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Study: Road traffic on rise

Intersections see 20,000 vehicles on average day

Some of Morgantown's most traversed intersections see more

TO VIEW the entire report, visit plantogether.org.

than 20,000 vehicles pass through each day — that's the equivalent of the combined populations of Fairmont and Star City.

Morgantown traffic count numbers were presented to members of the Morgantown Monongalia Metropolitan Planning Organization during its

meeting last week.

A traffic counter was placed along Monongahela Boulevard near the intersection with Patteson Drive. It averaged 32,509 vehicles a day in 2012, according to the report. That's an 11 percent increase from 2012, when 29,216 vehicles passed through.

The report notes that traffic volume is expected to increase due to development in the region.

Of those 32,509 vehicles, about 3.4 percent consisted of truck traffic — about 1,105 trucks a day. It also found the peak time in the morning was 7:30-8:30 a.m. with about 6.21 percent of total traffic occurring during that time period. In the evening, the peak time is 5-6 p.m. with about 7.5 percent of total traffic.

Ga. toll booth charity tradition is back for now

ATLANTA — The tradition of travelers paying the toll for the driver behind them on Georgia Highway 400 is back. Motorists complained and Gov. Nathan Deal asked for it to be reinstated.

In July, the State Road and Tollway Authority banned the practice because some motorists complained that cashiers might be pocketing the extra 50 cents instead.

Bert Brantley, the authority's executive director, said Friday the agency had been working to find a way to reinstate the practice.

The move means motorists will have a few more months to donate money for tolls on Georgia Highway 400. The toll booths are scheduled to come down the week before Thanksgiving.

Landslide causes pipeline rupture, gas spill

LITTLETON — A landslide caused a pipeline to rupture and spill a liquid gas near a Wetzel County stream.

Kathy Cosco, spokeswoman for the West Virginia Department of Environmental Protection, said that officials have not been able to take samples at the Rocky Run area where the spill occurred Tuesday because gas levels remained too high.

She said Friday that the MarkWest Energy pipeline carried an unspecified “wet gas.” She said many natural gas liquids, which are byproducts of natural gas drilling, vaporize when they come into contact with water. Evidence of a fish

kill was found, but Cosco said no one lives close enough to the site to be in danger.

“The company put out some absorbent material in the nearby stream, trying to absorb anything that might be on the surface,” Cosco said.

MarkWest spokesman Robert McHale said the 10-inch, 27-mile pipeline connecting two company facilities will remain shut down until repairs are made. He said no one was injured, and the company is working with local, state and federal officials.

Cosco said DEP representatives have been “able to get within eyesight” of the spill without being in danger. However, she said all such substances are

volatile and always have the potential to ignite. She said MarkWest workers have been maintaining the site and managing the spill in an effort to prevent any ignition or explosion.

Residents of the area expressed concern about potential hazards associated with the pipeline break. Ed Wade, who lives about a mile from the spill, said he visited the area and encountered “really, really strong fumes.” He said he saw one “roll-out ribbon” nearby that states “Danger,” but he did not believe this was an adequate warning.

Cosco said once the danger has passed and DEP workers can access the area, they will sample the stream and soil.

Robert McNabb, a 1970 WVU graduation who served on the WVU Foundation Board of Directors,

died Thursday.

guished Alumni.

He most recently served as a member of the Global Operating Committee of Korr/Ferry International, the world's largest human capital firm. He retired from the company as executive vice president in July.

WVU President Jim Clements issued a statement.

"Bob McNabb was not only a highly successful business executive, but one of the most loyal and passionate Mountaineers I have had the honor of knowing. His love

for WVU was inspirational — from his stories of his undergraduate years here to his service on the WVU Foundation Board and other University committees. We will miss him, and send our sincerest condolences to his wonderful family."

Residents can drop off prescription medications, or any medications that may be compounded to make other drugs, such as Sudafed.

MedReturn said it is the only such box in Preston, Monongalia and Marion counties.

Family-owned WCLG to change hands

Morgantown radio stations WCLG-AM and -FM will soon change hands. Bowers Broadcasting Corp. has entered into a contract to sell the stations to AJG Corp.

The sale is subject to Federal Communications Commission (FCC) approval.

AJG owns three FM stations in West Virginia — WKKW, Fairmont; WFGM, Barrackville, and WFBY, Weston.

WCLG-FM is an active rock station, operating on 100.1 MHz. The sister AM station, operating on 1300 KHz, carries a classic hits format.

Family-owned Bowers Broadcasting has operated the outlets since 1985.

West Virginia Hall of Fame broadcaster Garry Bowers oversaw WCLG's operation until his passing in 2011. The company has no other stations.

county commission. Under the commission, are the seven directors; Director of facilities, the flood plain coordinator, the coordinator of grants and administration, the county administrator, the county planner, the MECCA 911 director and the coordinator of pro-

grams and services.

Flowing down from the directors are the departments for which they are responsible.

For example, Doyle oversees the facilities manager, the canine center, the motor pool and housekeeping and has 20 employees under his charge.

Commissioner Tom Bloom said the need for re-organization became apparent to him shortly after joining the commission.

"It just seemed like there were overlapping objectives and confusion about who was in charge of what," Bloom said. "To me, accountability and efficiency

are key, and I think this accomplishes that."

He said the commission began the process by asking for mandatory job descriptions.

"[The commissioners] all feel like we're there to do the legislative work," Bloom said. "In the past, you would have county commissioners [who] would get personally involved in the managerial controls of this department or that program and it created confusion. That's why we have administrators, and we want to

let them do their jobs."

Bloom said the flow chart and job descriptions are just part of the effort. A reworking of the counties employee rules and policies is also part of the plan.

The goal, Bloom said, is to leave a positive legacy long after the current commission has moved on.

"When I leave, there will be a system in place so personalities are no longer part of the day-to-day decision making. People will know what their job is, what is expected of them,

what the rules are and who they report to."

Bloom concluded by saying that he feels the commission's organization efforts were part of what won it the Thelma J. Stone Memorial Achievement Award during the annual convention of the County Commissioners Association of West Virginia.

"It's working well," Bloom said. "I think the state agrees. We're taking on the system that was in place and making positive changes."

Ridge Road approaching the intersection with Van Voorhis Road recorded an average daily traffic count of 33,865, up from 32,854 the previous year.

Nearly 22,000 vehicles were counted, on average, on Stewartstown Road near the intersection with W.Va. 705.

Several intersections along University Avenue, near downtown, also had high counts. About 26,000 vehicles went through a counter along University near the Westover Bridge in the 2013 count. That is up 12 percent from 23,315 in 2012.

Easton Hill and a few intersections along Earl L.

Core Road also had counts above 21,000 vehicles a day.

On Boyers Avenue, near the intersection with University Avenue, almost 14,000 vehicles traversed that intersection daily, according to the data.

About 16,000 vehicles daily were counted at the University Town Centre in 2013.

Some of the biggest percentage jumps of traffic at intersections have occurred in areas where new developments opened.

Stewartstown at West Run Road had a 25 percent increase from 9,887 vehicles, on average, to 12,401 in 2013. The report notes that construction on W.Va. 705

should be considered when looking at the data.

The same provision was also given for the counter at Hartman Run Road, near Richwood Avenue, which had a 67 percent increase from 9,349 in 2012 to 15,679 in 2013.

Many of the busiest intersections are also some of the most dangerous in the area, ranking high in the number of accidents, including Monongahela Boulevard and Patteson Avenue and W.Va. 705 and Stewartstown Road.

Some intersections saw a decrease in traffic, but many of those were near the W.Va. 705 construction area or feed into the Mileground/W.Va. 705 area.

Mon County resident Kris Singleton said she travels a lot in Morgantown and Fairmont. She added she wasn't that surprised to hear how many vehicles pass through the area's busiest intersections.

"I do more sitting than

traveling," Singleton said.

Morgantown Monongalia Metropolitan Planning Organization Executive Director Bill Austin said the report is very useful for planning and looking for congested areas.

"It's a pretty comprehensive report," he said.

The group plans on doing the report every year; Austin said, and will begin to examine seasonal differences in traffic patterns.

Policy Board Chairman Joe Statler said the group uses the report to help guide its long-range plan.

There really wasn't anything surprising in the report, Statler said. But, he did note that some of the side streets had higher counts as people try to find a way around some of the more congested areas.

He added those side street should be used more by residents who live near those intersections.

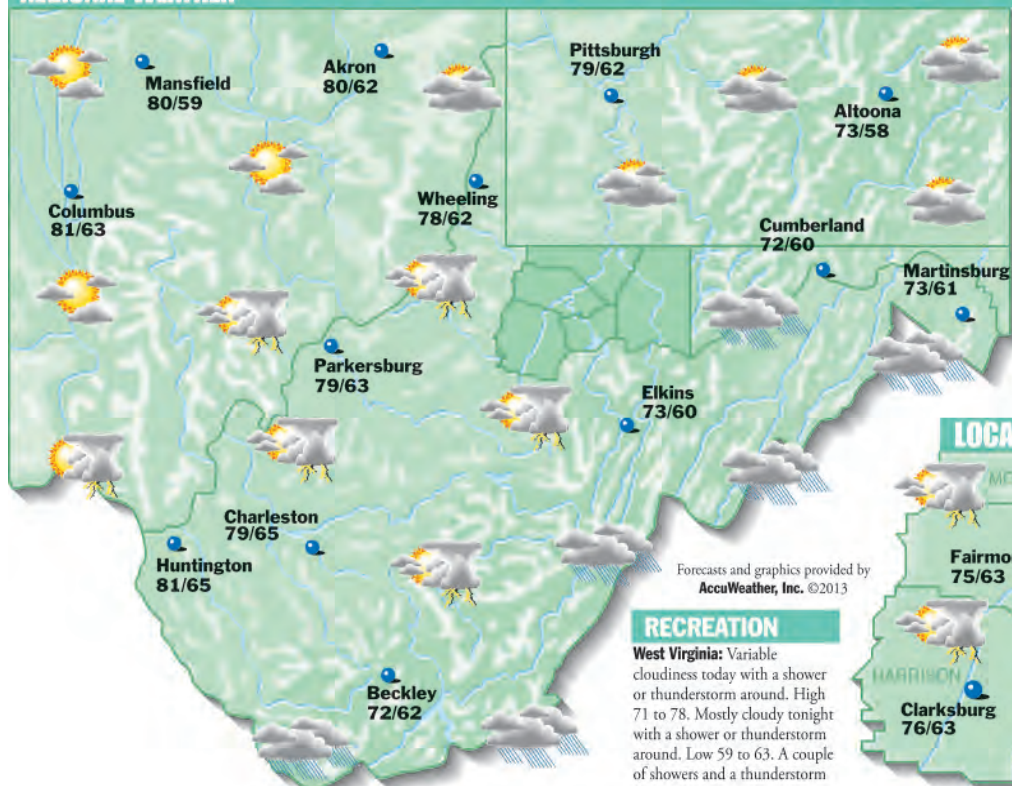

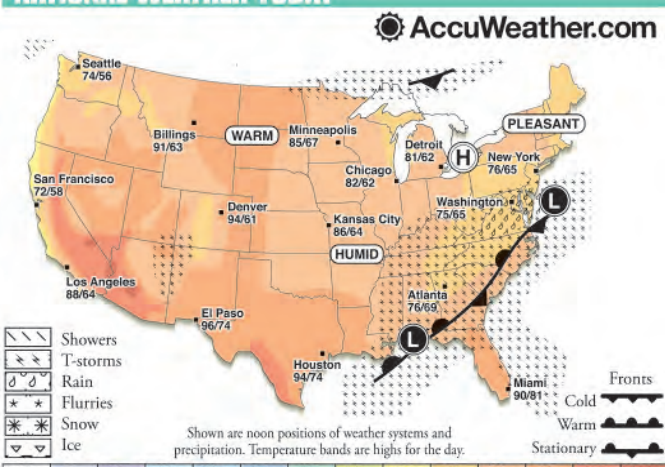

Yeah, I can be myself here in this small town

WHEN I DROVE from California to West Virginia more than a decade ago, I was struck quickly by the change from life in the big city to small town America.

My first-stop was in Nevada. I do not remember where I was, but I was following U.S. 50 and stopped for gas. I went into the station to pay in advance and the cashier looked at me as though I'd just landed from outer space.

"How are you gonna pay for it if you haven't pumped it?" the man asked.

I'd heard that question from countless customers, but never from a gas station employee.

(We used to call them service stations, kids. That was back when they'd wash your windshield and check your tires and oil with no questions asked. Sigh.)

Recently, I had another "only in a small town" encounter: I almost always have such experiences when I visit Richwood, which is in Nicholas County and is the birthplace of both my parents and four of my eight siblings.

We were at a family reunion in the forest when someone mentioned that the Richwood Public Library had a recording of a locally written and performed play that mentioned my grandfather. On our next trip to town, my cousins and I stopped at the library to ask about it.

I lost count of the employees who dropped what they were doing to look for it.

It was misfiled. It was not under my grandfather's name nor that of **Nancy Hart**, the focus of the play.

It was not under Richwood or West Virginia. If I remember correctly, it had been filed under "History."

So they found the tape, then asked for a library card. How embarrassing — three oh-so-literate family members couldn't come up with a card amongst them.

But that wasn't a problem. One of the employees graciously agreed to check it out for us.

Alas, few of us still own a machine that will play a VHS tape, so we asked about a place that might transfer it to DVD.

The answer, which was not surprising, was that WalMart in Summersville could probably do it.

I took my cell phone outside and called WalMart. After a few calls, I got through. Sure, they said, they could transfer it. It would only take mailing it to Alabama and about six weeks to get it back.

I wasn't willing to risk a library-owned tape in the process, so I told the kind folks at the library that I'd look for another way and get back to them.

When we returned to our campsite, I told the story to another cousin. "I can do it at work," she said. "It won't take a day."

So, I went back to the library with my cousin's driver's license, business card, home phone number, cell number and whatever else I could think of to assure them we were reputable, reachable and likely to return the video unscathed. My cousin said she'd mail it back to the library.

"I just need to know what town it's coming from so I can watch for it," the library employee said.

Don't you just love small towns? I know I do.

And just so you know I'm as good as my word, the library has its tape back, and a DVD of the play.

Straight scoop on roundabout, other changes

What's different about WVU, city since spring

David Bowie might have been singing about Morgantown when he belted out "Ch-Ch-Changes."

Out-of-town WVU students returning for the start of fall semester may notice a few physical changes and policy differences around town.

Two major changes involve traffic patterns and regulations. Students, just like year-round

residents, now have to navigate the new roundabout and reconfiguration of W.Va. 705. During the summer, construction on those projects wrapped up.

The roundabout replaces the traffic light at the intersection of 705 and the Mileground. Route 705 is now two lanes in each direction, and five lanes at its intersection with Stewartstown Road, with various turn lanes.

There was a major driving policy change: Using a hand-held cellphone while driving became a primary offense under state law, meaning drivers can be

pulled over for doing so.

Law enforcement agencies have already handed out citations for people using a cellphone while driving.

WVU Police Chief Bob Roberts said it doesn't take long for patrol officers to learn to spot someone using a phone. It's pretty visible from alongside the offender or even from behind the vehicle.

When the law went into effect, Roberts said, officers started by issuing warnings, but now they are citing drivers.

It is at the officer's discretion whether to cite drivers for using

a phone at the start of the semester, Roberts said.

On campus, students will notice a big difference this year: WVU is now tobacco-free. That includes roads that run through campus.

Spokesman John Bolt said it's hard to say how the ban on tobacco use might be altered or amended without feedback from the students on campus. With any new policy, it takes some time for people to adjust, but the university isn't expecting any major hiccups.

Re-enactor tells story of Cornstalk Warrior

Cutler brings history to life

Dan Cutler, 66, served the state of West Virginia as a firefighter for 23 years.

Today he serves the state in a new way — re-enacting its history.

Saturday, Cutler donned authentic Shawnee garb and acted out his interpretation of the Cornstalk Warrior's story in front of an audience at the Aull Center, on Spruce Street.

Cornstalk was a Shawnee peace leader, who led his people through battles in the French and Indian War, and raids into the Greenbrier Valley during Pontiac's Rebellion.

According to the Greater Morgantown Convention & Visitors Bureau, on Oct. 10, 1774, he led almost 1,000 Shawnee warriors against an equal number of Virginians at the Battle of Point Pleasant.

When Cutler was a firefighter in Huntington, he had a lot of extra time to read.

He was fascinated by eastern Native American history, but he soon became so enmeshed with the stories that he could no longer simply read them.

So Cutler went beyond learning and brought them back to life.

At first, it was just a hobby. In 1999, while working in Huntington, he began playing the role of Chief Logan, a Native American war leader who lived in the Ohio country and played a large role in the conflicts leading up to Dunmore's War.

It wasn't long before Cutler decided his duty to tell this story to the people far outweighed anything else.

In 2003, he retired from his career as a firefighter and took on the role of a professional re-enactor.

Fairview man accused of fleeing police while drunk-driving ATV

Tommy J. Eddy, 36, was arrested for fleeing while DUI by the Monongalia County Sheriff's Department. He was arraigned in Monongalia County Magistrate Court on Saturday. Bail was set at \$10,000.

According to his criminal complaint: Friday, Deputy T.D. Hunn was working as security at the

Clay District Fair. An attendee told him a person driving an ATV struck his truck and fled.

Hunn searched Upper Days Run Road for the suspect but couldn't find him.

When he returned to the victim, an ATV went by. The victim said it was the one that hit his truck.

Hunn caught up to the ATV and turned on his cruiser's emergency lights to stop it. But the ATV and its driver, Eddy, continued on and passed a truck on a double yellow line.

Hunn followed the ATV for about a mile, and turned off his emergency equipment for safe-

ty reasons.

The ATV was speeding, and Hunn found it half a mile down the road.

Eddy was trying to ram a cattle gate open in an effort to flee. Hunn took him into custody.

The setting did not allow for a field sobriety test, so Eddy was taken to the Sheriff's Department, where he failed two of the three tests.

A breath test showed Eddy had a blood-alcohol content of .152, almost twice the legal driving limit.

Fleeing while DUI is punishable by up to 10 years in prison.

Eye doc looks at diabetes

Dr. Raju, others will study health impact

For Dr. V.K. Raju, the Morgantown ophthalmologist who offers free eye care in places around the globe where corrective lenses are a luxury, the word "vision" is as nuanced as a sunset over the Grand Canyon.

There's "vision," in the literal definition of his profession: In 1977, he founded the Morgantown-based Eye Foundation of America.

In the nearly 40 years since, he and his colleagues have performed about 300,000 procedures across India, Iraq and Afghanistan without charging one cent.

Then, there's "vision," as the metaphor that motivates his work. After all, it takes a vision, and a work ethic, to front such an effort.

It takes a vision to make all those friends, so you can blink in sync with kindred spirits.

In the weeks ahead, Raju will cast that vision in the direction of the West Virginians he has come to consider as brothers and sisters since he came to Morgantown, in 1976, to do corneal transplants at the old WVU Medical Center.

His foundation is working with Monongalia General Hospital and WVU's School of Public Health to launch a study of the health of a group of people in Mon County and neighboring Preston County who suffer from diabetes or are pre-diabetic.

"We're getting ready to start," he said. It can't come soon enough, he said.

Besides being the sixth-leading cause of death in West Virginia — as noted by the Centers

We hope it has been a wonderful summer and you are all ready to kick off an exciting new school year. To help make this school year a successful one, here are some highlights of the Monongalia County Attendance Policy in which all parents/guardians/students need to be familiar:

- **ATTENDANCE IS MANDATORY!** Education is EVERYONE's responsibility!
- A parent/guardian is expected to call the school to report a student's absence no later than ONE (1) hour after the beginning of the school day.
- When the student returns to school after an absence, a parent/guardian is required to furnish a written statement regarding the reason for the absence within FIVE (5) school days. AFTER FIVE DAYS, YOUR EXCUSES WILL NOT BE ACCEPTED. NOTE: MAKE SURE YOU FOLLOW-UP WITH YOUR CHILD/SCHOOL TO ENSURE EXCUSES HAVE BEEN TURNED IN.
- The total number of unexcused absences permitted per school year is FIVE (5).
- Illness of a student verified by parent/guardian is NOT to exceed THREE (3) consecutive or FIVE (5) total days per semester. Verification by a physician will be required if absences exceed THREE (3) consecutive or FIVE (5) total days per semester.
- **TARDIES:**
 - ~ Elementary/Middle Schools: FIVE (5) tardies equal ONE (1) day of absence
 - ~ High Schools: THREE (3) tardies PER CLASS equals ONE (1) class absence
- If a child has FIVE (5) total unexcused absences in a semester, a letter (also known as a CA-2) will be sent to the parent/guardian requesting a meeting. If the parent/guardian refuses to attend or if, after the meeting, absences continue, a Truancy Tracking Form will be filed with the Attendance Director. At this time, the judicial process will begin and the Attendance Director will file a complaint in the Monongalia County Magistrate Court OR Circuit Court against the parent/guardian or the child, based upon the age of the child. If probable cause is found to believe that an offense has been committed, a summons or warrant shall be issued.
- Any requests for Driver Eligibility Certificates will be granted based on a student's attendance, grades and discipline; if a student has been denied due to unsatisfactory reasons, he/she must maintain satisfactory attendance for one complete semester before eligible.
- **TRANSFERS:** Applications for the 2014-15 school year will be accepted April 1, 2014 through June 30, 2014.

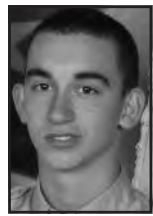

In 2005, Cutler added to his arsenal of stories by developing the idea for the re-enactment of the Cornstalk Warrior, and in 2006 he played that role for the first time.
Cutler said Cornstalk, being a "peace leader," advocated for peace, and nev-

er committed any physical acts of war.
He simply did his duty to his people by leading his troops through battle, directing them where to go and what to do.
He still received the blame for any atrocities done upon the settlers during the conflict.
After the Battle of Point

Pleasant, Cornstalk gave himself up in hopes of avoiding retaliation against his people.
Instead, he was shot seven to 10 times and torn apart for souvenirs, and his people's villages were raided anyway.
Today, Cutler performs both the Chief John Logan and the Cornstalk Warrior

re-enactments in Ohio, West Virginia and Kentucky.
Cutler said the eastern Native American histories are not as well known as the Western stories, like those of Geronimo and Sitting Bull.
"Nobody knows Cornstalk, and he walked right through here many times," Cutler said. "That's our history, and we should be very

proud of that."
He, himself, takes pride in spreading these tales, and intends to continue on his journey to do just that.
"It's a story that needs told," Cutler said. "Apparently, I get people to listen to me, and that makes it my responsibility to be able to tell them some truths about this incredibly interesting story."

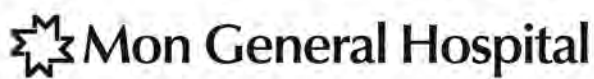

"We don't expect there to be any widespread issues," Bolt said.
The university is also working with city and community officials to address their concerns, Bolt said. One is that smokers are encroaching on residents' property because they can no longer smoke on campus.
A few changes occurred downtown during the summer. Construction crews are working on a streetscape project on High Street, between Kirk and Foundry streets. According to city officials, work will be about 75 percent complete by the end of August.
New parking meters have been installed in three popular lots: The Morgantown Market Place, the lot behind Daniel's Men's Store and the lot near Bent Willey's. The single-space meters have been replaced with pay stations. Hourly rates at those lots went up, to 75 cents an hour from 6 a.m.-6 p.m. and to \$1.25 an hour the rest of the time.

Idaho firefighters face another difficult day

HAILEY, Idaho — Fire crews Saturday faced another challenging day battling a rapidly growing wildfire burning closer to two posh, central Idaho resort communities.

Other blazes in the West charred homes, dry grass and brush.

In northern Utah, several manufactured homes were destroyed when a wildfire raced through the community of Willow Springs late Friday, jumping a state highway and fire lines, authorities said.

As of early Saturday, the

Patch Springs Fire had burned about 33,000 acres, or more than 50 square miles. It was estimated at 20 percent contained.

In Idaho, the Beaver Creek Fire grew by 15 square miles late Friday and early Saturday, to 144 square miles. Overnight, flames moved closer to homes and subdivisions in the mountains west and north of the communities of Hailey and Ketchum, and the Sun Valley Resort.

So far, authorities have issued mandatory evacuations for 1,600 residences in this smoke-shrouded valley.

The blaze was started by lightning Aug. 7. It expanded

significantly Friday, burning through tinder-dry brush and timber in the mountains west of the towns. Efforts Saturday were focused on protecting homes and structures in the gulches and foothills just west of Hailey and Ketchum.

Crews also planned to target erratic, wind-driven fire growth in one area north of Ketchum and two locations west of Hailey.

For now, that battle is taking place on the ground because heavy smoke has grounded air tankers capable of dumping retardant and water on the perimeters.

Some JFK probe files still sealed

Five decades after President John F. Kennedy was fatally shot and long after official inquiries ended, thousands of pages of investigative documents remain withheld from public view. The contents of these files are partially known — and intriguing — and conspiracy buffs are not the only ones seeking to open them for a closer look.

Some serious researchers believe the off-limits files could shed valuable new light on nagging mysteries of the as-

sassination — including what U.S. intelligence agencies knew about accused assassin Lee Harvey Oswald before Nov. 22, 1963.

It turns out that several hundred of the still-classified pages concern a deceased CIA agent, George Joannides, whose activities just before the assassination and, fascinatingly, during a government investigation years later, have tantalized researchers for years.

“This is not about conspiracy, this is about transparency,” said Jefferson Morley, a former *Washington Post* reporter and au-

thor embroiled in a decade-long lawsuit against the CIA, seeking release of the closed documents. “I think the CIA should obey the law. I don’t think most people think that’s a crazy idea.”

Morley’s effort has been joined by others, including G. Robert Blakey, chief counsel for a House investigation into the JFK assassination in the 1970s. But so far, the Joannides files and thousands more pages primarily from the CIA remain off-limits at a National Archives center in College Park, Md.

Rescuers reach Alaskan hunter mauled by bear

ANAKTUVUK PASS, Alaska — Crews equipped with night-vision goggles and flares staged a middle-of-the-night rescue to reach a hunter mauled by a brown bear 36 hours earlier, in the remote Brooks Range, the Alaska Air National Guard said.

The man was part of a group on a guided hunting trip about 30 miles north of Anaktuvuk Pass, a tiny Nunamiut Eskimo village in the Gates of the Arctic National Park. Initial rescue efforts by search teams and by the Alaska State Troopers were turned back because of dense fog.

The 11th Air Force Rescue Coordination Center learned of the man’s plight Thursday, about 36 hours after the attack, and offered to help, the Guard said in a release. The man had suffered severe blood loss and other injuries, but a medical professional who happened to be in a nearby hunting party reached him soon after the attack.

Officials credited the medical professional with saving the man’s life.

House arrest OK’d for elderly suspect

PITTSBURGH — An elderly funeral director charged in the shooting death of a contractor in July will be held on house arrest pending trial, authorities said.

William Welsh, 89, of Homestead, has been ordered to stand trial in Allegheny County in the shooting death of William Menni, 58, of McKees Rocks.

Defense attorney Frank Walker, who said his client acted in self-defense, asked Friday that his client be allowed to return home, citing his age. Prosecutors said they wouldn’t object as long as certain conditions were met.

Walker earlier said his client was remorseful but argued that the case should be considered self-defense or voluntary manslaughter.

Navy changes how alcohol sold on-base

NAVAL STATION NORFOLK, Va. — On the world’s largest naval base, sailors can pull into a gas station and buy a bottle of liquor before sunrise.

But as the Navy works to curb alcohol abuse in a push to reduce sexual assaults and other crimes, the days of picking up a bottle of Kahlua along with a cup of coffee are coming to an end.

The Navy’s top admiral has ordered a series of changes to the way the Navy sells booze. Chief among them, the Navy will stop selling liquor at its mini marts and prohibit the sale of alcohol at any of its stores from 10 p.m. to 6 a.m.

“It’s not going to fix everything, but it is a real step in the right direction,” said David Jernigan, Johns Hopkins University’s director of the Center on Alcohol Marketing and Youth.

Building demolition fuels quake study

HAYWARD, Calif. — With a series of quick blasts and a cloud of dust, a 13-story building on the Cal State-East Bay campus crashed to the ground Saturday morning as scientists monitored the impact on the nearby Hayward Fault.

The controlled implosion on a hillside above the San Francisco Bay also attracted scores of gawkers eager to feel the magnitude 2.0 shockwaves scientists predicted would occur from 12,500 tons of crashing concrete and steel.

U.S. Geological Survey scientists had placed more than 600 seismographs in concentric circles within a mile of the building to pick up the vibrations.

They hope the unique experiment will help map out where the ground might shake the most when the big one hits, though the data collected Saturday will take at least three months to analyze.

Obama family hits the beach

EDGARTOWN, Mass. — President Obama hit the beach for his last day of family vacation on

Martha’s Vineyard.

Obama, his wife and daughters went to a private beach on the island’s south shore Saturday morning. The president has been vacationing on Martha’s Vineyard for a week and is returning to Washington today.

Obama has kept a low profile during his stay. He spoke out publicly only once, to condemn escalating violence in Egypt. He filled most of his days with golf and evenings out with the first lady.

The first family is staying in a secluded four-bedroom rental home in Chilmark.

NTSB: No problem with plane controls

BIRMINGHAM, Ala. — Federal investigators said Saturday they haven’t found any problems with the controls in a UPS cargo jet that crashed while landing in Alabama, killing the two pilots.

National Transportation Safety Board member Robert Sumwalt said the cockpit controls in the A300 aircraft appeared to be working before the crash, and they matched the positions of the airplane’s flaps and rudders.

Sumwalt’s comments came during a news conference Saturday at Birmingham’s airport, where investigators are still sifting through the wreckage of the twin-engine aircraft.

‘Duck Dynasty’ star greets camo couple

MARS, Pa. — A camouflage-clad bride and groom got a little advice from a bewhiskered witness on their wedding day: “Duck Dynasty” star Willie Robertson.

WTAE-TV reported Robertson told the couple to always love and forgive one another as they were wed Saturday morning at a Field & Stream store near Pittsburgh.

Robertson popped in for the nuptials of Meghan Cook, who sported a camouflage sash on her dress, and Charlie Miller, who was completely clad in camo gear.

The two hadn’t planned on marrying at the store but Cook said they were eager to meet Robertson.

Police check new info on Diana death

LONDON — British police said they are examining newly received information relating to the deaths of Princess Diana and Dodi Fayed, and that officers are assessing the information's "relevance and credibility."

Scotland Yard declined to provide details about the information, only saying Saturday in a statement that the assessment will be carried out by officers from its specialist crime and operations unit.

The force stressed that it was not reopening the investigation into the 1997 deaths of Diana and Fayed, who were killed in a car crash in Paris.

In 2008, a British jury ruled that Diana, the Princess of Wales, and her companion, Fayed, were unlawfully killed due to reckless speed and drinking by their driver, and by the reckless pursuit of paparazzi chasing them.

Mexico detains key cartel leader

MEXICO CITY — A major military operation near the Texas border Saturday has netted another major drug trafficker, a leader of the Gulf cartel, according to an armed forces officer.

The officer, who was not authorized to speak to the press, would not name the person arrested but said he is being taken to Mexico City.

Mexican media reported that it is Mario Armando Ramirez Trevino, leader of the Gulf Cartel in Reynosa, who is responsible for much of the violence in the border city across from McAllen, Texas.

Bomb wounds five Bahrain policemen

MANAMA, Bahrain — Authorities said a bomb blast wounded at least five policemen in the restive Gulf kingdom.

The Interior Ministry on its official Twitter feed

said the homemade bomb went off Saturday evening, in the al-Diar area on the island of Muharraq.

Authorities described the bomb attack as "an act of terror."

Railway in disaster allowed to operate

OTTAWA — A Canadian government agency determined that the U.S. rail company whose runaway train crashed into a small Quebec town, killing 47 people in July, has adequate insurance to keep operating for the next month and a half.

The Canadian Transportation Agency said the Montreal, Maine & Atlantic Railway provided evidence it had adequate third-party liability insurance coverage to operate from Tuesday to Oct. 1. The agency's decision late Friday reversed an Aug. 13 order that would have halted the railroad's operations from early next week.

On July 6, an unmanned train, with 72 tankers of crude oil, came loose, derailed and crashed into the center of the town of Lac-Mégantic. Several tankers exploded, destroying 40 buildings. An estimated 1.48 million gallons of oil were spilled.

The rail company was granted creditor protection, saying it couldn't afford the cleanup and reconstruction costs for the town.

Divers search ferry for dozens missing

CEBU, Philippines — Divers combed through a sunken ferry Saturday in search of dozens of people missing after a collision with a cargo vessel that sent passengers jumping into the ocean and leaving many others trapped. At least 31 were confirmed dead and hundreds rescued.

The captain of the ferry MV Thomas Aquinas ordered the ship abandoned when it began listing and then sank just minutes after collision late Friday with the MV Sulpicio Express Siete, coast guard deputy chief Rear Adm. Luis Tuason said.

Security forces storm mosque

Morsi supporters had sought refuge inside the building

CAIRO — Egyptian security forces stormed a Cairo mosque Saturday after a heavy exchange of gunfire with armed men shooting down from a minaret. They rounded up hundreds of supporters of the country's ousted president who had sought refuge there overnight after violent clashes killed 173 people.

The raid on the al-Fath mosque on Ramses Square was prompted by fears that deposed President Mohammed Morsi's group, the Muslim Brotherhood, again planned to set up a sit-in, security officials said, similar to those that were broken up Wednesday in assaults that killed hundreds of people.

The arrest of the brother of al-Qaida chief Ayman al-Zawahri came in connection to the raid on the mosque. Officials said that he planned to bring in armed groups to provide support to those holed up inside the mosque.

Mohammed al-Zawahri, a Morsi ally, is the leader of the ultraconservative Jiha-

di Salafi group, which espouses al-Qaida's hardline ideology. He was detained at a checkpoint in Giza, the city across the Nile from Cairo, the official said.

The official spoke on condition of anonymity as he wasn't authorized to brief journalists about the arrest.

The Egyptian government, meanwhile, announced it had begun deliberations on whether to ban the Brotherhood, a long-outlawed organization that swept to power in the country's first democratic elections a year ago.

Such a ban — which authorities say is rooted in the group's use of violence — would be a repeat to the decades-long power struggle between the state and the Brotherhood.

For more than a month since the July 3 military overthrow of Morsi, Brotherhood members and supporters have attacked and torched scores of police stations and churches, in retaliation. Shops and houses of Christians have also been targeted.

Such attacks spurred widespread public anger against the Brotherhood, giving the military-backed government popular backing to step up its campaign against the Islamist group.

Egypt: Islamists hit Christian churches

CAIRO — After torching a Franciscan school, Islamists paraded three nuns on the streets like "prisoners of war" before a Muslim woman offered them refuge. Two other women working at the school were sexually harassed and abused as they fought their way through a mob.

In the four days since security forces cleared two sit-in camps by supporters of Egypt's ousted president, Islamists have attacked dozens of Coptic churches along with homes and businesses owned by the Christian minority. The campaign of intimidation appears to be a warning to Christians outside Cairo to stand down

from political activism.

Christians have long suffered from discrimination and violence in Muslim majority Egypt, where they make up 10 percent of the population of 90 million. Attacks increased after the Islamists rose to power in the wake of the 2011 Arab Spring uprising that drove Hosni Mubarak from power, emboldening extremists. But Christians have come further under fire since President Mohammed Morsi was ousted July 3, sparking a wave of Islamist anger led by Morsi's Muslim Brotherhood.

Nearly 40 churches have been looted and torched, while 23 others have been attacked and heavily dam-

aged since Wednesday, when chaos erupted after Egypt's military-backed interim administration moved in to clear two camps packed with protesters calling for Morsi's reinstatement. They killed scores of protesters and sparked deadly clashes nationwide.

One of the world's oldest Christian communities has generally kept a low profile, but has become more politically active since Mubarak was ousted and Christians sought to ensure fair treatment in the aftermath.

Many Morsi supporters said Christians played a disproportionately large role in the days of mass rallies, with millions demanding that he step down ahead of the coup.

Despite the violence, Egypt's Coptic Christian church renewed its commitment to the new political order Friday, saying in a statement that it stood by the army and the police in their fight against "the armed violent groups and black terrorism."

While the Christians of Egypt have endured attacks by extremists, they have drawn closer to moderate Muslims in some places, in a rare show of solidarity.

Hundreds from both communities thronged two monasteries in the province of Bani Suef south of Cairo to thwart what they had expected to be imminent attacks on Saturday, local activist Girgis Waheeb said.

for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) — diabetes is a scourge of eyesight here.

Double helping of data

More than 150,000 West Virginians have been diagnosed with type 2 diabetes, according to the CDC. Of that number, 38,000 are dealing with diabetic retinopathy, a byproduct of diabetes that chokes off blood vessels to the eye, resulting in legal blindness or blindness altogether. But there is medical and metaphorical light at the end of tunnel, Raju said, for those patients on course with the disease. "If you can catch diabetes early and monitor it," he said, "only less than 10 percent of its sufferers will ever have a problem." That's any medical problem, he said, and that's the focus of the study — even if he is looking at it through the eyes of an ophthalmologist. The study will look at the fortunes of 50 diabetics and pre-diabetics who will take on a health regimen with disciplined diets and doses of physical fitness. It's a zoom-lens in reverse, Raju said. You start out small, and then pull back for the larger vista. Dr. Ranjita Misra likes that approach, too. She directs the public health practice program in WVU's School of Public Health. Like Raju, she hails from India, and, like him, has provided humanitarian medical services in her home country. She's also done similar diabetes screening and prevention studies among rural communities across the American southwest, including Texas. She's done the same up and down Mexico. Medically speaking, she said, the more things are different, the more they literally are the same, as far as diabetics go. Especially pre-diabetics, she said.

Going back for seconds

While the study here will be clinical, it will also touch on emotions and conditioned responses. "What I know from that is that people are people," she said, of her research. "Ninety-percent of people who smoke know that cigarettes are bad for them, but they do it anyway, because it feels good." Andrea McCarty can tell you about that, too. She's a dietician and diabetes educator at Mon

General who grew up in northeastern Kentucky. She has family in West Virginia's southern coalfields, where diabetes is prevalent. In Logan County, 15 percent of the 37,000 residents have diabetes, according to the CDC. The county is home to 37 fast-food restaurants. Raju: "And the local Walmart sells more snack cakes than any other Walmart in the world." Enter the sociological side of the study. Is it poverty, or a pre-disposition to making unhealthy dietary choices? Might be a little bit of both, McCarty said. "We're not as poor as people think we are," she said. "But there is unemployment, and that means stress. When we're stressed, we go for the comfort food. We eat what we know." However, Raju said, you can't pin it all on Appalachia or poverty. "I've seen poverty in a lot of countries," he said, "and it isn't the lone factor for diabetes." More than 100 million people from all levels of income strata in the U.S. have diabetes or pre-diabetes, he said, with a prognosis as loaded as a double-fudge sundae for dessert. "By 2050, if the current trends continue, one in three adults in the United States will have diabetes," he said.

Recipe for responsibility

So, where do you start? By charting the food-fortunes, and offering positive reinforcement, for 50 people across Monongalia and Preston counties under the shadow of diabetes, his School of Public Health colleague said. "As a practitioner and researcher, I look at the things we can change," Misra said, "and that's diet. Fast-food is so convenient. Instead of spending \$2 or \$3 on a burger, is there a healthier alternative?" How about, she suggests, whole grain over white bread? Fiber, over empty calories. Vegetables. Just because they really are good for you. "We want people to start thinking long-term," she said. "We want them to start thinking about their risk factors." Raju wants the test subjects to feast on a full meal of empowerment. "People are going to have positive results," he said. "They're going to be encouraged, and emboldened, because they'll be taking responsibility for themselves. We are going to help each other."

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Provost sees web courses' opportunity

WVU Provost Michele Wheatly is not given to hyperbole. So when she calls massive open online courses (MOOCs) "the most exciting academic innovation in 30 years," colleagues and campus communities should take notice.

"There is a lot of hype surrounding MOOCs," Wheatly said, "both negative and positive. But what I'm thrilled about is that their advent has stimulated a serious discussion about the science of learning."

When Wheatly organized a panel for chief academic officers from the Association of Public and Land-grant Universities (APLU) this summer on the MOOC phenomenon, she thought it was time to adopt a proactive stance and redirect the conversation toward strategies for on-line course development that would improve student learning.

"The MOOC conversation has really galvanized higher ed, largely because it threatens the existing financial model upon which universities have been constructed, namely that the student pays to take a course and the university certifies student learning," she said.

Massive open online courses are offered by companies, universities and media directly to the public without entry requirements. Wheatly characterized them as the higher education equivalent of public libraries, where anyone with access can browse and read books.

Traditional institutions are not currently conferring credit to students who complete MOOCs. Nonetheless, 2012 saw the founding of three national MOOC providers — edX, Coursera and Udacity — and the *New York Times* called 2012 "The Year of the MOOC."

At the APLU panel last month, Wheatly and her co-presenters (Joe Glover, University of Florida; Karen Hanson, University of Minnesota; and Michael Tanner, of APLU, urged rational, evidence-based use of online delivery to improve post-secondary education. One presenter intentionally delivered his entire presentation without using the term "MOOC," effectively making the point about the need to see beyond the hype the term has generated.

Wheatly showcased the establishment of the office of academic innovation at WVU, which strategizes a variety of online educational tools and works with businesses developing intelligent systems for online curriculum delivery.

All four APLU panel speakers cautioned against taking extreme stances — either jumping on the MOOC bandwagon or refusing to enter the conversation at all.

Instead, they all agreed that MOOCs will become an important tool for higher education providers.

"The conversation about MOOCs has re-focused higher education on how technology can improve student learning and engage non-traditional learners," Wheatly said. "Via well-constructed online delivery, students can interact with intelligent software, providing valuable data on how they learn and what concepts they struggle to understand. The possibilities are really astonishing."

Alumnus establishes travel fund

"Professor Monahan, a specialist in French history, is aware that it is crucial for students studying European history to conduct dissertation research in Europe, and his generosity will enhance the success of many future students," Fones-Wolf said.

Monahan's donation creates a lasting legacy that eases the fi-

nancial burden for high-achieving students who need to take their research abroad. For almost three decades, Monahan taught history at Eastern Oregon University. Now, his lifelong achievements and devotion to higher education will have a longstanding impact at two institutions.

"None of this would have been possible without that marvelous group of people in Morgantown," Monahan said. "It is a department — and a university — I shall always hold dear to my

heart. This gift is an utterly inadequate way of saying thanks."

Amanda Dymacek, associate director of development, said support for graduate education is perfectly timed as the Eberly College works through its 2020 Strategic Plan for the Future to enrich graduate student learning and increase graduate student enrollment.

"This gift will support a student whose research will increase the prestige of the Department and College, in both America and Europe," she said.

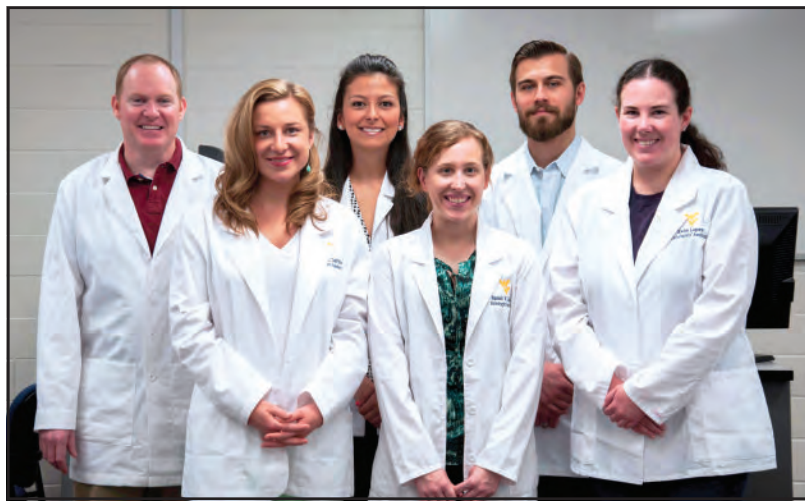

PA students are eligible to take the ASCP certification exam for pathologists' assistants.

WVU has a 100 percent pass rate for all graduates taking the exam on their first attempt, and a 100 percent job placement rate within one month of graduation.

A pathologists' assistant provides various services under the direction and supervision of a pathologist. They are similar to physician's assistants in surgical and medical practice, carrying out their duties under the direction of their physicians.

Sackett wants to build on strong freshman year

HANNAH SACKETT WAS LIKE most freshmen a year ago on the eve of the first day of WVU's fall semester — excited but also more than a little apprehensive about the road ahead.

The WVU volleyball recruit was a long way from her Somers, Mont., hometown for the first time in her life and feeling the pressure to live up to the athletic scholarship head coach **Jill Kramer** had bestowed on her.

"I was so worried," said Sackett, a 6-foot outside hitter. "I just didn't want to let the team down. I came in feeling I wasn't as confident as I should have been."

She knew Montana wasn't viewed as a hotbed for collegiate volleyball talent, once opining that "there are more cows in Montana than people."

Cows don't play volleyball. It turned out that Sackett could.

She was one of five freshmen who received a trying baptism into the Division I ranks. An exceedingly young Mountaineers team — with only one senior — embarked on its first season in the rugged Big 12, which produced national champion Texas at NCAA tournament's end.

The results were predictable: An 8-22 overall record and an 0-16 mark in the Big 12.

Sackett stood out as a shining light, leading the team with 267 kills and 29 service aces. She learned a lot about playing volleyball at the highest level and her knowledge tripled between August and the end of the season in early December.

"I think one thing that maybe I didn't know was just how fantastic our competition was," Sackett said. "I've never played against this caliber of opponent. That was something I knew was coming but wasn't sure what it was."

There are no easy nights in the Big 12, not with the likes of Texas, Iowa State and Kansas on the schedule twice.

The losing wasn't much fun for Sackett and her teammates, but she came to embrace the level of competition as the season progressed.

"It was really fun playing teams like that," she said. "It was amazing. It helps you work on your technique so much. If you're not in the right position and making the right moves, it's not happening."

"I thought last year I was going to walk onto the floor at Texas and be scared because they've got some huge outside hitters who are going to crush the ball on us. It wasn't scary at all. It was awesome. It's like, 'Bring it on! Hit it as hard as you can right at my face!' That was really cool."

Being in a position to take another crack at the Longhorns and the rest of the Big 12 has motivated Sackett to work on her game this summer. Kramer has emphasized that nobody has a starting spot locked up.

Those jobs are being earned this month in preseason camp.

Whether she's a starter or not, Sackett wants to pile up a whole lot more wins this season. The Mountaineers have already been picked to finish last in the Big 12 preseason coaches' poll.

They know that's the way it's going to be until they demonstrate they are capable of winning matches in the league.

"I know all the returners want to work harder than they did last year, which is going to be tough because we really worked hard last year," Sackett said. "It's a challenge to put a number on how many matches we'll win. It's like trying to guess what the score of a single match is going to be. I think we're all just so excited to already be in a better position than we were last year. I'm stoked to see what we do this season."

Patterson looking for a unique defense

Wants something hard to block but easy to learn

Whether it is or isn't, first-year WVU defensive coordinator Keith Patterson does not know, but his goal is to develop the Mountaineers' defense into one that is unlike any other found in the Big 12 Conference.

"If a team's got Tuesday,

Wednesday and Thursday to prepare for us, they got a lot of different things to prepare for," Patterson said of his hopes for WVU's 3-4 defense this season.

"I don't want to be like anybody else. That's everything that I do. I don't want it to be like anyone else. I want it to be unique. We describe it to [our players], as we want it to be unique."

Patterson, who has been a defensive coordinator at Pitt and

Tulsa, has been guarded to discuss many specifics about his defensive philosophies. It's multiple, in that it can morph into a 4-3 and 3-3-5.

Patterson said his defensive philosophies started with the 3-3-5 scheme Jeff Casteel ran at WVU from 2002-'11. It's morphed and adapted over the years, and Patterson explains he wants a defense that is simple for his players to understand but looks confusing to outsiders, particularly fast-paced, spread offenses found in the Big 12.

"Things make it look complex, (so) that we can put doubt in the mind of an offense. It looks this, but is it really that?" Pat-

erson said.

To accomplish that mission, Patterson said he and his staff have come up with a variety of terms to communicate play calls. The Mountaineers will use a variety of NBA and NFL mascot names, cities and animals as play calls. One word means one thing to a defensive lineman, another thing to a linebacker and something entirely different to a cornerback or safety.

He hopes that makes it easy for players to understand and difficult for opponents to read. Patterson said WVU probably has 20 defensive coverages and yet three concepts within the

After some early jitters and miscommunication up front left the Hawks scoreless on their first possession, the defense got UHS on the right track.

Senior safety Jack Armstrong gave Keyser fits, highlighted by his fourth-play 70-yard interception return for

The Hawks settled in on

their second drive, when backup quarterback Jeremy Eckels led them on a 10-play, 80-yard scoring drive.

Lengthy tight end Tony Richardson extended his whole 6-foot-3 frame to coral the first UHS touchdown of the season, a 27-yard pass into the front of the end zone from Eckels.

"The first couple plays, I was actually pretty nervous, not going to lie," Richardson said. "But once I caught that first touchdown, I was good. I was ready just to play the rest of the

Holgs mum on QB

WVU camp ends without starter being named

WVU head football coach Dana Holgorsen said he expected to make a decision regarding the team's starting quarterback for the season by the time the Mountaineers concluded fall camp, on Saturday.

But Saturday's self-imposed deadline passed without an announcement, and WVU offensive coordinator Shannon Dawson confirmed to *The Dominion Post* that no decision has been made.

"We're close to figuring it out," Holgorsen said Thursday. "I anticipate that by the end of practice on Saturday being 100 percent sure of the direction we're going to go in."

Holgorsen is deciding among three quarterbacks: Juniors Paul Millard and Clint Trickett, and redshirt freshman Ford Childress. Millard served as then-WVU quarterback Geno Smith's backup during the 2011 and 2012 seasons and, during his career, has completed 16 passes for 211 yards with three touchdowns and three interceptions. Trickett transferred to WVU from Florida State in May. He made two starts for the Seminoles, both as a freshman, and has completed 66 passes for 947 yards with seven touchdowns and four picks.

Trickett appeared to be in position to win the job earlier in the week. He worked with the Mountaineers' first-team offense during the media portions of practice Monday and Thursday. WVU opens the regular season against William & Mary, on Aug. 31.

Messages left for Holgorsen were not returned in time for this report.

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Huh, Reed share lead at Wyndham

GREENSBORO, N.C. — John Huh refused to let tough conditions and one terrible hole get him down.

He was rewarded with a share of the lead at the Wyndham Championship.

The PGA Tour's reigning rookie of the year shot an even-par 70 on Saturday and joined Patrick Reed atop the field after a soggy third round. Huh and Reed, the second-round leader who shot a 71, were at 10-under 200.

Huh shook off a triple bogey on his second hole, making up for it with three birdies in a four-hole stretch of the back nine.

"Since the rain picked it up this morning, it wasn't easy for us to play out there, but I told myself, 'Be patient, stay dry and keep grinding out there,'" Huh said.

Zach Johnson had the day's best round — a 66 — and was one stroke back along with Bob Estes and John Deere winner Jordan Spieth. Estes shot 68, and Spieth had a 70.

Eight players were within two shots of the lead.

"It's a Monday qualifier," Reed said. "I had a lot of success at Monday qualifiers, and that's basically what it is. I let everybody back in the field and to now, all of a sudden to have it as bunched as it is, it's going to be whoever can make as many birdies as possible tomorrow and shoot a low number."

Solheim Cup

PARKER, Colo. — Instead of seeing their lead disappear at the Solheim Cup, the Europeans saw it only cut in half.

They owed their slender advantage to a hole-in-one by Anna Nordqvist and a half-point from out of nowhere.

Nordqvist crashed a 7-iron on the 175-yard 17th into the pin, then the hole, to give Europe its only win in Saturday morning's alternate-shot matches. It was the highlight of a top-sy-turvy stretch of golf on the back nine that ended with Europe holding a 6 1/2-5 1/2 lead over the United States.

"It was just an unbelievable shot," Nordqvist said after she and Caroline Hedwall beat Jessica Korda and Morgan Pressel 2 and 1. "It was the right shot at the right time."

Pressel, who watched her dreams of a U.S. Open title disappear in 2005 when Birdie Kim holed out from a greenside bunker up the road at Cherry Hills, saw another one slip away cruelly in Colorado.

The Americans were feeling the same way in the day's third match after letting a half-point get away.

Brittany Lincicome missed a short putt on No. 17 that would have clinched a win against Caroline Masson and Catriona Matthew. Moving to No. 18, Matthew holed a 6-footer for birdie to pull into a tie with Lincicome and Lizette Salas, who had led since the second hole but couldn't close it out.

"I feel like I was not putting good," Lincicome said. "We had so many chances and Lizette played so good today, and just a couple of 5-footers that needed to go in just didn't."

Alabama tops AP poll again

NEW YORK — Alabama will begin this season the way it ended the last two — No. 1.

Nick Saban's two-time defending national champions are top-ranked in The Associated Press preseason college football poll, with the Crimson Tide trying to become the first team to win three straight national titles.

Much like the BCS championship game against Notre Dame, the vote was an Alabama landslide. The Tide received 58 of 60 first-place votes from the media panel Saturday to easily outdistance No. 2 Ohio State. Alabama matched Florida in 2009 for the highest percentage of first-place votes received in the 63-year history of the preseason rankings.

The Buckeyes received one first-place vote.

Oregon is No. 3, followed by Stanford and Georgia, which received the other first-place vote.

Notre Dame, coming off a 42-14 loss in the BCS championship game to Alabama, is No. 14.

Alabama won its record ninth AP national championship last season, third BCS title in the last four years under Saban, and became the first team to win back-to-back BCS championships.

The Tide is AP preseason No. 1 for the fourth time, and first since 2010. Alabama was ranked No. 2 in the preseason poll each of the last two seasons. The only time has Alabama started and finished No. 1 was 1978, when Bear Bryant led the Crimson Tide to the fourth of its five national championships with him as coach.

Now Saban's Tide is trying to accomplish something Bear's boys never

could. Twice Alabama won back-to-back championships under Bryant, but couldn't get the third.

Saban is hoping senior stars such as quarterback AJ McCarron, linebacker C.J. Mosley, defensive end Ed Stinson and guard Anthony Steen have enough memories of what went wrong for the 2010 Alabama team to avoid it hap-

pening in 2013.

"You're in a position here where we have a lot of players that really haven't lost much," Saban said earlier this week. "They have to really want to be good for the sake of being good."

Alabama is 49-5 over the past four seasons, with three of those losses coming in '10.

Roby, Smith to sit out at least Ohio State opener

COLUMBUS, Ohio — Hours after it was ranked No. 2 in the preseason poll by The Associated Press, Ohio State suspended two more of its top players.

Coach Urban Meyer said Saturday that cornerback Bradley Roby and running back Rod Smith

will sit out the Aug. 31 opener against Buffalo.

That now makes three starters, including leading scorer Carlos Hyde, who have been disciplined this summer and will miss at least the first game.

Roby was punished, because of his arrest in July on misdemeanor charges of assaulting a bar bouncer

in Bloomington, Ind.

"I don't think it's done yet," Meyer said of the case against Roby. "He'll be suspended one game just because there's an issue."

The prosecutor has offered Roby the chance to enter a pretrial diversion program that could result in the charge being dismissed. Meyer said even if

the charge is dismissed, Roby will sit out — and could face further punishment from the team.

"He was there and he shouldn't have been there. It won't change," he said. "Will he play the first game? No."

Roby has been working out with the second team, not the starters, even

though he is one of the top cornerbacks in the Big Ten. He considered entering the NFL draft after his redshirt sophomore season last year.

Smith, a senior, was suspended for the Buffalo game because of an undisclosed violation of team rules last winter.

It was Dixon's second key block of the drive, as his third-down hit four plays earlier allowed the Hawks to move the chains on a 10-yard run by Renner.

"When I heard he was

coming out, I got a big smile because I know he can make plays," Kelley said of Dixon. "What I was happy about today was the big play was a block. Those are the kind of things I want every kid on the team to see because that is a contribution. Maybe I didn't get the ball, but at least I'm going to contribute to making a big play, and he spun it really."

Michael Ramsey ruined the next Keyser possession when he took an interception 47 yards, after teammate Stratton Spirou tipped the pass away from the intended receiver.

When the Golden Tornado received the ball back under scrimmage rules, junior lineman Matt Minard returned it to the Hawks by recovering a fumble.

Then, UHS freshman quarterback Geoff Hamperian got in on the action with a 41-yard touchdown

pass to sophomore Kaleb Jennings, giving the Hawks an 18-0 lead and it was mostly freshmen on the field from there.

"I definitely was really happy for the way Isaiah Utt played the most," Richardson said. "He looked like a man out there. I really think that he should get some minutes with us at varsity. He played very well and he runs very hard. Kaleb Jennings, as well. He had a

nice touchdown out there, and (freshman running back) Adam Frisco. Just good to see a lot of the younger players getting better because they've got to practice with us all the time and sometimes they might take a beating, but they definitely looked really good today."

Renner led the Hawks for two drives, and completed 7-of-15 passes for 106 yards, with the TD to Neville. Eckels completed 3-of-7 passes for 68 yards, including the TD pass to Richardson.

At receiver, Armstrong caught six passes, one with a one-handed diving catch, for 78 yards. Richardson also made one more 33-yard reception earlier in his scoring drive.

"The big plus today was our people in space are going to be awfully hard to slow down," Kelley said.

Senior first-team all-state kicker Billy Kinney was on the sidelines in street clothes, with a sprained or strained ankle. Kinney said his status is day-to-day, but the injury occurred about four weeks ago and he does not seem to be improving.

have tackles who have never played and don't have experience, you're going to see some defensive ends and linebackers flying off the edge that's kind of scary," Crook said. "Even though those guys have experience, we keep them where they have experience and keep them out there where they can protect the quarterback."

And that's also led to moving Tyler Orlosky from guard to potentially starting center. WVU head coach Dana Holgorsen said Orlosky had the edge on the starting job last week, and he practiced with the first-team unit during the portions of practice open to media.

"Once you have the coach's confidence, you

just have to take that for what it is and keep going with it," said Orlosky, who was coached by former WVU center Pat Conachan at St. Edward (Cleveland) High School. "If they trust you enough to give you the ball ... you've got to take advantage of that trust."

Other than receiving a few practice tips from Conachan, Orlosky had rarely touched the ball before this spring. A lifelong guard, Orlosky has quickly realized the center position is his future.

He's trying to fill the void left by Joe Madsen, who was moved from guard to center during his Mountaineers' career. In time, Madsen, who is trying to earn a spot in the NFL, realized the switch was not only best for the

team, but also for him.

Orlosky has the same idea in mind.

"I think I've gotten to the point

where I feel comfortable with center and it seems that is where I am going to be at the rest of my college career," Orlosky said.

That's not to insinuate Orlosky has the new job down pat. Crook said Orlosky is still "learning the ins and outs of the position," while the art of snapping is one that requires repeated practice.

"It's a work in

progress," Orlosky said. "It's tough and you have to focus on it. Muscle memory has to kick in. You do it a couple hundred times and you realize you can't think about it, but just let your body take over and let your body do it for you."

As far as how that process is going, Orlosky said he still needs a "couple hundred more snaps before the muscle memory kicks in." Still, the center position is vital to an offense's success, and Crook likes what he has seen in Orlosky.

"Really, you've got to find a guy who understands the offense," Crook said of what he looks for in a center. "He's got to have an intelligence level from a football perspective. He's got to be able to talk and communicate and not be

afraid to step up and say, 'Hey, this is the call and this is what we're doing.' Sometimes it might be the wrong call, but you've at least got to get everyone moving in the same direction."

Junior-college transfer Mark Glowinski and redshirt sophomore Marquis Lucas repped with the first-team offense at the guard positions during open portions of practice this past week, and Orlosky thinks the trio is ready for the job, come Aug. 31 against William & Mary.

"It's going to be different," Orlosky said of what that first game will be like. "I am going to have to rely on the other offensive linemen to help me make my calls and just make sure I get that ball to the quarterback."

"See those little offensive guys over there? See Sticks?" Cook said of WVU receiver Ivan McCartney during a recent interview session inside the Puskas Center. "I just want to smash him right now.

That's just how I feel every practice. We ain't got Stedman (Bailey) or Tavon (Austin) where we can't hit them, so we're going to take advantage. Everybody can get hit. Everybody."

Memory loss?

After one season, WVU linebacker Doug Rigg admits the Big 12 is as fast-paced a conference as it was billed to be.

"Honestly I don't even remember the game — that's how fast they were moving," Rigg said of Baylor, which WVU beat 70-63. "I would have to watch it on film (to remember), that's how fast they were moving."

"Oklahoma, right after the game ended, I couldn't even remember plays. I had to watch film. Those (two) guys were fastest."

Allmendinger hangs on, at Mid-Ohio

LEXINGTON, Ohio — AJ Allmendinger led 73 of the 94 laps and survived a late challenge after a restart to win the inaugural NASCAR Nationwide Series race at Mid-Ohio Sports Car Course.

Allmendinger improved his record to 2 for 2 this year in the Nationwide Series, adding a victory to the one he picked up for Penske Racing in his only previous start at Road America.

The 31-year-old Allmendinger, rebounding after being suspended a year ago for failing a random drug test, took the lead for good on the 64th lap, then had to weather a late sprint when a car spun out just before his final lap on the twisting road course.

Pole-winner Michael McDowell was second, with native Ohioan Sam Hornish Jr. third, Max Papis fourth and Brian Vickers fifth.

Hornish took over the season points lead, 13 points ahead of Elliott Sadler.

The race was plagued by spin-outs and fender benders.

The last one almost changed the outcome.

With everyone racing to the finish and Allmendinger's Discount Tire Ford comfortably ahead of McDowell by a couple of seconds, the car driven by Kenny Habul spun out on Turn 11. Out came the yellow flag, with Allmendinger and most of the other leaders having to conserve fuel to prevent running out before the re-start.

When the pace car finally pulled off, Allmendinger sped away to the lead and held it throughout the final lap to take the checkered flag.

Johnson forced to go to backup car

Wrecked first car in practice run

BROOKLYN, Mich. — Another Michigan mishap for Jimmie Johnson.

The five-time Sprint Cup champion crashed nose first into a wall in his No. 48 Chevrolet during a practice session Saturday. Johnson was evaluated and released from the infield care center, but the accident forced his team to prepare a backup car — and now he faces quite a challenge trying to win a Cup race at Michigan International Speedway for the first time.

"I'm a little puzzled as to why I spun out going in because I've had great entry stability — even on that

run I had great entry stability," Johnson said. "To me it felt like I lost downforce just from the traffic scenario. I'm not really sure — either way we have a torn up car."

Johnson qualified third Friday, but he'll have to start from the rear now with the backup car.

Johnson is one driver who could afford a problem like this. He's won four times this season, leads the standings by a whopping 75 points and has already wrapped up a spot in the Chase for the Sprint Cup.

But Johnson is plenty motivated this weekend. MIS is one of only five tracks on the Cup schedule where he has never won. He's 0 for 23 in Cup races in the Irish Hills.

"Yeah, I do pay attention to the tracks I haven't won at," Johnson said. "It's more on the front side go-

ing to the event and building excitement about racing at the track and wanting to win. When the race starts, it doesn't go through my mind at that point."

Johnson has come close at Michigan. In August of 2011, he finished a solid second. The following June, he was fifth.

Last August, he had to start from the back because of an engine switch. He was leading the race anyway with under 10 laps to go, but his engine faltered.

Earlier this year, Johnson smacked the wall in the final laps at Michigan. He was trying to chase down eventual winner Greg Biffle, but a tire gave way and he dropped all the way to 28th.

"We've been so close that it certainly enters my mind at that point," Johnson said. "I've worked real hard on my driving style to get better fuel mileage

here. It seems like we've covered that gap, but we've had a mechanical or two. We blew a tire this last spring when we were here. So, there have been a lot of reasons why, but I really look forward to the day I'm able to pull into Victory Lane over here."

Chicagoland, Homestead, Watkins Glen and Kentucky are the other tracks on this year's series schedule where Johnson hasn't won a Cup race — and he has no more than a dozen starts at any of those other venues.

MIS repaved its track before its 2012 Cup races, and speeds have soared. Joey Logano qualified first Friday at 203.949 mph, the ninth-fastest speed by a pole winner in NASCAR history.

"You've got to maintain track position," Johnson said. "I think the secret to winning here really falls into the hands of the en-

gineer and the crew chief in what decisions they make late in the race to maintain track position. I think that's where the key is. For the driver, when you're out there practicing, you're going so fast around here and you're usually running by yourself, that it's easy to set the car up to run in clean air. And you don't always get that luxury."

Saturday's crash added some adversity. Afterward, Johnson still wasn't sure why his car spun out of control.

"We are trying to figure out what really happened because I had no sign of loose and certainly spun out and crashed," he said. "Loose was not in the characteristics of the car, and then I end up spinning out and going in. It would be nice to figure out why so we know."

Isner rallies for Cincinnati upset of del Potro

MASON, Ohio — John Isner's absence from the ATP top 20 will be brief.

The 6-foot-10 American made sure of that Saturday, rallying to beat seventh-seeded Juan Martin del Potro 6-7 (4), 7-6 (9), 6-3 in a grueling Western & Southern Open semifinal.

Isner, who fell from No. 20 to 22 this week, will return to the top 20 after a stimulating Cincinnati run that includes beating three straight top-10 players for the first time in his career while earning his second Masters 1000 series finals appearance and first in Cincinnati. His previous Masters 1000 final appearance was at Indian

"It's awesome to be at this stage again," said Isner, who beat top-ranked Novak Djokovic in the quarterfinals and No. 8 Richard Gasquet in the

second round. "I've been playing pretty well this season, but this tournament is where I've really started to put it all together. I'm playing pretty well in all facets of the game."

Isner, in his first appearance in the tournament's semifinals, had been 0-4 against the Argentine. He'll play third-seeded Rafael Nadal, who overcame sixth-seeded Tomas Berdych, 7-5, 7-6 (4) in the other semifinal to reach the tournament final for the first time in his fifth appearance.

Nadal extended his personal winning streak against the Czech to 14 matches while improving his overall season record 52-3.

Isner needed 2 hours, 47 minutes to improve to 16-3 since retiring from Wimbledon in the second round because of a left knee injury. He finished off the win when del Potro sent a backhand from the baseline into the net.

Despite tossing into a persistent swirling breeze

and bright sunshine, both players served so effectively early that the first set included just one break point, fought off by the 22nd-ranked Isner. The 6-foot-6 Del Potro came up with a crucial mini-break on the 11th point of the tiebreaker when Isner sailed his backhand volley wide to lose the set.

Del Potro broke Isner in the eighth game of the second set to put himself into position to serve for the match, but he double-faulted on match point and Isner came up with his own break to stay alive and eventually force a tiebreak that he won when del Potro sent a forehand wide to the deuce court.

"I think I lost the match in the second set," del Potro said. "That was my chance to beat him."

Hermaphrodite deer and ones that have Bullwinkle Syndrome

LAST WEEK, A FRIEND from Pennsylvania told me about a deer he saw that was blind and had a large, wide snout. He asked if I'd ever heard of such a thing and I told him I hadn't, but would try to find out about it.

A quick call to **Dr. Jim Crum**, a West Virginia Division of Natural Resources (DNR) deer biologist, got me the answer.

He said it was probably Bullwinkle Syndrome because the snout was so wide, like that of a moose. I told him the eyes bulged out of the sockets and appeared to be closed. He said that is often part of it.

They think this syndrome is caused by a bacterial infection. It's also been associated with the deer feeders where deer stick their mouths in to eat.

This disease is being tracked by the Southeastern Cooperative Wildlife Disease Study at the University of Georgia. It has been seen across the South and as far north as Delaware. So far, it's only affected a few deer, and they don't think it will have any grave impacts on overall herd health.

However, they want to know more. If you shoot one that looks like this, take it to the DNR for tissue sampling. Do not freeze the head before sampling. Then mount it. Can you imagine the comments you'll get?

Another interesting phenomenon is hermaphrodite deer. A true hermaphrodite has both male and female sex organs. Relatively few studies have been done on this. The earliest reference is at Bryn Mawr College, in Pennsylvania. A tag on an antler says that it came from a doe killed in New England in 1607.

A four-year study in Pennsylvania (1958-'61) revealed 31 antlered does among the 162,000 bucks killed during that time were that way. This doesn't seem like very many deer to be taken over four years, but remember, there weren't the number of deer then that there are now.

Seventeen of these were functional females, four were males with undescended testes in the intra-abdominal fat, one was a true hermaphrodite, one had an adrenal-type tumor, and eight couldn't be classified with the material available. Of the 31, 25 still had their antlers in velvet. The remaining six had polished antlers; that is normal for that time of year.

The four animals with undescended testes were classified as cryptorchid males. They lacked a scrotum, but had the external genitalia of a female. All had urethras of the male type. The testes of three of them were small and showed no signs of being able to produce sperm. The fourth one had large testes and the tubules contained what appeared to be mature sperm. These four also had polished antlers.

The true hermaphrodite had both gonads, an ovary with ova, but no corpora lutea, and separate testes with inactive tubules. Its antlers were in velvet.

It appears that the antlered females have an excess of male hormones when young. In normal males, after the initial shot of hormones, the hypophysis takes over and the velvet that produces the growth of the antlers is controlled by it. When the testicular hormone level increases near the mating season, the hypophyseal action is inhibited and the velvet dies. The buck then shines its antlers on trees and branches. However, the antlered females have no testes.

Without the surge of testicular hormones, the antlers remain in velvet.

This "he-she" phenomenon is not limited to just deer. It has been identified in more than 470 species of animals.

Trophy fish, big bucks are wanted for display

If you have a legally harvested and mounted West Virginia big buck trophy, or a trophy fish caught from West Virginia waters, it's wanted for a display at West Virginia's Celebration of National Hunting and Fishing Day, Sept. 28-29, at Stonewall Resort State Park, near Weston.

The West Virginia Wildlife Federation, the West Virginia Division of Natural Resources (DNR) and Toyota are seeking hunters who own trophy white-tailed bucks that were legally taken with either bow or gun and have a Pope & Young or Boone and Crockett score of 150 or greater. They also seek fish that qualified for a trophy fish citation under DNR guidelines.

Participation for bucks will be limited to 30. Hunters who display their trophy deer will be entered into a prize drawing.

Seasons set for birds

West Virginia's hunting season dates and bag limits for mourning dove, woodcock, common snipe and Sora and Virginia rails have been set, according to the DNR:

Mourning dove: Sept. 2-Oct. 5, Oct. 21-Nov. 9 and Dec. 23-Jan. 4. Daily limit: 15. Possession limit: 45.

Woodcock: Oct. 12-Nov. 25. Daily limit: Three. Possession limit: Nine.

Common snipe: Sept. 2-Dec. 7. Daily limit: Eight. Possession limit: 16.

Sora and Virginia rails: Sept. 2-Nov. 2. Daily limit: 25. Possession limit: 25.

Shooting hours for dove are from noon to sunset Sept. 2 and from one-half hour before sunrise until sunset for the remainder of the season. Shooting hours for rails, woodcock and snipe are from one-half hour before sunrise until sunset.

Dove hunting is available throughout West Virginia, but dove numbers are typically higher near agricultural areas. A recently harvested grain field with water nearby is always a good bet for dove hunting.

All licensed migratory bird hunters, including lifetime license holders and senior citizens, must also have a valid Migratory Bird Harvest Information Program (HIP) registration card, available free at DNR offices and all license agents.

Hunters may not hunt migratory birds with a shotgun capable of holding more than three shells unless the shotgun is "plugged" with a one-piece filler that can't be removed without disassembling the gun. Banded

birds should be reported by calling 1-800-327-2263 or online at reportband.gov.

West Virginia's 2013-2014 Migratory Bird Hunting Regulations brochure will be available at license agents, game check stations and DNR offices in late August, and online now wvdnr.gov.

Canada goose season

West Virginia's waterfowl seasons begin statewide Sept. 2, with the early Canada goose season. The early season will end Sept. 14. The season will also be open Oct. 1-26, Nov. 11-16, and Dec. 16-Jan. 31.

Shooting hours are one-half hour before sunrise until sunset. All other general waterfowl hunting regulations apply to the September season.

Hunters must possess a federal waterfowl stamp and a free Migratory Bird Harvest Information Program (HIP) registration card in addition to their regular hunting license. HIP cards are free and available from DNR offices and all hunting license agents.

Federal waterfowl stamps may be purchased with a credit card by calling 1-800-782-6724. Also, hunters who harvest a banded bird may call 1-800-327-2263 to report the bird and find out when and where it was banded. Banded birds may also be reported online at reportband.gov.

GO FISH! (W.VA. DNR)

Monongahela River

The river is above normal because of releases from Tygart Lake after the recent rains.

The best fishing is from 6-9 a.m. and 7-9 p.m. Fishing in the Morgantown tailwater is best on the Westover side at this river flow. The shoreline from the Morgantown lock to the mouth of Deckers Creek is always a good place to fish from the shore. This is also a good time for large catfish. Sauger and walleye usually begin feeding at dusk in the tailwaters. Jigs with minnows are always good baits, but 3-inch plastic grubs will also be productive. A good pattern for muskies is trolling with large crank baits. Cooler water temperatures for this time of year have increased success rates for muskies. The Uffington boat ramp was dredged recently, so it is now possible to launch trailered boats. You still have to lift the motor to get out to the river on the left side of Booths Creek.

Cheat Lake

The new Ices Ferry fishing and boating access site will not be closed during August. Pipeline construction will probably occur during September instead. The old bridge abutment on the opposite side of the lake can also be used by anglers. Channel catfish are doing well, and 2- to 3-pounders are abundant throughout the lake but concentrated in the river above Mont Chateau. Night crawlers or cut bait on a number 6 hook with a one-half to 1-ounce egg sinker cast into 10 to 20 feet of water will catch catfish. The best area for yellow perch is from the Sunset Beach Cove to the I-68 bridge. A good walleye stocking in 2010 and 2012 should be producing 13- to 20-inch fish. The embayments at Cheat Lake Park are good areas for bank fishermen to catch sunfish and largemouth bass.

Tygart Lake

The lake is 5 feet above the summer level. Fish for crappie in the fish shelters between the boat ramps at the marina. Look for schools of white bass breaking the surface throughout the lake. Use long casts with crank baits or jigs and 3-inch twister tails and follow the school as it moves around. Bass tournament success continues to be good. Smallmouth bass can be caught using crank baits or tube jigs along the shoreline and in the bushes. The tailwater temperature is 72 degrees. There are lots of trout and walleye in the tailwater. Walleye fishing is best during higher flows (1,500 to 5,000 cubic feet per second) and trout fishing is best at low flows (less than 1,000 cfs). Call 304-265-5953 for daily lake and tailwater conditions.

Stonecoal Lake

The lake is at summer pool. Fishing is good. Try early mornings and late evenings for the best action. Water temperatures are in the low 80s. Bass are being caught in and around cover. Bluegill and crappie are hitting live bait and jigs around beaver huts and fish attractors. A few channel catfish have been caught on worms. A few perch have been caught in the upper end on minnows.

Stonewall Jackson

The lake is at summer pool and clear. Fishing is good. Try early mornings and late evenings for the best action during the summer heat. Surface water temperature are in the low 80s. Before heading to the lake, call 304-269-7463.

FOIA may be the cure

WVU Medical Corp. doesn't just look like agency, it is one

You would think WVU Medical Corp. wouldn't need a doctor to tell it to wash its hands.

Or, in this case, a Circuit Court judge to tell it that it's a public agency.

WVU Medical Corp. (WVUMC), which does business as University Health Associates (UHA), has contested that status for decades to avoid complying with Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) requests.

Though a recent ruling was an unequivocal win for its cross-town rival, Mon General Hospital, the scope of this decision goes far beyond any institutional victory.

Far more importantly, Monongalia County Circuit Court Judge Phillip Gaujot's ruling is a resounding triumph for the public's right to know.

No, not to know private information about a private business; but rather to be informed or privy to knowledge about the affairs of a public entity, or in this case, an agency of an institution, WVU Hospitals.

Space here does not allow us to detail, again, the judge's line of thought behind his ruling. But few of us need little, if any, convincing that he could not have ruled otherwise, even if he was so inclined.

For instance, both WVU Hospitals and WVUMC share the same chief financial officer. WVUMC has also benefited from state-issued bonds and operates under bylaws that only can be amended with permission from WVU's president.

"WVUMC is operating for the state's direct benefit and/or at the state's specific behest," the judge wrote in his decision.

So if it looks like a state agency, bills and collects money like a state agency and sounds like a state agency, then it probably is a state agency.

We might add, if it employs obtuse arguments to avoid its responsibility and accountability, then it further stands to reason, it's a state agency.

And there are a lot more characteristics that can identify this duck. But what's more important now is what this ruling means. In a sentence, it means UHA's records are subject to state FOIA requests. This does not include access to its patient records and such, but to financial information and many other facts and figures.

As WVU Hospitals and WVUMC surely realize, this is the second time this court has reached the very same conclusion.

But it should not come as a surprise to anyone that this decision will be appealed again to the state Supreme Court, that may not hear it again.

But this "symbiotic relationship," as the judge referred to it, has not changed.

What has changed now is that a big dose of freedom of information has been prescribed for a state agency.

And that might just be the cure.

Truth about football

Facts about the gridiron's dangers improve even if perception doesn't

FOOTBALL PERIODICALLY faces extinction, but never has the game been enveloped in a crisis as odd as the current one. Just when the game plays safer than at any time in its 144-year history, its critics threaten to make the game history. Sportswriter Frank Deford calls football "barbarous." Author Malcolm Gladwell labels it a "dumb ... 19th century game." But it's that characterization that appears backward to anyone paying attention.

In 1905, when President Theodore Roosevelt intervened to help make the game he loved safer, more athletes died from on-field collisions on a single Saturday afternoon (three) than died from hits during all of the 2012 season (two). In 1968, a year of assassinations and bombings at home and peak casualties in the Vietnam War, football meshed with the violent times: An all-time high of 36 players were lost to col-

lision deaths at all levels of competition. The rough sport, which could boast just two seasons of single-digit contact deaths between 1931 and 1977, has since 1977 experienced just one season of double-digit collision deaths — in 1986, the birth year of today's average NFL player.

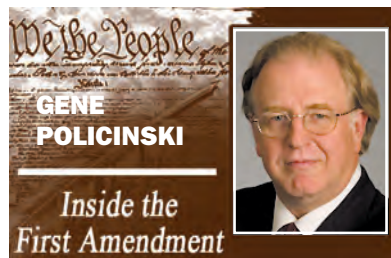
The dramatic reduction in fatalities should have caused football's boo-birds to cheer, or at least chirp. Relative to its past and the present of other pastimes, football looks quite good. For instance, California suffered seven times as many collision deaths from skateboarding last year as the entire

United States did from football.

Instead of putting football safety into perspective, the sport's critics have shifted the conversation to chronic traumatic encephalopathy, or CTE, a degenerative brain disease found in a number of deceased football players, including Hall of Famers John Mackey and Mike Webster.

Unlike fatality numbers, generalizations regarding CTE are just that. The absence of a randomized study on CTE leaves football's critics making sweeping assertions about the sport, though science can't yet pinpoint the prevalence or even the cause of the condition. It's irresponsible enough that pundits extrapolate autopsy findings from a few former pros to the entire NFL, but projecting the damage endured by a tiny fraction of athletes who toiled for years at elite levels onto youngsters who will never play beyond Pop Warner or high school competition goes be-

We all hold news media accountable

GIVEN THAT THE First Amendment precludes the government from being an actual "watchdog on news media," who else steps in to call the news media to account?

Increasingly it is citizen-critics or organizations outside of mainstream journalism, empowered by the Web's ability for two-way conversations and comments, and by independence from past restraints of expensive printing presses and broadcast machinery.

But there's one more approach, present in about 25 news organizations: An in-house public critic, the ombudsman. In various ways and formats, those ombudsmen — down from 40 such positions just a few years ago — tackle complaints, evaluate news-gathering and arbitrate claims of misreporting, distortion and even the absence of coverage.

Their very-public presence means correcting faults in public. Whistleblowers exist in many kinds of businesses, but rarely are they paid to operate in plain view from the start — which can result in some very-public spats.

Case in point: The current flap inside National Public Radio about a 2011 report critical of South Dakota's state-funded efforts that relocated what the report said was a surprisingly high number of Native American children into foster care. NPR ombudsman Edward Schumacher-Matos spent more than a year checking the report and found that it was "fundamentally flawed," according to a story posted on NPR's online news site.

The original NPR report said state authorities appeared to disregard the federal Indian Child Welfare Act, which favors placing Native American children with relatives or other Native American families before other options — and may have done so because of cultural bias and to gain increased federal aid to support such placements.

Both Schumacher-Matos and NPR News agree that figure isn't correct. But they disagree over the tone of some of the report, and whether state officials' views were properly represented. In the end, the ombudsman's 80-page critique may well be more significant for opining on a story missed or underreported than about factual errors.

NPR's management stands by the story's essentials, while conceding some mistakes. But, "I had a gnawing sense that the real issue was deeper than the story," Schumacher-Matos wrote.

The ombudsman wrote that "... the centrally relevant matter of child neglect is simply dismissed. That many of the foster decisions, meanwhile, are in fact made by the tribes' own independent judges goes unreported altogether. The crucial context of social ills and a crisis of Indian family breakdowns on the state's reservations are also all but missing."

Disagreements over the scope and focus of news reports are the daily stuff of news meetings and editor-correspondent discussion — but all of that generally takes place in private. The NPR situation affords a unique peek into the somewhat messy process of news-gathering and reporting.

Newsrooms have been battered by economic hardship and traditional audiences have been splintered by new ways of getting information. What's left to sustain a free press is a focus on credibility that surveys and polls say the public wants.

More news operations should provide for the kind of public follow-up and self-critique that NPR engaged in, both for the sake of accuracy and to sustain a free press. By holding itself accountable with the same vigor the media employs on others, we will have the credible "watchdog on government" that the Founders envisioned.

Health care on the river of no return

Health care costs are projected to total more than \$2.5 trillion in 2013. This is \$8,936 per individual citizen, and amounts to 17.6 percent of our Gross National Product.

The cost grows each year: By 3.9 percent a year from 2009 to 2011, and up to 4.3 percent in 2012. At this rate, it will be more than 25 percent of our GDP by 2025.

Health care in America is analogous to being on a boat in the Niagara River, heading for the falls, with most of the passengers unaware of what is about to happen. The “free market” capitalists of the medical insurance industry, the pharmaceutical industry, and the so-called “nonprofit” hospitals, which charge \$1.50 for one Tylenol tablet, along with a number of individual physicians, collectively believe that the unregulated, unrestricted “market” will always correct itself, and remain viable. It's true — it will correct itself, but only by imploding and utterly disintegrating.

This system is clearly non-sustainable, and even the “free marketers” know this, but refuse to admit it.

Our track record is nothing to be proud of. In one seven-year period, some 137,000 Americans are said to have died without any organized health care. The average cost on one hospital day in the United States is \$3,949, but the Germans pay only \$632, and the Swiss pay just \$690. The average American median income is \$26,000, but health care insurance premiums average \$15,000, and are predicted to reach \$32,000 by 2021.

The answer is inescapably obvious — as is found in one form or another in virtually every other modern nation in the world, including Canada, the United Kingdom, all the Scandinavian countries, Germany, France, Spain, Italy, Japan, South Korea, New Zealand, Australia, Taiwan and even Mexico — a government-controlled, single-payer system.

A system that totally eliminates the obscene profits of the medical insurance groups, strictly controls the price structure of the pharmaceutical companies, organizes health care providers into “accountable care organizations” or organized business groups of salaried providers, charges patients for total care packages, based on quality of care rather than fee-for-service, quantified by the number of patients seen.

Only in this manner can current escalating costs be stopped, obscene profits prevented and costs maintained at a minimal level, ensuring full availability of care for all citizens. This is not some carefully guarded secret, being kept away from the American public. It is the universally accepted means of providing — as a “right,” not a “privilege” — quality, affordable health care to all.

The dictionary defines a right as: That which is just, morally good, legal, proper, fitting and an advantage to which everyone is entitled. It defines a privilege as: A special advantage, permission or benefit granted to an individual, class or caste, which is not enjoyed by everyone.

You and I have the right to breathe clean air, free of toxins put there by others, and to drink clean, uncontaminated water — both necessities of life. Air that is cooled and dehumidified by an air conditioner, and water served with ice cubes and a lemon twist, are privileges.

Yes, I believe all of us have a “right” to health care — it is a necessity of life. Everyone knows that it is not free — it has to be paid for.

The current argument is about how much it should cost, who should pay for it, and how.

It does not have to lead to personal bankruptcy, as it has in as many as 500,000 cases in some recent years. It does not need to cost you and me an extra \$150 billion just for a profit margin for the private medical insurance companies, as it did in 2011. It does not need to cost another \$20 billion each year for the billing and collecting processes from the variety of insurance plans.

And it certainly should not deny this “right” to 49 million Americans who cannot afford the artificially inflated costs. The boat is heading for the falls!

Agent Orange use was no case of friendly fire

yond reckless.

In April, five scientists writing in the *British Journal of Sports Medicine* cautioned against such “causal assumptions” regarding contact sports and CTE because a “cause-and-effect relationship remains to be shown scientifically.”

All the while, in measurable areas, football progresses. In the National Football League, concussions dropped from 270 in 2010 to 266 in 2011 to 170 in 2012.

A study published last year by federal researchers of pension-vested NFL retirees who played between 1959 and 1988 showed that just 10 percent of the group had died, compared with the expected rate of 18 percent. In other words, Hall of Famer Art Donovan, that burly bard of football folk tales who passed away at 88 recently, wasn't much of an outlier; at least when it came to his life span. The National Institute for Occupational Safety and Health concluded that NFL retirees experience “significantly decreased” mortality relative to their peers in the U.S. population.

The same study, which the NFL Players Association petitioned the institute to conduct, also looked at suicide. Given the speculation linking CTE with the suicides of several high-profile players, the scientists' findings were stunning. The study found a suicide rate for the retired athletes way below the expected rate.

So the facts about football dangers improve even if the perception doesn't. In the end, longer lives and fewer deaths should offer a valuable lesson to football's crusading aboli-

tionists, and to its rigid purists. The former should grasp that football no longer poses the risks it once did. The latter should concede that reform is the reason.

Football is a sport of roughness and change. When the game gets too rough, as it had when Roosevelt got involved more than a century ago, change follows. The elimination of pre-snap forward motion for running backs, the establishment of a neutral zone between offense and defense, and the introduction of the forward pass resulted from that deadly 1905 season. In the era following the 1968 season, spearing penalties forbidding head-first hits, and the introduction of standards that ushered in more-protective helmets, saved lives and made a fun sport safer.

Purists who protest change don't understand the sport they love. While baseball has essentially stayed the same since the 19th century, football has morphed from a collegiate kicking sport to a grinding ground game to a spectacle of aerial acrobatics. Those changes didn't destroy the game, and surely the new rules allowing the NCAA to eject players for hits on defenseless receivers and allowing the NFL to penalize running backs who lower their heads into tacklers won't destroy it either.

Football is anything but backward. It evolves. The game's most zealous friends and foes might take a page out of football's playbook and evolve too.

A ban on snakes? Who decides?

In recent years, a movement to introduce strict legislation to control or eliminate exotic reptile ownership from private citizens has been a topic of interest for wildlife officials, media, private animal rights organizations and independent collectors.

In light of recent events, where human fatalities or negative environmental impacts have been associated with large constrictors or venomous species, supporters of these movements have lobbied politicians and wildlife officials demanding additional immediate action.

A belief among anti-ban supporters, however, exists arguing that certain fundamentals of current investigations are being ignored.

Understanding animal-related social and environmental impacts consists of a thorough evaluation of the known natural behaviors and physical capabilities of the animal in question, not superstition or someone's personal prejudices.

A principle of wildlife research requires that the researcher remains objective in the face of yet-to-be-determined facts.

This same principle is necessary to the process of effectively designing a system of accountability and sensibility, which will allow those representing both sides of the issue a sense of satisfaction.

Being an avid lifelong snake enthusiast, I have come to appreciate both sides of the issue.

Although I have always advocated the position of education vs. criminalization, I find it increasingly difficult to support the keeping of large constrictors or venomous snakes as personal pets.

No number of animal-related human fatalities is acceptable.

Many independent collectors do the proper research, practice safe handling and containment techniques and implement every safety precaution possible. However, there are those who show little regard to the potential capabilities of the animal, or who are willing to accept responsibility when unfortunate incidents occur.

In captivity, the majority of undesired reptile-related incidents can be attributed to lack of proper training, complacency or criminal negligence.

In opposition to the existing regulatory legislation and current proposals, members of the reptile community have cited documented evidence, which indicates that domesticated mammal-related deaths far exceed those associated with reptiles.

I believe, presenting statistics pertaining to undesired animal-related incidents regarding one species vs. another is irrel-

evant to the issue at hand. No number of animal-related human fatalities is acceptable.

In response to the statistical evidence presented by anti-ban supporters, some pro-ban private organizations and individuals have used questionable media-related tactics to create widespread and unwarranted hysteria regarding the dangers associated with exotic reptile ownership.

Due to the presence of biased opinions on both sides of the issue, only the cooperative efforts of qualified public health, wildlife, and law enforcement officials can determine the potential environmental impacts and public safety issues resulting from the rising popularity of exotic reptile ownership among independent collectors.

However, I would ask that consideration be given to the positive aspects of keeping these types animals as household pets.

The enthusiasm for wildlife study and preservation among private individuals, as a result of caring for exotic pets, can be linked to current and future generations of animal care physicians and technicians, wildlife researchers and conservationists, environmental engineers, and others.

Caring for these unusual and often misunderstood creatures can teach us the importance of preserving the planet's many forms of wildlife and the environment that we all share.

Like it or not, Obamacare is here to stay

IMAGINE HOW GREAT the national outcry would have been if, when the House extended the military draft in August 1941, members on the losing side told their constituents they would not help them get information on how to register.

That's akin to what some House Republicans are doing in their latest efforts to sabotage the Affordable Care Act, even while some Senate GOP colleagues talk of trying to shut down the federal government to stop its implementation.

Rep. Tim Huelskamp of Kansas said he'd tell constituents seeking health insurance information to call the Department of Health and Human Services. “Given that we come from Kansas, it's much easier to say, ‘Call your former governor;’” Huelskamp told *The Hill* in June, referring to Health and Human Services Secretary Kathleen Sebelius. “You say, ‘She's the one. She's responsible. She was your governor; elected twice, and now you re-elected the president, but he picked her.’”

“We know how to forward a phone call,” added Rep. Jason Chafetz, R-Utah.

These tactics and repeated House votes to “prevent” implementation of the program look more foolish than serious. But GOP House members are not the only ones using various legal, though questionable, tactics in an effort to get President Obama's landmark health law to fail.

Some Senate Republicans talk of refusing to fund the federal government unless Obama deletes all funds for Obamacare.

And many Republican governors have rejected cooperating with the government to expand Medicaid and set up health exchanges for those who aren't insured through their employers. Ironically, their refusal would raise ACA's costs and increase the role of a government whose power they decry.

To be sure, the program will almost certainly face the kinds of glitches that Obama conceded last week often mark the onset of complex federal programs. Unfortunately, the GOP's attitude means the administration won't be able to pass any legislation to fix any procedural glitches.

And it's also true that the way the administration has sought to delay some parts of the law from meeting the Oct. 1 deadline is a tacit acknowledgement that it won't be as ready to function as smoothly from the outset as officials would like us to believe.

Nevertheless, the time is long past for the GOP to recognize reality: When the Supreme Court upheld the ACA's legality, Mitt Romney was defeated and Democrats retained the Senate, Republicans lost their last serious chance to prevent Obama's health care law from taking effect.

As time goes on, the political focus is likely to change from whether the GOP can block it from taking effect to whether it can take away its most popular benefits.

Over the longer term, what long-time Congress watcher Norm Ornstein called the GOP's “monomaniacal focus on sabotaging” Obamacare may well backfire from other factors, notably the growing evidence it may benefit people more in states that cooperate with the administration than in those that oppose it.

Recently, insurance companies have announced sharp reductions in premiums in states such as New York, California, Oregon and Maryland where Democratic governors worked with the administration to establish state-level exchanges.

Meanwhile, Mississippi, which rejected cooperation, reported a limit in consumers' choices because of a sharp reduction in the number of companies offering insurance.

None of this has prevented such foolishness as the move by two top Senate Republicans to pressure the National Football League not to publicize the program, which would attract younger Americans whose participation is essential.

Indeed, the missive by Sens. Mitch McConnell of Kentucky and John Cornyn of Texas is unlikely to have any more long-term effect than those repeated House votes or the refusal of some House Republicans to tell constituents how to sign up. The Affordable Care Act is here to stay.

Keeping your eyes on your target-date fund

Simple is good when it comes to investing for retirement. But even after you find something simple, you can't take it easy.

That's the case with target-date retirement mutual funds, which some advocates call "set-it-and-forget-it" investments. If you began putting money in a target-date fund five years ago and have since tuned out, it's undergone some transformation. The changes go beyond the gradual shift from stocks to bonds that all target-date funds undergo. They're more fundamental.

Target-date funds take care of how to divvy up a retirement account among stocks and bonds, allowing savers to put the decision-making on autopilot. The funds used to focus on just U.S. stocks and bonds, but they're now buying a broader mix of investments, as well as making other changes. Many of the moves made in recent years are helpful, but the changes could also make

short-term returns choppy.

A reminder of what target-date retirement funds are: They offer a one-stop shop for nest eggs. Savers pick a fund set for the year that they hope to retire: Early 30-somethings might pick a fund targeted at a retirement in 2045.

When retirement is far off, target-date funds invest heavily in stocks. That's because investors have the luxury of time to ride out dips that may occur. Each of the three biggest target-date fund providers — Fidelity, Vanguard and T. Rowe Price — keeps at least 85 percent of its 2045 fund in stocks.

As the years progress, target-date funds shift some of their money from stocks into bonds and cash because investors should take less risk as retirement approaches. Fidelity's target-date funds reduce the percentage of assets held in stocks from 85 percent to 50 percent over the course of 30 years.

Here are some guidelines to keep in mind as you consider target-date funds, as well as some of the ways that they've changed in recent years:

— **They're built to be the only fund that you own for your retirement savings.** The financial industry has preached the benefits of diversification for years. By

spreading your nest egg across many different stocks and bonds, the chances drop that one bad investment can torpedo your retirement. But some have taken the advice a step too far.

Some investors feel they need to own many different mutual funds to be diversified, says Jim Lauder, who helps run the Wells Fargo Advantage Dow Jones Target Date funds. They shouldn't if they own a target-date fund. Each holds hundreds of stocks and bonds from around the world, and managers have constructed them to be diversified.

— **Two target-date funds for the same year can look very different.** Some providers are more aggressive, putting a heavier emphasis on stocks, while others are more conservative. The Wells Fargo Advantage Dow Jones 2020 fund (WFDTX) has 43 percent of its money in stocks, for example, while T. Rowe Price's Retirement 2020 fund (TRRX) has 68 percent.

That will lead to differences in performance. In 2008, when the financial crisis was pummeling stocks, the Wells Fargo fund lost 22 percent. That was a milder drop than the 33 percent loss for the T. Rowe Price fund. But the recovery in stocks since the recession means the T. Rowe Price fund has had stronger re-

turns the last few years.

— **They're becoming more foreign.** Japanese stocks have been some of the world's best over the last year, and European stocks are climbing as worries about the region's debt crisis fade. Target-date investors have reaped those gains as the industry has upped its reliance on foreign stocks. The average 2040 fund, for example, has 36 percent of its stock investments in foreign companies. That's up from 24 percent in 2005, according to Morningstar.

— **They're becoming more passive.** Target-date funds are typically made up of other mutual funds. The majority of the industry's assets are invested in actively managed mutual funds. But a growing number of target-date funds are relying on index funds. Last year was the first time that more dollars flowed into funds that invest in index funds than actively managed funds.

— **They're getting cheaper to own.** Expenses are going down as a direct result of the increased focus on index funds. Target-date funds have an average expense ratio of 0.91 percent, which means that \$910 of every \$100,000 invested goes to pay for manager salaries and other fees each year. That's down from \$1,040 in 2008.

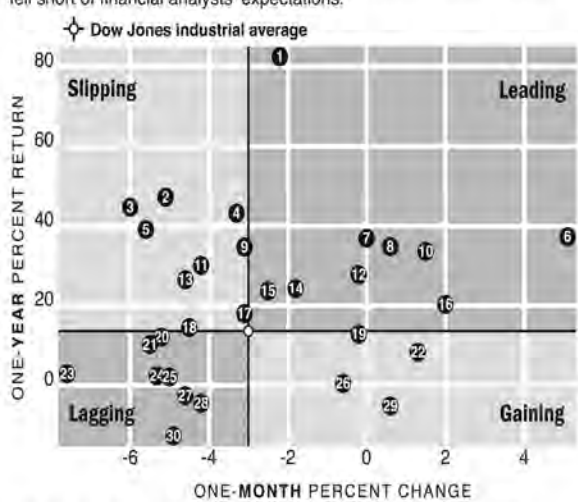

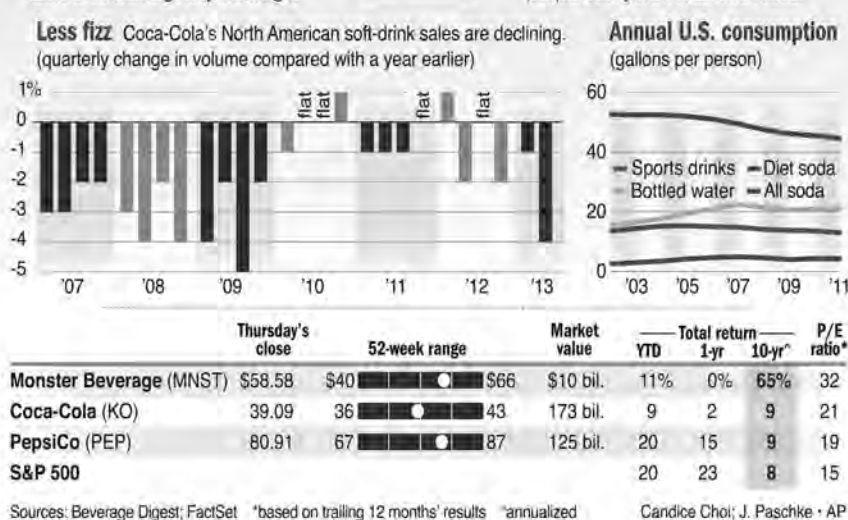

The soda slump

Americans are cutting back on soft drinks and it's not just because of the sugar. U.S. soda sales have been declining since 2005, including diet sodas, and there aren't any signs of a turnaround. Coca-Cola, PepsiCo and Dr Pepper Snapple all sold less soda in the second quarter compared with a year earlier. That was despite a spate of new advertising and lower-calorie drinks the companies have been rolling out. Coca-Cola even started airing ads addressing criticism that its drinks make people fat. But the concerns go beyond weight gain. Coca-Cola and PepsiCo are seeing their diet soft drinks decline faster than regular soft drinks. That's possibly a sign of a growing concern about the safety of artificial sweeteners. Options in the beverage aisle are growing, especially energy and sports drinks. Monster Beverage has enjoyed a great run, but has been slowed in the last year by regulatory issues and litigation about its Monster Energy drink. Monster is among the companies boosting sales by selling other types of drinks, such as teas, and expanding into emerging markets where people don't yet drink as much soda.

Technology stocks lost 0.2 percent last week, but that was the smallest decline of the 10 sectors that make up the broad market.

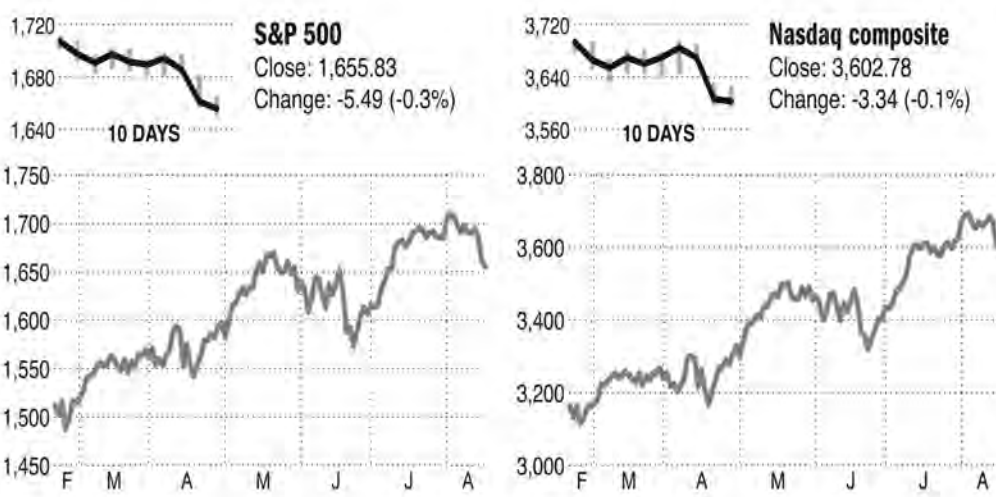
Helping to prop up the sector was a surge for Apple (AAPL). The iPad maker's stock rose above \$500 for the first time since January. It had been falling since September on worries that the company doesn't have another hit product. Activist investor Carl Icahn said during the week that he had acquired a stake in the company and was pushing for more Apple to buy back more stock.

Holding back the sector was a disappointing revenue forecast from Cisco Systems (CSCO). Many see the networking giant, which had \$48.6 billion in revenue last fiscal year, as an industry bellwether.

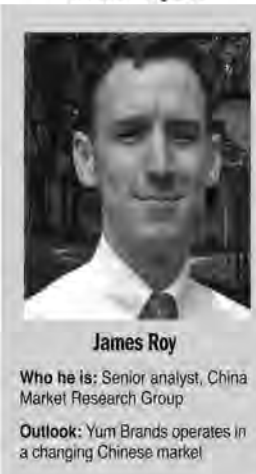

Yum Brands' challenges

Who he is: Senior analyst, China Market Research Group

Outlook: Yum Brands operates in a changing Chinese market

KFC's parent company Yum Brands suffered a setback in China last month after a streak of sales declines. The fast-food company is trying to get back on its feet following a bird flu scare and an earlier controversy over its chicken supply. Its performance in China is critical, considering the company raked in more than half its sales from the region last year. Analysts have been keeping tabs on the unit's monthly sales figures ever since Yum lowered its earnings outlook for the year. In July, Yum said sales were down 13 percent, worse than the 10 percent in June.

China Market Research Group senior analyst James Roy explains the other challenges facing Yum, which also owns Pizza Hut.

How has the perception of KFC in China changed?

The perceptions of KFC have taken a negative turn since the end of last year. The supplier controversy started creating worries about the health and safety of KFC's chicken, which was followed by the avian flu scare earlier this year. It really put a dent in trust of the KFC brand. People don't view it as the safe fast-food option that it used to be. The company's also dealing with a growing lack of trust overall and a shift away from the lower fast-food price point. People are either not going out as much or trading up to higher-priced options.

Do American chains still have an advantage over local chains?

The advantage that U.S. fast-food chains had was their broad appeal throughout China, whereas Chinese cuisine is much more specific and regional. Until recently, there was also the perception that the standards of local chains were not up to the standards of U.S. chains. But that perception has pretty much gone away.

Yum says it's focusing more on Pizza Hut's growth in the country. How has that chain been affected?

The perceptions of KFC don't really spill over to Pizza Hut. There's not a wide awareness that they're from the same company. Pizza Hut is a lot more premium. It's viewed as a much nicer restaurant for families or dates.

Who are KFC's biggest competitors?

There are a lot of new players. Chiefly it's McDonald's, but it depends on the city. There are local chains that are really large as well, including a Taiwanese chain that started almost as a direct copy of KFC.

Yum says it expects sales to improve over the year and turn positive in the fourth quarter. Do you see that happening?

It wouldn't be too surprising if they do better than they did earlier this year, given the big hits they took. I don't see them returning to the same levels of growth as in the past. The fact of the matter is that the market has changed.

Ringing registers in Shanghai, Sao Paulo and Saskatchewan are becoming more important to U.S. companies each year. Foreign sales made up 46.6 percent of all the revenue last year for companies in the Standard & Poor's 500 index that report regional sales data. That's the highest level in four years, according to S&P Dow Jones Indices. Sales to Europe have slowed given the region's recession, which ran for six quarters until this spring. But companies saw growth last year in revenue from Asia, and South America.

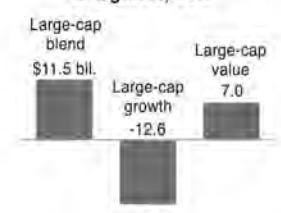

SHRINKING GROWTH

Investors have returned to stock mutual funds this year, but they're still a little leery of ones that invest in growth stocks. Investors yanked \$2.1 billion last month out of funds that invest in large-cap growth stocks, like Google (GOOG) or Amazon.com (AMZN). It continues a streak that has held for much of 2013: Investors have pulled a net \$12.6 billion out of the category. They have been more interested in funds that invest in value stocks, like banks and dividend payers, or at least funds that invest in a mix of value and growth stocks.

SWOON-FREE SUMMER?

The last three summers have been painful for investors. Each has seen at least one month where the Standard & Poor's 500 index has plunged at least 5 percent. In 2010, it happened in both May and June and nearly happened again in August. In 2011, it happened in August. In 2012, it happened in May. This year — hold your breath — it hasn't happened yet. The worst monthly drop so far has been the 1.8 percent drop in August.

Aug. 20, 2012 — NEW YORK — Apple is Wall Street's all-time MVP — that's Most Valuable Property. On Monday, Apple's surging stock propelled the company's value to \$624 billion, the world's highest of all time. It beat the record for market capitalization set by Microsoft Corp. in the heady days of the Internet boom.

One year later, Apple's value has declined to \$452.9 billion. Its stock, which peaked last fall at \$705.07 per share, is down to \$498.50. Even so, Apple remains the most valuable publicly traded company, having recently re-established its position after briefly losing it earlier this year to Exxon Mobil.

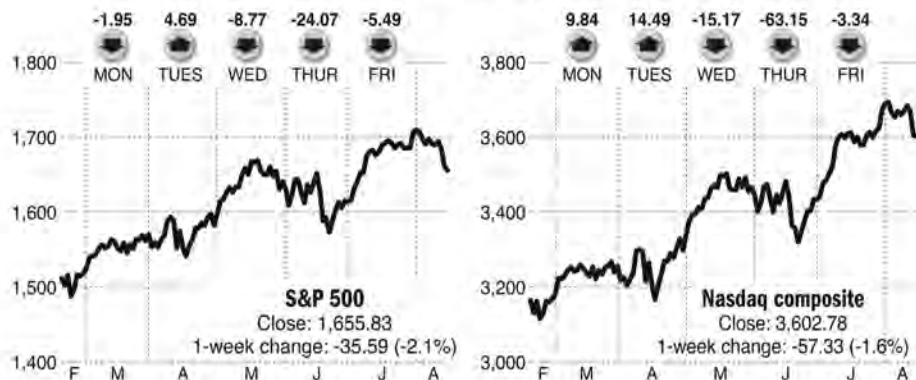
Apple's stock surged at the end of last summer amid optimism around what investors speculated would be the impending launch of the iPhone 5, and possibly a smaller, cheaper iPad.

But the company's stock has slumped in the months since then as Apple's growth has slowed and earnings have been squeezed from tougher competition in the smartphone and tablet computer markets.

Investors also have been disappointed by Apple's inability to unveil a breakthrough product since Tim Cook succeeded the late Steve Jobs as CEO nearly two years ago.

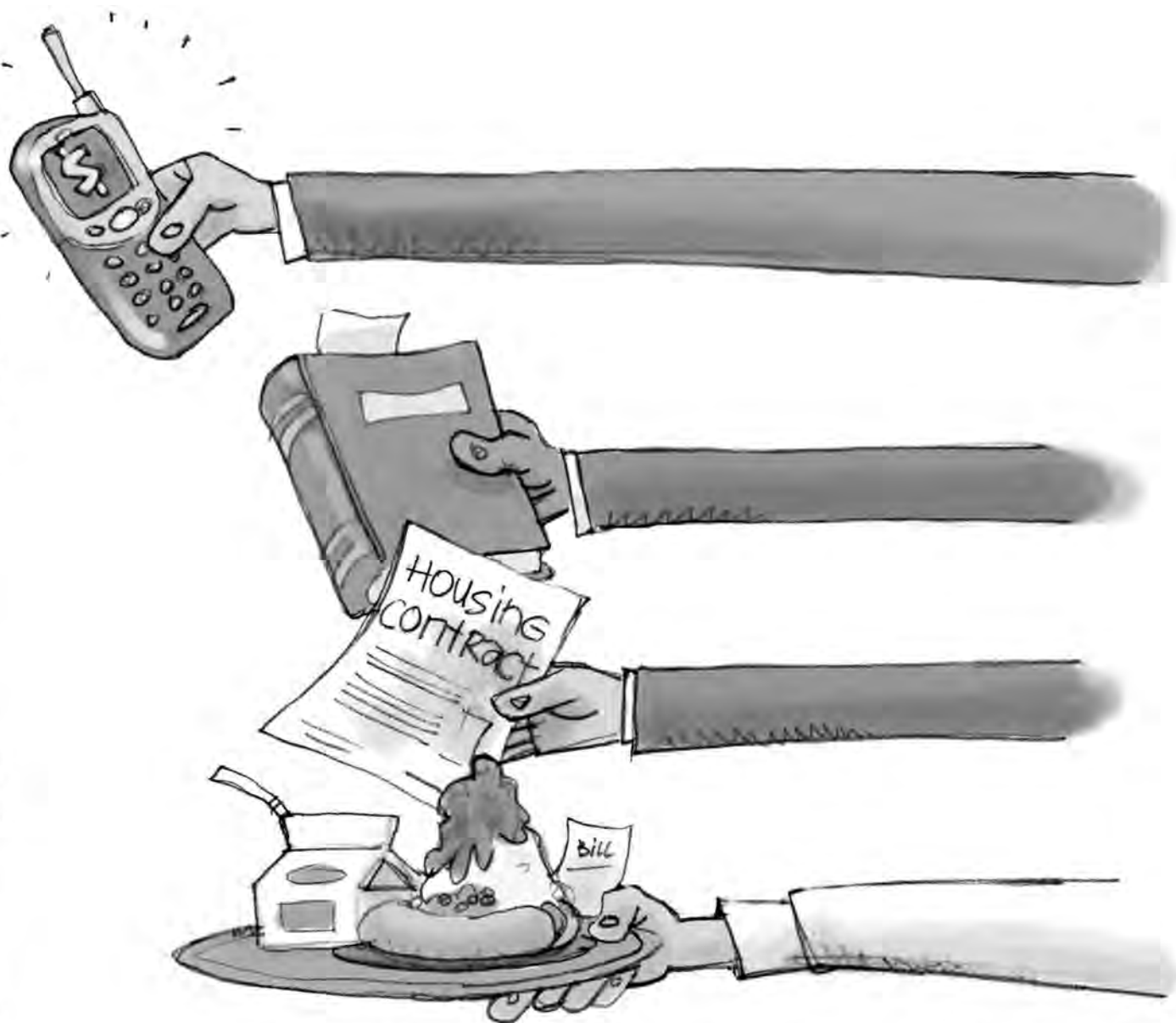

College Survival Guide

How to survive your first year on campus — without going broke

College is meant to be the best years of your life — and they better be for the price you're paying.

For the 2012-2013 school year, the average student's budget hovered around \$22,261 and \$43,289 for public and private institutions respectively, according to the College Board. That's a lot of money.

Although Congress approved a bipartisan student loan deal that ensures lower federal loan rates, higher education still comes with a massive price tag.

This fall, 21.6 million students are expected to attend U.S. colleges and universities, a 6.2 million increase since fall 2000, according to the National Center for Education Statistics.

For many of these students money management will be one of the most important — and toughest — things they'll face. To help ease the process, we've compiled these tips and hints.

BUDGETS

For most, college is the first time students will get their hands dirty with money management. And it's not easy. We spoke with some experts to find out the best ways to manage your money.

Mitchell Weiss, author of "College Happens — A Practical Handbook for Parents and Students" (\$12.34, Amazon.com), and adjunct professor at the University of Hartford, said that budgeting is "aggregating all the cash coming in and allocating all the expenses heading out."

In doing this allocating, Laura Schaefer, author of "Ultimate Money-Saving Hacks for College Students" (\$2.99, Amazon.com), says you should "take a few days to make it because you are always going to forget stuff to include."

If your budget is still going awry, what should you do? Weiss suggests keeping a journal of your spending. "It's a way to troubleshoot and find a leak in the system," Weiss said.

Beth Kobliner notes in her book, "Get a Financial Life: Personal Finance in Your Twenties and Thirties" (\$12.65, Amazon.com), essentials at this age may include rent, groceries, utilities, student loans and health insurance. Books, school supplies, laundry materials, toiletries and dorm room furnishings are also essentials. Non-essential items include entertainment, eating out and shopping trips.

That's not to say you can't have fun, just be aware of how much you are spending. This includes joining a fraternity or sorority. "Ask questions, and make sure you know fees and how they work," Schaefer said. Every chapter is different, but a quick scan around Forbes' top-100 colleges list finds prices to be, well, pricy with average dues as high as \$3,362.

If you still need a more rigid budgeting structure, Kobliner's book suggests trying a free website like www.mint.com. Mint comes with a free mobile app available in the Apple App Store and on Google Play. Mint collects all of your transactions in one place, allowing you to see where your money is going and how you can save.

HOUSING

According to the College Board, the average college student pays between \$8,000 and \$9,500 a year for room and board, with \$2,500 to \$4,500 of that total going toward food. Although that can take up a large portion of total college costs, there are ways to minimize these high prices.

Obvious options include living with family nearby. A recent report by student loan provider Sallie Mae said 57 percent of students are using this option.

However, with most colleges requiring incoming freshman to live on campus, that may not be an option. Here are some tips to keep in mind:

■ **Location:** It is no doubt that low-cost areas, smaller towns and public colleges come with a cheaper price tag. According to a 2012-2013 U.S. News and World Report, Fordham University in Bronx, N.Y., charges \$15,374 per year (including board) for their spacious New York City apartment-style spaces. Tamara Almai, a senior communications/media major at the university, paid approximately \$1,700 a month when living in dorms and will pay \$800 after moving to an apartment in Brooklyn. Northwestern Oklahoma State University in Alva, Okla., offers the most affordable room and board in the nation, according to U.S. News, charging just \$1,300 for a modern suite-style dorm with basic amenities, and \$3,700 including the weekly 19-meal dining plan. "It's all supply and demand and local market driven," said Marc Wallace, director of students and housing at the Oklahoma school. "It's a town of only 5,000, and there's no major highway or city nearby."

■ **Stick to the basics:** No need for extravagance in freshman dorms. Schools like Clemson University have a \$3,000-per-year discrepancy between the cheapest, basic dorm and the most expensive, luxurious one.

■ **Volunteer:** Schools like UCLA, offer a cheap co-op housing option in exchange for four hours of chores a week. University Cooperative Housing Association Executive Director Arusha Weerasinghe said that price-wise, UCHA is "about a third of what it costs to live on campus," meals and utilities included.

USEFUL TIPS

When it comes to other ways to save on campus, here are some smart habits to help avoid living off ramen noodles.

Schaefer said the key to saving money is your attitude: "If you're likely to look at everything with a question in mind, you're likely to save." Here are some questions Schaefer recommends:

Is there an event going on?

If you're a freshman, most likely, yes. There will always be events on campus with free food, shirts and other activities. Take advantage of them.

Should I bring my student ID? Yes!

If you're on a college campus, most establishments from hair salons to concert venues will have a student special or discount on one or more days of the week. If you're paying full price, question it.

■ **Can I make that myself?** This doesn't just apply to two-ingredient recipes (<http://bit.ly/RRJwH8>). If you can turn cereal boxes into useful storage organizers, go ahead! And if you can't, visit websites like www.instructables.com, or Schaefer suggests finding someone that can. "It's about using your social network," she said.

Is there an app for that?

Always. And with the college crowd being well-versed with technology and social media, many of the discounts are easy to obtain. Check in at establishments on Foursquare and Yelp on your smartphone, and subscribe to Groupon and LivingSocial deals for your college town, Schaefer said.

TRANSPORTATION

Unfortunately, for most incoming freshmen, many schools have policies that prevent you from having a car on campus. Here are some tips for what you can do when you need transportation that your own two feet can't provide.

■ If you're in need of travel within your college town, many schools offer a bus system that is free for students. One great service

that many universities are turning to is NextBus (www.nextbus.com/homepage/), a free online site that alerts students to when buses will be arriving for certain stops.

■ For those going to school in a city, Almai said, "if you ride the train (subway) several times a week, then it certainly pays off to have a weekly or monthly unlimited MetroCard." Almai also said she rides her bike as much as she can.

■ Amtrak (www.amtrak.com) offers more than 500 destinations with stops in 46 states for those avoiding the airport. With a mobile app compatible on most smartphones, it allows you to book trains, check schedules and can generate an e-ticket. That said, always compare prices with airlines; the train might not always be cheaper. Hipmunk (hipmunk.com) is a site and app that in addition to price can sort your flight options by "agony," or the number of connections and the duration of the trip including any layovers.

■ If you're looking for a cheaper alternative to Amtrak, look no further than Greyhound buses. Greyhound's prices are reasonable and it serves more than 3,800 North American stops.

■ If you are absolutely in need of a car and don't have one of your own, you can always turn to carpooling. Make friends with someone who has a car and you can both benefit — you, by getting where you need to go, and them, by sharing the cost of gas. Of course technology has eliminated the need to personally know someone with a car. You can reach out to people on your class Facebook pages, or you can turn to ride-sharing apps such as Lyft, Ridejoy or Sidecar Ride to get where you need to go.

Mon General receives accreditation from SCPC

Monongalia General Hospital has become the first hospital in north-central West Virginia to receive full Chest Pain Center Accreditation with Percutaneous Coronary Intervention (PCI) from the Society of Cardiovascular Patient Care (SCPC).

"By becoming an accredited Chest Pain Center, Mon General has demonstrated the high level of quality care it provides and a commitment to higher standards," said Dr. David Lawrence, medical director of the Mon General Emergency Department.

"To receive the accreditation, Mon General participated in a rigorous evaluation by SCPC for our ability to assess, diagnose and treat patients who may be experiencing a heart attack," he said.

Mon General received full accreditation with PCI on July 5. The accreditation is good for three years.

PCI, more commonly known as angioplasty, takes place in the hospital's cardiac cath labs to open narrowed arteries in the heart with balloon angioplasty or stents.

The SCPC is an international not-for-profit organization that focuses on transforming cardiovascular care.

Many different departments and services were instrumental in helping Mon General obtain this accreditation.

These include MECCA 9-1-1 (Monongalia Emergency Centralized Communications Agency), which dispatches ambulances; Monongalia EMS, which transports patients and begins treating heart attack

patients on the scene; the Mon General Emergency Department; Mon General cath labs; and the hospital's medical staff.

"People tend to wait

when they think they might be having a heart attack, and that is a mistake," Lawrence said.

"The average patient arrives in the emergency de-

partment more than two hours after the onset of symptoms," he added, "but what they don't realize is that the sooner a heart attack is treated, the less damage to the heart and the better the outcome for the patient."

Mon General's state-of-the-art healthcare begins with the dispatch of an ambulance.

"Most of the ambulances in the area can transmit an electrocardiogram to us," Lawrence said. "If we see the signs of a heart attack on the EKG, we go ahead and prepare the cath lab."

"It's routine for a heart attack patient to come in to the Emergency Department for a few minutes to get stabilized," he added, "and then go straight to the cardiac cath lab, which is the definitive treatment for most heart attacks."

Heart attacks are the leading cause of death in the United States, with 600,000 people dying annually of heart disease. More than 5 million Americans visit hospitals each year with chest pain.

The Accredited Chest Pain Center's approach to patient management allows physicians to reduce time to treatment during the critical early stages of a heart attack, when treatments are most effective, and to better monitor patients when it is not clear whether they are having a coronary event.

This helps ensure that patients are neither sent home too early nor needlessly admitted.

Mon General Hospital and Monongalia EMS are both part of the Morgantown-based Monongalia Health System.

Digital era threatens future of drive-ins

LANCASTER, Ohio — Through 80 summers, drive-in theaters have managed to remain a part of the American fabric, surviving technological advances and changing tastes that put thousands out of business. Now the industry says a good chunk of the 350 or so left could be forced to turn out the lights because they can't afford to adapt to the digital age.

Movie studios are phasing out 35 mm film prints, and the switch to an eventually all-digital distribution system is pushing the outdoor theaters to make the expensive change to digital projectors.

The \$70,000-plus investment required per screen is significant, especially for what is in most places a summertime business kept alive by mom-and-pop operators. Paying for the switch would suck up most owners' profits for years to come.

The United Drive-In Theatre Owners Association figures 50 to 60 theaters have already converted. At least one operator decided to close instead of switch, but it's not clear how many more might bite the dust.

"Everyone knows eventually that you'll be digital or you'll close your doors," said Walt Effinger, whose

Skyview Drive-In in the central Ohio town of Lancaster has been showing movies on an 80-foot screen since 1948. "Some will. If you're not doing enough business to justify the expense, you're just going to have to close up."

Effinger worked at the Skyview off and on for 30 years before he and his wife, Cathie, bought it two decades ago. They converted to digital last year, the first of the state's 29 drive-ins to do so. Because the films now come on a device the size of a portable hard drive and are downloaded to his projector, it's less hassle for him on movie nights and gives viewers a stunningly brighter, clearer image.

Think of the picture on a flat-screen digital TV, compared with the old tube set.

The digital transformation has been underway in the film industry for more than a decade because of the better picture and sound quality and the ease of delivery — no more huge reels of film. The time frame isn't clear, but production companies are already phasing out traditional 35 mm film, and it's expected to disappear completely over the next few years.

"We know fewer and few-

er prints are being struck," says D. Edward Vogel, who runs the historic Bengies Drive-In in Baltimore and is spokesman for the United Drive-In Theatre Owners Association.

An industry incentive program will reimburse theater owners 80 percent of the cost of conversion over time, Vogel says, but because most drive-ins are small, family-run businesses, it's hard for many to find the money, period. And the reimbursement doesn't cover the tens of thousands of dollars more that many will have to spend renovating projection rooms to create the climate-controlled conditions needed for the high-tech equipment.

It's a dilemma also faced by the nation's small independent theaters, many of them struggling to pay for conversion to digital years after corporate-owned multiplexes already did it.

Darci and Bill Wemple, owners of two drive-ins in upstate New York, hope an online competition will help them with the \$225,000 to \$250,000 they figure it will cost to switch their three screens. The American Honda Motor Co. is compiling online votes for the nation's favorite drive-ins and is going to pay the digital conversion costs

for the top five vote-getters. The Wemples say that if they don't get help, they'll have to consider closing up.

"To make this kind of conversion with three screens is like trying to buy another drive-in all over again," said Darci Wemple, whose El Rancho theater in Palatine Bridge is among dozens of drive-ins featured in the Honda ad promotion.

The number of drive-ins peaked at more than 4,000 in the late 1950s. Now there are 357.

Robyn Deal and Dave Foraker have been going to the Skyview in Lancaster since they were both in school in the 1960s and early '70s. On a recent weekend night, they sat together in folding chairs outside their car, blankets on their laps and their 12-year-old dachshund, Wilson, getting

lots of attention just before a double feature of "Turbo" and "The Wolverine."

"So much of our heritage is going away, and this is one of them," said the 60-year-old Foraker, who figures his first movie at the Skyview was "Who's Afraid of Virginia Woolf?" around 1966.

"A lot of the things I did when I was kid are gone," he said. "I think they're trying to keep what's left."

U.S. Rep John Lewis' graphic novel tells his civil rights story

In telling his life story in the pages of a graphic novel, U.S. Rep. John Lewis pays homage to a comic book that propelled him into the civil rights movement and, ultimately, into Congress.

The Georgia Democrat's "March: Book One," was published by Top Shelf, co-written by Lewis staffer Andrew Aydin and illustrated by Eisner Award-winning artist Nate Powell,

Lewis said the 128-page volume, the first in a trilogy, focuses on his early life — from raising chickens in Pike County, Alabama, to meeting Martin Luther King Jr. and holding lunch counter sit-ins and civil rights protests in Nashville, Tenn. A freedom rider and civil rights leader in the 1960s, Lewis was severely beaten while marching for voting rights.

"It's all there," Lewis said, from his "growing up" to his

discovery of the 1957 comic book "Martin Luther King and the Montgomery Story."

Lewis said the comic, which cost all of 10 cents, proved influential on him and others in their beginning struggles for civil rights.

"It was very inspiring ... and when I attended the nonviolence workshops in Nashville at a local church, we all had an opportunity to get a copy of this book we called the 'comic book,'" Lewis said. "We were able

to digest the essence of the book as we studied and participated in those nonviolence workshops."

Lewis is hopeful the "March" trilogy will inspire a new generation to hold similar ideals.

Powell, whose art encompasses the words written by Lewis and Aydin, said he strived to bring "balance" to his illustrations of Lewis' story.

"A lot of this has to do with tension, anxiety,

dread," Powell said. "Working but waiting is one of the major themes. There are a lot of silent moments."

Aydin called the work, his first, a chance to reaffirm Lewis' legacy and the civil rights movement for a new generation.

"I asked him 'Why don't you write a comic book?'" Aydin recalled saying to his boss in 2008, who agreed.

The two worked together, often in the evenings, trading notes and thoughts.

"So much of the story is based on the congressman's oral history," Aydin said, adding that their work felt like a "master class in comics writing."

Now, with the book's release, Aydin said the graphic novel takes on a life of its own.

"It was our job to bring it into reality. Somewhere, up in the sky, it was always there," he said. "It was just our job to pull it down and make it real."

Odd tie-in of Phineas & Ferb and the Marvel heroes

Fanboys rarely have reason to celebrate capitalism. The system is rigged by the entertainment/merchandising complex to ruthlessly exploit ardent fans' enthusiasm for pop culture. The Boba Fett action figure? Four easy payments of \$29.99.

Whoever thought it would cost so much to sit at the geeks' table? But then, the free marketplace has always been a cafeteria ruled by bullies.

There has been one production megadeal that fanboys can applaud, however — Disney's \$4 billion purchase of Marvel Entertainment and its rich pantheon of comic-book superheroes, from Ant-Man to Zuras.

It has resulted in a flood of Marvelous content, as Disney seeks to make its investment pay off.

Kids have been the main, um, beneficiaries of this campaign. A new channel, Disney XD, was

created essentially to showcase cartoons of our costumed idols. Disney XD carries 20 hours a week of Marvel programming, from "Fantastic Four" to "The Avengers: Earth's Mightiest Heroes" to the brand-new "Marvel's Hulk and the Agents of S.M.A.S.H."

(Another series on XD is "Randy Cunningham: 9th Grade Ninja," which I believe is about the boyhood adventures of the nimble former Philadelphia Eagles' quarterback.)

The oddest and most imaginative branding tie-in effort to date comes Friday to the Mouse Empire's TV mother ship.

"Phineas and Ferb: Mission Marvel" (that aired at 8 p.m. Friday on the Disney Channel) was a very special crossover episode that had our favorite adolescent backyard over-achievers, P & F, mixing it up with Iron Man, Thor, Spider-Man and Hulk.

Danville, the boys' car-

toon hometown, is invaded by a larger-than-life all-star collection of heroes and villains. That's because the town's resident evil comic relief, Dr. Doofenshmirtz, had a lab mishap that inadvertently robbed Thor, Hulk, and the other good guys of their powers.

The show tries to crank up the energy to accommodate the "special" status right from the opening credits, when Phineas and Ferb rock out on a head-banger that sounds very much like Led Zeppelin's "Kashmir."

That's followed by a fun scene of the P & F gang surfing on an asteroid belt up in space. Of course, Phineas, with his pointy, isosceles-shaped head, needs a customized helmet.

Then, unfortunately, it's down to business. The crossover never really meshes. The script alternates weak wise-cracks with overblown threats of annihilation. (Although Thor does get one good line:

"Juice in a box? We have nothing like this in Asgard!")

The show's signature musical numbers function here merely as frivolous filler.

The setting does as much as Doofenshmirtz to rob the superheroes of their powers. The muscle posse seems stiff, diminished, and out-of-place in this kiddie-cartoon playpen. The heroes' stern presence tends to flatten the usual goofy charm of "Phineas and Ferb."

Interestingly, the malefactors make the transition just fine. In particular, Red Skull and M.O.D.O.K. (a giant floating head) are bracingly effective and menacing, even in Danville.

In the end, "Phineas and Ferb: Mission Marvel" is like one of those jarring stunt episodes of "Gilligan's Island," when a guest star like Phil Silvers or Zsa Zsa Gabor joined our castaways. The result is both dissonant and disappointing.

Ashton Kutcher opens up about becoming 'Jobs,' timing of film, Wozniak's response

LOS ANGELES — It's clear from Ashton Kutcher's tone — even though he's sitting 2,500 miles away in New York — that the 35-year-old actor and technology enthusiast holds an unflinching reverence for Steve Jobs, the Apple co-founder he portrays in the film "Jobs," which opened Friday.

When he speaks about embodying the notoriously demanding Mac mastermind during a recent video conversation on Skype, in which Kutcher was an early investor, he's resolute and

thoughtful. It's the antithesis of his goofball on-screen personas in TV series like "That '70s Show" and in films such as "Dude, Where's My Car?"

With "Jobs," Kutcher hopes his performance is as much a lesson about entrepreneurship to today's youth as it is a profile of a man who revolutionized technology.

Q: You don't paint a spotless portrait of Steve Jobs in this film. How did you balance playing a man that's obviously an icon but also has flaws

like everyone else?

A: I think Steve cared about the end result and wasn't worried about being liked and knew he would eventually be liked if his creations were properly executed. He was very blunt, but it's because he cared. I tried to look at his faults as his gifts, and I tried to understand it and not judge it. I think the way that guy received love in life was by creating products that people loved, and when they loved the products, they thereby loved him.

Q: How did you mentally prepare for the scenes where Jobs goes into beast mode and he's yelling and combative?

A: He was never just senselessly combative. I think there was something he desired, and he had a goal and passion for his consumers that were driving his frustration. He wanted the people around him to care as much about the result as he did. I think his frustration was in an effort to motivate people to care.

Q: Why do you think now is the right time for this

story? It isn't too soon?

A: As time passes, I think the tales get taller. He'll become more glorified for the things he did right, and more vilified for the things he did wrong. We had a great opportunity to tell a story about a guy with an exponential amount of resources to inform us about what really happened — or as close to what really happened as they can recall.

Q: How do you feel about Steve Wozniak declaring some scenes weren't accurate after he

saw footage of the film?

A: Steve Wozniak is being paid by another company to support their Steve Jobs film. It's personal for him, but it's also business. We have to keep that in mind. He was also extremely unavailable to us when producing this film. He's a brilliant man and I respect his work, but he wasn't available to us as a resource, so his account isn't going to be our account because we don't know exactly what it was. We did the best job we could. Nobody really knows what happened in the rooms.

How to learn a another language on the cheap

"J'ECRIS le journal."
I spoke the words aloud to my computer, quite proud of myself for uttering those particular ones in another language. If I ever encountered a French person, I'd finally learned a phrase that was true and useful to our conversation: "I write the newspaper."

But "J'ecris le journal" was something that I could really apply to my life. Because I do, indeed, write for the newspaper.

And so, there I was, one step closer to becoming fluent in French.

Back in junior high and high school, I had taken two years of French, and I'd even visited Paris and Avignon with my first teacher. But, as things tend to do, when you don't practice, nor immerse yourself in the culture on a regular basis, you lose it.

So eventually, the only French words I could remember were "Bonjour," "Merci" and "Je t'aime" (I love you).

The other day, one of my friends was commenting on a foreign language game that teaches you a different language while you earn skill points. It was called Duolingo, and you can sign up for the program through Facebook or by email.

Intrigued, I decided to visit the site to at least check it out. Apparently, you can learn Spanish, French, German, Portuguese, Italian or English, and it's totally free. It can offer the program at no charge, because it asks you to help translate real websites as part of the game.

So I decided to sign up, and for nearly a week now, I've been learning — or re-

Q: Dundee was diagnosed with HCM (feline hypertrophic cardiomyopathy) five years ago, and he's been doing great until his most recent ultrasound which showed deterioration. Our vet has changed

medications, and now I have almost \$50 worth of a medication I can't use.

Our vet says he can't legally re-sell medication. Do you have any ideas, aside from throwing it down the toilet? A. C., Cyberspace

A: I love your question, and your concern. Indeed

flushing medications isn't a good idea. Reports in the popular press have revealed all sorts of drug compounds have been found in drinking water. Dr. Teresa DeFrancesco, board certified in cardiology and emergency critical care suggests you contact a local shelter, perhaps they can use the meds.

Q: My 9-year old dog has an enlarged prostate. My vet wants to neuter him, I don't. I'd like to explore homeopathic options. Do

you have any recommendations? C. J., Peoria, IL

A: "Neuter the dog, why not?" wonders internal medicine specialist Dr. Kevin Gulikers of Dallas, TX. He explains just as older men sometimes have enlarged prostates, so do many dogs.

"People take drugs that block testosterone with a goal to help shrink the prostate, the same drugs can be given to dogs. But for dogs we have another option, and it's curative, that's to neuter.

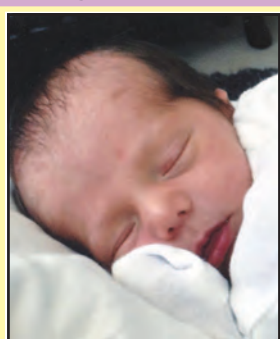

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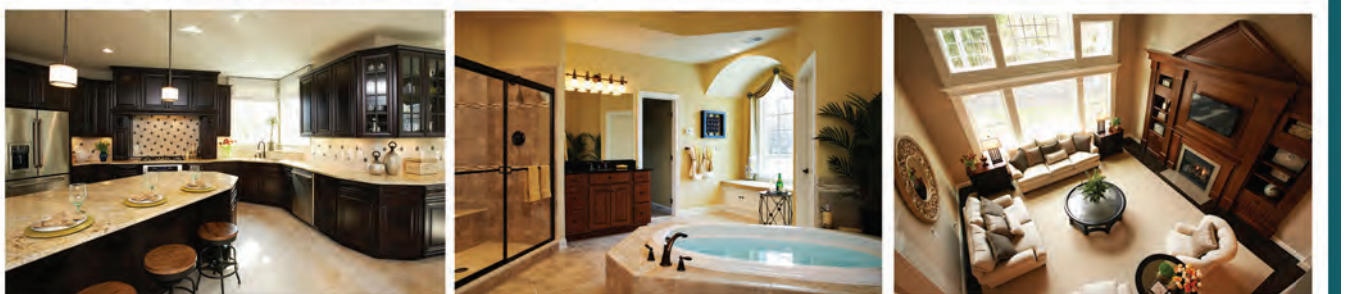

Some diabetes myths need to be debunked

IT'S ESTIMATED THAT more than 240,000 West Virginians have diabetes. Of those, more than 65,000 are undiagnosed. Even more have a condition called pre-diabetes, which occurs when blood glucose levels are higher than normal but not yet high enough to be diagnosed as diabetes. These are some of the facts.

There are also many myths about diabetes. To separate fact from fiction, I talked with Vicki Chase, RN, CDE, diabetes education coordinator at the WVU Healthcare Diabetes Education Center.

While reviewing the myths and facts, keep in mind that type 1 diabetes is caused by genetics and unknown factors. And type 2 diabetes is caused by genetics and lifestyle factors.

Myth: You'll have symptoms if your blood sugar is too high.

Fact: If your blood sugar levels are only slightly elevated, you probably won't have symptoms. If they're moderately elevated, you may have mild symptoms that are easily overlooked. And if your blood sugar levels are high, symptoms can include fatigue, increased hunger or thirst, weight loss, sores that don't heal and frequent urination.

Myth: Eating too much sugar can lead to diabetes.

Fact: Sugar does not cause diabetes, but it can cause weight gain, which promotes type 2 diabetes in those who are genetically likely to develop the disease.

Myth: You will eventually develop type 2 diabetes if you are overweight or obese.

Fact: Being overweight is just one risk factor for developing type 2 diabetes. Others include family history, ethnicity and age.

Myth: Only older people get diabetes.

Fact: More children than ever before are being diagnosed with type 2 diabetes. To help prevent diabetes in children, parents should encourage good health habits, including more physical activity and less junk food.

Myth: All people with diabetes need to take insulin.

Fact: While that's the case for type 1 diabetes, it doesn't hold true for type 2 diabetes. In some cases, proper diet, exercise and oral medications, if needed, can keep type 2 diabetes under control for some time before insulin becomes necessary. It's also important not to smoke.

Did you know?

The longer individuals go without treatment, the more complications they can experience. If you have one or more of the symptoms or think you are at increased risk for the disease, talk with your doctor. A simple blood test can diagnose the disease.

A: Your concerns about a terrible tragedy rest on the nature of miracles. Many people, particularly atheists, write to me with the same issues. If God can do anything, why doesn't God save us all from unexpected life-threatening situations and illnesses? There are good reasons why God occasionally allows us to be victimized by what Bob Dylan called, "a simple twist of fate."

If all people were saved or healed at all times,

then death would have no dominion over us and we'd all live long, comfortable and untroubled lives. The overcrowding caused by canceling death is just the first problem such total divine intervention would cause.

A bigger problem with expecting God to always save us is that this is a sure recipe for human passivity and indolence. Instead of trying on our own to cure diseases and reduce life-threatening dangers, we'd just sit and wait for God to save us. Such abandonment of our intellect is surely not what a good God intends for us.

God never promised to save us from all the dangers of life. God does promise to comfort us after tragedy and to receive our souls after death.

These are enormous and deeply comforting promises, but they don't seem to be enough for everyone.

An old joke: A grandmother is sitting on the beach with her little grandson, who is suddenly washed away by a wave. She screams a prayer to God, "Save my grandson!" Then a new wave washes ashore, deposits the child back on the beach and he continues to play in the sand. The grandmother looks up to God and says, "He had a hat!"

I have no idea, as I've often said, where the idea came from that God should be our personal guarantor against all the dangers of life on planet earth. It's not in the Bible, and it's not the teaching of any religion I've studied. In fact, Buddhism is entirely devoted to the management of suffering, not the elimination of it.

The 23rd Psalm is about having a partner as we walk through the valley of the shadow of death so we won't be frozen by fear. It's not about making

every day a picnic in the green pastures of life. We often become irritated with God for the violation of promises never made, and this leads to its own form of suffering.

I'm not at all sure you're correct that if God had sent that man to the bathroom, or out to 7-11 for a cup of coffee, before his house was swallowed up by the sinkhole that he would have seen his good fortune as a miracle. People can just as easily see miracles, if and when they do occur, as merely good luck. There's no way to pin down the difference between a miracle and a coincidence.

Here are two stories:

The first is the legend that during the crossing of the Red Sea, recounted in the Bible, many people didn't see the miracle at all. The moral that ends the story is: "They never saw the miracle of the splitting of the sea because they never looked up, so all they saw was mud."

The second is about a

man who nearly died while lost in a blizzard. Later, in a bar, he told the story to the man sitting next to him. "I was about to freeze to death, and I prayed to God to save me," he recalled. His companion asked, "What happened then?" The man who was saved responded, "God didn't do a thing for me, and if that Eskimo hadn't come along and found me at the last minute, I'd be dead."

Miracles do happen to us all the time, but not every time. That's the way God has arranged things. Why miracles occur (if they do) and why they don't (if they don't) is a mystery we must live with within the limitations of our understanding about God and God's ways. I believe in miracles, but I don't depend upon them. It's the only way I know to live with hope and caution.

Get the family organized with this pinboard project

If you're bracing for the start of the school year, you're probably already waist-deep in backpacks, markers and brand-new sneakers.

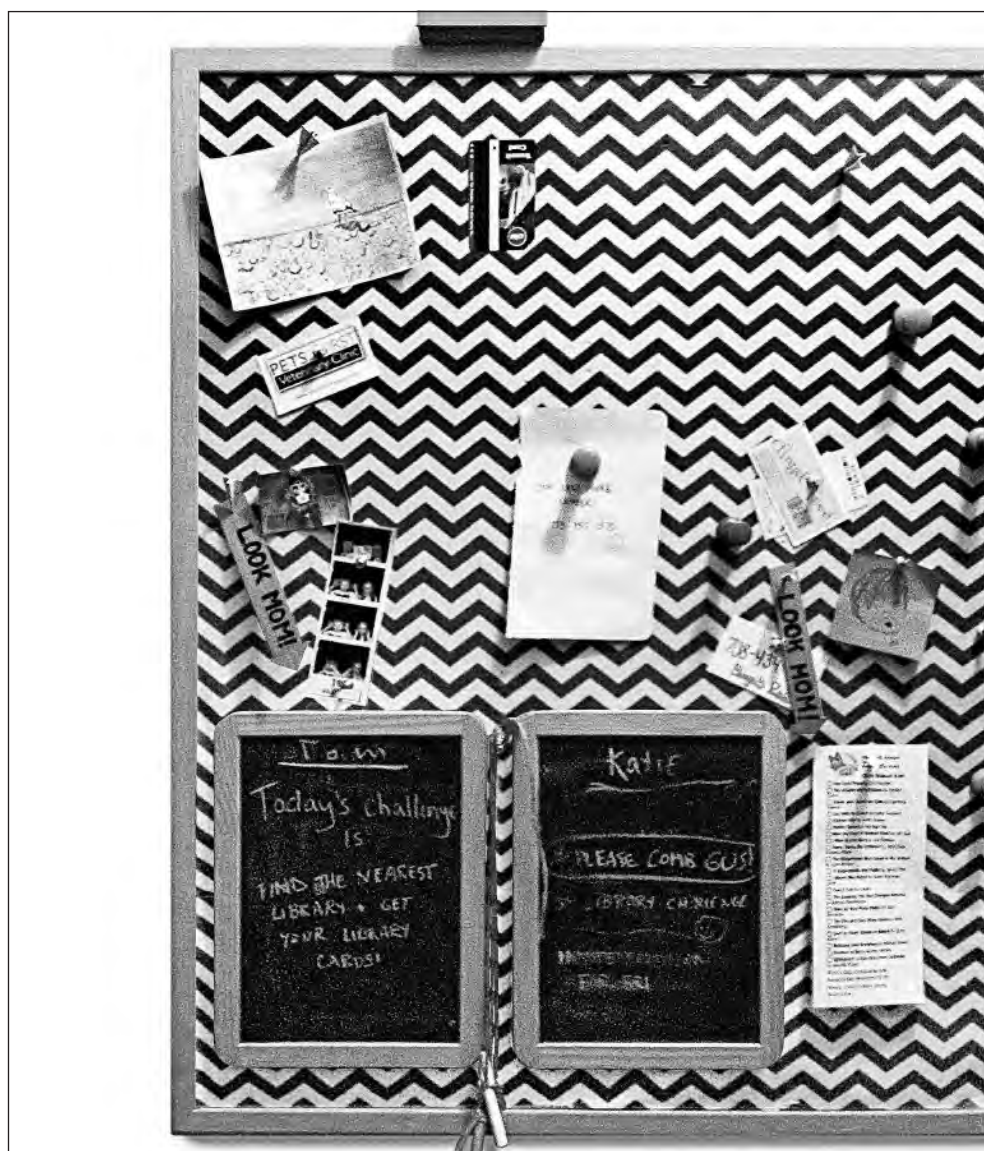
And you've probably already started thinking about where all that stuff, and the papers of varying degrees of importance that go with it, are going to wind up once school's in session.

We've tried various ways of corralling and organizing for the school year, and this year's version is a return to the tried-and-true, with a twist or two. It's also a testament to a little reality check: If you want to be dead-sure you don't forget that field trip permission slip/ticket to the play/map of the bike paths, you might have to stick it directly into your line of sight — in other words, on the wall.

Enter the trusty pin board. Put one up, dress it up a little bit and embrace the fact that life comes with reminders, sometimes of the paper sort.

The board: Go for one that covers the wall space you can devote to it — the bigger the better. Look like you mean it, not like you're hiding your pin board.

The covering: That said, why not hide your pin board? Though natural cork or sleek white or black metal (should you prefer a

magnet board) have their appeal, a classic corkboard can easily be dressed up with patterned paper (try

wallpaper) or fabric to give it a look that suits you.

paper airplanes stuck into the board, but giant colorful ones run a close second. One warning: Big pins make big holes in your board and may not stay up as well as the standard sizes.

The extras: Using picture-hanging strips, we added a small chalkboard for each kid, creating a custom message-leaving spot. Chalk, tied up with twine, was stuck into the board nearby using pushpins.

Another great option: attaching a pocket for each person to serve as an in-box for stuff that doesn't need pinning.

The red alert: It isn't actually red, but each kid now is the proud owner of a paper arrow that reads, "LOOK MOM!" Explanation? Could be their best new artwork, could need a signature, could be a kid emergency — whatever the paper is, sometimes mom needs a little extra help seeing which one needs dealing with right now.

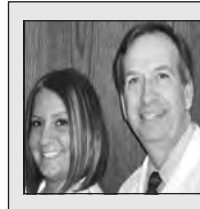
The fun: Anything that needs a prominent, but not a permanent, home can go on the board. That snapshot from the class party, a postcard, a blue ribbon, a piece of artwork — all can serve to make the board an ever-changing portrait of what's going on in your house, and a fun place to look. (Which means you might see that field trip note in the nick of time.)

covered by a multi-layered moisture film that protects our eye surface. In rosacea, the tear-producing glands of our eyelids begin to malfunction. This makes our tears abnormal and leads to dry eye syndrome, or for some people this means your eyes feel dry or scratchy.

For others, your vision is fuzzy or blurry at times. Restoring the normal tear gland function is our goal in treatment.

This condition is actually more inflammation than infection. We treat the inflamed eye tissue with topical eye medications and oral medications. Excellent new eye drop medicines can quiet the inflammation and help restore normal oil gland performance. Oral medications, often in the tetracycline family, are useful in restoring more normal tear production as

well. And the old home remedy of using warm compresses directly on the eyelids can also help. On the other hand, another old remedy of using baby shampoo on the eyelids is now not recommended, as the shampoo actually damages our tear layer.

For many people, the oil-producing tear glands are so blocked or plugged that we must open them to allow normal secretion. This in-office procedure is painless and gives immediate results. Unfortunately, these treatments are not permanent. Rosacea

and dry eye syndrome are chronic processes, like arthritis, meaning they never completely go away. So many patients have some sort of "maintenance treatment" at home or in the office from time to time.

There are other new treatments for dry eyes that can restore comfortable, moist eyes like you had years ago. Talk to your eye doctor about your treatment choices.

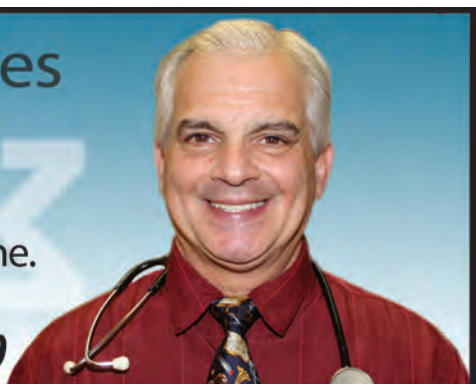

2013 Honor Book Awards

Meet Sheila Turnage

Sheila Turnage won a 2013 Newbery Honor Book award for "Three Times Lucky." This is her first novel for kids.

Growing up

Sheila decided to become a writer when she was in the first grade. After she wrote her first story in class, the teacher said, "This is an excellent story, and you are an excellent writer."

"I absolutely believed her," Sheila said. The teacher took her to the third-grade classroom, telling her, "Read it to the third-graders."

"I was terrified of them; they were so big," Sheila said. "I was scared to death." But by the end of the story, she said, "I had the third-graders eating out of my hand. I remember walking out of that room and thinking, 'This is it. This is what I'm doing.'"

In "Three Times Lucky," Moses LoBeau plans to hang out for the summer with her best friend, Dale. But when Dale becomes a suspect in a murder, the two friends go to work to clear his name.



Sheila, 59, and her husband, Rodney Beasley, live in the house in North Carolina where her great-grandparents lived. They have a blind dog, an Australian blue heeler. Her husband owns a company that restores old homes, and the couple restored their home. There are deer, turkeys, coyotes, rabbits and chickens in their yard.

Learning to tell stories

Sheila said her experience "just shows how important teachers are." Her teacher could have discouraged her instead of making her excited.

Many members of her parents' families were great storytellers, she said. She learned from them.

She has written many magazine articles, especially travel stories. She has also written adult-level nonfiction books and one picture book for kids.

Her background

Sheila earned her college degree in **cultural anthropology**, which is the study of how people live. She said it "is the study of realities, so a pretty good thing for a writer to learn about and think about." When she was a student, she helped excavate a Mayan temple.

Some favorites

Sports: scuba diving — "It's so beautiful under the water."

Books for kids: "Peter Pan" and Hardy Boys mysteries: "I loved those books you could move right into. The Hardy Boys were both exciting and safe at the same time. You knew they'd be OK."

Advice for kids

"If you want to be a writer, just jump in there and do it. You can't do it wrong. If you're doing it for yourself, nobody's going to be grading it. Write about what you really, really care about."

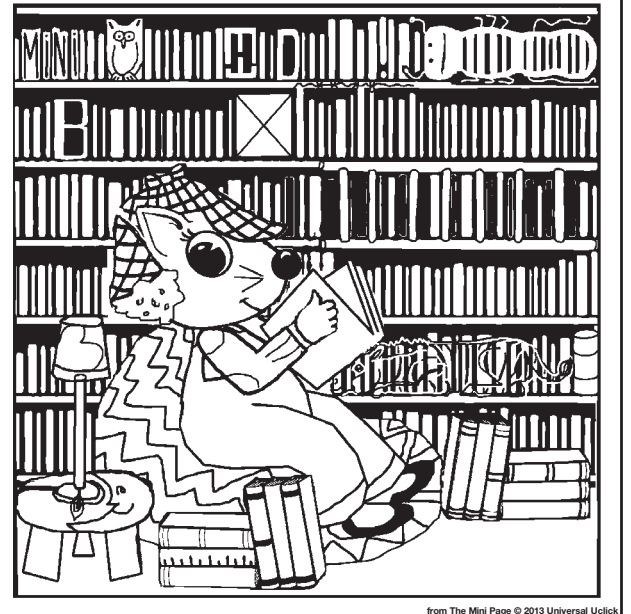

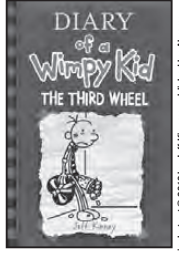
Talented youngsters keep surfacing in the surfing world, but Slater doesn't shy away from competition. He still answers the call of the roaring ocean and takes on the giant waves.

Favorite author

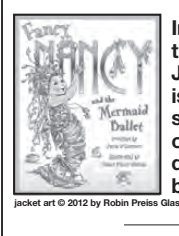

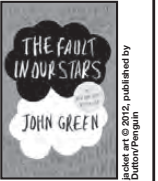

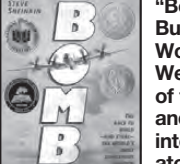

Sellers: Make buyers want your house

AFTER LAST SUNDAY'S column, where I shared some home buying tips, I felt it would only be appropriate to provide sellers with some tips as well.

As I mentioned last week, buying and selling a home is one of, if not the largest, most important transactions you'll make in life. However, it's not something that most people get a lot of practice at, except for real estate agents. So, here's a list of things that will help those of you who are selling now or anytime in the future.

- Leave for all showing appointments on your home. Do not wait until the buyers and their agent get there. Leave before they show up and make sure you're gone until the appointment time is over.
- Stage your home! It works ... period.
- De-clutter and organize everything, even closets. Buyers will open all closet doors and they'll check out every storage space available in your home while viewing it. These areas shouldn't look full, because it will give the impression that there isn't enough storage space.
- If you have a lot of stuff, rent a storage unit and clean out before putting your home on the market. Buyers cannot see past your stuff.
- A fresh coat of paint works wonders.
- Pay attention to your home's curb-appeal and make sure it's ready for the market. You never get a second chance to make a first impression, and sometimes your home may never get that chance if the exterior isn't up to par. Many buyers will drive by a home before making an appointment to view the inside, and if the exterior disappoints, then the buyers will probably pass on seeing the interior.
- De-personalize. Buyers need to be able to see themselves living in your home. Another reason this is important is because the pictures that are taken of your home and put on the Multiple Listing Service (MLS) are linked to numerous additional websites, which means that photographs of your children and family hanging on the wall will be posted for the world to see.
- Remove everything off the outside of your refrigerator. Yes, the children's artwork is fabulous and deserves to be displayed, but not while the home is listed for sale.
- Keep your home show ready (or as close to it as possible) for those last minute showing appointments.
- One thing overall to keep in mind when your home is listed is it's now a marketed item for sale. Think about what you expect when you're purchasing something. You expect it to be easy to see and inspect, you want it to be clean and in good condition, and most importantly you have to want it. So sellers, make the buyers want your home.

Create a family room with style

In many homes, the "family room" is decorated with just one purpose: to withstand the impact of juice-spilling, game-playing, cookie-eating, crayon-wielding children.

The result is often a room that's long on durability but short on style.

How can you create a stylish, sophisticated family room where grown-ups will want to spend time, while still keeping the space kid-friendly?

Three design experts — Brian Patrick Flynn of decor demon.com and Flynnside Out Productions; Betsy Burnham of Burnham Design; and Jon Call of Mr. Call Designs — offer some advice:

Strong fabrics

"Design technology and textiles are catching up with our family-friendly lifestyle," said Burnham. "There are so many outdoor fabrics, so many amazing vinyls" that are durable and easy to clean, but also look good. Burnham is a fan of Holly Hunt fabrics treated with Nano-Tex, which resists spills and stains without changing the fabric's texture.

Indoor/outdoor rugs are another great option now that they're being made with materials soft to the touch.

Flynn, who often uses Sunbrella indoor/outdoor fabrics, suggests upholstering with removable slipcovers for easy cleaning.

When choosing slipcovers, "washed linen is great since it's meant to look worn-in and super casual." He's also a fan of very dark denim: "Navy blue and charcoal are my go-to choices for denim slipcovers since they look more tailored than basic beiges or creams."

Neat sofas

Call recommends skipping sofas that have three or four seat cushions and several more cushions across the back. "If you've got kids playing and jumping on those," he said, you'll constantly be finding the cushions out of place or on the floor.

Instead, he said, pick a sofa with one large seat cushion and no separate cushions along the back — "something tailored and clean looking" that won't need its cushions adjusted constantly.

Multi-use tables

Family rooms are built for entertaining, so think about flexible seating, Burnham said. "Maybe a side table that's also a stool, or a coffee table that's also a bench or an ottoman."

Kids can use an ottoman as a surface for games, while adult party guests can use it as seating.

Opt for tables with rounded corners for safety in rooms where kids often play, Flynn said, and choose tables with "metal or weathered wood tops. Metal tops can withstand heavy wear and tear, while weathered wood is intended to look worn, so as kids take their toll on the pieces, it simply adds to the intended look."

Varied lighting

Rooms that do double-duty need lighting that does too, said Call.

"When you have adults over or if you're watching TV or it's a more intimate moment, you want a lamp by the sofa, at

eye-level or below, to create intimate pools of light," he said.

But kids doing homework or art projects need the brighter light that overhead fixtures provide. Make sure your family room has both.

Extra storage

Have a place for everything, Burnham said, so toys and other kid-related items can be put away easily at the end of the day. She recommends a wall of built-in cabinets with doors, so kids' clutter can be easily stashed, at hand but out of sight.

She also suggests creating storage space in the family room for a few fragile or valuable items that aren't kid-friendly.

"You can have a cashmere throw in the cabinet that you pull out for the adults," Burnham said. By storing these things in the room, you're more likely to really use them, yet they're protected from the kids' play.

Flynn also recommends built-ins, and suggests "adding color and pattern to their back panels."

"I usually use large-scale patterned wallpaper," he said. Consider nautical styles: "They're casual and fun, and they don't take themselves too seriously."

For additional storage, Flynn said, replace coffee tables with "upholstered storage ottomans complete with safety locking mechanisms, which prevent lit-

tle ones from getting inside of them to hide, and also protecting any little fingers from hinges." He suggests upholstering ottomans with indoor-outdoor fabrics so they'll withstand spills and sticky fingers.

Bold colors

In a high-traffic family room, Call suggests sticking with deeper colors rather than whites or pale shades.

Flynn agreed: "The one color I use more than any other in family-centric spaces is navy blue," he said, because it can appeal to the whole family. He recommends Seaworthy navy from Sherwin-Williams: "It has just the right amount of purple in it to make it bright instead of dark."

"Red is another high-energy hue which works great in family rooms," Flynn said, which works well with most other colors, especially black-brown, navy blue and charcoal.

Playful decor

Don't hide the fact that the room is being shared with kids, Flynn said.

"Embrace it. Work children and playfulness into the design of a family room's aesthetic," he suggested.

On the walls, he likes to use "pop art or original photography of toys, especially vintage toys, or black-and-white candid photography of the family blown up to an enormous scale" to personalize the room.

Don't monkey around with your nest egg

Q: Should I take advantage of a 403(b) withdrawal in order to buy a house?— Bryan

A: I wouldn't do that because it really doesn't accomplish anything. The only money you can take out is what you've put in, and any growth you've experienced has to stay in there. Basically, it's a retirement plan, and I wouldn't monkey around with retirement money to buy a home.

My advice is to make sure you're debt-free and you have three to six months of expenses set aside in an emergency fund. Once you've taken care of those issues, you can pile up a bunch of cash in a money market account toward the purchase of a home. You won't earn a lot of money, but it's a safe place to park your cash when you're saving up for a big purchase.

When it comes to saving and investing, I'm a big fan of mutual funds. The problem in this scenario is that if you start sticking money in mutual funds, then the market is down when you're ready to buy, you could've lost some money. That's not the route I'd want to go if I'm in your shoes, Bryan. I'd forego the opportunity to make money in order to keep it safe for this goal.

Q: I'm 24 years old, and I have a wife and child. We've been following your plan, and I'm about to buy life insurance. Should I get a 20- or 30-year term policy?— Derek

A: I think the big question is how long will you need this life insurance. If you and your wife are planning on having more kids in the next 10 years, I'd suggest a 30-year policy. That could put you in a situation of being 34 years old with a new baby. That's not old by any means, but your wife will need 20 years' worth of coverage if this happens, because you'd want the kids grown and out of the house before the insurance term runs out.

But that's just one of your financial goals at this point. You also want to be debt-free. And you need to ask yourself some other questions. Are you going to have your house paid for 15 years from now? I sure hope you didn't take out more than a 15-year mortgage. Are your kids going to be grown and gone by then? Are you going to have a big pile of money in the bank by then? In other words, where are you going to be at the end of the term?

If 15 years from now, you have \$700,000 in your retirement account, your house is paid for, and the kids are out on their own, then, if you die, your wife will be fine, financially speaking. But at that time, if you still have kids in the house and your home isn't paid off, then you'd probably need a 20-year policy.

That's how I would look at it. How much longer are you going to need life insurance?

Workers get more vacation time

Fewer paid sick days also noted

LOS ANGELES — Americans workers get more vacation time today than a decade ago, but far fewer paid sick days, according to new government data.

The average full-time worker at a private company gets 10 days of vacation a year, up from eight days in 1993, according to the analysis by the Bureau of Labor Statistics.

That expands over time, with the average employee getting 14 vacation days after five years (compared with 13 days in 1993) and 20 days after 20 years (versus 18 days in 1993).

This is good news considering the widespread advice from re-

searchers' about the psychological and professional benefits of taking vacations.

However, the boost in paid vacations is being more than offset by a pronounced reduction in paid sick days off.

For the average full-timer who's been at his or her company for a year, paid sick time has dropped to eight days from 10 days in 1993, according to the BLS. That's the exact reverse of the increase in vacation.

And the gap between now and the past widens the longer a worker is at a company.

The average person today gets eight sick days after five years (versus 13 in 1993). That rises to 10 paid sick days after 20 years. But that's down from 17 days a decade ago.

And don't count on making it up at Christmas or other holidays. The average worker gets eight holidays off a year, down from 10 a decade ago.

U.S. temp workforce hits record

DAYTON, Ohio — Seven years ago, Larry Mayham earned \$13 an hour, often working 60 to 70 hours a week as a driver taking handicapped clients to their jobs.

Today, he holds a similar job — but as a temporary worker. He earns \$10 an hour and works less than 30 hours a week. He's in constant pain from a tooth extraction gone bad, but he can't afford to see a specialist.

He goes to the food pantry once a month, just to get by.

Mayham is part of a growing trend in the American workforce. In an uncertain economy, more companies are relying on temporary workers, who accounted for about one-fifth of private-sector job growth in Ohio in 2012, according to federal labor data. In June, the U.S. Department of Labor reported that the nation has 2.7 million temp workers, the highest number on record.

In Ohio, temporary staffing services employed 105,412 people in 2012 compared to 73,757 in 2009, according to the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics. The average annual pay for a temp worker in Ohio was estimated at \$22,512 in 2012, with an average weekly wage of \$433. That's essentially flatlined since 2007, when temporary employees averaged an annual salary of \$21,590. "I haven't had a raise in six years," Mayham said.

Some people, like Connie Adam, of Middletown, Ohio, love the flexibility of temp work because it allows her to go on more vacations and manage her own schedule. In the past, she had worked her way into a full-time job through a temp-to-hire arrangement. "My experiences have been mostly positive," she said. "I love it now, because I can take time off to spend with my grandkids. I'm not bound by the company's vacation schedule."

But others experience a significant reduction in salary, self-esteem and quality of life. Single mother Michelle Back, of Bellefontaine, Ohio, can't afford to buy a home or provide basic

medical care for her young daughter. "It is a bad time for the worker," said Glenn Couch, 64, of Middletown. "You can't find work nowhere unless it's at one of these temp agencies that are popping up everywhere."

Tom Maher, president and CEO of Manpower of Dayton Inc., an employment agency, believes the uptick is due to the scarcity of skilled labor and the uncertainty about government programs, particularly the Affordable Care Act. "There's still uncertainty about the rules and regulations under the ACA, so there's uncertainty about the pending costs," he said.

Shawn Cassiman, associate professor of social work at the University of Dayton, said that the health-care law isn't to blame — that the resurgence of the temporary worker is "part of a whole cycle, a long-term trend that includes a withdrawal of support from workers and an attack on labor unions. Workers today are less likely to be represented fairly in the workforce."

She said economists have described the trend as the rise of a new, precarious class. "There are more and more workers living precarious lives, not knowing when they're going to be fired," she explained. "McDonald's even talks about the second job that employees might need to make ends meet."

Doug Barry, the president of Barry Staff, a Dayton-based staffing company, said the company sees about 125 people per week apply for temp work. Barry said the goal is to get temp workers hired on as full-time employees, and the company has succeeded with many of its workers.

"We only hire 20 to 25 percent of people who walk through our door," he said. "We want good workers, so we really weed through applicants with an interview process and testing."

For Mayham, temp work represents a painful change in his lifestyle. "I enjoy the work, but I wish it paid more," he said. "I use 70 percent of my income just to pay the rent."

Why don't men wear their shorts while working?

I HATE PANTS.

So deep is my dislike of these bifurcated leg prisons that I'd be fine ending this column right here. It would give me more time to stare menacingly at the dreaded jeans and khakis the working world demands I wear.

But I'm going to be mature about this. America's most-beloved workplace advice columnist does not pout. He investigates. He seeks answers — in this case to the question that plagues many a comfort-starved man: Why, in most cases, is it unacceptable for men to wear shorts to work, even on the sweatiest dog days of summer?

I reached out to workplace fashion expert Mary Lou Andre, editor of DressingWell.com, and asked why shorts are never seen as an option.

"They're just not the norm in our society in most industries — they're a distraction," she said. "They are one of the lower-food-chain bottom options. With shorts on, for women, an inappropriate skirt, you're emphasizing the bottom half (of your body). You don't want to emphasize the bottom part of your body."

In other words, you want people to look you in the eyes and not be distracted by a piece of outside-the-norm clothing.

"How you're dressed really does set the stage," Andre said. "To ignore it is not smart."

If there's one thing I've never been accused of being, it's smart. So I conducted an anthropological workplace study by wearing shorts to work.

The modern-day newsroom is not what you would call a high-fashion zone. I'd describe my standard form of dress as "hobo chic," so it's not like people expect me to strut around in the latest cutting-edge couture.

On top of that, it was a day where the temperature was creeping up toward 100 degrees. So it would be perfectly reasonable to not wear pants, right?

Wrong. Even though my newspaper doesn't technically have a dress code that bars shorts, I felt awkward. People noticed I was wearing shorts, and not just because my finely sculpted calves are a wonder to behold. I appeared out of place.

I was cool and comfortable, as I had always dreamed of being at work, yet I felt goofy, almost as if I was walking around in my underwear.

I found that fascinating. By wearing shorts, I wasn't violating any official rules and nobody seemed to care, though one person jokingly asked if I was going to a Pearl Jam concert. But it felt wrong, which is saying a lot coming from a staunchly pro-shorts person like myself.

Looks like the male legs will be on lockdown.

Keep cool with sneaky co-worker

Q: One of my co-workers is really hard to work with. He seems ambitious, and sometimes I think he doesn't share information I need in order to make me look bad. What can I do?

A: Focus on your own goal: To do your job well, and look for ways to obtain the resources you need.

The inner game

The first step is to address that so that you can bring balance to your considerations. Take several deep breaths, breathing in through your nose and releasing through your mouth. Let any stress, annoyance, or anxiety dissipate with each breath.

It seems like there are two issues here, both rooted in mistrust. In general, what is your trust level with this colleague? Are there other ways in which he demonstrates himself to be untrustworthy? If, for example, the fact that he wants to get ahead in his career undermines him with you, you may have to reassess your values. If you have evidence, however, that he would step on people to get there, that's another matter.

Regarding information sharing, are there other ways you could interpret his behavior? He may not actually know what information you need at any given time, or may have other priorities that he sees as more urgent. This doesn't get you the info you need, but it does change the dynamics based on motive.

Then reflect on his interactions with other co-workers. Do others also have issues with him? Also consider your general "get along" skills to ensure that it's not a more-general pattern with you.

The outer game

Map out the information you need: What, when, and from whom. Depending on your work, this may take the form of a monthly plan for ongoing projects, or it may be more general for one-time requests. Notice risks you may have in terms of tight turnaround times for information from others, only having one person who can help you (what happens if someone is sick or on vacation), or major unknowns that could require analysis that isn't built into the timeline.

Then start planning to mitigate these risks. For example, you may have a certain type of project that will require information from this co-worker with only a two-day turnaround. Each time it occurs, it could cause you to feel that information is being withheld, but it could actually just be a planning issue that could be worked out collaboratively in advance.

But you may find that benign explanations don't hold up, and that he really is sabotaging you. At this point, take your concerns, your evidence, and your efforts to effectively collaborate to your boss to get help. Because you've been proactive and collegial, this will not reflect poorly on you, and could gain you the support you need.

The last word

Start with the high ground so that you can resolve the issues or, in a pinch, come out ahead.

Health insurance forces tough decisions

ATLANTA — Lisa Ehlers had landed her dream job.

After 19 years teaching elementary school in Cherokee County, Ga., the Woodstock resident used her new master's degree in social work to secure a job at a for-profit agency that provides outpatient mental health services to children and adolescents.

"I just loved it," Ehlers said of her time at Focus Counseling and Training. "I loved [owner Beth

Brock] and the other employees. But I couldn't stay." Ehlers, 44 and a single mom after her husband died in 2005 from cystic fibrosis, needed health insurance for her two boys, especially her 13-year-old who suffers from bipolar disorder and requires costly medications and therapy. Brock could not afford to offer it, so Ehlers took a job at the larger Ridgeview Institute in Smyrna, which did.

Ehlers' story offers one small example of how the

availability of health insurance can affect employers and employees in the most personal and even painful ways: Focus lost a dedicated worker it did not want to lose. The story can also serve as a microcosm of America's larger health-care crisis — the lack of affordable coverage for all — and how the grand effort to solve the problem, the Affordable Care Act, is forcing some companies and employees to make tough business decisions.

Employers far and wide

have criticized the ACA. They say health coverage shouldn't be government-mandated and add that the requirement that businesses offer it will have unintended negative consequences.

For Brock, the ACA will limit her hiring and cause her to put off the big plans she had to open a second office in Savannah, her hometown, she said.

It will, she said, "stop us from growing." She is angry because Congress and the White House "put

something into law without knowing what it was or how it would affect the big picture." About 49 million people don't have health insurance because they can't afford it, or don't see it as a priority. Some haven't been able to obtain it, even if they've wanted it, because they have pre-existing medical conditions. As a result, the uninsured often had to seek care in high-cost emergency rooms. Medical bills are the nation's No. 1 cause of bankruptcy.

Restaurant uniforms becoming multipurpose

KANSAS CITY, Mo. — Celebrated chef Patrick Ryan once walked away from a chef's position at a top Chicago hotel, mostly because he couldn't stand the uniform he had to wear 50 to 90 hours a week.

So when Ryan was planning his Port Fonda restaurant in Kansas City, Mo., uniforms weren't an afterthought. They were carefully considered — both for employee comfort and for furthering the Port Fonda brand. His workers now wear designer jeans, shirts and even hats by Kansas City's nationally recognized Baldwin Denim.

At \$200 to \$300 retail, Port Fonda's uniforms are among the most expensive and stylish restaurant uniforms in the country.

"We were taking a 'bigger city' approach, not only with the food and drink but with the design, the atmosphere, the music and what the staff were going to be wearing," Ryan said. "We wanted a relaxed vibe, not stuffy. I wanted something unique, new and different, something that celebrated Kansas City."

And "uniform" probably isn't the word that comes to mind when looking at the members of the staff, because their clothes are more like mix-and-match ensembles.

Nearly one in 10 workers, or \$13.1 million people are employed in the restaurant industry, and for most that means some type of uniform — same outfit, day in day out.

Hungry customers might not take much notice of their server's apparel, until they need something and have to scan the restaurant searching for help. Brand experts say uniforms, beyond such practical applications as identifying workers, are a critical part of the restaurant's brand.

Indeed, organizations as diverse as Playboy and the San Francisco 49ers take uniforms so serious-

ly they have registered them with the U.S. Patent & Trademark Office.

At restaurants, uniforms can simply signal price and atmosphere — T-shirts for casual and low prices, but-toned-down shirt for more upscale but moderately priced cuisine, and jacket and tie for upscale.

Whether it's a conservative country club or modern cutting-edge restaurant, a comfortable, stylish uniform also help recruit and retain workers, experts said. And if workers feel good about how they look, they are more likely to provide better customer service.

From military dress to Playboy bunny outfits, uniforms create a sense of community, of belonging, said Ann Willoughby, founder and chief creative officer of Kansas City-based Willoughby

Design, an innovation and branding company.

"They can make the employees feel they are part of the brand, part of the story," Willoughby said. "It identifies who they are, who works there, and signals to the public that someone is there to help them."

Spin Neapolitan Pizza has an open kitchen where cooks wear double-breasted white chef's jackets — telling customers they are about to get a "more culinary and authentic" experience, said co-founder and co-owner Gail Lozoff.

Spin's servers wear black pants or jeans and a Spin T-shirt. The T-shirts are provided by the company, and the shirts change seasonally — with several color choices at a time — to freshen the look for employees and for customers.

"The uniforms are usually worn by young people, so you want something that complements young people's bodies, not something that would look like what their mothers would wear," Willoughby said.

At Standees, a new restaurant and movie theater complex in Prairie Village, members of the development team spent hours scrutinizing uniforms on mannequins and testing various fabrics for wear-ability, durability and stain resistance. They settled on several styles for the restaurant and theater employees, outfits that are comfortable in the workplace and stylish enough to wear if they want to go for a beer afterward.

Black pants are standard at Standees, but then each position has its own shirt.

Prepare for odd questions at interviews

ENTER "DUMB INTERVIEW QUESTIONS" in a search engine, and you can spend hours reading examples from job hunters and human resource professionals alike.

The interesting thing is not everyone agrees what questions are stupid.

Some interviewers ask, "If you were a tree/cookie/animal, what would you be?" They say the answer gives insight into candidates' creativity and ability to think on their feet.

Others think that question deserves a response like, "What relevance does that have to the job? I'd rather respond to a real job-related problem."

Given the nature of the job market since 2008, here's another question that grates: "Where do you see yourself in five years?" Some interviewers say it speaks to ambition, tenacity and loyalty.

To which others say, "Ha!" No one can predict job status five years out. Best to say, "I hope to be a productive contributor in a valued position." Don't snap, "I expect to have your job," or "I plan to own the company."

Job applicants need to be prepared for: "Tell me about yourself." "Why do you want this job?" and "Tell me about a time when you solved a problem" (or something else "behavioral").

The jury is out on whether the first two requests are dumb. Expect them anyway. Many job interviewers believe they open windows to a candidate's character.

Ideally, interviewers have job-relevant questions. Ideally, interviewers and applicants hold conversations that help both determine "fit" for the job.

Worker feels shorted by 'pay for performance' ranking system

Q: I am appalled by the "pay for performance" system recently implemented by my company, which has more than 10,000 employees. Forced rankings are used to assign performance review scores, so 60 percent of the staff must now be rated as "meets expectations." Only 10 percent are allowed to receive the highest rating of "outstanding."

To place people in rating categories, each department holds a meeting in which the managers discuss their employees' performance. Names are moved around until every category is filled. Even if there are many outstanding staff mem-

bers, only 10 percent can get the top score.

I feel sure that all the managers will lobby for their own employees, so those of us who work for less persuasive or influential people are likely to lose out. What do you think about this approach?

A: Since most people agree that greater contributions merit greater rewards, "pay for performance" makes perfect sense conceptually. The

problem is that virtually everyone believes they are "above average," so lower ratings often trigger lengthy debates. To avoid these unpleasant arguments, many managers, left to their own devices, simply give higher ratings to everybody.

Your company's group ranking approach spreads the performance distribution across entire departments instead of applying it to each individual unit, which is a reasonable strategy for increasing validity. But, as you point out, assigning ratings through open discussion can easily create a "squeaky wheel" bias.

If your boss seems to be a predictably feeble advocate, consider sharing this

concern with your human resources manager. That may help to balance the scales, since the HR department is almost always involved in establishing final rankings.

Q: I work with a group of people who like to discuss their personal lives. Every Monday morning, someone will ask what my boyfriend and I did over the weekend. I am private by nature and would prefer not to share this information, but I don't want to seem rude. How should I handle these nosy co-workers?

A: Most of the time, "What did you do this weekend?" is an innocuous query, similar to "How are

you?" People are asking just to be polite. They have no interest in hearing a detailed account of events and would probably be dismayed to receive one.

Therefore, you can simply respond with a brief and bland answer — like "oh, the usual stuff" or "nothing very interesting" — quickly followed by an inquiry about your colleague's activities. Since most people greatly prefer talking about themselves, this question should shift the conversational focus. The price you must pay for privacy is listening to the answer.

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2013 Audi RS 5 comes to U.S., finally

American Audi fans finally can get their hands on a few — just a few — Audi RS 5 Coupes and Cabriolets.

Sold in Europe for a few years, the highest-performance versions of the Audi A5 started to arrive on U.S. soil for the first time this model year.

With just about everything standard, these 450-horsepower, V-8-powered, two-door, handsomely crafted cars will be rare. Just 1,500 are slated for this market.

The exclusivity, the RS image that offers Americans a new alternative to BMW's M and Mercedes-Benz's AMG brands, and the lustful performance of 0 to 60 miles per hour in about 4 seconds from a hand-built engine are designed to position Audi at a new level.

Certainly, the powerful and impeccably handling RS 5s, which come standard with Audi's quattro all-wheel drive system, build on Audi's winning race heritage. It was just last month that Audi celebrated its 12th win in 13 years at the famous Le Mans 24 Hours race in France.

The RS 5s also build upon Audi's somewhat "cult luxury car brand" reputation in the United States.

The RS 5 Coupe test car had an unusual, darker blue color called Sepang Blue that attractively camouflaged the spirited nature of the car. From the front, though, there's no missing the wide stance of an RS 5 and the massive, black grille.

The test RS 5 Coupe started up melodiously, with awesomely deep engine sounds. Note the test car had the \$1,000 optional sport exhaust that definitely was worth having for its showoff value.

A push on the accelerator brought instant response, though

the car moved with a heaviness and solidity that seemed more Mercedes than Audi.

To be sure, the RS 5 Coupe weighs more than 4,000 pounds with standard 19-inch tires, and the test car had the optional-for-\$1,000 20-inchers.

Find time for family dinners

THE OTHER DAY, my family and I were sitting together having dinner. Our daughter, who is 8, recounts that she had to tell a little boy to not pick on her brother. Her brother is 5, 63 pounds big for his age and doesn't yet realize his size.

As she tells the story of how she had to raise her voice to get her point across, my son began to explain how he felt about being picked on. He said that he didn't really care about it; he just thought that the kid was a being silly and that knew he was like that to most of the kids. In my son's words, he felt sorry for the kid, since he made choices that decreased his chances of having more friends.

This conversation allowed my wife and me to discuss our thoughts on the topic of making positive choices and give both children affirmations pertaining to their

chosen behaviors.

We also shared times when we, as parents and when we were younger, had to make choices that were difficult because of peer pressure. This conversation became very intimate, and the amount of disclosure that came out of it seemed to bring a feeling of love to our little kitchen.

Unexpectedly, while I was cleaning the table off (that is my kitchen job, because my cooking stinks) my daughter came over and hugged me. I said thanks and asked what brought that on. She replied, "Just because."

Sitting down for dinner

allows the family to get together and keeps us, as parents, invested in getting to know each other and our children.

Working for WVU Extension Service, I have found out that there are many things that family-style meals positively affect. Here are just a few:

- Decreased obesity — Simply eating together helps children stay

healthy, physically, as well as have better mental and emotional health. One of the impressive mechanisms of family meal-times is their inverse relationship with obesity. Studies have shown that a greater frequency of family meals is associated with a lower risk for obesity (Gable, Chung & Krull, 2007). Research consistently finds that chil-

dren who eat at home consume a healthier diet.

- Reduction of risky behaviors — Consistent family mealtime decreases the chance your children will drink, smoke or use drugs. Strong evidence from many studies shows that it has positive effects on behavior. Research has demonstrated that teens who have regular dinner-time with their families are less likely to use drugs, misuse prescription drugs, smoke cigarettes, use marijuana and abuse alcohol. Middle school-age girls who ate five or more meals a week with their families were much less likely to drink, smoke or use marijuana five years later. Some studies have shown that girls seem to benefit more than boys. (CASA, 2007).

- School performance — Another positive behavioral outcome is that children who eat dinner with

their families tend to have higher academic achievement and enriched language development (Fiese & Schwartz, 2008).

If you are interested in finding out more about the positive effects of family-style meals, please browse the Extension Service website at ext.wvu.edu. There are many facts that will blow you away pertaining to how you can positively impact your family with simple efforts.

Now, to get to the point of all this. If you say you don't have time to eat together, I will disagree with you. It's a matter of prioritizing. Sit, talk and engage with your kids, and what you will find is a healthy love for one another that stems from making a choice and finding time.

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Budget-friendly convertibles elusive in modern market

Most motorists don't notice a particular car or truck until they consider leasing or buying one. With as many cars as I drive in a year, I am no different. I may not pay attention to a vehicle until I am driving one or writing about it.

So, I noticed something a few weeks ago while test driving a 2014 Ford Mustang convertible. Or, perhaps, it's what I didn't notice: Convertibles. And it wasn't my imagination.

According to industry publication *Automotive News*, convertibles, which accounted for 2 percent of the U.S. car market in 2006, barely reach 1 percent today.

This is backed up by my own research.

Back in March, I wrote a story on affordable convertibles, with base prices starting at less than \$35,000. I was hoping to do 10 but could find only eight.

Have we forgotten how to have fun? Or are we too concerned about skin cancer? Actually, the culprit may be sunroofs. According to Edmunds.com, 45 percent of 2013 model-year rides have sunroofs as standard equipment.

Consumers still like drop-tops — the term the British use for convertibles — but many mainstream automakers don't offer them. Honda, Hyundai, Kia, Scion, Subaru, Mitsubishi and Toyota don't sell any. Nissan does, but its 370Z roadster starts at \$41,470 before options. That's not budget-friendly.

Of course, high-end auto manufacturers realize that even if they don't sell a lot of them, ragtops add glamour to the line. That's why just about every premium marque, except for

Lexus and Cadillac, has one.

That doesn't mean there aren't some wonderful, less-expensive ragtop rides out there. Both the Chevrolet Camaro and Ford Mustang can be had with folding roofs. The Fiat 500C, Mini Cooper, Chrysler 200, Mazda MX-5 Miata and Volkswagen Beetle all can go topless.

Ironically, when automobiles first appeared more than a century ago, they were all convertibles. Early on, the closed sedan was the most difficult to build, and usually the costliest model in the lineup. This is why so many cars, even luxury makes, had open cabins. It wasn't until General Motors perfected a way to build an all-steel body affordably in the 1930s that sedans surpassed other body styles in popularity.

By the 1960s, convertibles were still fairly common, whether full-size or midsize; there were even a handful of compact models.

But that changed in the 1970s when Congress threatened to pass rollover standards. In response, most mainstream automakers killed their ragtops.

When the threat seemed to have passed, Lee Iacocca revived the idea in 1982 with the Chrysler LeBaron and Dodge 400 droptops.

Since then, their popularity has waxed and waned, and now, it seems to be the latter.

Mainstream manufacturers seem captivated by the big sales afforded by the dull-but-practical crossover. Well, it's time for carmakers to let their hair down and produce more glamorous, reasonably priced ways for us to soak up the sun. I have my sunblock ready.

Ford to pay C-Max owners after overstating hybrid's MPG rating

LOS ANGELES — Bowing to criticism that its C-Max hybrid didn't get the fuel economy claimed on its window sticker, Ford Motor Co. has restated the compact car's mileage ratings and said it will issue special payments to people who own the vehicle.

Ford said it would make a special one-time, "goodwill" payment of \$550 to people who purchased the C-Max and \$325 to those who leased the vehicle.

Everyone will get the same payment regardless of when they purchased the car or how many miles they have put on their vehicle, said Raj Nair, Ford's group vice president for global product development.

Nair blamed the fuel economy label problem on "testing anomalies."

The fuel economy rating on the C-Max actually comes from a test of its automotive sibling, the Ford

Fusion hybrid.

The EPA said that label regulations allow, but do not require, vehicles with the same engine, transmission and weight class to use the same fuel economy label value data, "since, historically, such vehicle families achieve nearly identical fuel economy performance."

But Nair said it turns out that the more aerodynamic design of the Fusion sedan actually yields better results. Ford is now labeling the cars separately based on separate tests. It is also making some transmission gearing and aerodynamic changes to the 2014 version of the C-Max to improve fuel efficiency, he said.

The new fuel economy estimates for the 2013 model year C-Max are 43 miles per gallon for combined driving, 45 mpg for city and 40 mpg for highway, said the Environmental Protection Agency, which regulates the fuel economy ratings that go on car window stickers.

Fatherhood for the future

Cameras follow stay-at-home fathers in 'Modern Dads'

Fatherhood has never been easy. Often portrayed as hard-working breadwinners and strict disciplinarians, the role of fathers has evolved over the past several years and some men are taking daddy duty to new heights as stay-at-home dads.

Cameras follow four such fathers in the premiere of A&E's new reality TV program, "Modern Dads," debuting Wednesday, Aug. 21. The series is produced by Sirens Media, the same people behind "The Real Housewives of New Jersey." If the success of the channel's other unscripted shows such as "Duck Dynasty" and "Storage Wars" is any indication, "Modern Dads" has the potential to be a hit as it strikes a chord with viewers.

While stay-at-home parents are still typically women, the landscape is changing. Sometimes, it just makes more sense economically for a family if the mom is the higher wage earner, and sometimes women don't want to give up their fulfilling careers. The 2010 census estimated there were more than 150,000 fathers who stay at home with their kids as compared to more than five million women.

That's still a huge disparity, mind you, but the men in "Modern Dads" don't seem to be afraid of defying convention. If nothing else, they have each other as they form a tight-knit "guys club" on a playground in Austin, Texas.

"Times have completely changed," explained Nathan Hall, one of the featured dads. "It's not 'Leave it to Beaver' anymore, it's leave it to Nate-Dawg."

A professional music and portrait photographer, Hall is married to high-profile medical director Truly. After years of trying to conceive, in-vitro fertilization led to the birth of their little guy, Cormac, who's now one and the light of Hall's life. He's a typical over-protective first-time father who frets over anything and everything. As the rookie dad of the group, he relies on his good friends to show him the ropes of fatherhood.

He's got quite an eclectic bunch who dole out advice. With four kids, Rick Lucas is undoubtedly the most seasoned dad on the show and, from the looks of things, one of the most laid back. From his two boys, 10-year-old J.T. and seven-year-old Zach, to his twin one-year-olds, Elizabeth and Katherine, he shoulders the bulk of the daytime parenting duties as his wife Meghan works for a Fortune 500 company. Once referred to as "the MacGyver of Dads" when he appeared on a morning talk show, Lucas relishes his role as daddy dearest.

At the other end of the spectrum is single dad Stone Slade. While he has two older children — Hunter, 20, and Lexi, 16 — his main

focus these days is his littlest one, precocious five-year-old Danica. A true ladies' man, Stone sometimes takes advantage of his daughter's cuteness to hit on women, and often appalls his guy friends with his ability to charm beautiful gals. Interestingly, Slade may be the dad most comfortable with the spotlight, having grown up amid rock stars. As a youngster, he tagged along with his father as he toured with the Grateful Dead.

Rounding out the group is stay-at-home stepdad Sean Kent. Ten years ago, he was battling Hodgkin's lymphoma, but he beat the odds and now spends his days entertaining — and frequently humiliating — his stepdaughters Arwen, 8, and Joopsy, 5. Along with his gorgeous girlfriend Rachel, they've been a family of four since he moved in with them in

2007. While Rachel is busy running a tech start-up and painting on the side, Kent spends quality time with Arwen and Joopsy.

Judging by the screener, Kent is often the comic relief of the show.

"In my line of work, there's blood, sweat and tears," joked Kent in the opening.

His quip is just a taste of the kind of humor viewers can expect from "Modern Dads." These fathers obviously know that raising their kids is serious business, but they know how to have fun, too. They convene at a local park — their unofficial headquarters — where they discuss what's going on in their lives and their parenting challenges, a scene that often plays out on playgrounds across America with moms.

In once such meeting, Lucas seeks the guys' advice on what to do for his twins' first birthday party after he convinces wife Meghan to forego the party planner and let him do it. He comes up with a Godzilla

theme, complete with his two girls tromping through boxes made to look like buildings, but, thankfully, the guys talk him out of it and suggest a much more appropriate princess theme. Then, they all pitch in to pull it off.

Despite some good-natured ribbing,

the dads support each other through challenges big and small, just like stay-at-home parents should. With everything from baby wrestling to diaper demos, it's worth staying up past bedtime to watch "Modern Dads," premiering Wednesday, Aug. 21, on A&E.

Ghouls ghosts and sharks

Syfy's aquatic killers return from beyond

Ghouls, ghosts and ... sharks?: The howling sharknados have dissipated and the legendary sharktopus is missing in action. Surely, it must be safe to go in the water.

Think again. While Discovery's annual "Shark Week" may be behind us, Syfy isn't letting up on the toothy terrors. Earlier this year, the cable channel set the Internet into overdrive with "Sharknado," a modern take on the classic, low-budget monster movies of yesteryear, while back in 2010 it gave us a ravenous shark/octopus hybrid in "Sharktopus."

Someone should have told the survivors that sharks don't stay dead.

On Thursday, Aug. 22, Syfy premieres "Ghost Shark," continuing the network's trend of terrorizing (and often amusing) audiences with some of the most outrageously outlandish fish stories out there. In this latest outing, a great white shark rises from beyond the grave after being tortured and killed by a rather cruel fisherman. This ghostly shark doesn't just want revenge on this one man, however, but on the entire human race.

Not surprisingly, Syfy has attracted some recognizable faces to the project — despite their kookiness, the original features generate a lot of buzz, especially on the Internet. The many fans of "7th Heaven" will no doubt recognize the film's lead, Mackenzie Rosman. While on that show, she played the adorable little Ruthie Camden; in "Ghost Shark" she plays Ava, a young woman who discovers that no one believes her tall tale that a ghostly shark has brutally killed her father.

Anyone in the mood for something a little bit tongue-in-cheek should tune in as Ava tries to defeat the fish from beyond — and possibly save all of humanity in the process.

The Griffins go to Springfield: If there's a network that does animated families right, it's Fox. With "The Simpsons," "American Dad," "King of the Hill" and "Family Guy" all under its belt, Fox certainly holds a monopoly among the major networks for high-quality, animated sitcoms.

While they're not to everyone's taste ("Family Guy" especially has been called out for its crudeness), even their detractors can't deny the popularity of both "Family Guy" and "The Simpsons." It shouldn't be surprising, then, that at long last these two families are coming together.

"Family Guy" enters its 11th season this fall, but the folks behind it are already hard at work on a very special episode that's not due to air until 2014. In it, the Griffin family is leaving their Rhode Island city of Quahog and heading to Springfield, where they'll be meeting up with a certain famous family.

In a plus for fans of both shows, all of the main voice actors from "The Simpsons" will be voicing their characters for this special "Family Guy" episode. Bart Simpson (Nancy Cartwright, "Kim Possible"), Lisa Simpson (Yeardley Smith, "Dharma & Greg"), Marge Simpson (Julie Kavner, "Rhoda"), Homer Simpson (Dan Castellaneta, 2011's "Super 8") and Maggie Simpson (unvoiced) will all

be ready to welcome the visiting Griffins with open arms.

In a tongue-in-cheek news release put out by the network, the two animated family patriarchs chimed in with their excitement for this long-overdue crossover. "Finally I can get my hands on this guy," said Homer Simpson, expressing, perhaps, the excitement that a lot of fans of both shows will be feeling over this television event.

No specific air date for the episode has been set yet, though it's slated for fall 2014.

Revolutionary ideas: The revolution is spreading.

"Revolution" was a huge freshman hit for NBC last season, defying lukewarm early reviews by critics to become a ratings darling. With the high body count of the first season — several significant characters didn't survive to see Season 2 — the cast of this apocalyptic drama is expanding, with Jessica Collins and Patrick Heusinger signing up for important roles.

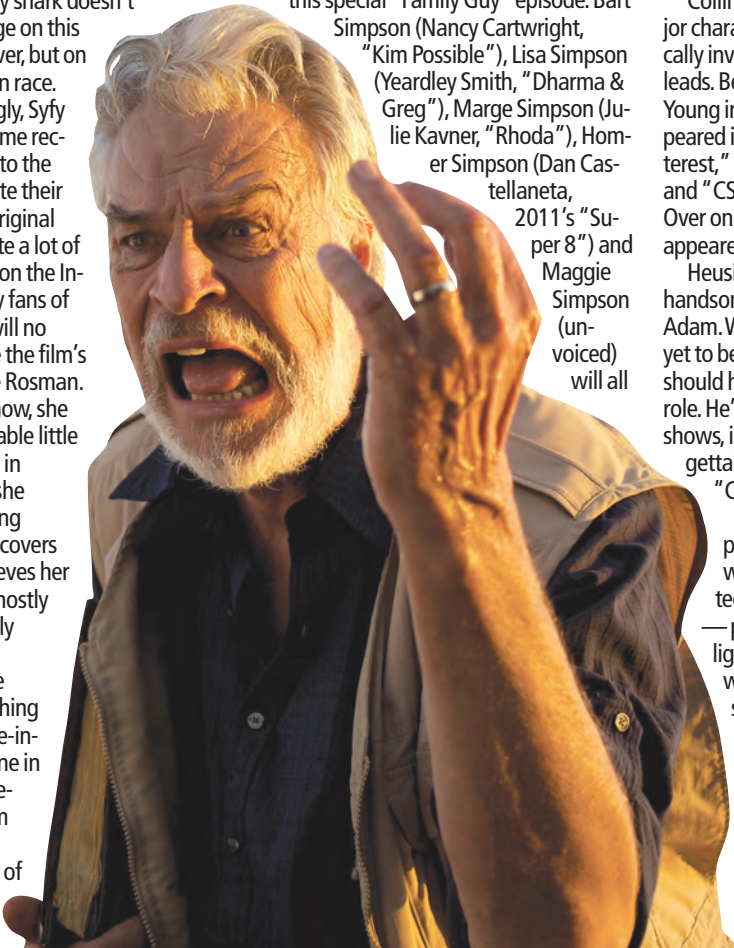
Collins joins the show as Cynthia, a major character who will become romantically involved with one of the show's leads. Best known for her role as Maggie Young in "Rubicon," Collins has also appeared in "The Good Wife," "Person of Interest," "Law & Order: Criminal Intent" and "CSI: Crime Scene Investigation." Over on the big screen, she most recently appeared in 2012's "Zero Dark Thirty."

Heusinger has signed on to play a handsome and roguish man named Adam. Whether he'll be a friend or foe has yet to be revealed, but the versatile actor should have no trouble slipping into either role. He's popped up in a long list of TV shows, including "Gossip Girl," "Unforgettable," "Necessary Roughness," "CSI: Miami" and "30 Rock."

"Revolution" is a show about power — in both senses of the word. Set in an America in which all technology that relies on electricity — phones, cars, computers, even lights — has mysteriously stopped working, it's an intimate adventure seen through the eyes of a young woman struggling to survive (Tracy Spiridakos, "Being Human").

The second season is scheduled to premiere Sept. 25 on NBC.

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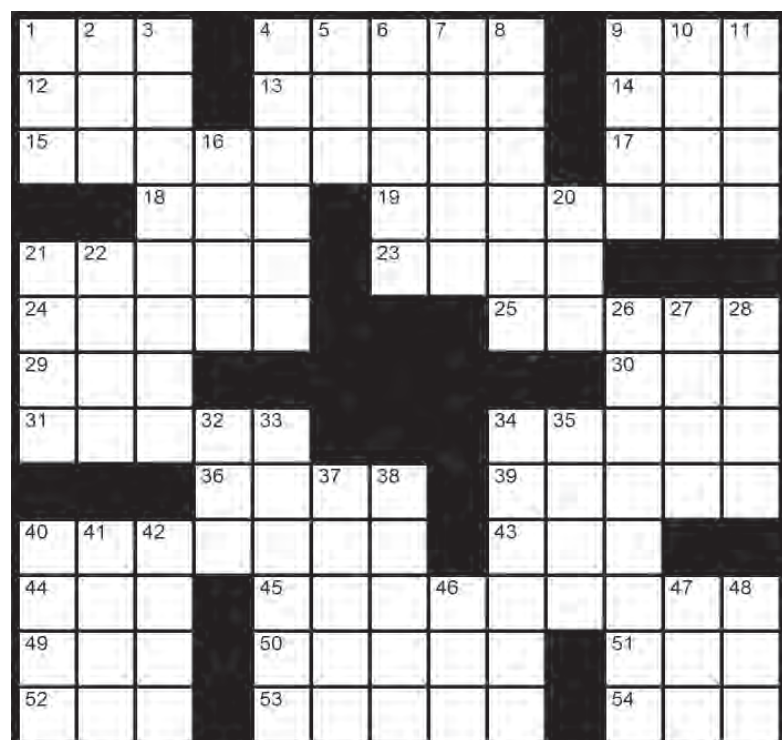
