turn up just in time to comedically eat something, or joust with Jason Statham on a Jet Ski.

That’s the fun stuff. Or rather, the Fun Island stuff, and that is literally the name of the location of the closing hour. At least that segment has the good grace to be absurd in the manner of the lowest-grade sharksplotation movies, the *5-Headed Shark Attacks*, *House Sharks*, *Sharkansas Women’s Prison Massacres*, even your *Sharktopus vs. Whalewolves*.

Unfortunately, most of the budget seems to have been spent on the first half, a murky slog through the depths of the meg-infested abyssal depths of the titular Trench where the characters are puddle-deep and the villains so cardboard that their biggest danger isn’t being chum but dissolving in water.

What’s all most astounding about this is that it’s directed with zero panache by Ben Wheatley of all people. The British master of gritty nightmares (*Down Terrace*, *Kill List*) and psychedelic mind benders (*A Field in England*, *In the Earth*) seemed an unlikely choice to head up a dopey big-budget monster flick. Once the action hits Fun Island, at least he is able to embrace the stupidity, even if he can’t overcome either the miserable script or the demands of the Chinese market (*Meg 2* having all the narrative hallmarks of a production engineered to comply with the extensive and very real rule book for release in China). But after an hour of a bored Jason Statham trudging across the ocean floor, those laughs could barely raise a bubble in a bathtub.

Barclay Stratton, co-owner and chef of Golden Hour Cafe & Wine Bar, uses rotating Adagio selections for Golden Hour’s apero plate during their snack hours. Stratton cooked in Tuscany, Italy, for a spell and declares that Adagio’s is the best salumi he’s had in America – the closest in craftsmanship and quality to the salumi he experienced in Tuscany.

Pedonesi’s familial legacy is steeped in the genesis of salumi in the western world. Around 160BC, Cato the Elder wrote *De Agri Cultura (On Farming)*, the oldest known work of Latin prose and the Western world’s first farmers’ almanac. In it, he gives a recipe for curing pork hocks primarily with salt and finishing them with smoke. Cato was from Tusculum, an area just about 16 miles northwest of present-day Rome. Pedonesi’s grandfather, a salumerian, emigrated from Rome at the beginning of the 20th century.

Ironically, Pedonesi didn’t envision himself butchering animals when they started the salumeria. “[Gerry] is an artist with a knife,” he says, humbly crediting Garcia’s butchery as one of the major components that makes Adagio what it is.

Garcia learned to dress animals when he was 6. He dressed venison and goats with his uncles and father, and it turns out this knowledge comes in handy when you open your own salumeria and start breaking down whole animals. Garcia has an affinity and inclination for butchery, Pedonesi says, a skill that became an indispensable asset in the formulation of their vision.

Time is a constant theme throughout our conversation and their journey.

Adagio, meaning “at a slow tempo or pace,” is a fitting name for their brainchild (they first branded themselves as the Salumeria). The thought, time, and effort of what they’re doing is a sublime

Patience Is a Virtue

The butcher, the engineer, their passion, and their hog farm **BY EVAN RODRIGUEZ**

Time is the ultimate currency marking our conscious experience. Some believe time to be linear, others cyclical. Adagio Salumi marks its time in what is *not* left at the end of the day, endeavoring to put as much back into their corner of the earth as they extract.

“What a road paved in pig mud,” jokes Adagio co-founder Gerry Garcia. He and his business partner, Anthony Pedonesi, own and operate a 250-acre open pasture regenerative hog farm in Rockdale with a capacity of more than 1,000 hogs. Their hog farm of heritage breeds, which include Berkshire, Hampshire, Duroc, Landrace, and Red Wattle, supplies all of the pork that Adagio cures.

A chance encounter a little more than five years ago grew a multigenerational family tradition into a sustainable hog farm, a salumeria that is the first of its kind in Texas. Garcia was remodeling Pedonesi’s neighbor’s house one day when he saw Pedonesi’s son playing outside and thought that his boy and Pedonesi’s could be good friends.

“I got familiar with [Garcia’s] craftsmanship and enjoyed his personality, and the next thing you know, I am asking him to quit his job and go into business with me,” Pedonesi says.

Adagio was born of Pedonesi’s and Garcia’s shared passion for eating. Pedonesi is a third-generation salumerian and Garcia was raised dressing animals, unbeknownst to each other. Serendipity.

“We were not intending to be hog farmers,” Garcia says. But after crisscrossing Texas visiting multiple hog farms, they couldn’t find enough of a supply of pork raised in a way that they wanted it to be raised, so they created that environment. “We wanted them to be doing pig things ... we wanted these animals that had access to air and oxygen, and plants, we wanted them to graze on a salad bar,” he continues.

Happy hogs make for a better overall salumi. After researching sustainable and regenerative husbandry practices, the best

philosophically and practically for what they wanted to do, Garcia and Pedonesi created a hybrid grazing practice of free-range and pasture-raised hogs to create a better quality of life for their passel and for the land.

Through regenerative farming and rotational grazing of their hogs, Adagio claims to have reduced the amount of water needed for their farm. This significantly reduces the need for plowing, as the hogs naturally root through the soil, aerating it and spreading seeds. In turn, this reduces the amount of insecticides and pesticides needed for a healthy pasture. Their end goal, in short, is to create a sponge with the topsoil through these farming practices, allowing them to maximize the rainfall by reducing the waste from its runoff.

These practices and the fruits of their labor endeared them to their first distributor, Antonelli’s Cheese Shop. They are poised to grow nationally, starting with placements in H-E-B’s Central Markets statewide.

“Antonelli’s absolutely adores Adagio for their great-tasting cured meats in addition to knowing that they are also a family-owned, small business based out of Austin,” says Jensyn Hartzell, brand marketing coordinator for Antonelli’s Cheese. “We love that they use sustainable practices.”

orchestration. The acute attention to detail necessary in the long process of raising, then curing meat is fraught with a high potential for hiccups.

The average feedlot hog raised on corn and soy, pumped with hormones and antibiotics, is ready for slaughter in about nine months; Adagio raises their hogs on a diet of peanuts, hazelnuts, seasonal treats, grain sorghum, milo, and a salad bar for anywhere from 18 months to two years. Depending on the water content desired, or lack of, a salumi can cure anywhere from just under a year to two years. Each bite literally takes years to make.

The quality of Adagio's products is informed by a dedication to natural ingredients. Two ingredients, Swiss chard powder and cherry powder, stand out on the label of the sleek black tube housing Adagio's The O.G.

"The known way of combating botulism [a potentially deadly spore that can grow in some foods under specific conditions] is through nitrites, which are converted into nitrates. We needed a solution for botulism ... we found that Swiss chard actually enhanced our product and provided that minimum requirement to extinguish the botulism threat. We took something healthy out of the garden and were able to satisfy a crucial requirement, and in the process eliminate the need for synthetic nitrites and nitrates," says Pedonesi, who was previously a biomedical engineer.

Cherries are naturally high in ascorbic acid, basically water soluble vitamin C; cherry powder is used for preservation and color retention.

Pedonesi and Garcia have a seemingly clear vision of growth, but unlike the chef-driven culture of reinvention and reinterpretation one might mistakenly group them in, these gentlemen are driven by the idea of historical preservation and respect for tradition born from necessity and survival.

"What we do here is we find the recipe, the reason behind the recipe, the story, the culture, the family even, the cross section of streets of where it originated, and to the best of our abilities re-create it," Pedonesi says.

Garcia adds, "Don't elevate it, just honor it. Just go back and learn the way it's supposed to be done, go back and learn why it was done a certain way. Food, traditionally, was not a luxury, it was a necessity. We are just trying to go back in time and rescue those tastes that were otherwise lost."

Garcia and Pedonesi strive for subtlety and nuance. Everything starts from the ground up. They feed their

hogs indigenous spices and herbs in search of a specific flavor profile they are attempting to recapture. While most palates might not be able to single out those flavors, that minute element pervades.

Adagio is scaling as we speak. They are currently constructing a new facility that will allow them to grow "one hundredfold," with curing chambers "five times" what they currently can do, the partners say. Their ultimate commercial plan is national distribution in major grocery stores.

Ideally, Adagio will curate an experience, the Cure Box (currently offered at adagiosalumi.com), to be delivered to your door with historical information to learn

the stories behind the salumi. They want to share what they have learned because they are passionate about their craft. Pedonesi also says that they have a plan for a certification process for farms that want to raise Adagio-quality hogs in order to address the plan for national scaling, which is not possible from the farm in Rockdale.

"What's important to us also resonates with Austin in general, and that is being in control of what we're putting into our

bodies. Our salumi is nothing but the pork we raise, salt, and spices," says Pedonesi.

Even with their plan laid out, how does this scale? It is consistent for how we interpret a certain lifestyle of eating and consuming, but will it work in the long run? If they are as aware and passionate about their expansion and growth as they have been about what they have currently built, it just might.

Only time will tell. ■

Ways to Celebrate the 50th Anniversary of Hip-Hop in Austin

Kid-friendly concerts and essential showcases for the genre's golden jubilee **BY GENEVIEVE WOOD**

In the early August dog days of summer 1973, the Jamaica-born, Bronx-based DJ Kool Herc electrified a neighborhood block party with a high-energy vinyl set. As Herc mixed funk and soul records into a rapid succession of rhythmic breaks, MCs spun stories on the mic for an enraptured teenage crowd. Fifty years later, the August 11 party remains the stuff of legend and serves as the ceremonial birthdate of hip-hop.

To celebrate the genre's golden jubilee, we've rounded up a list of local and touring talent hitting the stage this week. From heavy-hitting showcases to kid-friendly workshops, hip-hop lovers from all walks of life are welcome.

THEE PHANTOM & THE ILLHARMONIC ORCHESTRA Long Center for the Performing Arts, Saturday 12, 7:30pm

Some may doubt the viability of combining hip-hop and classical music, but Thee Phantom, maestro of the genre-blending Illharmonic Orchestra, is used to these suspicions. In 1987, a 13-year-old Phantom mixed Beastie Boys' bratty classic "Paul Revere" with Beethoven's melodic *Symphony No. 5* and brought the tape to his best friend's house for review.

"He ejected it, threw it across the room, and said it would never work," laughs Phantom. "From that moment, I became galvanized to the idea that I would mix hip-hop and classical music and do it on a major level."

Alongside his wife, the Phoenix, who holds the title of Mistress of Ceremony, Phantom leads the Illharmonic Orchestra through instrumental renditions of Nineties rap classics. Crowd-pleasers include interpretations of Outkast's "SpottieOttieDopalicious," the Notorious B.I.G.'s "Big Poppa," and Pete Rock's "T.R.O.Y.," each backed by a full band of strings, horns, woodwinds, and piano.

"They seem like such polar opposites, but at the end of the day, music is music, right?" says the Phoenix, whose soaring vocals send the Orchestra's live sets to new heights. "If you go back and listen to some of the hip-hop greats, they always use instrumentation that exists in an orchestra — it's actually a pretty natural progression to put them together."

BAVU BLAKES ACC Highland Campus, Friday 11, 6pm Far Out Lounge, Saturday 12, 10am

As a conscious rap connoisseur and long-time Austin educator, Bavu Blakes rightly leads two weekend festivities. On Friday, he offers a free performance in ACC Highland's Recital Hall with MC Anastasia Hera and their trackless, no-computers-allowed cover band Classic Hip Hop Live. Saturday, to satisfy your pint-sized hip-hop head, look no further than Breakfast Boogie's family-friendly celebration of the genre's half-century.

Spearheaded by Charlie Faye (lead of Motown-inspired Charlie Faye & the Fayettes, and more recently, kid-focused group Charlie Faye & the Fanimals) and Cindy Haws (of queer family band Strawbitty Yops), the weekly series brings age-appropriate live music to the Far Out Lounge's spacious patio on Saturdays.

Living up to his nickname of Scholar Emcee, Blakes waxed poetic on the significance of hip-hop's 50th anniversary. "Hip-hop is turning 50 in the year that I'm turning 49, so I'm what you'd call a first-generation hip-hopper," says Blakes, who founded the forward-thinking educational agency Hip Hop Grew Up. "This is a celebration of the culture being that age."

"There's this resilient, undying, loud, in-your-face, creative spirit that some have said wouldn't be around, and now it's the thing to be," he continues. "Go to the top 20 country videos and you'll see a heavy hip-hop influence. Or go to what's supposed to be pop, or to ESPN, or the news, and you'll hear that influence everywhere."

"That's what this really marks — a celebration of that, no matter how hard you try, you can't stop us now."

CUPCAKKE, LYNN, LADI EARTH Antone's, Wednesday 16, 8pm

For a decidedly *non*-family-friendly hip-hop celebration, catch CupcakKe, the Chicago-born trap-pop performer known for spitting hilariously hypersexual lyrics over club-ready beats. Her set serendipitously coincides with Austin Pride week: The outspoken ally's 2016 hit "LGBT" is required listening at any queer function ("*Fuck out my way when you see me/ I'm rollin' with the LGBT*").

Female rap talent runs deep in the night's lineup, including Ladi Earth, the Austin-based R&B singer who leads cleansing "twerk and heal" workshops at Windsor Park art studio Brass Ovaries. Also joining as support is Lynn, the Alabama-born, Killeen-based rapper who floats between hard-hitting bravado and melancholic pensiveness with a maturity that far surpasses her 22 years.

"When you listen, you're definitely gonna feel every emotion," shares Lynn, who also scored an opening slot for Three 6 Mafia's DJ Paul at Antone's last month. "I'm very, very fierce, and give a hint of that vulgarity that you feel from Lil Kim or Foxy [Brown]."

Lynn, no stranger to the struggle of making moves in the historically male-dominated genre, values hip-hop's shift to a more female-friendly environment in recent years. "It's definitely a guy's game, but there's been a lot of progress, from the A-listers all the way down to the rappers like me who are still just getting started."

"We're definitely going hard, we're making names for ourselves," she continues. "We're just breaking generational curses and knocking down doors, and it feels good to be in these conversations and on these stages."

FRESH FRIDAZE Independence Brewing Co., Friday 11, 8pm

In our guitar-crazed town, Jsun the Prophetos and Michael "Big Mic" Pereida co-founded the College of Hip Hop Knowledge to build community around a shared love for the hip-hop art form. The duo's monthly Fresh Fridaze showcase recruits seasoned veterans as well as up-and-coming artists looking to hone their live chops. August's second Friday coincidentally falls on the genre's b-day, recruiting Cap Lewis, Bars Robinson, Ill4Real, Akademics, Space Goonz, and Northside Bully.

One of Friday's rising talents is Envy N, an East Austin native who combines the Southern swagger of Houston's Screwed Up Click with Trina's infectious energy. Her stage name is a phoneticized version of "Nikolette vs. Nichelle," with the former representing her artistic alter ego and the latter signifying her birth name.

"I'd get bullied in elementary because I was the Black girl with the big lips and the big eyebrows," she shares. "That kind of hurt my ego — I was this sweet girl, and I had to put on a mask because people didn't accept me for who I was."

"That's where Envy N comes in — it's my alter ego versus my real personality. I struggle with those two because I'm over here trying to make everybody else happy, and then another part of me wants to just be myself."

The 24-year-old cites her art form as a cathartic tool for self-expression while navigating inner turmoil.

"Hip-hop — it teaches you things, it teaches you about your culture," she shares. "I'm hoping people realize the importance of hip-hop on its 50th anniversary, because you can grow with it. It's a lifestyle, you know?" ■

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The Riverboat Gamblers' *Something to Crow About* Turns 20

The album that made Austin's apex punks **BY TIM STEGALL**

"That's the one that put the band on the map," says Riverboat Gamblers guitarist Ian MacDougall of *Something to Crow About*, the second full-length release from Austin's apex punk outfit. Long out of print, *Crow* relaunched in a special 20th anniversary edition, pressed in three different colors of vinyl, on August 18 via the band's own GFFG Records. Local genius engineer Jack Control of Enormous Door Mastering breathes new life into the Tim Kerr-produced album.

Crow was released June 3, 2003, by Gearhead Records. The A-list garage/punk indie label run by former *Maximum Rockroll* contributors Mike Lavella and Michelle Haunold previously broke the Hives' motorik garage hit "Hate to Say I Told You So." Big Boys/Poison 13 legend Kerr successfully transferred the Gamblers' incendiary live sound – 1969 Detroit pro-punk invested with the ballistic energy of Japan's Teengenerate – to 1-inch tape at the late Sweatbox Studio in 2002.

Meanwhile, the still-Denton-based band's buzz grew steadily. Frequent visitors to town since a late-Nineties Blue Flamingo appearance, they made Beerland their de facto Austin HQ. Then-*Rolling Stone* writer David Fricke became an early champion, reviewing a typically explosive Emo's South by Southwest showcase in 2003, before declaring them one of the "Top 5 bands to break out at this year's SXSW" in 2006.

"That was way outside of what we thought was possible, or what we were capable of," says guitarist Fadi El-Assad, who started the Riverboat Gamblers in Denton when he was 18 with bassist Patrick Lillard and singer/spectacle Mike Wiebe. "That's when we started getting a little bit of juice, and it

started building and it felt really exciting at that time.

"None of us had stars in our eyes. There was nothing like, 'Oh yeah, we're going to make it now.' It was more of a confused flattery. Like, 'Are they really into this? All right, cool.' It was more of that kind of attitude than anything else. But we were young and ready to do it, so we were like, 'Let's give it a shot.'"

A few years earlier, Lillard, El-Assad, and Wiebe were enthralled with what the singer calls "the Gilman Gold Rush, when all the Lookout and Epitaph stuff was blowing the fuck up." Denton was alive with young bands playing an active house show circuit, everyone playing in everyone else's bands several times over. Lillard approached El-Assad about doing something "more big rock/rock & roll/garage rock." El-Assad played with Wiebe in two other bands, both desiring to rock harder. Wiebe says they bonded over discovering the source of Nineties group Teengenerate's name was a song by NYC punk pioneers the Dictators – which led them to the latter act's 1978 *Bloodbrothers* album and the path ultimately chosen.

Kerr produced the Gamblers' first two albums. "I have always thought that band was great," he writes via text message. "[*Crow*] was recorded how I/we did all the recordings [at Sweatbox]: Basic tracks live, no headphones."

El-Assad recalls one song during the *Crow* sessions not going well. Kerr told them to take a break, drink some beer,

then come back and try again. They finally got it, but the guitarist remained skeptical.

"I said, 'That's not how it's supposed to go.' His reply always stuck in my head, and I think about this – about life events, about music, anything: 'What do you mean that's

not the way it's supposed to go? That's the way it went."

Crow was the first widely distributed evidence of the band's flamethrower superiority. They still play nearly half of its 13 songs live: "What's What," "Rattle Me Bones," "Ice Water," "Save You," "Lottie Mae," "Last to Know." According to El-Assad, "Sparks & Shots" returned during recent gigs. The album also transformed them, per Wiebe, into "road dogs extraordinaire."

"I think we'd done one tour beforehand," says the lead vocalist, speaking on a break from writing new material for the Gamblers and his other project, Drakulas. "But that was the record that opened us up to really kind of living on the road for a while there."

The 2003-2005 *Crow* tours also brought an 18-year-old MacDougall to the band, shoving him into the tour van shortly after his high school graduation, upon guitarist Colin "Ambulance" O'Donnell's exit. Previously in '77-style punk band the Kicks, then-tour manager Bryan McClellan advised him: "No creepers, no skinny ties, no neon shirts, any of that shit." MacDougall has remained in the band's core since, alongside Wiebe, El-Assad, and bassist Rob Marchant, who replaced Lillard in 2007. Drummer Sam Keir came aboard in 2010, leaving after three years to become a firefighter, but returning in 2021. He's remained drumming since.

All that touring made a machine out of the Gamblers by the summer of 2006, the year *Alternative Press* magazine declared them one of the "100 Bands You Need to Know." Their van rode behind tour buses holding X and Rollins Band, as they traversed America with the L.A. punk legends in support of *To the Confusion of Our Enemies*, the Gamblers' first LP under their

new contract with skateboard manufacturer Volcom's short-lived record label. That July, they were the first live act I got to see upon returning to town after several years away.

I honestly had no idea how either X or Henry Rollins would be able to follow them at Stubb's that night. The Gamblers clearly absorbed everything MC5 and the Clash taught them, but with more demonic energy than either in their prime. And Wiebe put life and limb on the line every night.

"I was on a real mission, back then," he acknowledges. "It had to be a more intense show than everybody else. Sometimes that was more like, 'How can I physically hurt myself rather than sing alright.' I had a lot of injuries. I was constantly in and out of the ER with some kind of new break or laceration or something."

"It was like that onstage, and honestly it was like that offstage," chuckles El-Assad. "Recklessness was sort of the engine that was powering the band at that time."

After Stubb's, it wasn't their new LP I purchased as my first Riverboat Gamblers LP. It was *Crow*. Such is that record's power: It defined them, even then. It led to their Austin relocation, MacDougall's membership, their road seasoning – virtually everything.

After a long absence, it's back. Control's remaster, only available on the new vinyl issue, sounds like it's had a shower, a shave, and two cups of coffee. The Riverboat Gamblers support their ultimate creation's rebirth with a to-be-announced series of shows presenting *Crow* live, in full, in sequence, plus other select tunes. Their first studio album since 2012's *The Wolf You Feed* is forthcoming, as well as a live album. But for now, the Riverboat Gamblers celebrate the album that made them. ■

A BAND CALLED MA'S SLOW BURN "MOUNTAINTOP"

Austin Barker and Dominic Sena make up A Band Called Ma, who found inspiration for their sound in the mystic scenery of Big Bend National Park as well as the downcast explosiveness of artists like Radiohead and Alex G. With scorching, cinematic ballad "Mountaintop," the new duo now totals three 2023 singles. Cavernous drums, raw acoustic guitar riffs, and moody vocals abound on this slow burn of a song, which culminates with a powerful monologue and soulful saxophone solo. The result is a track that feels like it has its feet on the ground and its head in the clouds – or in another dimension entirely.

IFÉ NEURO, "VIVIENNE BANDEAU"

A reflective track co-produced with Sunday Dinner Records labelmate GEECHEE SUPREME, "Vivienne Bandeau" builds largely on a looped sample of the opulent opening bass and acoustic guitar from Stevie Wonder's "Visions." Here, Austin's Ifé Neuro looks back while acknowledging his stable present. Cultural references paint a modest childhood: wearing K-Swiss with thoughts of Air Jordan 4 Military Blues, eating Spam, watching *Viva la Bam*, and rocking a temp fade in sixth grade. "Wasn't rich, but had an aura like we been paid," he states. Nowadays, he simply points to his "gorgeously plated" wagu when asked if he's underrated.

KYDD JONES, "DON'T TRY ME"

Branding this summer-loving reverie, the video for "Don't Try Me" adds a titular kicker to the visuals: "A Love Letter by Kydd Jones." Melting quickly at an all-too-brief 2:31, the homegrown rhymesayer's midyear missive builds a complete narrative of worlds colliding. "You don't need no lingerie," croons the chorus, and the way Jones sings the latter plot point – "lawn-jur-ray" – becomes the audio tickle amongst melting rap verses and a cooing soul chorus. On YouTube, the track flickers equally luxe, juxtaposing alleyways with lush Austin greenbelts and roomy cribs. Jones cuts the easy figure of an iconic MC.

FUVK, "YELLOW"

Singer-songwriter Shirley Zhu has come a long way since Fuvk's humble beginnings as an anonymous "personal journal," but her ever-endearing lovestruck yearnings still take center stage for "Yellow." On the Austin bedroom-pop project's first release of 2023, she muses, "My girl is chronically sad, in a bitter mood and she knows it." The track's brooding lyrics are offset with bright riffs, a killer bassline, and an incessant beat, making Zhu's pining the perfect foil to the song's deceptively sunny instrumental. On "Yellow," the heartache is real, but it's never sounded so fun.

HOT///CAKES, "DEPLETION!"

For a song about "running out of steam," HOT///CAKES' garage punk riot "Depletion!" certainly goes down swinging. Supercharged with wailing gang vocals and triple guitars, the burnout anthem narrates the exhaustion of day-to-day life. "Everything around just feels so bleak," Chris Himelblau deadpans, final syllable howling over an electric drone. Aaron Reecer's warbling solo slices through the noise before the track slows to a crawl, titular fatigue on full display. Sixty sluggish seconds later, churning guitars and crashing cymbals crescendo into third gear, HOT///CAKES' last hurrah. Brute force and rowdy rhythms slam into nothingness. Depletion, indeed.

LOS COGELONES

What's got deeper roots than trad punk? How about ancestral punk? Los Cogelones – a quintet of brothers wearing face paint, feathers, and jewelry along with sleeveless leather and biker boots – perform a strain of experimental punk informed by their Mexica (Aztec) heritage. The band hails from Ciudad Nezahualcōyotl, or Neza, an area east of Mexico City sitting in the drained bed of Lake Texcoco with a dense population that's been historically marginalized.

Beginning with anarcho-punk interests, Los Cogelones later strengthened their musical identities with the rebellion and resistance of their cultural heritage – incorporating its traditional instruments, language, and dress. 2020's full-length debut, *Hijos del Sol*, with distorted guitars, driving bass, Aztec rhythms, and gritty, impassioned singing, gained Los Cogelones an international fan base. An ensuing KEXP performance video showcased their striking live show, where a pounding huéhuetl drum, resonating tlapitzalli flutes, and declarations in the Nahuatl language magnify the spirited release of punk rock.

Following a tour in Spain, Los Cogelones now hit a 10-day run of U.S. shows, two of them being in Austin.

"Throw Em Out," and the title track raise fists and drinks for the working folk and those left behind – operating in the best of country music's traditions. Yet equally powerful is Baum's tender croon elevated by Walker Lukens' production, hitting a weary but defiant swoon as he takes stock of what matters.

After pushing the envelope at Willie Nelson's Luck Reunion in March – and entering the alluring, tradition-twisting singer-songwriter big leagues with Lana Del Rey and Weyes Blood on a 2021 cover of Joni Mitchell's "For Free" – Zella Day brings her disco-touched, Seventies-wirled drama to town. Houser (Sara Houser) on keys, and danceable electronic igniter EMSKIII (Emma Berrigan) on drums. "[When] we added the rhythmic component," he said, "I realized that having a bit of noise and chaos can add emotional depth." Los Angeles folk singer Jamie Drake opens.






